THE WINTER TIME ORDER

In accordance with the Winter Time Order 1982, approved in the Dail last month, summer time will come into force on Sunday next, March 27 and will continue until Sunday, October 23.

Proposing the approval of the Order in the Dail on February 23, the Minister for Justice, Mr. Noonan, said that the Order complied with an EEC Second Council Directive on summer time arrangements concerning the harmonisation of the summer time period throughout EEC member states.

The principal effect of the Order is that summer time will begin one week later than prescribed under our primary legislation in this area, the Standard Time (Amendment) Act of 1971 and that we will have the same period of summer time in 1983, 1984 and 1985 as we have had for the past two years.

The EEC Commission, the Minister pointed out, considered that the harmonisation of the summer time period would help the efficiency of transport, communications, commerce and contacts generally between member states.

However, the situation has its problems, mainly the fact that natural time in this country and in the United Kingdom is substantially different from that of the Continental member states. This fact has been accepted in the Second Council Directive which has prescribed that the summer time period in the Continental member states should end one month earlier than in Ireland and the United Kingdom.

The Minister is then on record as stating: "This is a most favourable arrangement from this country's point of view as we have always favoured as long a summer time period as possible and the public, when consulted, were in favour of having our summer time period synchronised with that of the United Kingdom. The arrangement also suits the Continental member states who have always favoured a shorter summer time period."

A minor consequence of the Order which should also be noted is that the time of change from winter time to summer time and vice versa will be 1 a.m. rather than 2 a.m. So when it comes to 1 a.m. on Sunday next, March 27 we will "lose" an hour as the time pieces go on to 2 a.m.

RESIGNING AFTER 42 YEARS SERVICE

Thursday next, (March 31), will mark the resignation of Mr. Peter O'Sullivan who, for the past 42 years, has been a member of the Advisory Staff of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture now ACOT in his capacity as Horticulture Instructor.

A unique feature of Peter's career is that he served the full period of his working life with the Waterford Committee, joining the service as a newly qualified instructor 42 years ago to work in the field of horticulture with the late Pat O'Shea, Cappoquin.

Peter resided in Dungarvan for many years where he became a firm favourite and is still popularly remembered by a wide circle of friends. In later years he has worked mainly in East Waterford and now resides at Adamstown, Kilmadon.

The members of the Committee of Agriculture as well as Peter's colleagues on the Advisory Staff will be involved in presentations to mark the occasion. I extend to him and to his good wife (nee) Anne Cullen, (Grange) my good wishes for a long and happy retirement.

THREE CHEERS FOR KELLY

Sean Kelly gave Ireland their third successive triumph in the Paris-Nice cycle race,

winning in style on Wednesday last to repeat his exploit of last year. He stormed up the 11 km. climb of the Col d'Eze to score his third successive success, winning the mountain time trial by 37 seconds.

Kelly, who was second in the world road race championship last year and who was the points winner in the Tour de France, covered the gruelling Col d'Eze in 20:19.5—the fourth fastest of all time. He went to the front in the rain-hit sixth stage, taking over from former Tour de France winner Zoetemelk. It was an extraordinary comeback because he looked to be out of contention after incurring a controversial 48 seconds penalty in a fall on the second day. When stewards refused to make up his time after the accident, Kelly vowed he would "wage war" to win back his top place. And so he did, proving to be a worthy winner with a dominating performance which left Zoetemelk floundering back in tenth place, more than 90 seconds back.

Kelly said afterwards he had almost given up his chances after his fall but that eventually gaining the lead had given him the boost he needed. "I think I am even stronger than when I won here last year. I worked hard all winter and I think it shows in my condition. I am full of confidence for the rest of the classics."

And so we say "hurrah for Sean Kelly," the County Waterford man (not Tipperary as he is usually credited) who hails from Curraduff, Clonea Power, which is six or seven miles on the Dungarvan road outside Carrick-on-Suir, and wish him more power and further major successes as the cycling season progresses on the Continent.

THIS IS YOUR LIFE, KATHLEEN DUGGAN

A 53-year-old mother of five who operates her own day care home in the Brown's Point area of Tacoma in the State of Washington, U.S.A., has recently been selected Washington's Mother of the Year.

She is Kathleen Duggan who had been selected from a choice of 35 entrants nominated by Women's and Church Groups for the contest organised by the Washington Mothers Association of American Mothers Inc.

Described in reports in the Tacoma News Tribune as "a soft-spoken woman with a lilting Irish brogue," Mrs. Duggan has run a day care in her home for eight children since her oldest son was a baby himself in 1953, the year in which she and her husband John left Ireland for America. Since then she has taken care of hundreds of children of all sizes, ages and nationalities. She says that children are her special love.

But despite all this activity, this amazing woman has still found time, down through the years, to be involved in the running of the local church, the local soccer team coached by her husband whom she assisted as team mother, in her community, and has even taken a 90 years old man who lives near her under her protective wing because "he has nobody at all."

Her own family, now grown, includes Michael, 34; Mary, 33; Edward, 29; Helen, 24; and John, 22. All but Helen, who her mother says is a tremendous help with the children have left home. "I've worked hard for my own children to help them get the best education," she said. One of her sons is a deputy prosecutor in Seattle, another is a Mathematician and Science teacher and the third is a Harvard University graduate preparing for Law School.

Mrs. Duggan will be presented with her State award early next month and will then go on to seek the national Mother of the Year title in New York from April 20 to 23.

The success which has surrounded the efforts of the Duggan family since they emigrated thirty years ago will be learned with a great sense of pleasure by their friends here at home and all will send her best wishes for her further success when she travels to New York next month to compete in America's Mother Of The Year contest.

UNSLIGHTLY DUMPING

The efforts of the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and of the officials of the County and Urban Councils to clean up our countryside and the streets of our town by banishing litter and refuse from the scene are being negated to a great extent by many people who illegally carry on surreptitious dumping activities, apparently under the cloak of darkness, at many places around Dungarvan and throughout the county.

One such place that comes to mind is the road running by the estuary to the left at Barnavee Bridge outside Dungarvan where under-the-cover-of-dark dumpers have been dumping hundreds of white plastic bags filled with all types of rubbish and creating an eyesore which is in full view of the main coast road over which many tourists pass throughout the summer.

At the monthly meeting of the local Urban Council last Monday night Cllr. Martin Walsh complained that the end of Davis Street was now being used as a public dump and that as a result the roadway there was in a diabolical condition. The Town Engineer agreed and said that this was an isolated place where a lot of dumping took place after dark. They had a "no dumping" sign there but the refuse and rubbish was left piled up around it. He added that short of having a 24-hour watch on the place it was impossible to stop this dumping.

It just goes to show the great lack of civic spirit which is so very prominent still in the community and the widely accepted morality that nothing's wrong unless you're caught!

County Council Fixes April 11 As "Budget Day"

Monday, April 11 has been fixed as the date on which Waterford County Council will hold their annual estimates meeting for 1983. The date was decided at the March monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan following the reading of a letter from the Department of the Environment, Informing the Council that in accordance with an order made by the Minister, Mr. Spring, the estimates meetings of County Councils would have to be held between March 15 and April 30.

The letter then went on to detail the following measures relating to the estimates for the coming year—
DOMESTIC RATE GRANT AND GRANT IN LIEU OF RATES ON LAND
 The Government has decided that the provisions of £138 million, and £108 million

included in the public service estimates published on 18th November, 1982 for domestic rate grant and grant in lieu of rates on land, respectively, should be increased by £25.5 million and £8 million, respectively, making a total of £163.5 million for domestic rate grant and £114 million for grant in lieu of rates on land. While it is not possible at this stage to give a precise indication of the grants you will receive under these headings the following estimates may be used as an indication, subject to an adequate rate being struck to justify the estimates. Domestic rate grant: £1,595,000; Grant in lieu of rates on land: £3,482,041.

It should be noted that these estimates do not take account of the usual minor adjustments from previous years and the estimates will be subject to change as the claims are audited. Payment of both grants will be made on a monthly basis.

RATES ON COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL PREMISES FOR SERVICES
 The Taoiseach proposes to restore local authorities' discretion in the matter of rate percentage increases and he does not therefore propose to specify a maximum rate percentage increase for 1983.

A thorough review should be carried out of the existing charges for services with a view to increasing rates derived from these sources. This review should include charges for commercial refuse collection.

NEW CHARGES FOR SERVICES
 Regulations propose to promote legislation as a matter of urgency which will confer a general power on local authorities to charge for services provided including domestic water in urban areas.

PLANNING CHARGES
 Regulations have been made under Section 16 of the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1982 to provide for the payment of fees to planning authorities in relation to planning applications and applications for extensions or further extensions of permissions. The Department's circular letter PD 1 83 of 14th February, 1983 which issued to each planning authority refers.

DEVELOPMENT LEVIES
 The Taoiseach is considering the question of amending the law so as to permit a greater proportion of the cost of development to be met by developers on foot of planning permissions. In the meantime, you are requested to consider the possibility of increasing revenues on foot of existing powers to impose development levies.

EXPENDITURE
 It should be noted that careful financial management is essential for local authorities as for all areas of the public service. The increased rates support grants now being made are in recognition of the difficulties which beset local authorities. It is imperative however that local authorities should review all their operations with a view to ensuring maximum return from the resources available to them.

DEFICITS AND RELATED OVERDRAFTS
 In determining measures relating to local finances for 1983, the Government were anxious that deficits and related overdrafts on current accounts built up by local authorities should be eliminated by the end of this year. You are asked to bear this in mind in setting expenditure and revenue targets and to draw up a programme for the elimination of these deficits and overdrafts. The Taoiseach will be monitoring progress on this matter during the year.

I.F.A. BULLETIN

E.E.C. PRICE LOBBY
The I.F.A. launched a two-tiered attack to back up their demands for better prices for Irish farmers last week.
While I.F.A. Deputy President, Mr. Hugh Ryan, succeeded in getting the European Parliament to support greater price increases for agriculture following a week long debate in Strasbourg, I.F.A. President, Mr. Donal Cashman had a special meeting in Brussels with Herr Eril, President of the Council of Ministers.
During his meeting with Herr Eril, who is also the West German Agriculture Minister, Mr. Cashman pressed for the implementation of the special Irish measures proposed by I.F.A. which would equal an additional price rise of 3 per cent on top of whatever decision on Ministers take on prices.
Mr. Hugh Ryan said that the lobbying carried out by I.F.A. in Strasbourg with the Parliamentarians was never more vital than he felt it had been very valuable.
From Brussels, Mr. Cashman said after his meeting with the West German Agriculture Minister, that he was hopeful, judging by Herr Eril's attitude that there was a good chance of the special Irish package getting through.

DAIRY MEN CALL FOR PAY RISE
Mr. Pat Finnan, Chairman of I.F.A. National Dairy Committee has called for a pay raise in the dairy processing sector.
Mr. Finnan said: "With the present, small 3 per cent increase on offer from the E.E.C. there was no other option but for Co-operatives to plead inability to pay.
Mr. Finnan pointed out that when milk prices had been rising rapidly in the mid-1970's wage rises in Co-operatives were far in excess of those for other workers. As the milk sector was now going through an extremely difficult period workers could not expect their wages to be kept in line with inflation.

DEVELOPMENT FARMERS HIT BY GOVERNMENT DEVELOPMENT PLANS
The Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Deasy, must assure all farmers who are embarking on development plans that they will not be hindered by the Government's recent decision on action with regard to grants for farm development.
This was stated by Mr. Michael Slattery, Vice-President of I.F.A.
Mr. Slattery said: "Farmers are becoming more and more disillusioned with the Government's overall attitude towards agriculture.
Expenditure on agriculture as a percentage of total Government expenditure has fallen from 14 per cent in 1972 to an estimated 4.7 per cent in 1983, while expenditure on public sector pay over the same period has increased from 28 per cent to 40 per cent of total Government expenditure.

DECLINE IN CATTLE BREEDING HERE
The blatant disregard by successive Governments to implement a realistic Development Plan for agriculture to arrest the decline in our cattle breeding herd is clearly seen from the (December 1982) livestock enumeration figures published by the Central Statistics Office.
Mr. Deasy added that the Production Threshold as Irish Dairy farmers simply cannot accept these restrictive measures.

WATERFORD CO-OP MILK RECORDING SCHEME LIFTS YIELDS
Prizes for outstanding performance within the Waterford Co-op Milk Recording Scheme were awarded by the Bank of Ireland and presented by South East Area Manager, Frank McDonagh, at the Ardree Hotel on Thursday, March 10.
A combination of high yields and good management made Ned Collier, of Carrigadaggin, Newbawn, Co. Wexford, the major prize-winner. Ned's average yield per cow was 1,200 gallons in 1982.
The competition has a prize fund of £1,000 and aims to encourage farmers to make full use of the information that rises from recording.
In addition to the major prize, four regional prizes were presented to farmers who achieved the highest increase in output per cow in 1982, compared to 1981.
Pat Hannon of Araglan, Co. Cork increased yield per cow from 600 gallons in 1981 to 800 in 1982 and won the prize for the Castletyons area.
In the Dungarvan area, Emmett Nugent of Cappagh was the winner with an increase from 700 to 900 gallons per cow in 1982.
The winner from the Kilmacdonagh area was John Fitzgerald, of Kilmacdonagh, Portlaw whose yield per cow increased by 320 gallons to 1,050 gallons in 1982.
In the South Eastern area, Patrick Simott of Ballygarret, Gorey had an increase from 750 to 900 gallons in 1982, making him the winner in the region.
The Waterford Co-op Do-It Yourself Milk Recording Scheme was launched in 1977 and now applies to 145 herds throughout the Co-op's supply area.
The manager of the scheme, John Hickey, says that it has helped those taking part to achieve remarkable results. Many participants have lifted yields by 200 gallons per cow in two to three years.

EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT DISCUSSES PRICES

By MICHAEL DILLON
The special problems of Irish farmers were highlighted at recent discussions of the European Parliament at Strasbourg. The discussions concerned the price support package for farmers which is under consideration by the Council of Ministers at this time of year, and it followed on the recommendations of the Parliament's Committee on Agriculture which had been put forward.
These recommendations, which were agreed in the Committee by a majority of 28 to 12 called for an increase of not less than 7 per cent in farm prices, on the grounds that although farmers' incomes had risen last year, this still did not make up for the losses of the previous three years.
The Committee on Agriculture and various Members of Parliament were very much concerned with the plight of the smaller farmers and with the effect that heavy penalties for over production would have on their incomes. The Committee is opposed to the increased penalties in the co-responsibility levy which would be 2.5 per cent, and it suggests instead that there should be an additional levy on milk producers whose output exceeds 15,000 kg per hectare of forage area. This is something which was suggested in the past, but Commissioner Dalsager says that he believes this to be unworkable.
The Parliament has also endorsed the Committee's call for an end to imports of New Zealand butter by 1983, and suggested that the way to solve the problem of the dairy sector was through better marketing and better management. The Committee also suggested that there should be tax on all imports of oil seeds, in order to provide protection for domestic producers of oil seeds and income to use for disposal of surpluses. They blame the present problems in the cereal sector on levy free imports of cereal substitutes and the lack of a policy on use of home-grown grain in animal feeds.
Irish MEP's at the Parliament session stressed the problems of small farmers in this country, and the fact that many farmers have incomes of less than £50 a week. This attitude was supported by Members from all parties, and also by all the Northern Ireland MEP's who spoke of poor income there.
