TRYING TO PASS THE BUCK

We note from a report of the annual general meeting of the Tallow Finna-Fail Cum-rinn as reported in a recent issue of the Leader that the members present were addressed by Mr. Jackie Fahy, T.D. The report states, after all, that Mr. Fahy is referring to a loss of a seat in Waterford in the last election but that the bad publicity of the local and national press helped in no small way to the losing of that seat.

Surely Mr. Fahy must be joking in trying to pass the buck in this fashion. The local and national press were in no way responsible for the disastrous and unseemly incident which in the run-up to an election had the Finna-Fail organisation in the county in shreds. They merely reported the facts and in attempting to place the blame on bad publicity now Mr. Fahy is merely looking for another back door-but as far as we, in this paper, are concerned at any rate, this is just not on.

Anyone with even the smallest grain of political sense knows why Finna-Fail lost the seat in Waterford—something which should not have happened. It was not due to the bad publicity in the local and national papers as Deputy Fahy now wants his followers to believe. The reason the seat was lost was because of the mayhem that went on within the party for the past couple of years and which resulted in the bad publicity that followed these many incidents at various meetings of the Party.

FARMERS OWE £1.1 MILLION TO HEALTH BOARD

In the course of his official report to the October monthly meeting of the South Eastern Health Board held in Kilkenny last Thursday, the Board's Chief Executive Officer, Mr. P. G. McQuillan states that farmers in the region, which in addition to Co. Waterford embraces Co. Tipperary (SR), Co. Kilkenny, Co. Wexford and Co. Carlow, owe in excess of £1.1 million in Health contributions.

Mr. McQuillan's report sets the position out as follows: "The Board acts as collection agent for the Exchequer for health contributions from farmers. At the last meeting it was agreed to give the amounts outstanding by farmers in the South-East. The following amounts are due:— 1982/83—£755,330, 1981/82—£24,077, 1980/81—£199,303, 1979/80—£132,342, 1978/79—£89,906. Total: £1,500,978. The annual amount due this year is £1,047,145, so the balance due represents about 11 years' debt. Accounts were issued for 1982/83 in May and reminders were sent out in September."

SEVERE WEATHER SWEEPS COUNTRY

Very severe weather swept the entire country last weekend and heavy rain and gale-force winds were reported from practically every area during one of the worst autumn storms in years.

The storm was at its height on Saturday and early Sunday morning making road conditions hazardous in many parts. The south coast was the worst hit with winds reaching 60 knots—70 miles an hour—in some places and mountains seas lashed the shoreline. The torrential rain caused heavy flooding and rivers everywhere were badly swollen.

In many cases, small craft and yachts moored in the inner harbour in Dungarvan were blown from their moorings on Saturday night and suffered varying degrees of damage. A French fisherman was lost overboard from the French trawler 'Madeleine' in the stormy seas 30 miles off Youghal at about 1.50 a.m. on Sunday morning. The victim, stated to be clad in heavy oilskins and boots, was washed off the trawler by waves believed to be between twelve and fifteen feet high.

PROPOSED NEW GARDA STATION FOR DUNGARVAN

Deputy Austin Deasy has received the following letter dated September 27 from the Private Secretary of the Minister for Justice:—

"I am directed by the Minister for Justice, Mr. Seán Duignan, T.D., to refer again to your recent representations concerning the proposed Garda Station in Dungarvan. The position is that the Office of Public Works has not yet received a site for the new station. There is, however, a possibility that the site will have to be engaged in order to grant the Garda Commissioner's requirements for the new station and the Office of Public Works are currently examining this question. As this is a matter for that Office the Minister has forwarded a copy of your representations to the Minister of State at the Department of Finance for attention."

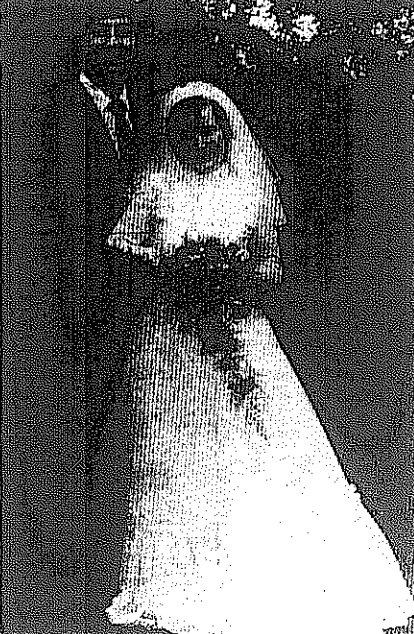
MY MOTHER'S OLD ROSARY BEADS

MASSES OF THANKSGIVING MARKS JUBILEE OF DUNGARVAN NUN

Half a century of unceasing and undivided service in the Vinny of the Lord. That's the memorable milestone recently attained by Sister Mary Agatha O'Connor, a native of Clontarf, Dublin, who celebrated her Golden Jubilee at the Bon Secours Hospital, Cork, on September 26.

A Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. Hogan, Rector of the parish, at the Mass which was sung by the Bon Secours Sisters. The huge attendance included many of Sister Agatha's relatives and friends. Four days later Kilgobbin Church was the setting for another Mass to celebrate her Golden Jubilee, this time the celebrant being Fr. John Kelly, C.C. Forliss, a cousin of Sister Agatha. The organist was Mr. Finbar Keenan of Abbeystead, and Mr. John O'Flynn, Dungarvan, was soloist, while the Lessons were read by Sr. Eugene, also of the Bon Secours Hospital, Cork.

Following the Mass a buffet supper was given at the home of Sr. Agatha's cousin, Mrs. Mary O'Connell. Mass was also celebrated to mark the Golden Jubilee in Gairantrane Church, celebrated by Sr. Agatha's cousin Fr. Pierce Ahearn, C.C. Abbeystead, assisted by another cousin Fr. James Power, a native of Clontarf who was home on holidays from his United States.

RECEPTION

A reception was subsequently held at the home of Mrs. Peg Cliffe, the Burgery, Abbeystead, with a very enjoyable evening being had by all. Sister Agatha entered the Bon Secours Hospital in Cork in 1932 and having completed her Novitiate in the Mother House in Paris was professed in September, 1932.

Returning to Cork she commenced her nursing studies in the Bon Secours Hospital and worked on the staff for a number of years. In 1944 she was assigned to the care of the patients at the Spaulding Mount Desert, where her bright and happy disposition, and her natural goodness of heart radiated an atmosphere of joy and love, especially for the young patients of those days when the dread nature of their illness claimed so many victims.

In 1954 she returned to the general hospital in Clontarf, Dublin, and during the past decade served in the care of the poor and aged of the parish in which service she completely lost the kindly care and devotedness of Bon Secours in her own unique way. Sr. Agatha was daughter of the late Tom and Ella Connors (the former Ella Lynch of 556 Gough St., Clontarf) and is a cousin of the Tobins of Knock. In congratulating this extraordinary Sister on the Golden Jubilee of her profession as a Nun, we wish her many, many more years serving with God, for the betterment of others as she has been doing so splendidly over the past half century.

PUB SUMMONS DISMISSED ON TECHNICITY

A publican charged with a breach of the licensing laws at Cappoquin Court had the charge struck out on a technicality. Thomas Cahill, 'Welcome Inn', Cappoquin, pleaded not guilty to the alleged breach at 12.15 a.m. on July 16.

Defence submissions by Mr. Michael Hanrahan, solicitor, resulted in the charges being struck out. The offences took place at Shanabally, Cappoquin, on July 19.

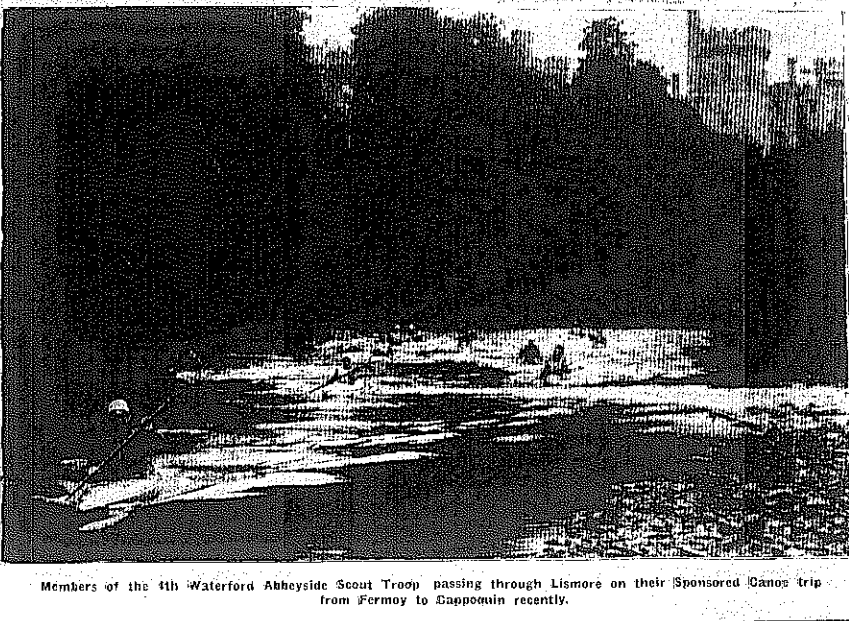

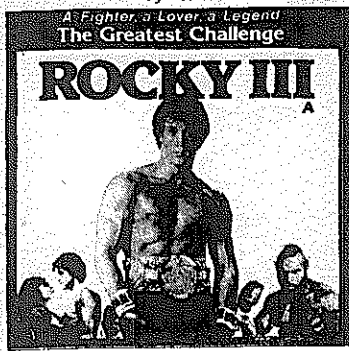

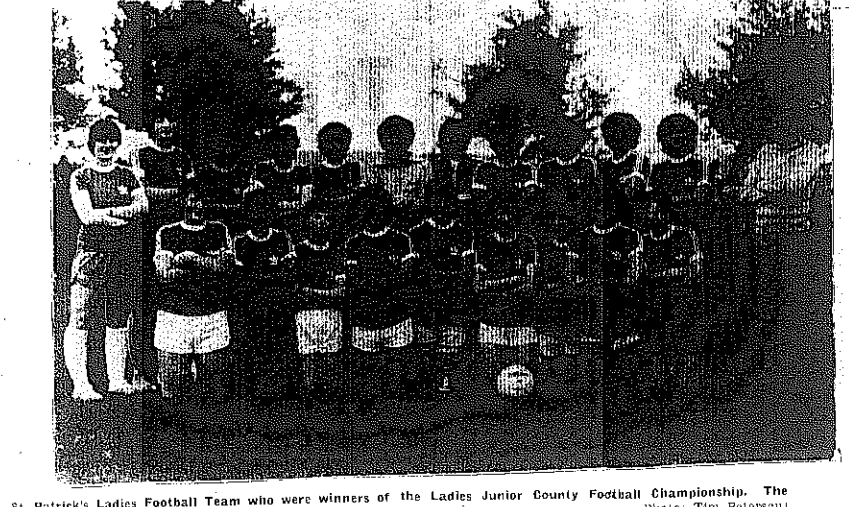
