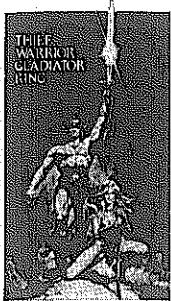

POTATO MARKETS ARE NOT ORGANISED

A good proportion of the Irish potato crop has been lifted by now and is burning out well. Yields are varied, depending to some extent on the type of weather there was in the particular area, but in general the harvest of the crop is much improved from last year and it is likely that the tubers will store well. The quality of the crop is also improved, at least up to the time that land began to get wet.

The acreage under potatoes this year is up to 4,500 acres from 1981, and it is calculated that there should be a total yield of about 300,000 tonnes which is up to 100,000 tonnes from last year.

There is obviously a big reduction in the quantity of potatoes in Ireland since 1986, when there were 107,500 acres planted, nearly twice as much as last year. There is no Common Market Organisation for potatoes in the European Community. It is a difficult crop to organise because of the big variations in yield from one year to another, depending on weather conditions.

It is estimated that the total crop in the Community this year will be nearly as big as last year, but there are wide differences, from one Member State to another. In Germany the crop is expected to be down by 7% owing to a fall of 3% in acreage and 4% in yields due to dry weather. In the total output is expected to be about 7,051,000 tonnes, over half a million tonnes less than last year.

In the U.K. on the other hand, output is expected to be up to 600,000 tonnes, a total of 6,900,000 tonnes. This includes Northern Ireland, and also the small growers who are not registered with the Potato Marketing Board. Yields are expected to be up from last year and the demand for imports there will be substantially reduced.

Growers in the U.K. have a guaranteed price of £35 a tonne for a certain acreage of potatoes for which they are given contracts by their Potato Marketing Board, a long-established marketing authority which regulates supplies from the growers to the markets and diverts potatoes for animal feed.

In the absence of a Common Market Organisation for the Community, this board is allowed to operate in Britain, but in other Member States, no matter what organisation may be introduced in the future, it is not permitted to operate because it has been so successful.

In France there is an increase of 3,500 acres but yields are said to be reduced, and it looks as if the total output will be unchanged. It is also expected that the output in Belgium will be unchanged from last year, and the demand for exports there will be a reduction also in Greece.

BIGGEST EXPORTERS
The biggest exporters of potatoes in the Community are the Dutch, and their crop has a wide influence on markets in other Member States, including Ireland. Their plant-

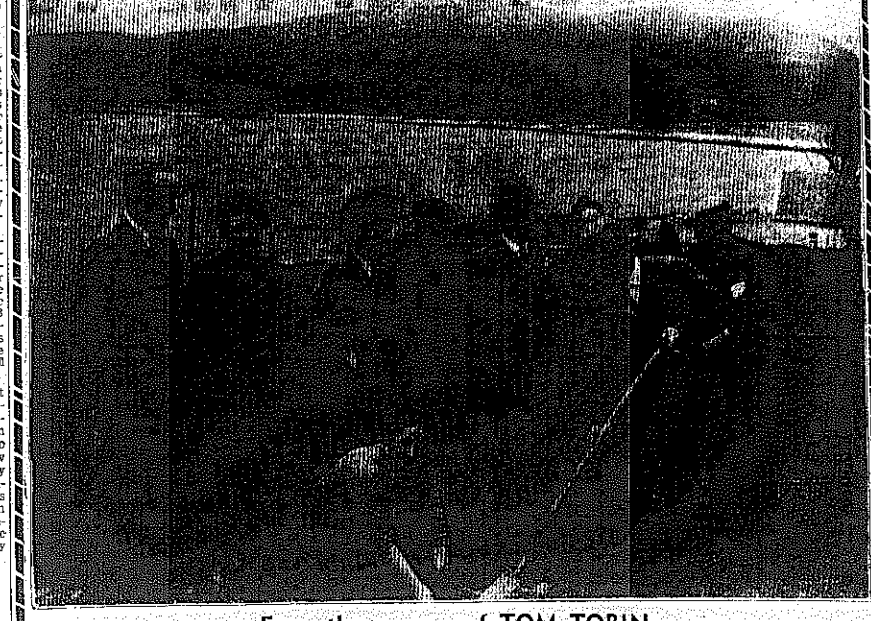

NEWS FROM THE LAW SOCIETY FOCUSES ON "MAKE A WILL WEEK"

Failure of more than 40 per cent of the adult population of Ireland to make a Will creates considerable social problems which are very often only too difficult to deal with. The making of a Will can be a relatively simple matter in most cases but even where it is a simple matter unless it is properly drawn in clear and concise language and properly executed and duly witnessed it can lead to untold trouble.

Sometimes people draft a Will of their own, either in their own handwriting or on pre-printed forms which later—too late—turn out to be flawed or improper, and therefore leads to great difficulty in obtaining a Grant or Probate, and incurs expense unnecessary in the administration of the estate. The fact is that often than not there is no Will at all.

Both situations can become the cause of expensive and wasteful law suits. The fact is that when they are at their most vulnerable is very difficult to do anything to rectify this situation.

Nothing that lawyers who subconsciously become involved can do to rectify this situation.

Who should make a Will? Virtually every adult owns property of some kind or another, a house, a car, a business or even a motor cycle, and has very often a family. It is not until it is too late to do anything to rectify this situation.

This must ensure that not only is the burden of the bereaved minimised, secure legal and financial arrangements have been made for their well being. Unnecessary legal costs, expense and trouble are also avoided.

Nothing that lawyers who subconsciously become involved can do to rectify this situation.

Who should make a Will? Virtually every adult owns property of some kind or another, a house, a car, a business or even a motor cycle, and has very often a family. It is not until it is too late to do anything to rectify this situation.

Announcing the change in the format of the contest to include Home Economics and Farm Management, Mr. Thomas Ryan, Market Development Manager, Williams Walker Ltd., said that for some time there had been a feeling that the adjudication system did not take full account of the outstanding home skills and farming knowledge of many of the finalists.
