OIREACHTAS MEMBERS HIT BY PAY FREEZE TOO

The pay and travelling increases for members of the Oireachtas, T.D.'s and Senators, announced in mid-July last, has had a serious effect on the long summer vacation as not all can afford to be paid. They have now been ruled out by the Government as part of its clampdown on wage rises in the public sector.

When news of the increases first came to light there was a public outcry and rightly so and it appears that the Government have now realised that they could not make a fish of the public sector and flesh of themselves and have ruled out the increases which the All-Party Dail Committee on Procedures and Privileges had sanctioned and which would have given rises of up to 50 per cent for deputies and senators.

Besides the wage increases, the T.D.'s and Senators will also forfeit rises in travelling and subsistence allowances and the government decision to clamp down on the increases will mean that T.D.'s will lose about £1,800 this year while senators will lose just less than £1,000 a year.

Under the new subsistence allowances country deputies were to receive £25 overnight as compared to £17.50 while the Dublin deputies would have had their daily allowance for "appearing" in the Dail increased from £10 to £15 in addition to their basic salary. The mileage rate would have gone up by an average 40 per cent with the rates varying upwards from about 27p a mile.

Up to the time the Dail recessed in July it had sat for only 48 days this year and the Senate for only 18 days so, as I have already said when commenting on these increases a couple of weeks ago, I can say that our T.D.'s or Senators are over-worked.

The houses of the Oireachtas are now out on holidays and will remain "as laithair" until October and while usually find very little which I can agree in many of the public statements made by Cork University Professor Senator John A. Murphy, I must totally support the call made jointly by him and Senators John Robb and Shane Ross in a statement issued on Monday last demanding an early recall of the Senate. The statement declared that "because of the critical state of the public finances, the rising spiral of unemployment and the unstable political situation we shall be seeking the necessary thirty signatures for an early recall."

There is an urgent need for the recall of both houses of the Oireachtas in view of the very serious situation confronting the nation. As things stand at the moment it looks as if Nero is just once again burning while Rome is burning!

MANAGER'S ORDERS FOR URBAN AREA

County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley has made a number of orders over the past month dealing with affairs as they specifically affect the Urban Area of Dungarvan.

One of these directs that increased charges be made for the use of the Town Hall as follows: £25 per night for dances, discos, concerts and shows; £20 per night for bingo sessions and £5 per hour for other purposes. Local clubs will be charged £1.50 per hour while as a concession to the work being done by the local youth club the nominal standing charges of £1 per night and £3 per disco are to be retained for them.

Two of the Manager's orders concern official appointments under which rent collector Mr. Edward J. Veale is appointed temporary collector of revenues for the period August 1 to September 30 and Mr. Raymond Moloney, 5, Coolagh Estate, Abbesside is appointed as relief rent collector for the same period.

The problem of litter on the Square to which Mr. Hurley has previously referred publicly at meetings of the local Urban Council is dealt with specifically in Order Number 97/82 which directs "that the Council's Solicitor, Mr. A. R. Farrell, be and is hereby instructed to initiate whatever legal proceedings that are necessary to terminate the sale of chips, etc., from a mobile van at Grattan Square, Dungarvan by Patrick O'Shea of Byrneville, Dungarvan."

A further order made by the Manager spells trouble for some tenants of Cathal Brugha Place who have been at loggerheads with the Council on the question of repairs to their houses. This order also directs the Council's Law Adviser, Mr. A. R. Farrell to recover arrears of rent from 19 of the tenants with the proviso that all those concerned be given ten days to make an arrangement that will be acceptable and notified of the consequence of failure to do so which was re-possession by the Council. The order then directs "that the weekly rent be added in all cases commencing on Saturday, the 21st August, 1982, and on subsequent Saturdays. That costs involved be demanded from the tenants."

The increased activity of street traders in the town is referred to in yet another of the County Manager's orders which is aimed at an effort to curtail such activities and in which Mr. Hurley directs that the Council's Solicitor be also instructed to initiate whatever legal proceedings that are necessary to prevent street trading in the Square on days other than Market days.

BEGGING ON STREETS

A reader has drawn attention to the need to put a stop to the practice, prevalent on the streets of Dungarvan in recent weeks, of itinerant children begging from passers-by. She states that these children place themselves at vantage points like the entrances to Banks and Supermarkets to carry on their begging activities while in

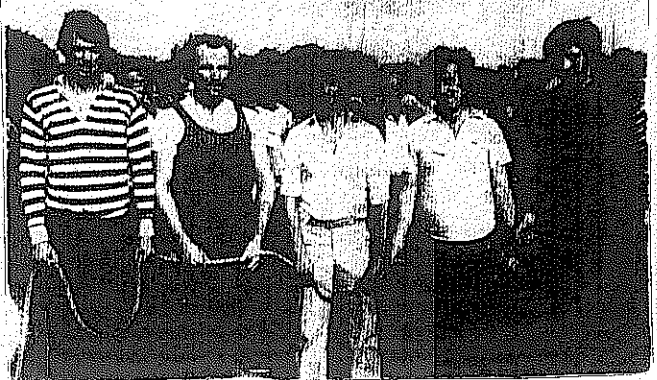

SENIOR FOOTBALL

2.—The wording of the Amendment has not been decided so talking about the supposed conditions and exceptions is mere speculation. The incidence of cases of pregnancy due to rape or incest being terminated, in countries where abortion is legal, is statistically insignificant.

3.—The Amendment seeks specifically to forbid legislation of abortion, a proposal which has its basis in natural moral law, also the origin of most religious moral teaching (including the Catholic Church) is in natural moral law. The opinions of religious leaders are no more infallible in this area than any other. Conscientious objection to killing cannot be classed as sectarian.

4.—Acceptance of the proposed Amendment does not imply the end of free speech or discussion, as suggested, and will not hinder the passing of future legislation, if an overwhelming public opinion demands it. That what referendum is about, to find out the majority opinion.

5.—In an economy with a GNP in the region of £2,500m, £1m (0.04%) seems a reasonable price for finding out where the country stands on this controversial issue. In terms of cost, £1m would provide approximately 36 new jobs, as to the one-third of the population on the poverty line, £1m would provide them with perhaps a pound or two each. The real cost should be kept in perspective.

KNOCKANORE, GLENDINE AND KILWATERMOY NOTES

Backlogs from Mullin's Na Tire publication entitled The Financial Contribution of Mullin's Councils to The Irish State, during 1981.

Mullin's Na Tire's Annual Contribution is in excess of £21m. This figure in no way represents our biggest contribution to the State. The money spent on creating industry includes £21.6m for the development of a steel centre in Kilmobber. Also included was a turf cutting centre in Ballynea, Co. Kildare and a centre in Liscannell, Co. Galway set up in the old industrial school premises.

In the youth area, over 58,722 was raised for youth facilities, sports and games, up to 50 ANCO Youth Employment Schemes providing work experience for up to 500 young people, children's playgrounds, etc.

It is interesting to note that, Michael Lynch, speaking in Tipperary last February, compared this £21.6m. grant to local level, to the £30,000 grant-in-aid received by Mullin's Na Tire in 1981. Further comment is hardly necessary.
