GENERAL ELECTION 2
OF '82

Polling Day in General Election 2 of 1982 is now only a week away and on Wednesday next, November 24, the electors will once again be faced with the task of going to the polls to elect a government. It is the second occasion this year, but was only nine months ago on February 18, and indeed it will be the third time in a period of some sixteen months that the country has had this obligation thrust upon it.

Following the inconclusive result of the June '81 election it was forecast elections of general elections would be held in the 80's would be unstable governments and that pattern has already been established and, at the time of writing, appears very likely to continue with another hung Dail being the outcome of next week's effort — although God forbid that this should be so.

When nominations closed last Monday the list showed that the 166 seats in the 24th Dail are to be contested by a total of 366 candidates in the 41 constituencies. One of the main will, of course, automatically go to the Ceann Comhairle, Dr. John O'Connell. A run down of the party nominations shows that Fianna Fail have 132 candidates in the field, Fine Gael 115 and Labour 40. The Workers' Party are fielding 30, the Democratic Socialists 10, the Communist Party 7 and the balance is made up of 52 independents.

Here in Waterford it looked as if we were going to have five candidates for the four seats but surprise entry by a second independent candidate at the week-end brought the total of candidates seeking election to ten.

Fianna Fail are again putting up three, but their team shows a personnel change from that of last February as the defeated outgoing deputy at that time, Mr. Billy Kennedy failed to win a nomination at the Party's Convention this time and was replaced by Waterford City solicitor Brian Swift who now joins outgoing deputy Jackie Fahy and Dr. Donal Ormonde who, although new to the hustings last February, made a bold bid for a seat, losing by 558 votes after 5 counts.

Fianna Fail's main objective here is to win back the seat which they lost in February. Outgoing Jackie Fahy, although his personal vote showed a considerable drop between June '81 and February '82 (6,314 as against 6,762) should, none the less, manage to retain his seat. Swift was on the Fianna Fail team in '81 and polled 3,456 first preference votes but went out after the third count. It would appear though that the Party's main hope of regaining their lost seat rests with Donal Ormonde and a great deal of interest will centre about the manner in which the young doctor, from Kilmachomas will fare on this occasion.

In the February election, Dr. Ormonde, although facing the electorate for the first time, polled a strong 5,058 first preferences in the final analysis he lost the last seat to a mere 558 votes while Jackie Fahy elected in the same count had a surplus of 538 votes. Had the party supporters ensured a better transfer of their preferences, Fahy would still have been elected without reaching the quota of 6,762. Ormonde would also have held on to the seat which Fianna Fail were undoubtedly in very hard luck to have lost.

The winning back of this seat then is the main objective of the Fianna Fail party in Waterford. Donal Ormonde would appear to be their best bet to do this because appar-

So that leaves two candidates for the four seats and the outcome will depend on how you, the public, will vote next Wednesday.

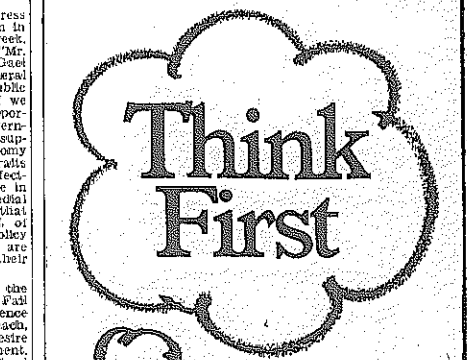

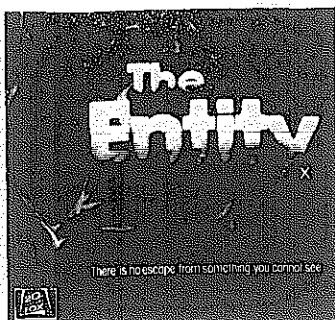

Waterford must be cautious against Kilkenny

NEXT SUNDAY

Round four of the National Football League will see Waterford play Kilkenny at Leamington, the Western Junior football final and the intermediate hurling final between Shamrocks and Tallow at Lismore on Sunday. Several Western Junior football league fixtures are also down for decision.

The Western Junior football final between Emmetts and Geraldines at Dungarvan is the final division championship fixture of the season and the entire championship will be decided on Sunday when the Western champions play Tramore in the county final. It is interesting to record that should Emmetts survive on Sunday then the same side will play in both county finals as Tramore and Coghlan/Emmetts have already played in hurling. In fact Tramore as far as I am aware will go into the records as being the first club to play in both junior county finals in successive years.

Both Emmetts and Geraldines survived in close semi-final contests and if we are to judge them on the merits of their displays in those games we must report that there is very little in the matter of standards between the two sides. Both are moderate junior football teams and the game has already been decided in the semi-finals. This is a rather uncomplimentary opening to a Western final which must be said to have been a disappointing championship final with a few of the games and excitement, few if any, would be the words of critics for their high standards.

Emmetts are very keen to come from the game and the game is expected to be a close one. The Western title in the grade of good and exciting football here on Sunday.

Emmetts' Western championship in hurling have gone over 20 years since winning a football title and their opponents on Sunday, last won a football championship in 1956. well tuned up for the game, but in spite of this I won't be surprised if Emmetts last the hour better and this could prove to be the deciding factor in what looks like being a very close game.

The team selected to play Kilkenny at Leamington on Sunday next, shows very little change from the side which surprised Sligo two weeks ago due to a change of injury, and the master of the stress of Carhad Mac Craith and Pierce White. White was left at left corner forward. Corner back Tom Aherne, who was injured at the beginning of the Sligo game, is believed to be fit again and has been named again as corner back. Pat Daniels, who scored two great points against Sligo, but who was sent off for personal fouling a few seconds after full time, is also back on the team.

Waterford footballers hit the headlines for the wrong reason, when they last played Kilkenny, and remembering the fact that they were beaten by Kilkenny, players will not be anxious to let it happen again. A cautious approach and a more determined effort in this meeting should ensure victory.

HEAVY FINES FOLLOW TRAFFIC ACCIDENT AT HELVICK

Fines totalling 290 and a disqualification for 3 months were imposed by District Justice W. F. O'Connell on Declan Morrissey, Jim Helvick when he pleaded guilty to a number of charges arising from traffic offences at Helvick, Ring on August 24, Dungarvan Court. Sgt. M. Dunham who prosecuted stated that, at 12.40 a.m. on August 2 a woman living in the Helvick area heard the wheels of a car on gravel outside her house and then heard her garage door getting a bang. When she looked out she saw a car pulling away and when it had gone about 150 yards she heard another bang and subsequently learned that two cars, the property of French tourists visiting the district, had been damaged. The Superintendent said that Sgt. Lacey, Ring, carried out an investigation of the incident and eventually found Morrissey's car the next day and saw that it was damaged. He said that he understood that the defendant had paid for all the damage he had been responsible for. Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solicitor for the defendant, said that the road at Helvick where the damage had occurred was a cul-de-sac. The defendant was driving his car outside Mrs. Long's house when the car caught in the handle of the garage door and then collided with another car, the car being the property of a French tourist. The defendant had paid £200 for the damage to the garage door and £350 for the car damage.

Poor quality hay and silage must be supplemented with concentrates. Do not overestimate the feeding value of your hay and silage this winter.

LICE Treat all cows and cattle for lice at housing and afterwards as required. Systemic type products such as Foron are very effective and easy to use.

WINTER CEREALS Check growing crops for slug and rat damage. If growing conditions improve, continue to sow winter wheat at increased seeding rates.

FINANCE Merchant credit is very expensive. Bulk purchases of fertilisers and concentrates for cash is good business. Seasonal loans at favourable interest rates are available from ACC and Banks.

SUGAR BEET Sugar beet in clamps should be covered. Suitable covering material is available from the Sugar Company. Sugar beet products such as beet pulp, molasses, etc. are good value at current prices.

DIRE UNEMPLOYMENT PROSPECTS FORECAST FOR LISMORE

The Lismore Economic Development Committee has recently completed a survey of the town of Lismore and one of the forecasts that has emerged from it was that within the next ten years the town would have 25% of its total population out of work.

This was stated by Cllr. W. McDonnell, Lismore, at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last week when the draft development plan for Lismore was placed before the meeting for consideration.

Cllr. McDonnell suggested that consideration of the plan might be adjourned until the Councilors for the area could first meet with members of the Lismore Development Committee to discuss it.

In reply to a question by the Chairman Cllr. P. Coffey, the Co. Engineer said that the Council were to adopt the plan and that the Lismore group would be asked to make on paper he could then study them.

On the proposal of the Chairman seconded by Cllr. B. Byrne, the Council agreed to agree that the local Councilors could meet with members of the Lismore Development Committee in Lismore to hear their views on it at a meeting to be arranged.

Eddie Collins moved a motion that the Council and the IDA give every assistance to industrial development in Lismore and to recognise the existence of the Lismore Economic Development Committee and Cllr. Cllr. Collins stated that the Lismore Development Committee deserved the full support of the Council and that the Council should meet with members of the Committee to discuss the plan.

A SHORT SHARP SENTENCE THE ONLY CURE SAYS D.J.

Joseph Coward (18), Congrats Villas, Dungarvan was sentenced to a 12 month detention in St. Patrick's Institution, Dublin by District Justice W. F. O'Connell when he pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court to charges of stealing a bottle of wine value \$6.88 from the L. & N. Store, Main Street, Dungarvan on October 29 and with common assault on David Rogers on the same day.

Supt. M. English who presided stated that on Friday, Oct. 29 at about 7 p.m. Coward entered the L. & N. Store and was seen to take a bottle of wine and put it under his jacket. He left the store without paying for it and Mr. Rogers went out after him and asked him about the wine and he denied him with his head.

The Supt. added that this was the second occasion that such a case had been before the Court in a short time as he had been charged with robbery on the 12th of September.

Mr. E. P. King Solicitor for the defendant said that while it was hard to condone the case, the fact was that he had the mental age of an 8 or 9 year old. His parents are one of the poorest in the area and he was the only problem boy in the family. He said that while at home he gave trouble and he was sent to the school when he was 10 years old.

Mr. King added that the defendant's parents would give an undertaking to the Court to supervise his daytime outings.

Asked what he had done with the 250 which he and another person had robbed from Mr. Lenders, the defendant replied that he had only got 215 and he had spent this.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Q.—How can I check that my PRSI is being paid in by my employer?

A.—First of all you can ask your employer to show you your PRSI card. You have a legal right to inspect this every three months. This card is a record of your PRSI contributions paid. There is a special column on the card for each week of insurable employment to be recorded.

It takes a while for such details to reach the Department of Social Welfare but they should be able to give you information on the card for the years up to 1980 and possibly 1981.

At the end of each year your employer should give you a statement of your income for the previous tax year (1981) with details of your PRSI contributions. If you are getting this it would be a good indication that your PRSI is being paid in. However, it is best to check it as that may be your only actual proof that your employer is paying your PRSI contributions and that you were insuredly employed at any given time.

The programme has been compiled by Dungarvan Community Information Centre which provides a free and confidential service to the public on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, 7.30 to 9 p.m., Thursdays, 4.30 to 6 p.m., Saturdays, 11.30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

UNION CALLS FOR URGENT ACTION ON DUNGARVAN'S EMPLOYMENT POSITION

In a statement issued this week on behalf of the Dungarvan Branch of the Amalgamated Transport & General Workers Union, its Local District Officer, Mr. Tony Mansfield calls for urgent action from the Government, Local Authorities, Industrial Development Authority, County Development Team and other agencies to deal with the growing unemployment problem that exists in the capital town of Co. Waterford.

Mr. Mansfield states that the politicians now coming before the electorate, and all other agencies, must understand the seriousness of the current situation in Dungarvan. The last published figures for the week ending 20th October, 1982 in respect of the Local Employment Exchange in the town and the surrounding rural hinterland areas showed that a total of 761 persons were registered at the Dungarvan Exchange, as unemployed, and this figure represents an increase of 18 per cent on the figure for February of this year.

In recent years the Dungarvan Area has suffered major job losses: since late 1977 over one hundred (100) jobs have been lost at Dungarvan Leather and now under the Irish Leather Group rationalisation programme another 97 jobs will go at the Dungarvan factory.

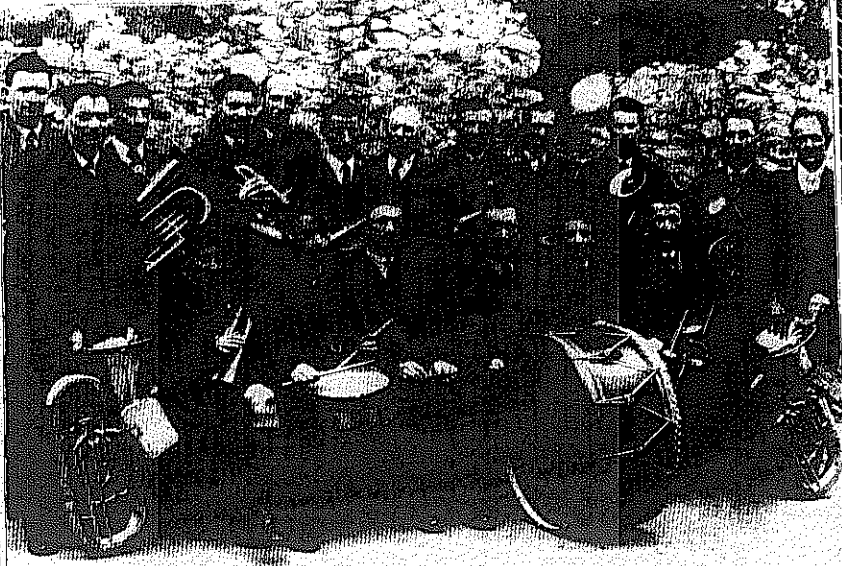

Supt. M. On analysis this was found to have an alcohol content of 239 milligrammes.

Commenting that the concentration was very high, District Justice W. F. O'Connell imposed a fine of £100 with a 12-month probation and an endorsement on the licence.

On an application by Mr. Gordon the District Justice agreed to defer the operation of the disqualification until December 1.
