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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

NEW PRESIDENT OF I.C.O.S.

It is indeed a great pleasure for us this week to congratulate Mr. John Barry, Glenmalur, Lismore on his election as President of the Irish Co-operative Organisation Society to succeed European Parliament Member T. J. Maher.

John is one of the most progressive dairy farmers in County Waterford and one of the best known figures in agricultural politics at national level, having been a Vice-President of the National Farmers Association with Mr. Richard Deasy. He was also Chairman of the Waterford Executive of the NFA and its Vice-Chairman of Waterford Co-op and a member of the Board of ACOT, the National Agricultural Council.

Mr. Barry's election took place during a special two-day conference of the ICOS Council in Dublin last week and during a subsequent news conference he touched on a subject which was debated at length by the members of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Friday.

This concerned the Brussels farm package and the concept, rejected as erroneous, that Irish farmers were not as badly off as they claim to be.

Mr. Barry stated at the news conference that of the £700 million a year in State and EEC funds earmarked for Irish agriculture only about £300 million actually ends up in the farmers' hands — the rest of the money is absorbed by a vast army of bureaucrats in administration. Mr. Barry condemned what he called his "enormous bureaucracy" which has been set up to administer farm grants. Now the ICOS has become so concerned about the situation that the outgoing President, Euro MP T. J. Maher is to raise the issue in the European Parliament and the ICOS is to urge the Government to place the administration of agricultural grants in the hands of the farming co-ops themselves.

"This," Mr. Barry then said, "would be the cheapest and most effective mechanism of getting the money through the farm gates," and he added, "the money is no good to farmers if it is being lost in administration. We need a radical change in the administration of agricultural aid as only a fraction is currently getting through to farmers."

Mr. Barry also stated at the news conference that farming was now getting back to the situation of the late '70's when production could begin to increase. The ICOS was having discussions with the Banks Standing Committee on some arrangement whereby farmers could buy feed and fertilizer supplies from their co-operatives on an overdraft facility with the Banks. And he said the ICOS was interested in working closely with agriculture, so that targets could be set annually for milk, beef and grain.

Perhaps the fact that so much of the money coming from Brussels for the farmers is taken to pay civil servants to administer it can account for the varying position and potential of farmers as expressed in statements from the EEC on the one hand and the farmers themselves on the other.

These protests have rightly been made and we fully endorse them as we believe that there was no man better qualified than the Villiers-town man to serve on Cospoir with his world wide experience as a top athlete.

One of the most embarrassed organisations in the County as a result of Mrs. Quinn's decision was the Fianna Fail Party from whom one of the first and one of the most vehement protests came and which called on her to re-instate John Treacy.

The Minister has now given her answer to all these protests and requests. This came in a one sentence reply in the Dail on Wednesday, June 2, to a question by Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy, put down for the Minister for Education asking if he would restore John Treacy to the National Sports Council "as has been demanded by all sections of the community in Waterford county and city," it stated: "I have appointed Cospoir, the National Sports Council for a three year term of office beginning 1st May, 1982 and it is not my intention to make any alteration in its membership."

So much for popular demand!

DEAD PHONES IN DUNGARVAN

We have received several complaints from telephone subscribers in Dungarvan that their phones have been out of order since last Friday morning and at the time of compiling this column our Tuesday the service had still not been restored. Main areas affected are in the Mitchel Street-Youghal Road-Springmount districts and extending as far as Twomile-bridge.

The cause of the failure, I understand, was that an old lead cable in Mitchel Street which had become porous, eventually broke down and left all the subscribers in the area it serviced with dead telephones.

Although the fault was discovered without delay, the length of time taken to effect the necessary repair and replacement has to be criticised and hinges, we understand, around the fact that overtime on the job would not be allowed.

Whatever about the merits or demerits of the Department's policy in cutting back on expenditure, there should be a proper priority where repairs to major breaks such as this one are concerned and they should be tackled and completed with the least possible delay.

Business people, not to mention private subscribers in the affected areas have suffered considerable loss and inconvenience because of the long break in their telephone links over the entire of last week-end and goodness knows the high charges now having to be paid by subscribers should merit them better treatment than this.

MENTALLY HANDICAPPED IN PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITALS

I was pleased to note that at the May meeting of the Special Hospitals Committee of the South Eastern Health Board, the Programme Manager, Mr. J. A. Cooney informed the members of the Department of Health policy document and the report on disturbed mentally handicapped persons, prepared by a sub-committee of the Royal College of Psychiatrists (Irish Division).

The document and report indicate that it is to be a departmental policy for the future to cease admission of the adult mentally handicapped to psychiatric hospitals insofar as this can be achieved on grounds of unsuitability.

In accordance with this new attitude it would appear that almost all adult handi-

apped should now be cared for in special centres but the policy will be almost impossible to operate as the present shortfall in accommodation will necessitate a continuation of the admission of a number of mentally handicapped persons to psychiatric hospitals.

While we must acknowledge the fact that there will be a problem in providing adequate accommodation for separate centres and that these will take some time to materialise, we welcome the flexibility in the departmental policy as outlined pending the provision of separate facilities as a step in the right direction.

The Department's document also pointed out that pending expansion of the present level of facilities for disturbed mentally handicapped persons in special centres, a degree of flexibility in the approach to their treatment was needed.

The Report of the Royal College of Psychiatrists has made the following recommendations: a) adequate, long-term residential facilities and day-care facilities to be provided in all areas and by specific services for chronically disturbed and violent patients should be developed in each area either in mental handicap centres or in special units in psychiatric hospitals.

This change in the attitude of the Department in regard to the care and treatment of adult mentally handicapped can only be welcomed as it is beyond time to realise that mental hospitals are not or never were suitable for their treatment.

The late Dr. Michael O'Neil who was Assistant Chief Medical Officer in Waterford for a number of years up to the time of his most regretted death and who was very highly qualified in the field of psychiatric treatment was a firm believer then in the policy now adopted by the Department. He always held that it was not right that adult mentally handicapped

persons should be housed in mental hospitals among psychiatric patients and he had gone so far as to go in providing a segregated unit for them in St. Otteran's Hospital in Waterford.

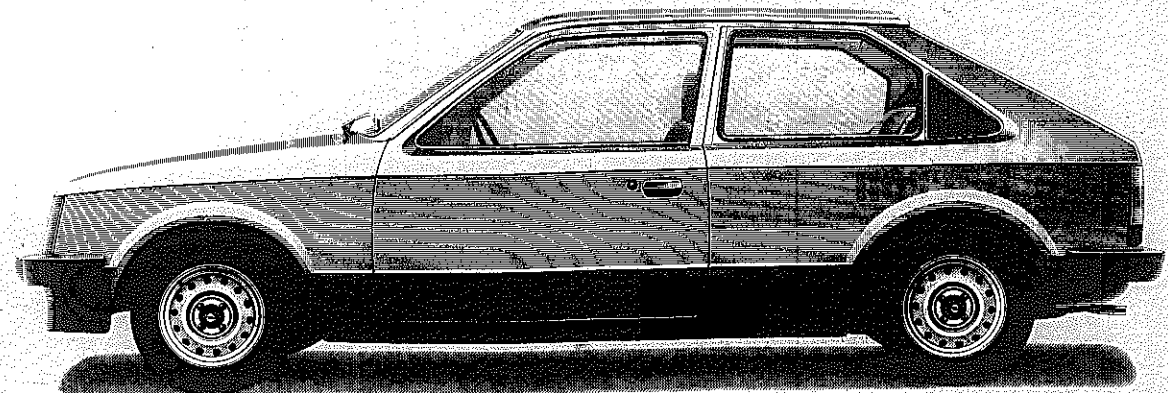





IDA CHIEF SAYS DEASY MISUNDERSTANDS

In replying to recent criticism of the IDA in regard to figures for jobs creation put forward by them made by Eimear Gael Deputy Austin Deasy, the IDA South East Region Manager, Mr. Frank Burke felt that there had obviously been a misunderstanding...

On the question of job approvals Mr. Burke said that for the period 1978/80 200 projects were approved for Waterford City and County with a job potential in excess of 6,000; fixed asset investment in excess of £25.4 million and grant commitments of £46.1 million.

During this period IDA capital expenditure totalling £18.75 million took place on land and buildings as well as grants.

Having given details of various grant aided projects in the West Waterford area, Mr. Burke went on to say that Lismore, Cappoquin was an area of which they were very conscious. He agreed that existing industry in Lismore had been affected by the recession and he asked that these industries be encouraged and supported.

In conclusion Mr. Burke said: "I am very proud of our achievements throughout the county and I would ask that the IDA efforts be matched by support from local community organisations in identifying economic activities which would stimulate further growth and thereby enhance our continuous job creation programme throughout the county."

For both riders it will be their first time to ride in this prestigious nine day international cycle race.

The other members of the Waterford team are Joe Wall, Mícheál Malone and Jimmy Phelan.

This year's race has the biggest ever number of entries. More than 110 cyclists will be given the send off by the Minister of State at the Department of Education, Mrs. Maire Geoghegan Quinn from the GPO in Dublin at 11.30 a.m. on Saturday, 19th June. From the GPO the cyclists will be led by two teams of celebrities including RTE presenters Mike Murphy, Rodan Collins, Liam Nolan, Ulan Galtsov's Newsreader, Anne Doyle and the 1982 Irish Superstar champion, Corporal Jerry Lohan. The official start of the race is in Tallaght and the cyclists will be given a send off from the GPO by the Píntan Lawlor Pipe Band.

The Tirolia Ras Tailteann is sponsored by the Michael Vaughan Group, Trim, Co. Meath. The Group imports, distributes and manufactures Tirolia solid fuel and gas cookers. This is the fourth year of Tirolia's involvement in the race which is now in its 25th year.

VALUE-ADDED TAX

PAYMENT OF TAX ON IMPORTS AT POINT OF ENTRY

The Minister for Finance announced in the Budget that value-added tax will be imposed on imports at point of entry as on and from 1 September, 1982.

SCOPE

The charge at the point of importation will apply to goods entered for home use at the time of importation, to taxable goods imported for further manufacture and to goods entered on importation for warehousing.

DEFERRED PAYMENT

Subject to participation in the Banks' Direct Debiting Scheme an importer may defer until the 15th day of the month payment of value-added tax due in respect of goods imported in the previous calendar month. Importers wishing to participate in this scheme must make prior application to the local Collector of Customs and Excise.

VAT RETURNS

Taxable persons will be entitled to deduct in their VAT Returns the VAT paid or charged at importation in relation to goods used for the purpose of their taxable activities. Customs will provide proof of the amount paid (or deferred) to the trader or his agent, by means of the issue in all such cases of a copy of the customs import entry for the goods.

VAT NUMBERS

Importers should ensure that their VAT No. is quoted correctly on all import entries so that all deductions can be allowed promptly. Where the entry is being completed by an agent acting on behalf of the importer, the Importer's VAT No. and not that of the agent should be quoted.

Where a subsidiary company or a branch of a company is separately registered for VAT, it must quote its own VAT No. on import entries.

Where an importer is not registered for VAT the words "Not Regd." should be entered in the VAT No. Box on the entry form.

Further information, and copies of Notice No. 1658, which contains additional details regarding the proposed arrangements for payment of VAT on imports at point of entry, and of Notice No. 1183D (revised) which contains full information on the Deferred Payment Scheme, may be obtained from the Revenue Commissioners, Castle House, South Great George's Street, Dublin 2, or from any Collector of Customs and Excise.

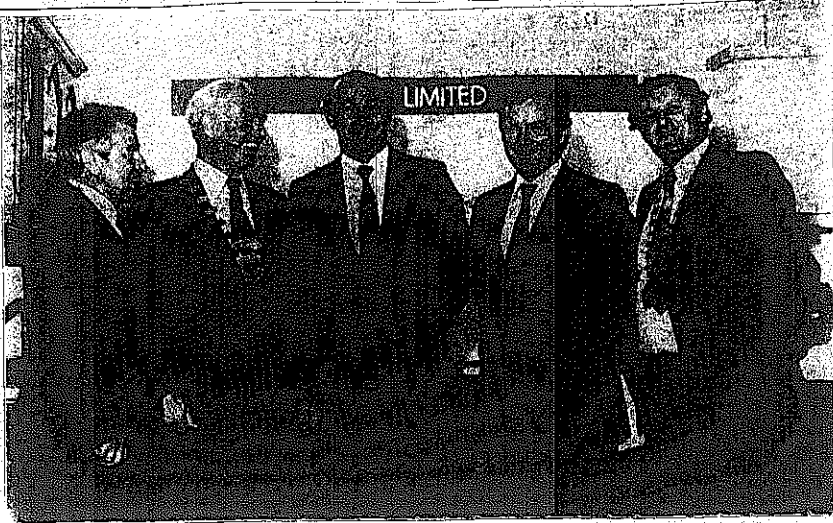
