### PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**THE BIG CLEAN-UP IS ON**

Shortly before Christmas, County Manager Dan Hurley issued a warning that the County Council had plans in train for a major campaign against illegal dumpers and the owners of abandoned vehicles. In an end-of-the-year message Mr. Hurley pledged that 1983 would not be very old when the Council would "unrelentingly hound down" those engaged in illegal dumping and bring them before the Courts.

At the time, the Co. Manager revealed that the Council's most recent survey on the situation had provided them with "alarming findings." In an interview he said: "there are in excess of eight hundred derelict cars, vans and other vehicles dotted throughout the county despoiling some of the most picturesque and popular tourist areas. The owners of these wrecks are to be warned to remove them without delay or to suffer the consequences."

The Manager's warning has now been officially acted on by the County Council and a public notice was published in the "Leader" and other local papers last week warning the public that in accordance with the Litter Act 1982, it is an offence to abandon a vehicle or other article on public property or on private property visible from a public place. The maximum fine for anyone convicted in court for an offence under the Act is £800.

The County Council notice then stated that the owners of such abandoned vehicles should ensure that they are removed before February 28 next, otherwise the Council would remove them and recover the removal costs from the owners. As a concession the Council will allow use of its dumps at Lismore, Dungarvan, Portlawn and Tramore to be made for the disposal of these vehicles.

The Manager has made it clear that the Council will unhesitatingly take action against anyone found dumping indiscriminately or illegally and that the same uncompromising stance will be adopted against offenders under the Act by Dungarvan Urban Council.

Mr. Hurley leaves no doubt about the Council's intentions under the Act when he warns that in the event of any undue delay on the part of the owners of abandoned derelict cars in clearing them, not only would legal proceedings be initiated against them but the Council would remove them and pass on the bill to the offenders. "We really do mean business and the clampdown is on as never before," said the Manager.

So now anyone who may be compromised under the new Litter Act should see to it without delay that the offending article is removed and disposed of in a legal manner as set out under the Council's notice. There cannot be any sympathy for anyone who will persist in breaching this law after the warnings which have now been issued.

## £1.4 Million Outstanding On County Rates For 1982

County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley had a rather gloomy picture to paint in the Financial Reports covering the period to December 31, 1982 which he submitted to the January meeting of the Dungarvan County Council in Dungarvan.

The text of the report which was noted by the Council is as follows:—

"As I indicated when the Estimate of Expenditure for 1982 was being considered by the Council in March, 1982 an additional problem associated with

cash flow would arise in 1982 due to uncertainty in certain receipts, notably rates on agricultural land and domestic rate recoupment.

payment of \$100,000 additional allocation in December, 1982 will leave this account over-spent by £350,000 as at 31st December 1982. The Council were in a position to carry this excess due to the favourable revenue position but the problem as detailed earlier makes this impossible to continue in the absence of a substantial increase in capital allocation.

### ESTIMATES 1983

A preliminary examination of Estimates for 1983 has been carried out on the basis of maintaining 1982 levels of service in 1983 and meeting the Council's Statutory and other contractual commitments. This has indicated that to meet this goal, the Domestic Rate Subsidy, Agricultural Grant would need to increase by £750,000 approximately.

While we must await decision by Government, before we have any concrete information regarding the level of state support which will be available, it is clear that there is a commitment to ensure that user of services pay for these services.

In this context the Council will require to give serious consideration to the imposition of charges for services and an immediate increase in existing charges. Legislation was introduced by the previous two governments to enable Local Authorities to make such charges. The only positive legislative step was in the Planning and Development Act 1982 which enabled a planning authority to make charges subject to regulations to be made by the Minister.

The level of charge to be made will require to be at a realistic level for the service provided.

### REVENUE EXPENDITURE

During the year a strict control was exercised on expenditure and it is expected that net over-expenditure will be less than £100,000 or a variation of approximately 1% from the original estimates.

### CAPITAL HOUSING CONSTRUCTION

As was indicated in 1981 and again in 1982 the capital allocation for the Council's programme of house construction falls short of that required to finance the programme. At December, 1981 this account was over-spent to the extent of £350,000 following a conscious decision taken by the Council in September, 1981 to complete the work in hand.
