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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### THE MINISTER GOT IT WRONG

Last Wednesday's Budget could well go down in history as the harshest ever on the Irish family and the one that eventually sank the already sinking Irish economy. A huge range of items will cost more from March 1 onwards and following the direct tax measures, people will have less income to start off with.

Among the burdens doled out by the Minister for Finance, Mr. Dukes, are: a new restriction on mortgage interest allowable against tax which could cost up to £520 a year, telephone rental up to £17 and increases in the cost of trunk calls, a higher ceiling on PRSI contributions (a cost of up to £277) and less take-home pay for the better paid due to the increase in the top rate of tax, increases in motor tax and driving licence fees, petrol up 11p a gallon, home heating and other fuels up 5 per cent, duty on videos up to £20 and on televisions up to £15, television licences increased by £7, local authorities to charge for services.

Added to all these are the increases in VAT rates which will mean that an even more exhaustive range of goods and services will also go up in price and this will mean that even our own newspaper will have to be increased to meet this latest tax rise.

In all this it is clear that the Minister for Finance and indeed the Coalition Government headed by the Taoiseach Dr. Fitzgerald has got it wrong. The Government's problem is that it overspends, not that it underpays but what we got in last Wednesday's Budget is a long list of heavy taxes with little or no effort made to cut-back on public expenditure.

It was a bad day's work for the country, it will certainly add to the ever-growing army of unemployed and could well push the economy, already teetering at the brink, over the edge.

### COUNTY WATERFORD ARTISTS

Some weeks ago we sought information in this column for Mr. William Fraher, Childers Estate, Dungarvan concerning artists who were born in the town and other parts of Co. Waterford.

We are indebted to Mrs. Stella Noonan (nee Kiely) who replies to the query from her home in Hammersmith, London W.6. In her letter she writes about The Water Colour Society of Ireland and quotes extracts from a Dictionary of Irish Artists by Walter G. Strickland and published by Maunsell & Co., Dublin and London 1913 as follows: This Society owes its origin to a local drawing society founded in 1870 which held its first exhibition in the Courthouse in Lismore, Co. Waterford, in May 1871. This Society was founded by six ladies: the Baroness Pauline Prochazka, Miss Keane, Miss Frances Keane, Miss Phipps, Miss Currey and Miss F. Musgrave with the object of mutual improvement in painting and drawing and the cultivation of a taste for art. Subsequent meetings were held at Clonmel and Carlow. There were a few changes of name but in 1888 it adopted the name of The Water Colour Society of Ireland.

A further extract from the same source refers to The Waterford School of Art, as follows: The School of Practical Art and Design was founded through the exertions of the Committee of the Michanie Institute and Mr. J. A. Blake who obtained the sanction of the Board of Trade. The School was opened on October 1, 1852 with T. D. Croome as Master. It ceased after some years and was re-established in 1882 and is now under the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction, forming part of the Waterford Central Technical Institute.

Mrs. Noonan referring specifically to artists named in Mr. Fraher's request then goes on to point out that the Dictionary of British Artists, 1880-1940 gives the following entries: Power-O'Malley; Landscape and figure painter born in Co. Waterford in 1870. He had an exhibition in 1939. Sarah H. Purser; Born 1848. Portrait Painter. Established a crafts school in Dublin for the manufacture of stained and painted glass. She died in 1943 at the age of 95.

Mrs. Noonan expresses the hope that the information she has submitted may be of some interest and lead the way to further research. We are sure that these extracts will prove of interest to all our readers and we thank her for the trouble she has taken to submit them.

## MR. O'BRIEN EDGES OUT FORMER COUNCILLOR FOR NOMINATION

The selection of the candidate for co-option to the County Council took place at a largely attended meeting of Dungarvan Comhairle Ceannair Pianna Fall held in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan last Saturday night. Chaired by Mr. Peter Griffin, Chairman of the Comhairle Dail Ceannair, the attendance included Mr. Noel Davern, M.E.P., Deputies Donie Ormonde and Jackie Fahey and local Councillors. The number of Cumann represented was 19.

Five candidates were proposed and seconded for nomination: Michael Mansfield, Ardmore; Seamus O'Donnell, Old Parish; Sean Whelan, Ballua-

mult, a former member of the County Council; John O'Brien, Grange; and Jim Fitzgerald, Clashmore.

Mr. Mansfield withdrew from the contest before a vote was taken and the result of the first count among the four candidates standing was: Fitzgerald 9; O'Donnell 12; O'Brien 20; Whelan 30.

In the final count, following the eliminations of Fitzgerald and O'Donnell the position was O'Brien 32, Whelan 28.

Mr. O'Brien was then declared selected as the party's nominee for co-option to the Council by a majority of 4 over Mr. Whelan.

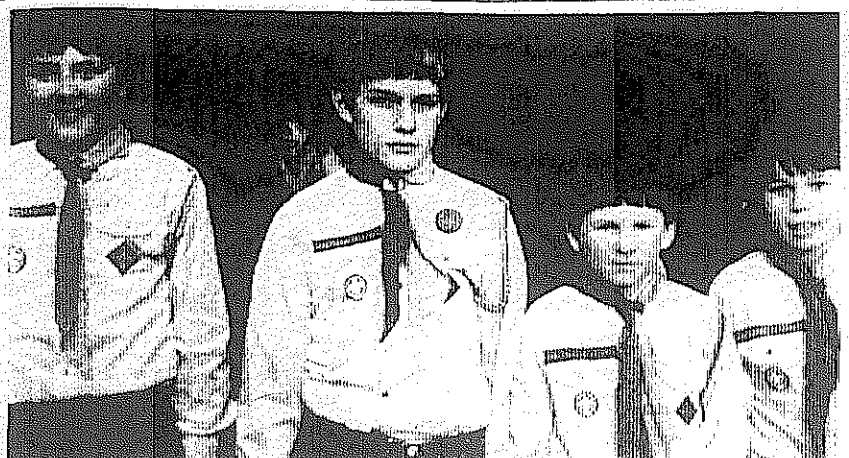

TELEVISION

TV licences up from £27 to £34 black and white and from £45 to £52 for colour. Tax on TV sets up £15 to £121. Tax on video recorders doubled from £20 to £40.

BUSINESS

Bank levy of £25,000,000. One per cent. levy on insurance companies. Introduction of advanced Corporation Tax. Stock relief renewed for 12 months. Corporation tax payment incentive to continue for another year.

OTHER TAXES

Local authorities to raise £65,000,000 in increased charges. Travel tax up from £3 to £5 on all sea and air journeys. Gaming premises, up from £200 to £300 a year. Gaming machines, up from £150 to £250 a year.

SOCIAL WELFARE

Increase in social welfare and pension payments of 10 and 12 per cent. from end of June, four to six per cent. below estimated rate of inflation. Abolition of children's allowance for apprentices under 18. Substantial cutbacks in pay-related benefits from those out of work. Special £5,000,000 fund for poor families.

OVER-REACTION

As a member of the teaching profession I feel compelled to make a few observations on your article "Over-reaction" 4/2/1983 (Spelling).

I think your explanation is acceptable. I would have grave doubts about convincing her District Justice W. F. Witness said that at the check-out she paid for her groceries but did not pay for the meat. She then went to the Supermarket and then left without paying for it. When he approached her outside the Supermarket she said she would pay for the meat "there and then."

Garda Frank Sweney said when he interviewed Mrs. Power in the Supermarket office she declined to make a written statement. She admitted taking the bacon out of the premises without paying for it and said she wanted to pay for it at that stage. She was very upset and flustered.

COMpletely FORGOT The defendant, however, told the court she put the large parcel of meat into her bag as she didn't want to have it alongside such items in the trolley as firelighters and soap. She left the small meat parcel in the trolley as it was alongside bottles of beer.

She said she never had a conviction against her for anything in the past. Mr. Power added "I had no intention whatever of stealing the meat."

District Justice O'Connell said he felt the defendant's explanation was "acceptable." In all the circumstances I will dismiss the charge," he added.

BUDGET DOES NOTHING TO RESTORE CONFIDENCE IN AGRICULTURE

The cutbacks in expenditure to agriculture, announced in the Budget, are most regrettable and will have a serious impact on recovery and development in agriculture. This was stated by IFA President, Mr. Donal Cashman.

Mr. Cashman said: "I cannot understand the logic of the Minister for Finance in proposing a series of expenditure cuts of penny pinching amounts on the agricultural sector at a time when confidence and investment needs to be promoted."

"This Budget represents a serious setback for farmers and does nothing to dispel fears about a gloomy future. It truly merits the description of 'unimaginative, defeatist and regressive for all sectors.'"

"While IFA welcomes the attempt made in the Budget to restore some semblance of order to the nation's public finances, the Government must make a clear distinction between productive and non-productive expenditure cuts."

"The proposed cuts in development aids and especially in the farm modernisation scheme are both senseless and short-sighted. The benefits under the farm modernisation scheme have already been seriously eroded by inflation."

"The Government's failure to correct this situation together with the decision to close down the scheme temporarily, not only adds insult to injury but clearly demonstrates the Government's lack of commitment towards investment in the agricultural sector."

"IFA is also extremely critical of the proposed cuts under the Disadvantaged Area Scheme, the National 5 per cent interest subsidy, the Farm Retirement Scheme, the Wool Board and ACOT. These cuts attack the very heart of progress and development and cannot be accepted."

"However, IFA welcomes the Government's provisions to increase reactor payments and to continue the EEC LIME and A.I. subsidies. Reactor grants must be increased to the level recommended by the Animal Health Council and clearly vindicates IFA's rigid stance on this controversial issue."

"In relation to the extension of the income tax net to include all farmers, IFA demands early discussions with the Minister for Finance to examine the proposed introduction of income tax to all farmers, and to ensure that those farmers coming into the tax net for the first time will not have to pay sums of money to prove that they do not have a taxable income."

Mr. Cashman added: "This Budget does not restore confidence in agriculture. In fact it will reduce confidence among farmers and if implemented in association with the meagre farm price increases

AGRICULTURAL RECESSION NOT BASED ON CURRENT REALITY

While welcoming the positive approach to farm credit in the statement by the Chief Agricultural Adviser of the Allied Irish Banks, Mr. Lorcan Blake, his suggestion that the agricultural recession is bottoming out and that farm earnings should match inflation during 1983 and 1984, seems to be an unduly optimistic assessment, and not based on current reality.

"This was stated by Mr. Hugh Ryan, IFA Deputy President."

Mr. Ryan said: "The level of price proposals from the EEC Commission are as low as 3 per cent for milk and grain. With Irish inflation in 1983 at a minimum of 12 per cent or 13 per cent, there is a clear prospect of further falls in farm incomes this year, unless there is some dramatic solution from some other measure, such as a currency devaluation. Also bearing in mind that the volume of net farm output increased by about 6 per cent last year, it is difficult to anticipate any further volume increase in 1983."

"While IFA welcomes the change in the Bank's policy on new lending to farmers, the Banks should not forget that their first commitment must be to those farmers already in financial difficulties as a result of past borrowings."

He added: "Much of the present financial difficulties of farmers have stemmed directly from an over-optimistic assessment by the Banks of returns from agriculture. The Banks will have to live with past mistakes again."

PROBLEMS FACING CEREAL GROWERS

Mr. Martin Breen, Chairman, IFA Grain Committee, has come out strongly on the crisis now prevailing in this country in relation to wheat growing because of the increase in bread and flour imports.

At a meeting of Co. Wexford Executive IFA he called on grain growers to fight for their rights to work in this country and to carry on the centuries old tradition of their forefathers in providing bread for their nation.

CAPTURE OF SMUGGLED LAMB WELCOMED

A call for immediate and greater liaison between the Garda and the Customs and Excise officials on border patrol so as to stamp out the smuggling of lamb from the UK into this country, was made this week.

Mr. John J. Deegan, Chairman of IFA's National Sheep Committee, congratulated the Customs and Excise Officials who tracked down and seized the consignment of UK lamb which they located in the Swords, Co. Dublin area.

PROPOSALS FOR FINANCING COMMUNITY BUDGET

One of the more contentious issues in the European Community in recent years has been the budget, because of the way that it is financed and the way that the money is spent. The complaints come from the two member states which have the greatest industrial development and which make the greatest contributions to the finances, that is the Federal Republic of Germany and the United Kingdom.

Indeed the UK government has felt so strongly about what it believes to be the inequity of the system that last year the fixing of agricultural prices was delayed and was only finalised by a majority vote.

The finances for the Community come from two main sources, up to 1 per cent of the VAT base in the member states and also agricultural levies and customs duties which are charged on goods coming into any member state in the Community. The heavily industrialised countries contribute a high rate of VAT because there is so much value added in manufacturing processes, and they are also the biggest importers of foodstuffs from outside the Community.

The UK for instance takes practically all the New Zealand butter and lamb, and also brings in beef from South America and Australia, and a variety of other farm products from former colonies. On the other hand the UK receipts from the budget are comparatively small, because agriculture only provides 2.2 per cent of its gross domestic product.

Germany also imports a lot of food, mostly from Eastern Europe and South America, and agriculture there only provides 2.1 per cent of GDP, compared with 18.7 per cent in Ireland, 4.7 per cent in France and Denmark, 7.3 per cent in Italy and 15 per cent in Greece.

At present Germany provides 29.8 per cent of the budget finance, the UK 21.1 per cent, while France contributes 18.6 per cent, Italy 11 per cent and Ireland 0.9 per cent, Belgium and the Netherlands, which have a better balance between industry and agriculture than most, contribute 8.2 per cent and 8.7 per cent of the finances. The British and German arguments about their contributions are based on the fact that they have a higher degree of industrialisation. They have a higher income per head from the free trade in industrial goods within the Community, and from Community protection against imports.

This is an effective argument while self-sufficiency was being built up in agricultural production, but now that the Community is self-sufficient in an increasing number of products, and output is still rising, the case against the financing of the disposal of surpluses by the member states which least to gain from the CAP is gaining strength.

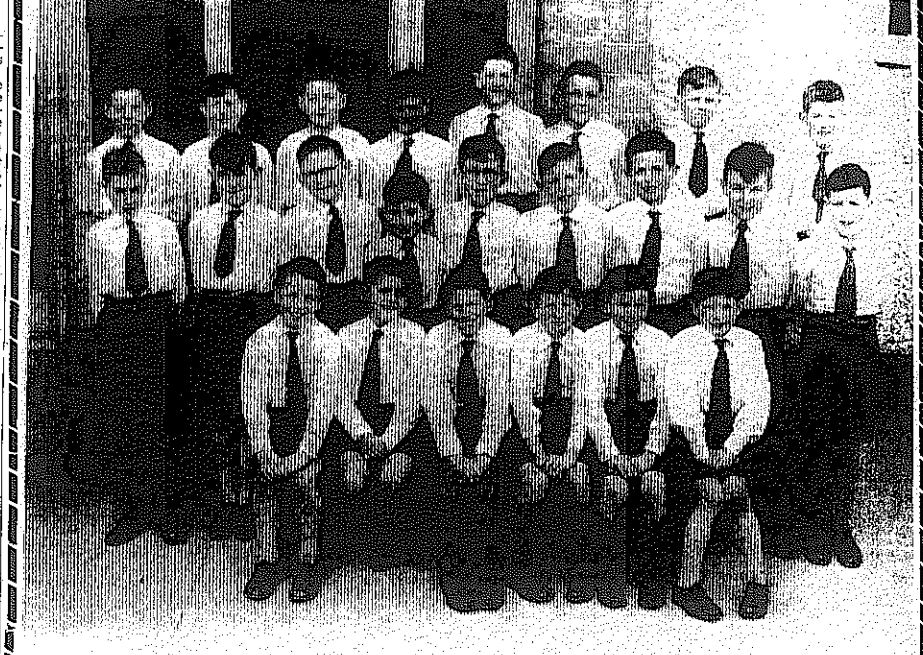
AGRICULTURAL OUTPUT

In order to help finance new Community policies and to cope with the enlargement of the Community the European Commission recently suggested that one of the ways in which contributions might be calculated for a transitional period would be on the basis of agricultural output. This suggestion has been wrongly portrayed as some kind of levy or tax on the receipts that the benefiting countries get from the operations of the CAP, but in fact such a scheme would obviously be unwelcome, and could be very unjust. It is suggested that if gross agricultural output was used as a basis for calculating part of each member state's contribution, Germany's share would fall to 45.8 per cent, the UK share to 12.2 per cent, while the French share would rise to 26.6 per cent, the Italian to 8.8 per cent, and the Irish to 2.1 per cent, which is 2.3 times as much as Ireland contributes at present.

There are various other suggestions also about future financing, including a system linked to gross domestic product, or the sample hitting of the ceiling of 1 per cent VAT.

It should be noted at this point that while agriculture still takes the lion's share of the expenditure in the Community that share is falling, and will fall further this year as a result of another prudent price

STAGGERING TIMBER IMPORTS AN UTTER DISGRACE SAYS I.F.A.

Imports of timber and timber products for the year 1981 (the last full year for which figures are available) amounted to the staggering figure of £270 million. This is nothing less than an utter disgrace for a country which at one time in its history had ninety per cent of its surface land under forestry. To-day over seven million acres of Irish land is officially classified as being of limited agricultural use.

"Two million acres have no agricultural potential. Under cooperative farm-ownership management however, the capability exists of profitable production of not only our own timber and timber products, but also of a significant export market. The exploitation of the full potential of the home market alone would create a demand for 50,000 new jobs through an acceptable progressive National Forestry Policy," concluded Mr. Healy.

HIGHEST TIMBER PRODUCTION
