BEEF INDUSTRY BENEFITS FROM EXPORT REFUNDS

In spite of the fact that world beef markets are full and that consumption of beef within the European Community is still falling, Irish cattle prices have reached a new record level for this time of year and the whole beef industry is thriving. Many have never before had such activity in the processing departments of our meat factories and some plants are now bottling out over 90 per cent of the cattle that they slaughter.

This activity is due to the changes in the levels of export refunds on beef and cattle going to third countries. These refunds favour carcase beef over live cattle and boned out beef over long sides, and it can be said that the result is higher employment and more added value as well as better returns to the producers in that the changes were justified.

It is still too early to assess these effects for the whole year, but it is worth noting that the number of cattle to third countries dropped by 30,000 head in 1981 to October 1. For the first half of the year the total slaughterings of cattle were little changed, and shipments to third countries were actually down during that period.

There was a significant change in the pattern of exports to third countries, with the Middle East, particularly Iraq, Algeria and Libya, and some plants are now bottling out over 90 per cent of the cattle that they slaughter.

The report quotes the Community census results for May 1982 which show that there has been little change in numbers of breeding stock and that the herd is still growing. Although there were slight increases in cow numbers in Italy, the Netherlands and in the other member States, it should be noted, however, that in Ireland the significant reduction in slaughterings of cows and heifers indicates that there is a much lower culling rate. This is a trend towards putting more heifers in calf which should lead to bigger cow numbers next year.

Beef production in the UK has been 10 per cent below 1981 for the first two quarters of this year and is expected to be 2,000 tonnes a week or 20 per cent over the same period last year. Stocks are low and the price of beef is being up to 150,000 tonnes by the end of the year. The Community reference price in October was 10.3 per cent above the level of 1981, indicating that the price support increase was passed on to the producers.

UNIQUE GATHERING AT YOUTH ASSEMBLY

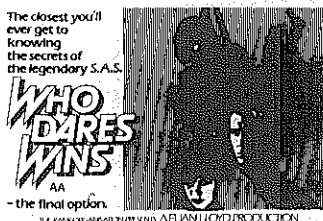
