## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**MINISTER'S NO HOPE FOR  
 QUIGLEY DEPUTATION**  
 When Minister for Industry and Energy, Albert Reynolds arrived by helicopter in Dungarvan last week to perform the official opening of the Stafford Miller Plant, one of the first tasks he was faced with was meeting a deputation concerned with the announced closure, next month, of the Quigley Magnessite Plant at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan.

The deputation comprised County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley, the Chairman of both the County and Urban Councils and Mr. Tony Mansfield, A.T.G.W.U. District Officer, who headed a strong trade union representation. During a two-hour meeting, the Minister heard all the arguments as to why the plant should not be allowed to close but in the end he was unable to hold out any hope that the planned closure could be averted or even postponed.

The failure of the Minister to provide any hope that Quigley would be kept operational obviously angered many of the workers and the communal nature of his response to the case put forward by members of the deputation is now seen as acceptance by the government that there is no hope that the industry can be saved.

When the shock announcement that the Ballinacourty Plant was going to close with a loss of 140 jobs was first made at a press conference in Dungarvan on Wednesday, April 28, Mr. James C. O'Donoghue, Chief Executive of the Quigley Company who made the announcement, made it quite clear that it was not, as he told the press people, a 24-hour decision on the plant which had been made by the company. In other words it was a decision which had been reached after all options had been considered over a period.

This being so, and no matter how distasteful the position is, and the fact that 140 jobs are going to be lost with a concomitant loss to the general economy of the community can hardly be more distasteful, it must be accepted that there was nothing the government nor indeed anyone could do in the circumstances and that the closure would be halted or postponed were, from the very first announcement, only vain hopes indeed.

**IMPORTANT DAY IN  
 HISTORY OF  
 NEW COMPANY**  
 While dark clouds are gathering over Ballinacourty, the Minister's visit to Dungarvan was not all gloom as he moved on to the function which primarily brought him to the town — the official opening of the new high calibre healthcare project of Stafford Miller (Ireland) Ltd. of which Inc. Block Drug Corporation of New Jersey, USA, is the parent company.

Following the ceremonial blessing of the new factory by Very Rev. Dean Mayes, and Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, the Minister cut the tape at the main entrance to the spacious building, and on entering the lobby unveiled a plaque, inset in the wall commemorating the opening. Protective clothing was issued to all the VIP's and visitors who attended the ceremonies as they entered the factory and all, including the Minister, were then taken on a tour in groups during which the various processes on the production lines were explained by guides. Speeches were made from a specially constructed platform in the main building and the speakers who were introduced by the factory's general manager, Mr. Michael Leo, who acted as M.C., included the Minister, Mr. John Bennett, Vice-President, International

of Block Drug who travelled especially from New Jersey for the opening and the Chairman of the Urban and County Councils. In the course of his short speech Mr. Bennett said that the day was a most important one in the history of the Company. He said that when they realised 3 years ago that they would need a new factory for Europe, a careful analysis was carried out as a result of which Ireland and the site they now were on were chosen. "Our confidence in Ireland was well placed and it has already been justified," he said. Mr. Bennett went on to pay a high tribute to the Industrial Development Authority (IDA) whom he said, had no equal in counselling and helping. He concluded by making a presentation of Dungarvan Crystal to Minister Reynolds to mark the occasion.

In Dungarvan the Stafford Miller Company is manufacturing world famous oral hygiene products which include such names as Sensodyne toothpaste and Super Polygrip denture fixative cream as well as tooth brushes and other related items. In addition the Company has decided to introduce a new product line to Dungarvan, a liquid denture adhesive developed by Block Drug in its laboratories in New Jersey and for which there is already a big demand in Germany and other European markets. The £5 million Stafford Miller Plant which went into production last October at present employs 50 people and when full production is reached this number is expected to rise to 146.

**A 10 SECOND SPRINT**  
 It has been suggested to me by several pedestrians (and by a number of motorists too) that the time limit in the changing of the colours of the traffic lights in Dungarvan and Abbeyside could be altered some little bit to allow pedestrians more time in crossing through Mary Street corner and from Stranidside south to Killy's corner. I do not know what the exact ratio in the light changes are at present — they are set to favour the through Cork-Waterford traffic — but one pedestrian has told me that in trying to cross at Abbeyside all he had was 10 seconds and that the light changes caught him in the middle of the road — much too short for even sprinting movers.

**NEW MONTHLY FARMING JOURNAL SPOTLIGHTS "DOUBLE STANDARDS"**  
 A new farming journal, "The Practical Farmer" was launched in Dublin last month at a reception attended by the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Brian Lemmon. The new monthly journal, which incorporates "The Farmer" magazine, reflects the changing composition of Irish farming needs and will be distributed on a controlled basis to 10,000 farmers at the top end of the market (circulation control criteria include farmers with 150 acres or 60 dairy cows or 80 acres of cereal or other tillage or 150 beef cattle). An additional 1,000 copies will be distributed through retail newsagents for other farmers not on the circulation list.

Reading through the first issue of "The Practical Farmer" I came across an item concerning which I had heard rumours circulating in Dungarvan some time ago. Under the heading "Double Standards," the paragraph reads as follows: "The watering down of milk incident by one of the competitors in the Farmers' Journal/Bord Baine 'Dairy Farmer of the Year' competition caused a bit of a scare in the dairy industry recently. We have heard since that, in fact, it was a Waterford Co-op supplier who was

caught at it. And in fact it was an ICI adviser who first became suspicious when he discovered that the farmer had two bulk tanks. Apparently the sample had been taken from the first tank, which had all milk in it, and the second tank had been watered down. When the adviser discovered the farmer had a second tank he became suspicious and the farmer was asked to withdraw. So, sometimes it doesn't pay to fiddle."

**MET POPE IN EDINBURGH**  
 In the course of his historic pastoral visit to England, Scotland and Wales last weekend Pope John Paul met Church leaders of all denominations and when he visited Edinburgh on Monday last he exchanged greetings with the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, the Right Reverend Dr. John McIntyre. The formal ceremony took place in the Courtyard of New College, close to Edinburgh Castle.

At a meeting with the staff of New College later, Professor James Mackey who was laicised in 1973 met Pope John Paul. Introduced separately to the Pope was his wife Noelle, Professor Mackey held the prestigious Thomas Chalmers Chair of Theology at New College since his controversial appointment to the post in 1979. He teaches theology to the trainees for the Presbyterian Ministry.

When he was introduced to the Pope Professor Mackey bowed and kissed the Pope's ring. No words were spoken between the Pope and the theologian. Dr. Mackey is a native of Dungarvan. **FLEW 4,000 MILES TO CELEBRATE WITH OLD FRIEND**

## COUNTY COUNCIL DEPUTATION WELL RECEIVED BY ENVIRONMENT MINISTER

A deputation from Waterford County Council and consisting of Mr. P. Kennedy, Chairman, Cllrs. Henry, McDonnell, O'Ryan and Quigley, members of the Opposition, and the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer and Mr. B. J. McNally, County Secretary were received by Mr. Ray Burke, Minister for the Environment in Dublin on Thursday, May 20. The purpose of the deputation was to stress the Council's financial inability to maintain the roads, insurmountable capital house construction programme and to ask that if money could not be made available for county roads that some flexibility in the use of the Block Grant be permitted.

Reporting on the deputation at a special meeting of the Council in Dungarvan, the Co. Secretary, Mr. E. J. McNally, stated: "The Minister indicated that although he has been in office since 1981 on the money, including £270,000 notified recently to the Council, from a £20m. allocation which he had received in the Budget, he had no further monies for allocation in 1982. The Minister suggested that the 'strategic' grant of £70,000 for Regional Roads could be flexibly 'inter-converted'."

Following further discussion the Minister indicated that if the report was prepared by the County Council on the deteriorating condition of county roads he would have the position examined by his officials.

**HOUSING**  
 The County Manager referred to the position that had obtained in 1981 when the Minister had indicated that the Minister had agreed to enable work to continue on the Council's modest housing capital programme. The position in 1982 was such that a similar situation would arise in the absence of additional capital to continue work in progress. The financial position of the Council to "carry" this level of expenditure was seriously eroded due to substantial arrears of rates outstanding.

The Minister indicated that he was fully appreciative of the position and indicated that a further allocation of Capital monies would be made before the end of the month which would enable the Council to continue its programme and enable a phased start on the current proposals in 1982.

## Deasy backs Britain in Falklands issue

Deputy Austin Deasy (FG) has issued the following statement: "The Government's blanket anti-British stance on the Falklands Islands issue is disgraceful and is a pandering to the perpetrators of the policies of hate which is so prevalent in elements of our society. Such hypocrisy and such unchristian posing must be resisted and rejected by all fair-minded people on this island. Many decent Irish people have been cowed into silence and even criticism of British reaction to an aggression by a militant and hostile minority who seemingly have a blind hatred of everything British. This country appears to have unlimited quantities of bigotry. In many instances people are afraid to express a sensible, fair-minded opinion lest they be designated by associates or friends as being Pro-British."

"Over the years hundreds of thousands of our citizens have earned an excellent living in Britain and in many ways have helped the economy of this country enormously. Thousands of Irish men and women have served in the British Armed Forces through two World Wars and no doubt many more are presently engaged in the battle for the Falkland Islands. Obviously there are very large numbers of second and third generation Irish fighting on the British side and who can blame them being bitter at the lack of support from the land of their forebears."

"Economically our stance is suicidal. We can hardly expect the British public to purchase Irish products and produce where alternatives are available. The collapse of the most lucrative element of our tourist industry, i.e. the British market, has been a costly blow and a severe setback to the economy. The job losses arising from our present unfriendly attitude will be significant and we should ask ourselves if in these difficult times we can afford to be so independent."

"In times of stress, those in difficulties expect the hand of friendship from their neighbours and it is my perception that our Government's actions do not reflect the views of the majority of fair-minded Irish people. Let us ignore the fibes and provocations of the British gutter press and certain British politicians and remember that by and large the British are an exceptionally friendly and tolerant people deserving of much more sympathetic treatment than that presently being meted out by our Government. Hopefully it is not too late for a change of heart."

**URBAN COUNCIL APPROVES OF NEW DUMP CHARGES**  
 On the recommendation of the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, Dungarvan Urban Council unanimously agreed to introduce new charges for the use of the Council's dump at Ballinacourty at their May monthly meeting.

In making his recommendation, the County Manager stated that he intended that such charges should apply only in cases of the disposal of commercial waste. "I am aware," Mr. Hurley told the Council, "that the dump is providing a much needed service for the people of the town and surrounding district and would be reluctant to discourage the person who wishes to use the dump facilities for disposing of small amounts of domestic waste, such as may be contained in a plastic bag or the boot of a car and I would accordingly recommend that charges should be allowed to continue to use the dump without charge."

Mr. Hurley then submitted the following charges being similar to those at other dumps: 55p per lorry load or skip; 32p per tractor or pick-up truck and £1 per trailer.

With certain reservations the Council on the proposal of Cllr. D. Goode seconded by Cllr. B. Kyne approved of the new charges on the understanding that the position would be reviewed in 6 or 9 months.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Q - I am a 51 year old man living with my daughter who died three years ago. My daughter has had to give up a fine job to look after me. She has no money. I only have an invalidity pension and would like to know if there is any other payment my girl can get to support herself. I am not even entitled to the 50p.

A - Yes! There is another payment you can get because you are an invalidly pensioner. You are entitled to a grant from one other person who is providing constant care and attending the full housing programme of the State. You can apply immediately for the prescribed Relative Allowance, and your case will be assessed. If you qualify for payment you will receive 200p a week of your pension. Your daughter will not receive any payment for herself. There are many rules which apply but as long as your daughter is being supported by anyone, earning any money, or receiving any social welfare payment, your case looks very good. The golden rule is 'It is doubt - apply.'

Your daughter will also be welcome at your local Community Information Centre in Dungarvan where help is available.

SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD Food Hygiene Regulations 1950-1971 PROPOSED NEW FOOD PREMISES Persons who propose to commence any of the 'regulatable food business' (hotels, cafes, restaurants, public houses, fishmongers, food manufacturers, ice cream manufacturers, wholesalers of food) should be aware that before any such business may be legally carried on, they must first apply for registration within a specified period of one month prior to the commencement of such a business and obtain registration, full or provisional, of the food premises concerned. FAILURE TO OBSERVE THE REQUIREMENTS CAN RESULT IN LEGAL PROCEEDINGS BEING TAKEN AGAINST THE PROPRIETOR. Prior notification will also ensure that subsequent and expensive alterations to the premises can be avoided. Applicants for Registration are especially advised to give preliminary notice to the Health Board at the planning stage. This procedure will ensure that the Statutory requirements will be incorporated in the final layout, thereby avoiding possible additional outlay on the building. CALF PREMIUM SCHEME (1) This Scheme applies from the beginning of the current marketing year, viz. 20 May, 1982. (2) It provides for a payment of 32 ECUs (at present equal to £21.90) for each calf born within the State on or after that date and reared to at least 6 months of age. (3) The full conditions of the Scheme will be available in the very near future. A basic condition will be that the date of birth of each calf for which a premium is claimed must be clearly established. Theonus will be on the farmer to satisfy the Department of Agriculture on this. (4) The Department will arrange for the early inspection and tagging of calves born on or after 20 May, 1982, with a view to identification later for premium purposes. Calves will be inspected and tagged at centres and details of these centres will be advertised shortly in local newspapers. Owners of locked-up herds, however, should apply in writing to the local office of the Department for on-farm inspections of any calves born on or after 20 May, 1982, and should quote their full names, addresses and herd numbers. (Printed postcards will be made available for this purpose later). Pending inspection and tagging no calf should be sold from the holding on which it was born. Any calf sold before inspection and tagging will not qualify for the premium. (5) A Certificate of Birth for each calf will be issued at the time of tagging and this will be an essential document for claiming the premium after the calf has reached 6 months of age. Where a calf is sold in the meantime the Certificate should be given to the new owner. (6) Calves born before 20 May, 1982, are not eligible for the premium and will not be considered for tagging. JAILED FOR BOUNCING CHEQUES, STEALING AND FRAUD

A well-dressed clean-cut 28 year old man appeared before District Justice P. A. McMorrow at Dungarvan Court on a long list of charges of uttering false cheques, stealing and fraud to all of which he pleaded guilty. He was Gerard O'Dowd, a house decorator of no fixed abode but stated to be a native of Ballinacorney, Co. Galway.

O'Dowd was charged that on May 22 at O'Connell Street, Dungarvan he did enter the Ormonde Hotel and steal cash amounting to £113 the property of Niall Flynn; that on May 22 at T. F. Meagher Street, Dungarvan he did attempt to defraud Sean Hogan, Manager Allied Irish Bank of the sum of £250 by falsely pretending that a Savings Account Book Book in the name of Timothy O'Keefe was his property; that on the same day at Mary Street, Dungarvan he attempted to defraud and obtain goods and cash to the value of £50 from Jim O'Donnell and a false cheque; that on the same day he attempted to defraud Mary McGrath, M.A. at Street, Dungarvan of the sum of £9; that on May 20 at the Ard-Hi Hotel, Waterford he obtained cash amounting to £20 from Tony Breen by uttering a false cheque and that on the same day at the Ard-Hi Hotel he did obtain goods and services to the value of £20 by uttering a false cheque.

Det. Garda J. Molloy gave evidence of arresting the defendant on May 21. He said that having been charged he was then released on his own bail. He re-arrested the defendant on May 25 and charged him with the false cheques.

Stole a Car When the defendant formally pleaded guilty to all the charges, Det. Garda Molloy then told the Court that on May 20 the defendant stole a car in Clonmel the property of Timothy O'Keefe in which there was a cheque book and a Bank Savings Book. He went to Waterford where he wrote two cheques at the Ard-Hi Hotel. He then came to Dungarvan where he wrote another cheque for Jim O'Donnell and tried to cash it at £250 in cash from the AIB by presenting the Savings Account Book.

Det. Garda Molloy went on to say that the defendant was arrested at this point and taken to the Station and charged but was released on his own bail at 10 p.m. on May 21. He then went up the street and went into McGrath's shop where he attempted to defraud the shopkeeper by presenting a cheque for £100 and not a £1 note he had tendered for a basket of clothing goods. Later that night having gone to the Ormonde Hotel he stole the cash at about 3.30 a.m. and he was again arrested that evening.

Inspector M. Gilhooly who prosecuted told the District Justice that the defendant had several previous convictions mainly for fraud and larceny and that he had served several terms of imprisonment. Mr. E. P. King, Solicitor who defended having been assigned to the defence by the Court read a statement from the defendant in which he expressed regret for what he had done. 'All I can now do,' the statement added 'is to place myself at the mercy of the Court.' The statement then asked that any sentence that might be imposed on him be deferred for 3 months to allow the defendant an opportunity to repay the money totalling £285 to the injured parties. Mr. King said that he would put the case for the defendant no further only to say that he appeared to have a banking after hotels.

District Justice McMorrow sentenced O'Dowd to one year in prison on the first charge and said that all other charges were taken into account in this sentence. He fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.

ALL IRISH SCHOOL TO OPEN

Plans are now nearing completion for the opening in September of an All Irish School in Dungarvan. Much work has gone into the effort during the past few months and the committee in charge, which includes a number of parents who want their children to receive an All Irish education is now making the finishing touches to its plans.

The All Irish school will be named Scoil Gharrbhain and will have National school status, recognised, subsidised and inspected by the Department of Education. Free education applies of course. All subjects, including English of course, will be taught and pupils will have the benefit of bilingualism from an early age. Scoil Gharrbhain will have a lower pupil/teacher ratio than other National Schools (not more than twenty pupils in a class) and therefore pupils will receive individual attention. As well as this, the committee has offers from teachers of music, drama, dancing, games and gymnasiums, to teach these extra-curricular subjects in the school.

LOCATION AND DEVELOPMENT Scoil Gharrbhain will be housed temporarily in the old Church of Ireland school, which has been given by kind permission of Very Rev. Dean Richard of the Church of Ireland Rectory. Indeed Dean Mayes was most helpful in the process and visited Dungarvan at the most unusual time of 7.30 a.m. one morning, to meet members of the committee and show them the school building and grounds. Incidentally, the old Church of Ireland school is in excellent repair and is an ideal location for the school.

The committee of Scoil Gharrbhain is very thankful indeed to Dean Mayes, for his kind assistance. Of course the intention behind the All Irish school is to develop and expand it. Starting off in September, it will have only one teacher catering for the infant classes and possibly first class, if there are pupils for such. It will develop yearly, until it is a fully developed school, housed in a new modern building catering for as many pupils as there is demand for.

Incidentally the Department of Education gives a hundred percent grant towards the purchase of the building, but the building of an All Irish school. So a new school, with playing field will be built in Dungarvan without a local contribution.

The school committee meets in Lawlor's Hotel every Tuesday night at 10 p.m. Anybody wishing to help, or who wants to control pupils in the school can contact the following: Mrs. Colette McGrath, St. Davan's Dec., Mrs. Geraldine Kelly, Brynville, or Síneara Bean Uí Donnabháin, Pinewood Estate, Abbey-side.

A play school of naíonra catering for children between three and four years and using Irish as a new medium language has already been established by Bríd Bean M. She in her own house in Pinewood, Abbey-side. It is hoped also to develop this naíonra, so that it will be complementary to the All Irish school. The idea is that pre-school children will have learned quite an amount of Irish through the play-group before they enter formal school.

Caravanners Fined For Illegal Parking

Three members of the travelling community, Matthew Clap, Thomas Connors and William Connors were each fined £50 with £20 costs when convicted by District Justice P. A. McMorrow at Dungarvan Court charged under the Temporary Dwelling Act for Illegally parking their caravans at Shandon, Dungarvan. The proceedings against the defendants were instituted by Dungarvan Urban Council and evidence of the presence of the vans was given by Mr. P. Murphy, Town Foreman.

RESTORE TREACY TO COSPOIR CALL

At the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council Deputy Austin Deasy said he thought that they, as a Council, should join the many other towns and villages which had already done so in voicing their protest at the removal of John Treacy from the Council. Deputy Deasy said that the move could not be described as a 'sham' and that the ill-judged and ill-advised decision.

Cllr. Dee Goode stated that John Treacy had been World Cross Country Champion for two years and that the Council should voice a protest and send a message to the Government and further agreed that a request be sent to Minister of State, Mr. George Colley, to have John Treacy's name restored to the Council.

LAND SALE TO MEITHEAL MARRA NA RINNE

Land acquired by Waterford County Council from the State at Meitheal in 1974 is to be sold to Meitheal MARRA NA RINNE. The Council at a special meeting in Dungarvan agreed in principle to the sale of the land which the County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, stated was to be used for the erection of a factory by the group.

When the question was asked as to who Meitheal MARRA NA RINNE was, Cllr. Jim Harty said that it was a public cooperative of Ring Roadmen to whom great credit was due for taking this step as it would mean the setting up of an auction centre where they would be able to sell their own produce and obtain the full market price.

Cllr. Harty said that the Co-op had received contributions from many spouses and added that he would like to congratulate the County Council in being the first public body to make a move to help the co-op. He proposed that the sale be approved. This was seconded by Deputy A. Deasy and unanimously approved.

Young Defendants Remanded On Bail In Dungarvan

Two 20-year old young men appeared before District Justice P. A. McMorrow at Dungarvan Court on charges of stealing property value £250 from the Quilley Machine Factory at Ballinacorney. Tolom O'Leary, 35, Springfield Estate, Dungarvan and Paddy Joe Dwyer, 41r, Ballinacorney, Dungarvan were both charged that on May 6 at Ballinacorney, they unlawfully entered as trespassers the factory of Quilley Machine and steal property value £250 belonging to Bill Romayne. Both pleaded not guilty to the charges.

Inspector M. Gilhooly who prosecuted asked that the charges be adjourned as the injured party was at present on holidays.

According to the request, the District Justice adjourned the hearing of the charges to the next sitting of the Court in Dungarvan on June 9 and remanded the defendants on continuing bail.
