TROUBLED AND CONFUSED
 The scandalous revelations of the past week concerning the tapping of telephones and the bugging of private conversations have made this country the laughing stock of the Western World, have removed whatever vestiges of respectability that had remained from the field of politics and have left the public in general troubled and confused.

The charges and counter-charges, the allegations, accusations and denials which have taken place have clearly exposed how rotten and dirty the politics game really is. But worse, they have shaken the confidence of the people in the institutions of government and also in the Garda Force to an extent never experienced before.

At a time when the economy of the country is in dire straits these occurrences are something which we could very well have done without. Indeed they are things which should never have occurred or should never have been allowed to occur.

That politicians should play the power game at the expense of the country and the people is a very frightening situation and those involved should now do the only decent thing left to them, that is if decency and honour are things which they can understand, and resign totally from public life.

COUNTY COUNCIL CO-OPTION
 Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting last Monday in Dungarvan fixed February 14, the date for their next monthly meeting, as that in which the vacancy on the Council and Subsidiary Bodies, created by the death of late Cllr. Charlie Curran, will be filled.

Information to hand would indicate that the meeting of the Dungarvan Chairman, Councillor of Fianna Fail held last Thursday night reached no positive decision as to a party nominee for the co-option and that a further meeting will be held to decide the issue.

The grapevine had it too that Deputy Jackie Fahy was not interested in the co-option and intended to await the local elections to be held next year when, as a resident in Dungarvan, he would not only contest the County Council but in all probability also seek a seat in the local Urban Council.

ABBESYDE RAILWAY WALK
 Plans for the landscaping and development of the Railway Walk at Abbesyde, stretching from the "New Bridge" to the new housing estate at Sea Park and running parallel to the Clonagh Road were submitted to the January monthly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council by Mr. J. M. Shine, Waterford County Council Planning Department, and endorsed.

Under the heading "Abbesyde Amenity Scheme," the accompanying map indicates the major planting job which is proposed for the area. It shows that inside the road boundary there will be a belt of Scots pine trees while on the far side of the "walk" there will be clumps of Blackthorn, Silver Birch, Mountain Ash and Beech backed by belts of Lawson Cypress with Ash, Chestnut, Hawthorn and Lime trees interspersed.

Given time, the plantation should greatly beautify this entrance to Abbesyde and Dungarvan and effectively screen the new housing area in Nugent's field from the Clonagh Road.

Co. Council Baulks At Land Sale For Supermarket Complex

Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday considered the recommendation from the County Manager calling for the approval of the sale of 2.7 acres of land owned by the Council at Strandside North, Abbesyde, to Adam P. Torrie, 3/4 Broad Street, Waterford as nominee of the L&N Supermarket Company for the erection of a shopping complex for the negotiated price of £101,000.

Cllr. D. Goode said that once the proposal had become known it was referred to in last week's "Spotlight" column. It had created a lot of public disquiet in the area and local traders in Abbesyde and Dungarvan were now making a sustained effort to hold up any decision in the matter.

When the Chairman, Cllr. P. Coffey asked the County Manager to make a statement on the position, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that he would like to see what he thought the matter was one which should have been discussed fully by the Urban Council before it came to the County Council seeing that the matter was one which solely concerned Dungarvan.

He said that he first heard about this project at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council which was being held in committee. Now a lobby to oppose

Cllr. J. Hartly said that while he agreed that the Manager had made a tremendous deal for the Council if the sale went through he still thought that they should not sell the land now in view of the objections raised by the traders.

Cllr. P. Kennedy again pressed his proposal to defer the matter to the next meeting and this was then unanimously approved.

DUNGARVAN MATERNITY UNIT TO CLOSE

The maternity unit at Dungarvan District Hospital is to close as an economy measure, the South Eastern Health Board has announced in its monthly meeting in Kilkenny.

By 17 votes to 8, members sealed the fate of the service which catered for just 73 births last year and had no patients on 86 days.

The move, which has already sparked off protests in Dungarvan, is intended to save £80,000 per annum but an assurance has been given that the staff of six will be redeployed.

Although it was pointed out by the CEO Mr. Peter G. McQuillan, that the cost per patient per day in the Dungarvan unit was £20, compared to £100 for a major general hospital such as Ardee, the discontinuation of the service was bitterly opposed by Dr. Donie Ormonde, T.D.

He argued that if it was upgraded to a full maternity consultant service it would be used by mothers from West Waterford and Dungarvan who must now travel long distances for their babies.

DUNGARVAN MOURNS SUDDEN DEATH OF DR. JOHN P. BALLOT

The sudden death of Dr. John P. Ballot, one of the most popular and best loved doctors in Dungarvan which occurred here going on to study medicine at University College, Cork. After qualifying the young Doctor Ballot practised for a period in England before returning home to take up an appointment as Registrar in the Surgical Unit at Ardee General Hospital, Waterford.

It was during his term in Ardee that he came to be known by patients from all over the county and indeed from adjoining counties also who came under his care when undergoing surgery at the hospital. In a very short time he won the reputation of being a doctor of outstanding ability—a reputation which he richly deserved and which remained with him always.

On resigning from Ardee, Dr. Ballot commenced private practice in Dungarvan and soon due to his wonderful charisma and great concern for his patients, coupled with his outstanding qualities as a doctor, this had grown to huge proportions. From there on apart from his beloved wife and family he devoted his life as a physician to caring for those

who came to him seeking help and consolation and ease from their physical pains and ailments. He had the wonderful ability of making each of his patients feel that their problems were personal to him and this was particularly so in the case of his older patients to all of whom, despite the many calls on his time, he was always freely available. He was a man of great charity, a man possessed of a great kindness, boundless consideration and deep understanding.

During the brief leisure periods which he allowed himself, Dr. Ballot liked nothing better than to do a bit of sailing and he was a most expert about the technical details of yachts and sailing craft. He was also very fond of gardening and it was while working in the garden attached to his residence that death came to him unexpectedly last Thursday evening.

The huge concourse which attended the removal of his remains to St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan on last Friday evening was ample testimony, if it were needed, to the manner in which Dr. Ballot was loved and respected by the people. The huge edifice was packed to the doors with thousands of mourners, one of whom was overheard remarking truly that half of Dungarvan would not know where to turn now that the good doctor was dead.

Rev. Fr. W. Callanan, C.C. blessed and received the remains and Requiem Mass was then offered by Rev. Fr. Hennebery (brother-in-law).

Again on Saturday morning St. Mary's was crowded with mourners as priests, nuns, brothers, doctors, nurses, business and professional people, public representatives and officials, schoolchildren and students representing all walks of life, rich and poor came to pay their last respects to a man who had never spared himself for them during his lifetime. Rev. Fr. Hennebery was the principal celebrant of the Concelebrated Mass after which the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery.

The immediate chief mourners were Mrs. Anne Ballot (wife), Alex. (son), Josephine and Margaret (daughters), cousins, relatives, etc., etc.

County Convention On Sunday

by Commentator

COUNTY CONVENTION

The Colde Gnotha has decided that the Convention should not be held on a Tuesday or even a morning/afternoon session and they agreed that with a 1.30 p.m. start the business of Convention can be completed in reasonable time.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

It is another excellent production covering all aspects of the County Board activities and County Secretary, Seamus Grant has some interesting points to make about club organisation and the commitment of players and officials.

FINANCE

Income for the year was £52,278 as compared with £46,118 in the previous year. Expenditure for the year came to £54,118 as compared with £47,733 in the previous year.

Traveling expenses amounting to £31,191 and of this a total of over £24,000 was spent on training and championship medals cost the Board £3,243.

The current Board assets are shown as £73,566 but this figure includes investments in Frater Field and Wexford Park to the tune of over £83,000 and much of the remainder is accounted for by equipment on hand.

As far as is known, there will be an election for the position of Munster County Representative. The two outgoing members, Tom Cunningham and Seamus Power, who are among the outstanding representatives on the County Council, are being replaced by Frankie Cullinane of Portlaur and Tommy Hennessey of Kill.

Both newcomers are well known at County Board level. Frankie Cullinane, Portlaur club secretary is the regular club delegate at County Board and Tommy Hennessey, an Eastern Board Representative is a referee and former Kill footballer.

Six of the 30 motions deal with matters arising from the special committee on football and they seek a restructuring of the championships, changes and a change in the transfer and registration rules.

Briefly what the motion on the senior football championship is seeking is to have the championship confined to fourteen teams and the same for intermediate with the County Executive Committee carrying out the grading of teams for the first year.

The senior and intermediate football championships, so remain on the open circuit and junior championships to continue to be run on a divisional basis.

The intermediate team winning the championship to be promoted to senior and the senior champions to be relegated to intermediate championship. As part of the new arrangement the motion seeks to abolish the Western and intermediate hurling and football championships. In their present form this might do no harm at all.

Another motion emanating from the football report, calls for a complete restructuring of the county leagues. This asks for separate senior and intermediate leagues (in football) to be organised on a county basis and junior leagues on a divisional system. Second string teams not to be permitted to play against every other team. There shall be a system of promotion and relegation and the motion goes on to outline the conditions attached to participation.

In an effort to defuse these motions, Kiltrossary club have submitted motions requesting the Convention to ensure that both championships and league will be run on the same basis as last year.

Following have a motion also on the restructuring of the championships, but in fact the request is for the restoration of the football and hurling and football championships on a divisional basis as they have been before the change these Conventions ago.

Abbeyside/Ballinacorney clubs have submitted a motion that the under 21 hurling championship be run on a blitz system similar to that in football and the same club seeks to have the county football final fixed for the fourth Sunday in October.

There are motions dealing with finance, Scot support, Irish manufactured goods, Disciplinary Committee etc., etc. as well as those already referred to in previous issues.

No doubt about it, there is tremendous material for debate and hopefully delegates won't miss the opportunity to register their views on many of the important matters listed. I hope club delegates will have advised their delegates on the importance of the motions and how they should vote.

CAPPOQUIN SPORTS

One of the many families associated with Cappoquin's GAA clubs over the years have been the Mason family and recently it came across a report of a Cappoquin GAA Sports meeting which was held at Mount Mellows just six years ago and in which a master Joseph Mason, son of Mr. Richard Mason who was a well-known personage was one of the outstanding prize-winners of the day.

As well as being a prominent figure in the sporting events, he won the prize for the long kick in football, despite the participation of several senior football competitors.

MOSSIE WALSH HONOURED

"Gaelic Stars" the country's longest established Gaelic yearbook, has this year presented a "Gaelic Star" award to the 33 counties, including London.

At the beginning of 1982 they set up a panel of experts whose responsibility it was to monitor the principal happenings in Gaelic Games over the entire season and this would embrace every facet of the national pastime, hurling, football, camogie, handball, inter-county and club competitions.

The waterford hurlers to merit consideration for the award included John Galvin, who was acknowledged to be the outstanding inter-county player of the year, Pat McGrath, Mossie Walsh, Pat Casey, Jim Greene, Tom Casey, and Pat Bennett. Club players were also considered and the names of Stephen Greene, Denis Conroy and Anthony Conroy, all Mount Sion, were on the list (no doubt because of their contributions to the county's inter-county honours).

Richard Walsh for his part in the Waterford senior hurling county championship. Having outlined the claims of the Ballyduffman, the Gaelic club secretary, it was his outstanding display in the county final, a result which made history for his club, that won the award to Mossie Walsh.

What will interest many people in relation to this matter is the fact that the Ballyduffman club got there "by the skin of their teeth" in a battle with Stephen Lyons who took top honours when winning the All-Ireland handball titles. Here is what they had to say about Kilkobnet's Stephen Lyons, but if you are a Waterford fan, you will be glad to hear that the county of All-Ireland champions through the brilliant performance of Stephen Lyons in handball.

Young Lyons climaxed an impressive campaign at under 21 by saving the national singles at 60 x 30 with a splendid two sets win (21-8 and 21-18) over the worthy capable Pat McGrath of Sion. This marks as a bright and high point in Waterford's handball history.

Certainly a well deserved tribute to a player who it is interesting to record that in Clare the award was given to a handballer, John Dwyer. The trophies for the 1982 winners have been donated by the very well-known sports company "O'Neills". It would be nice if Mossie's trophy was available for presentation when all his friends and admirers are present at the county final. The county will have a chance of being present at the Ballyduffman club function on February 4th.

THE IRONY OF FATE

"It's better to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all."

"Well I hope it is and I sincerely trust that the Rathgorrack football team will be able to extract some solace from the poetic exercise as they have not only fought but conquered for some time past. Fate has never decreed that the well won trophies will be theirs."

"At a special meeting of the Munster Council held at Waterford on Sunday last, the president chairman allowed a discussion on an objection lodged against the award of medals and the match to Blackwater Ramlers."

"However, we may dislike the winning of championship matches on technical grounds that could not be won by skills on the field of play, there is complete agreement on the point that Mr. John P. O'Donnell established a very convincing case for Lismore and that Rathgorrack has played an exorbitant price for the privilege of playing Frank Doyle and Jack Moore in that final. Rathgorrack had been convicted on the charge of a grievous mistake which was committed in the heat of good faith Lismore's case was based on a precedent set by the same Munster Council at an earlier meeting, when the decision arose effecting the transfer of a player from the same club from which Doyle and Moore were transferred."

The above is an extract from the "Waterford Stars" account of the famous occasion which has been taken place. It appears that Rathgorrack, who were the reigning county champions, played Doyle and Moore in defiance of the County Board and there was County-wide support for Blackwater Ramlers' action in objecting. This information was unearched in our effort to get the names of the team (Blackwater Ramlers) and the man who helped out is none other than that very well known Agribusiness expert, the stalwart John O'Grady who has a record of service with the county as well as with his club over a 25 year period. As well as being a delightful character on the field of play, when discussing past events in our history, incidentally the report relates to the championship of 1914 and according to the Munster Council ruling Lismore were awarded the senior and junior titles. The report, which was published a photo of the Ballyhinch football team (Lismore) and while I cannot at the moment recall what I wrote on the subject, I have evidence that they were around at the same time as the Ramlers. They had in fact some very intimate association with the famous Lismore Pipe and Drum Band of that time. The departure of England in 1912 of one, Jimmy Stapleton, was a sad day for Ballyhinch as he was one of their outstanding players. He was also a big man in the Pipe and Drum Band. He played outstandingly in 1911 on the left wing, where he partnered another great player named Fenlon. Stapleton's last game was against Stradbally as a Dungsarvan's handball player. He gave an outstanding display, even though he was injured.

NEWS BITS

The new Western Board will have its first meeting under new Chairman, James Tobin, on Thursday night of next week. The agenda includes the championship draw will take place. The Board will also consider the submission of the one application and that transfers which are not properly presented will not be considered. The Board will convene on one week later and finalise the transfers and registrations. This was announced by the Board.

This latter scheme can save buyers £250 on £3,000 borrowed over 3 years in comparison to most other motor finance schemes. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Q-If a person has no VHI cover and is in Category 3 for Health Services what does he have to pay for in hospital?

A-The person who earned over £2,500 in his last tax year is in Category 3 for health services. This means that he will be liable for all consultants' fees in hospital.

If he goes into hospital as a public patient he has his bed and board free and there are no charges for drugs, dressings, and so on. However, for X-ray, laboratory tests and other such procedures are carried out free of charge but consultants' fees in connection with these are not.

Anyone in this Category would be wise to consider joining the VHI. Consultants' fees can be high and it is possible to take out cover for fees only under the VHI Scheme.

The VHI has offices in Dublin, Dun Laoghaire, Cork, Limerick and Galway.
