PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

MAGILL GUIDE TO ELECTION '82

Returning this week to our initial references in last week's column to the Magill Guide to Election '82 (edited by the controversial journalist Vincent Brown) we examine further its assessment of the election in the Waterford Constituency.

Having traced the political divide in the constituency from 1923 to 1977 in last week's issue we now move on to what Magill says about the elections of the last couple of years and in particular the most recent one.

"In 1981," it states, "the vote in the constituency divided more or less as expected, with the two major parties again splitting the seats. Fine Gael's Eddie Collins fending off a strong challenge from party colleague and first-time contestant Katherine Bubbula. Paddy Gallagher of SFWP—who had won 10.5% of the vote in 1977 and threatened to take the heretofore traditional Labour seat—saw his vote slump to under 8%. Clearly, however, many of his 1977 voters had gone despite their mutual ideological antagonism to hunger-striker Kevin Lynch. They returned on Lynch's elimination, although this effectively calls into doubt the underlying continuing strength of Gallagher's support. On a last effective count basis Gallagher was still within striking distance of a seat."

"Moreover," with Labour entering the election less tied to Fine Gael than they had been in 1981; he could reasonably expect a greater proportion of transfers from that source. In 1981 he obtained an almost inexplicably low figure of 13% of Labour transfers.

"If Gallagher were to succeed, most believed it would be at Fine Gael's expense. Eddie Collins would be a rich man if everyone who ever predicted his demise had to say him a special word. Fine Gael had outplayed Fianna Fail in 1981, the latter getting less than two quotas. Fianna Fail's vicious infighting in the constituency had left sections of the party in no condition to fight a close campaign."

Commenting on the '82 election, Magill then goes on to say: "Fine Gael's decision to fight the election without Katherine Bubbula as another candidate may have cost the party votes but it left it in a better position to defend its two seats than Fianna Fail was to find itself in. Fianna Fail actually introduced its first preference total marginally while Fine Gael was taking a significant drop, but Eddie Collins was substantially nearer the quota on the first count than either of Fianna Fail's challengers for a second seat, and with Gallagher looming very large indeed, that was to be a vital factor."

"Gallagher bounced back after his disappointing 1981 performance, doubling his share of the poll to 16%, slightly more than the combined SFWP and H-Block votes of 1981. Gallagher, however, was still 1,643 votes short of a quota, and it was vital for him to pick up a substantial transfer from Labour this time. The rest would be up to the vagaries of P.R. In fact, Gallagher took 36% of the vote, while Fine Gael and 17% to Fianna Fail's three candidates.

"Even if Fianna Fail was to take two seats, it was unlikely to be outgoing. Chairman of the Parliamentary Party Willie Kennelly, who would return to the Dail alongside Jackie Fahey, Kennelly was always behind the first Fianna Fail candidate, Ormonde, and was eliminated after the fourth

count. A better distribution of Kennelly's transfers could have deprived either Collins or Gallagher of his seat. Gallagher was elected 558 votes ahead of Ormonde, while Jackie Fahey had a surplus of 544 and would have been elected without reaching the quota if more of Kennelly's votes had gone to Ormonde. Fianna Fail was desperately unlucky not to take two seats."

Summing up the situation in the constituency as it now stands, Magill has this to say in conclusion: "Waterford is now the most marginal constituency in the country with SFWP in particular and Fine Gael, also, in serious danger of losing a seat to Fianna Fail. A minute swing to Fianna Fail of only 0.1% will see it take two seats here. If Paddy Gallagher is to have any reasonable confidence in his prospects of survival, he will have to hope that the pattern of about transfers to Fine Gael changes in his favour and that his own first preference vote shows more stability than his 1981 performance would seem to suggest."

"We will have another look at two into 'Magill Election '82' in the next couple of weeks."

FAHEY AND CONTROL REMARKS

It would appear that there is more "uisce-fe-thalamh" trouble brewing within Fianna Fail at Constituency level with Jackie Fahey once again stirring up the pot. "Backchat" in a recent issue of the "Sunday Independent" alleged that Fahey had claimed that he "controlled" the Officer Board of Fianna Fail in Waterford. This was denied the following week by Jim O'Neill, Fianna Fail Public Relations Officer for Waterford who is reported as saying that the Comhairle Dail Ceannair were meeting that week to discuss the Fahey claim.

Last week's "Sunday Independent" had "backchat" then reporting as follows: "A communications row seems to have erupted in the Waterford area last week. Public Relations Officer Jim O'Neill criticised a remark by former Minister Jack Fahey and said that his allegations that he 'controlled' the Officer Board of Fianna Fail in Waterford would be discussed at a Comhairle Dail Ceannair meeting last week. Said Jack Fahey in this week: 'I have checked with the officers and no meeting has been held. There is no question of a meeting of the Comhairle Dail Ceannair being held last week to discuss any remarks I am alleged to have made.'"

How's that for "control"?

FISHERMAN FEATURES IN EXCLUSIVE VIDEO TAPE

"At the invitation of Helvick based fisherman Tony Gallagher I sat in with a specially invited group at a private showing of a specially made video, which took place, by kind permission, at Mr. John Casey's, Main Street, Dungarvan on Tuesday last week."

People Being Robbed By Wrong Phone Bills Says Councillor

Calling on Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday to request the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs to investigate and look into the charging system for telephone accounts, Cllr. Paddy Kennelly said that a lot of people were being robbed as a result of what was going on and were not aware of it.

"Telephone subscribers," he said, "were being charged twice with bills which in the first instance they did not owe and were then being cut off because they did not pay these bills. He said that he had already been in contact with the Minister about this but had got no response."

"These complaints are widespread," said Cllr. Kennelly, "and a lot of people are being robbed and are not aware of it. I was awakened in the middle of the night lately by the telephone with a call from Canada which I did not book, while on another occasion there was a call from Denmark which I did not make either. There's something wrong about all this and there's no way that a farmer

could run up a telephone bill of £500 or \$600 as I have seen. In 12 months not to mention for a 2 months period."

Cllr. B. Kyrne agreed with the points made by Cllr. Kennelly and said that he knew of a similar case in Dungarvan where a telephone subscriber took up the phone when it rang to be told "your phone call to America is now through." No such call was made by this subscriber and Cllr. Kyrne who added that there should be some system of a ring back to check when these calls are booked. He said that anyone can give a number now and book a call to wherever and it could then be charged to that number."

Cllr. C. Curran created some laughter and showed how ridiculous the entire situation is at present when he told the meeting that although he had no telephone he had recently got a telephone bill for £128 with a notice that it would be disconnected if it was not paid."

Cllr. Kennelly's resolution calling on the Minister to investigate the whole situation was unanimously passed by the Council.

Cannabis Plants Found Growing In Dungarvan

When garda searched a glass house in the back garden of a local authority house in Dungarvan on August 26 last they found 23 cannabis plants growing. District Justice W. E. O'Connell was told at Dungarvan court.

Before the court was Kevin Carleton, a 25-year-old unemployed labourer of 6, Cathal Drugha Place, and he pleaded guilty to charges of having possession of the 23 cannabis plants on the occasion, and of cultivating them at the rear of 6, Cathal Drugha Place.

Detective Garda John Moily told the court that he searched the glass house in the back garden of the carleton home where he found the plants growing. The defendant admitted growing them but stated they were for his own personal use only.

Carleton told the court that he had purchased the plants from a friend for £5. He denied that he intended giving some of them away to his friends. They were for my own use only," he said.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solicitor, advised Carleton a "plea of sure" into this type of activity, and he would now give the court an undertaking that he would not engage in it again.

District Justice O'Connell fined Carleton £25 on each charge and also sentenced him to three months imprisonment on the warrant not to issue if he is of good behaviour for 12 months.

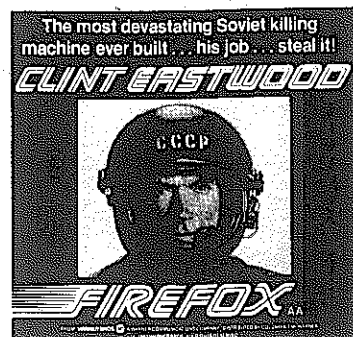

ABBEYSIDE SCOUT NOTES

RELIGIOUS AFFAIRS This was the daunting title given to last week-end's trip to Waterford. Thirteen Scouts from the Gasoga Mass and Senior Patrol took part in the activities and were joined by three seniors from the Sacred Heart Troop in Waterford. The group was divided into three sections, and each set out to interview, record and try and find out what made life so hard for the various people they met. One of them was in his first year, but had done his year and was 15 years of age. We met many from different walks of life. They were very friendly and open with us. We would have liked more of time with them, but they had class, and we had to go to our next appointment. Perhaps we can get better acquainted in the future. De La Salle Brothers: We were met by Bro. Virgilius and Bro. Finbar. We drove into the priory, and met the brothers in their work in Waterford. Bro. Virgilius was very good on local history while Bro. Finbar seemed to have been more of the scout and could tell us of the close connections over many years of De La Salle Scouts and Abbeyside. Franciscans: We had our lunch in their garden behind their house. It was very peaceful and lovely. They had a lovely fish pond, and it was here we interviewed Fr. Pat and Fr. Eamon. They related their history and the role of the Chaplain in a Franciscan, as is Martin Duggan's uncle Sean, who was one of our people's heroes. Fr. Eamon impressed us with their great friendliness and openness. They seemed to be very busy but enjoyed their work. Dominicans: We next visited Ballybeg, which is a new parish. We were interested in a new district in modern times. The priory house is small and modern, built near their new church, which has a very steep roof. It is only built and in use for 6 months. Fr. Eamon O.P. explained his life style, and told us of what he felt were the challenges before them. We liked the ideas that went into this building, the idea of the step down and up for the Baptism of John, the church, and the 16 Stations instead of the normal 14. Fr. Abbeyside joined us for the visit. U.S. Mount St. Mary's was our last visit. We were met by Bro. Anthony (who has been my instructor in engineering). FINED £500 FOR USING MARKED DIESEL

A maximum fine of £500 was imposed on Barry Murphy, Ballygunnermore, Grantstown at Dungarvan Court when he was convicted of using marked diesel or gas oil in a dumper at Skeehurte, Abbeyside on February 9 last. Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solicitor who prosecuted told the court that this was the defendant's third offence in this regard and in the circumstances he asked that there be no mitigation of the maximum fine of £500 which could be imposed. Murphy who conducted his own defence admitted using the red diesel but he pointed out that the vehicle was used only on site and was never used on a public road. Others in similar circumstances were using red diesel and he could not see why he also could not do the same. He added that despite representations made to the Department they were unable to obtain any official direction in the matter. Mr. Maher agreed that representations had been made and he had been instructed to then withhold prosecution in such cases but the Revenue Commissioners had now directed that prosecutions arise be instituted in all these cases. Two Inspectors from the Department of Finance gave evidence for the prosecution and District Justice W. P. O'Connell said that he had no option but to convict the defendant and to impose a fine of £500 which he would not mitigate. He fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal. ADJUDICATORS REPORT ON DUNGARVAN

This year marked the 25th Tidy Towns Competition held by the State. The adjudicators awarded Dungarvan 112 marks out of a maximum of 150. This was 10 more than the town scored last year.

The following is the adjudicators' report showing the marks awarded under the various sections showing the maximum possible in brackets.
