PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

C. J. STILL IN THE SADDLE
Mr. Charles J. Haughey shortly before midnight last Monday survived the latest challenge to his leadership by 40 votes to 33 in a dramatic and generally unexpected decision taken by Fianna Fail's Parliamentary Party at a meeting in Leinster House. A majority of seven confounded the expectations of all but Mr. Haughey's most loyal supporters and when the division was called at 11.15 p.m. after a seven hour session it showed that for the third time in three years he had, once more, survived a challenge to his leadership.

There is no doubting the achievement of the Party leader in defeating this third challenge and countering every argument put up by the parliamentary party opposed to him and who had persistently claimed since the latest crisis struck the party that they commanded a majority to support the motion calling on Mr. Haughey to resign. His ability to out-manoeuvre his opponents must surely mark him as the greatest survivor not only in recent times but in the entire political history of the country. His courage in the face of the greatest adversities must be admired and he must be given credit for the manner in which he confronts and defeats what for others would undoubtedly prove the death-knell of their political hopes and ambitions.

But having said that, the question remains whether, with so clearly divided a group in the Dail, Mr. Haughey, having succeeded in remaining in the saddle, can now restore unity to the Party and close the gaps which have split it almost to fragmentation.

MINISTER ON JOB CREATION IN WEST WATERFORD

Mr. John Bruton, Minister for Industry and Energy referred to the position of industrial employment in Dungarvan and West Waterford last week when he replied to questions asked by Deputy Jackie Fahey in the Dail.

Deputy Fahey asked what efforts were being made by the IDA to secure industry for West Waterford and also whether the Minister, in view of the high rate of unemployment in West Waterford, would make a statement on the present position in respect of new projects for the area.

In his reply the Minister said that the Industrial Development Authority set a target of 600 new jobs in grant-aided manufacturing industry for the town group of Dungarvan, Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow in its industrial plan covering the period 1978-82. Six hundred and twenty-five actual jobs were created in the first four years of the plan. These gains had however, been more than offset by job losses, particularly in the traditional industries.

Mr. Bruton then went on to say: "In recent years a number of major projects and expansions have been secured for the West Waterford area. In Dungarvan, Stafford Miller (Ireland) Ltd., a subsidiary of the Block Drug Company, U.S., is at present recruiting its workforce. The company plan to employ 131 people at full production. Discussions are continuing between the IDA and Rumson Chemicals concerning the implementation of a project with an employment potential of 130 people in Dungarvan. In Tallow, the former Jyden project, which went into receivership in late 1982, has been taken over by Kingsford Industries who will maintain the existing 90 jobs and who plan to provide a further 50 jobs within the next 18 months. In addition, the IDA are continuing to promote their 10,000 sq. ft. factory in Cappoquin, the two 3,000 sq. ft. factory units in Dungarvan and their land bank of over 70 acres in West

WEST WATERFORD DRAMA FESTIVAL

The Organising Committee of the above held a meeting recently at St. Michael's Hall, Ballyduff to select the plays for the forthcoming festival which will be held in Ballyduff from Sunday, February 27 to March 6. The standard and number of entries are very high and much discussion went on before awards were eventually picked—four for the open section and three for the confined.

The open section includes two groups—Haulbowline and Ballyduff—who contested last year's All-Ireland Drama final at Athlone and carried off major awards. Ballyduff will stage "Catch 23" and anyone who missed earlier productions will have an opportunity to see Ballyduff's interpretation of "Da".

This year, Carrick-on-Suir who proved very popular last year, will stage Seamus Casey's classic "The Shadow of a Gunman". The remaining play in the open section will be performed by a Dublin group known as "Fayrassus" and is called "All In Favour Said No".

Two Waterford Drama groups were selected to contest the confined section. Artmore will stage "The Country Boy" and Old Parish present "The Year of the Hike". The popular Kildare group Rathangan complete the line up in the confined with "Faustus Kelly".

The art competition being held in conjunction with the festival has attracted a flood of entries. It is confined to primary schools in the West Waterford and East Coast areas. The closing date for entries was February 9 and the adjudicators tell me that the standard of the entries received to date is exceptionally high.

The prize winners in each of the four categories will be presented with their awards during the festival. If space allows, all the performing groups will be in the hall during that time.

More details will be given next week on more of the plays, the performing groups and our adjudicator Gerda Heidlich.

A 21 year old motorist, who it was stated had a number of previous Road Traffic convictions, was fined £50 and given a two month suspended prison sentence by District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Youghal Court.

William Gleeson, (jnr.) 8, Kilmoran Park, Youghal, was convicted of driving without insurance at North Main Street on October 12, and with not having a current driving licence.

On the insurance charge defendant was fined £50, charged, and disqualified for three months. He was also sentenced to two months imprisonment, suspended on his entering a bond to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for two years. The driving licence charge was marked "taken into consideration."

Well-known hunting and racing personalities whose regretted deaths have occurred in recent times were remembered by Perpetual trophies presented by their families for a number of races run at the Dungarvan Point-to-Point Meeting held at Klossera in biting cold weather conditions last Saturday.

The Dungarvan Crystal sponsored Hunt Race which in previous years was known as The Dungarvan Harriers Confined Race carried with it the M. V. Morrissey Memorial Perpetual Cup, perpetuating the memory of the late Vinnie Morrissey who was Master of the local Harriers Hunt for several seasons and who had close associations with the Point-to-Point fixture throughout his lifetime. Then there was the longer standing Jack Lynch Memorial Perpetual Challenge Cup which went to the winner of the Maiden race and which recalls the memory of the late Jack Lynch formerly of South Terrace who was a man not only associated with the Hunt and the Point-to-Point but also with the Show and many other sporting functions in the locality.

£7.6 MILLION INVESTMENT IN SOUTH EAST FOOD PROCESSING - COLLINS

The Minister of State at the Department of Industry and Energy, Mr. Eddie Collins, T.D., announced last Wednesday that two dairy processing companies in the South East region, Waterford Co-op and Cow & Gate (Ireland) Ltd., have agreed major investment programmes with the Industrial Development Authority. Mr. Collins said that the investments, which total £7.6 million, will enable the two companies to expand their output of added value dairy products.

The Minister of State said that Waterford Co-op is to invest £3 million in new processing machinery and environmental protection equipment which will facilitate increased output of its entire range of products at its plant at Inch Co. Westford. He said that Cow & Gate (Ireland) Ltd. is undertaking a £4.6 million investment in energy conservation and new equipment in Westford. The company is expanding its output of babyfoos.

The increased production capacity resulting from the new investments is expected to generate a total of 16 new jobs between the two plants by 1985, Mr. Collins said.

Mr. Collins said that the dairy processing sector accounts for 8-10% of total manufacturing employment in the South East region. The main dairy processing plant in the region produces about 240 million gallons of milk per year in the production of cheese, cream, yogurt, whey powders, lactose, babyfoos, cream liqueur base and other products.

"The identification, development, manufacture and marketing of new added value dairy products being undertaken by companies such as Waterford Co-op and Cow & Gate (Ireland) Ltd. is in line with the Government's policy of the development of the food processing industry," he said.

"PACK THEM IN FOR THE DAY"

A very large number of requests for anti-smoking literature has been received by the Irish Cancer Society from people who are determined to join the National "Smokout" by giving up cigarettes on Ash Wednesday, February 16. A spokesperson for the Society said that the response from the public to the campaign was overwhelming and pointed out that many smokers who agree to accept the 20 hour challenge have the long term goal of giving up cigarettes altogether in mind. The Society spokesperson said that people are becoming increasingly aware of the health hazards of cigarette smoking and the effects of their smoking on non-smokers.

A smoker's decision to give up cigarettes will not only have a favourable effect on the life of the smoker but also on the lives of those with whom he is in close contact every day. Family, friends and associates also stand to benefit.

Research into the concept of passive smoking (inhalation of tobacco smoke by the non-smoker) shows that non-smokers may experience an allergic reaction when exposed to a smoke-laden atmosphere. Passive smokers are much more prone to chest infections.

CHILDREN AT RISK

Young children can be harmed by passive smoking. Infants under one year of age run twice the risk of developing a serious chest illness if both parents smoke. And children of parents who smoke have more upper respiratory infections than do children of non-smokers.

Babies may suffer from the effects of passive smoking before they are born if their mothers smoke. Still births are increased by nearly one-third in smoking mothers compared with non-smokers.

Mothers who smoke ten or more cigarettes a day after the fourth month of pregnancy tend to show poorer placental blood flow at least up to the age of 16.

Exposure to tobacco smoke can be very harmful to those suffering from chronic bronchitis, emphysema or asthma. CAMPAIGN TO USE MORE BARLEY IN FEEDSTUFFS

A major campaign to use more barley in feedstuffs has been launched by the I.F.A.'s National Grain Committee.

Mr. Hugh Ryan, Deputy President, told a press conference in Dublin that the I.F.A. National Grain Committee has received the full support of the Irish Grain and Agricultural Merchants Association and ICOS on behalf of the Agricultural Cooperative movement.

Mr. Ryan stated that the livestock sectors of Irish agriculture were highly dependent on a thriving cereal sector to ensure a supply of quality feed for our livestock industry in the future.

He reiterated the view that the feeders must make themselves more aware of the aspects of quality in feeds and a guarantee of such quality will be a ration containing a high proportion of barley.

He urged the compounding trade and cereal industry to increase the amount of barley in Irish grain rather than treating Irish grain as a commodity in competition with imported ingredients, some of which are of dubious quality.

Mr. Martin Breen, Chairman of the Grain Committee, urged livestock feeders to turn to their compounding improved quality. This, he stated, would rule out some "suspect imports" and encourage higher inclusion of barley. The price of a quality ration based on barley versus the price of a lower quality ration would be more than compensated for by the increased performance in terms of milk yield and weight gain.

He recommended feeders to purchase from compounders who are already including a high proportion of barley in their rations.

FUTURE OF FEEDING BARLEY IN IRELAND

Feeding Barley is the most important cereal crop in Ireland constituting 87 per cent of the total cereal acreage. The acreage of Feeding Barley doubled in the mid 1970s in response to increased demands and a campaign to grow more Barley by Department of Agriculture and Farm Organisations, but in the early 1980s the future of Feeding Barley is less certain because of the practice of increased use of imported substitutes and poor cereal prices.

The I.F.A. Grain Committee are extremely concerned about the £200m spent on imports of cereals and animal feeds in 1981/82 at a time when the overall level of inclusion of barley in animal feed was only 35 per cent. We have, therefore, begun to look realistically at barley and its real value and importance for the future.

The I.F.A. recommend to the compound feed trade the necessity for a greater inclusion rate of barley in compounds. Many compounders are already doing this and the I.F.A. would like to compliment them for their commitment to Irish cereals and advise livestock feeders to purchase their requirements from these mills and be assured of value.

DAIRYING

Do not forget that high energy rations do NOT contain magnesium. Grass, let a magnesium deficiency is often a problem when cows are feeding onilage.

CALVING COWS

Well designed calving pens are essential on every dairy farm. The following materials should be readily available: (a) Disinfectant; (b) Mild detergent; (c) Rubber gloves; (d) Soft nylon rope; (e) Calving jacket (if you are taking a nylon or rubber protective clothing).

MEAL FEEDING

Are you sure of the quantity of meals being fed to your milking cows after calving? It is important to check the weight of meals being fed often if you are using automatic feeders. With average quality silage it is desirable to feed 16 lbs. of a good quality meal to a cow daily. High fibre and high ash content are indicators of poor quality rations.

LICE

Lice are still evident on livestock on most farms. Treat immediately.

HORTICULTURE

Early sown peas, broad beans and shallots may be sown in suitable soil conditions in February.

THE OPTIONS INVOLVED IN LOCAL RADIO

Introducing a showing of a documentary "Talking Among Ourselves" in Dungarvan, Mrs. Elish Pearce, Public Relations Officer at ACOT, said it was important that centres such as Dungarvan should have as much information as possible regarding the options involved in local radio.

The RTE community radio plan proposed that 20 locally controlled services be provided within the country. The RTE community radio services would be organised on the basis of a main co-ordinating centre probably in the county town which would be linked with satellite studios in three or four other towns in the county.

The discussion is not about illegal versus legal radio, said Mrs. Pearce. It is a question of RTE wanting to draw attention to the opportunity which will not come again and which must be grasped on the basis of complete reflection. RTE does not want to supplant but rather wants to support local newspaper and community initiatives.

"It is significant," said Mrs. Pearce, that BBC Radio Manchester was about to embark on an experiment in neighbourhood radio in Greater Manchester which, she acknowledges, is based on the successful RTE Community Radio West experiment which involved five towns in County Mayo in 1981. This three-week experiment in community radio relied on local groups under the guidance of two RTE producers to make their own programmes.

BASIC TRAINING

RTE were delighted to be taking the initiative in providing basic training for community workers under the aegis of the National Social Service Board, in preparing for community radio which is now sure to come. The idea of the scheme is that community car workers should be able to use local radio to further work. LIVES SAVED ON THE ROAD REMEMBRANCE

"A decrease of 57 people killed and 484 people injured on the roads in 1982 over those in the previous year, is solid evidence that with public cooperation the road toll could be reduced much further," said Mr. Jim Kelly, Director of the National Road Safety Association, commenting on the provisional road accident figures for 1982 issued by the Gardaí.

Of 513 road deaths this was the lowest since 1969 when there was half the number of vehicles on the roads. The number injured, 7,557, was the lowest since 1975.

A look at the death and injury figures for November and December 1982 compared with the same two months of 1981, showed that 1,379 injured, 121 killed, 1,156 injured, 77 killed, Nov./Dec. 1982 - total 1,527; Nov./Dec. 1981 - total 1,300.

The Joint Garda NISA Christmas Drinking Drivers Campaign "I'll Never Be Caught" which began in November and ran through into the New Year, got a great response from the public. Garda authorities throughout the country announced that they were stepping up their patrols on the basis of the Road Traffic Act especially in the areas of drinking and driving, speed and dangerous driving. At the same time, the Association set about encouraging local communities with the aid of the national and provincial press, and a whole range of bodies and institutions to do something about tackling the Christmas period (Nov./Dec.) death and injury figures.
