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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### THE SISTERS OF MERCY IN DUNGARVAN

The seven booklet detailing the order of the cereals at the Mass and blessing of the new extension for the Mercy Convent in Dungarvan. Colaisie Muire also contains a brief history of the Mercy Order's work in developing facilities for secondary education in the town.

As some wag put it—  
 "To purchase souls for penny-rows  
 —For soup and hairy bacon."  
 Canon Power then goes on: "Convents and Religious were few in those times; so, for that matter were railways and such means of travelling. Our devoted pastor had a weary time in search of a community for his parish. He tried Dublin first—journeying from convent to convent and from one Religious Order to another—but without avail. Something inspired him to turn his steps to Wexford and there, as if by a miracle, he succeeded. The Convent of Mercy came to his aid—promising a small community of three sisters which, indeed, happily speaking, it could ill afford."

Detailing how the nuns made the journey to Cappoquin the history states: "Preliminaries having been satisfactorily arranged, the little band of Sisters, under Mother Vincent Fanning, set out for their new home on November 25, 1850. From Wexford to Waterford was a whole day's horse journey on an indifferent road. The wayfarers stayed in Waterford for the night and the following morning they were most kindly received by the Bishop, Dr. Foran, who sent his own carriage and coachman with them as far as Dungarvan."

"When they reached Cappoquin the short day had already closed but the travellers found a temporary home prepared for them in a house off the Main Street. Here they had to put up with many inconveniences and discomforts but the heroic pioneers were often, in after days, heard to say that they had never been happier than these first weeks of privation and lack of amenity, lending credence to the words of the Step-mother who works of their institute—visitation of the sick and poor and instruction of young women in Christian doctrine. They commenced school teaching as soon as they could and as their limited numbers allowed.

"Soon, better accommodation was secured—the well-remembered old convent opposite the church gates. The place was convenient because it enabled the community to hear Holy Mass daily in the parish church. It had a front that was far from imposing but it had at the rear a pleasant little garden that sloped down to the river's edge. Adjoining houses—eight or nine in all, finally—were bought from time to time as opportunity offered and as the community increased in number. Such a makeshift convent building is seldom the most comfortable but the good sisterhood made the best of it and their unselfish labours brought a blessing on Convent and Parish. Postulants became fairly numerous and the house was soon strong enough to send a foundation to Dungarvan in 1854."

"And that is how the good Sisters of Mercy first came to Cappoquin and subsequently to Dungarvan and started the wonderful tradition of service which has left generations in both towns so deeply indebted to them."

### HARD TIMES IN CAPPOQUIN

Canon Power's history of the Order in Cappoquin has a couple of interesting references to conditions in the town in those times and which, I thought, were worth recording before I put it back on the shelf.

"During the decade ending 1860 times were bad in and around Cappoquin; there was much lack of work resulting in widespread want. To alleviate the situation as far as they could the Sisters organised an industry for girls and

women. The parish priest built a workroom for them and the little venture proved highly successful. The wages were not high but they kept the wolf from many a poor door. Mustin embroidery and Point lace making were the chief branches attempted and in these the workers soon developed much skill.

"Another and rather unusual work of charity was initiated in 1861. This was a Sunday School for secular subjects—reading, writing and arithmetic. The school had a very good attendance, especially of farm workers.

"An industrial school for the care and training of small boys and under government supervision was opened by the Sisters in 1873."

"The new convent, on a sunny eminence at the eastern boundary of the township was erected in the years 1902-03 and blessed, dedicated and formally opened by the Bishop of the Diocese, Most Rev. Dr. Sheehan, on Michaelmas Day of the latter year."

I know I am but re-iterating the thoughts of everyone when I say, long may the Mercy Order flourish to continue their wonderful work of service.

### NEW TRAFFIC LIGHTS

# Great Day For Mercy Order In Dungarvan

Monday last, May 10, 1982 will be forever remembered by the people of Dungarvan as it marked another milestone in the history of the Order in the town with the blessing and official opening of their new extension at Colaisie Muire with accommodation for 425 secondary students.

The magnificent building which has many specialist departments with ultra modern facilities has cost, fully equipped, the sum of £750,000. It was designed by the Cork firm of Architects, Frank Murphy, Ian White and Partners, and built in most splendid fashion by the well-known local firm, Building Contractors E. O'Brien & Sons, Ltd., Dungarvan.

The new extension was blessed by the Most Rev. Dr. M. Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore and was officially opened by Mr. R. Walsh, Chairman, Dungarvan Urban Council.

The ceremonies for the great occasion commenced with a celebrated Mass at St. Mary's Parish Church at 11 a.m. The principal celebrant was Most Rev. Dr. Russell and the concelebrants were Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P., V.F., Very Rev. Canon Farrell, P.P., Very Rev. Fr. Brennan, O.S.A., Prior, Rev. Fr. Callahan, C.C., Rev. Fr. Carey, O.S.A. and Rev. Fr. Galinias, C.C.

The huge edifice was crowded to capacity as the Mercy Convent Choir with Sister Binnett at the organ and under the direction of Sister M. Goretti sang the Entrance Hymn 'Joy Comes to the Heart' and the singing and organ accompaniment throughout the whole of the Mass was both beautiful and inspiring.

### BISHOP'S CONGRATULATIONS

In his sermon during the Mass his Lordship the Bishop extended his congratulations to the Mercy Sisters for the wonderful work which they had done and said that they had joined in celebrating such a joyous occasion which was a further milestone in the history of the Mercy Sisters in Dungarvan. The Bishop stressed the fact as enunciated by Pope John Paul II that a Catholic school must be committed to teaching the tenets of the Catholic faith to all pupils and he said in doing this they must make no apology to anyone. He praised the courage of the Nuns in facing the huge burden which the building of the new school extension had placed on them and said that his prayer for the future was that Catholic schools such as this would always be in Ireland.

### THE BLESSING

After Mass, all the pupils of the Mercy Schools marched to the new school which was festooned with flags and bunting where the blessing and official opening took place, following which most of the present staff of the school were invited to tour the school which was open to the public. Fine airy bright classrooms abounded, with a couple of very fine, fully equipped cookery rooms while particular interest centred in the Art room with its polystyrene kiln and the Language Laboratory with its ultra modern electronic teaching facility.

In the course of his speech at the opening, Mr. Walsh referred to the heavy financial undertaking for the Mercy community which the building of the new school had meant to it.

#### IRISH GRAIN SHOULD BE IN COMPOUND

£225 million was in imports of cereal and feeds in 1981. It was stressed at a meeting of the Irish Goods Council and the Irish Grain Recruiters Merchants Association that a campaign should be launched to discontinue the greater use of imported feed grain in the production of compound feed. The matter is being discussed at this time as over 80 per cent of compound feed used last year was made from imported ingredients while Irish feed harvests since last harvest have been depressed.

It is pointed out that some of the substitutes are of poor quality and poor nutritive value. It was agreed that a campaign should be launched to make both the public and the feed manufacturers aware of the advantages of producing quality standards with the maximum use of Irish grain at the same time, maintaining the value for money to the feed compounds.

It was agreed that a statement of Agriculture should be asked to regulate the use of cereal substitutes into the country and bring in improved regulations for the manufacture of feed compounds.

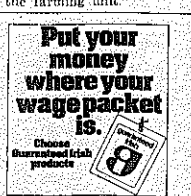

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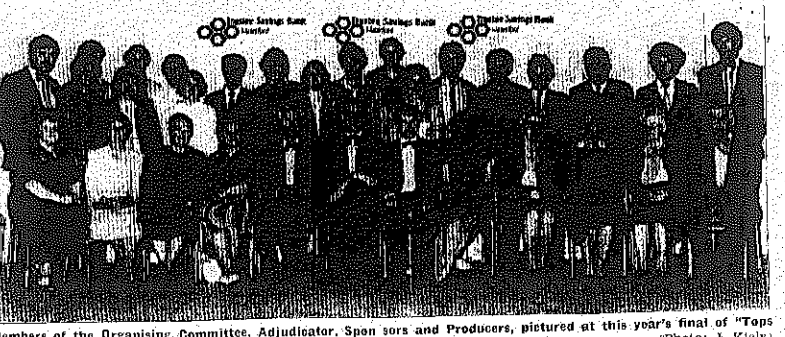
