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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**A WINTRY EASTER**

The main feature of the Easter holiday break last week-end was the dreadful weather that marred all outdoor activities. Arriving earlier than most years I suppose that should not have been surprising but even at that it was also colder than usual with freezing temperatures laced with frequent showers of hail, sleet and rain. Snow fell in some of the northern counties and very heavy snow-falls in parts of England made it a white Easter there.

As one visitor to Dungarvan remarked when I spoke to her on Monday morning: "I hate going anywhere for Easter because of the weather. It's always a dead loss! Not necessary so—we have had some very fine Easter periods in recent years. Perhaps, though, it shows there is a case for those who believe that instead of remaining a moveable feast, Easter should become a fixed holiday with a date in May."

The significance of Easter as the major religious festival was stressed by the huge congregations that attended the usual Holy Week and Easter Celebrations in the Churches, a special feature of which this year was the commissioning of Ministers of the Eucharist and it was new to see lay people distributing Communion in the churches.

The main social event in Dungarvan on Easter Sunday was, as usual, the Lions Club Sponsored Cycle Tour. Fortunately the weather held up in the early part of the morning as the hundreds of cyclists, from those of very tender years to veteran stages, gathered at the town car park for the start.

Lions Club President, Michael Holland, welcomed all who were to take part and following a blessing by Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P., V.F., the tour was officially started by Urban Council Chairman, Mr. Jimmy Byrne and led by the Dungarvan Pipe Band the cyclists streamed out of the Car Park on to Mary Street and then proceeded on to cover the estimated 20 miles circuit.

There were bicycles of all makes and sizes, some real antiques but also many ultra-modern models. Of vintage class was the "penny-farthing" machine of Agricultural Contractor John O'Brien of Knockatemore on which he covered the entire distance while his little daughter, Aoife, went one better when she accompanied him all the way on her miniature model "penny-farthing," which I was told, because of its size, should only be called a "penny-farthing."

It was unfortunate that the weather caught up with the cyclists at the half-way stage and from there on most were drenched by the heavy showers and arrived at the final checkpoint at the Glass factory car park wet and numb with the cold. Despite these dreadful weather conditions it was good to see that all, however, remained cheerful to the end. They all had the satisfaction of knowing that the effort they had put in represented a real good deed and that it will raise funds which will be devoted to a number of good causes. Our congratulations to all who participated in what was not the fun occasion it could have been had the weather not been such a spoil.

**WHAT MY COUNTRY OWES ME**

Kennedy said on the occasion of his inauguration that the motivating factor for those who wanted to see economic progress achieved should be not what my country owed to me but rather what I owed to my country. This thought came to mind last week when details of the many hundreds of thousands

**THE MAID OF CASTLE CREAUGH**

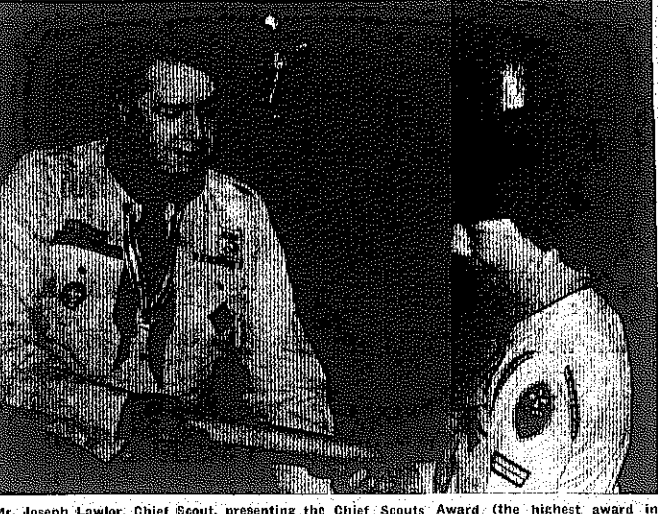

## CHARITY CONCERT IN LISMORE CATHEDRAL

On Saturday night of next week (April 16) at 8.30 p.m. in St. Catharine's Cathedral, Lismore, there will be an opportunity to hear a concert of music by Brahms, J. S. Bach and Richard Strauss. The performers will be the choir and orchestra of University College Cork under their founder-conductor Dr. Geoffrey Spratt and the proceeds will be donated to Cappoquin Church and Lismore Old Peoples Homes.

### FIRST HALF

In the first half, the orchestra will perform Brahms' hauntingly beautiful "Serenade" in D major, Op. 11 and the first of the European connections (or rather the second, because all three composers are amongst the most distinguished of the German School) is that both the leader of the orchestra, Catherine McCarthy and the principal second violinist, Jessica O'Leary have been selected from thousands of applicants to be members of the 1983 European Community Youth Orchestra. Catherine is just finishing her second year of the B.Mus. Degree Course in Lismore and was in the 1982 E.C.Y.O. Jessica is completing her Cork School of Music Diploma and plans to go to U.C.C. in October to read for a B.Mus. degree, and this will be her first year in the orchestra.

### PREMIER AWARD WINNERS

The second half of the concert will open with a performance of J. S. Bach's most glorious and substantial musical "Jesu, Meine Freude" by the choir.

The U.C.C. Choir have enjoyed a lot of success recently — in May of last year they became the first Irish choir to nearly 20 years to win the premier award at the Cork International Choral and Folk Dance Festival and only last month they won first prize at Limerick's prestigious Church Music International. Last year they represented Ireland in the Let's Sing Competition organised by the BBC and their performance in a special T.V. show made by RTE for St. Patrick's Day.

They sang this Bach recently for their concert debut in Dublin (Cork has had the good fortune to hear them regularly for nearly seven years now) and the music critic of the Irish Times, Charles Acton, wrote: "They are an excellent body..."

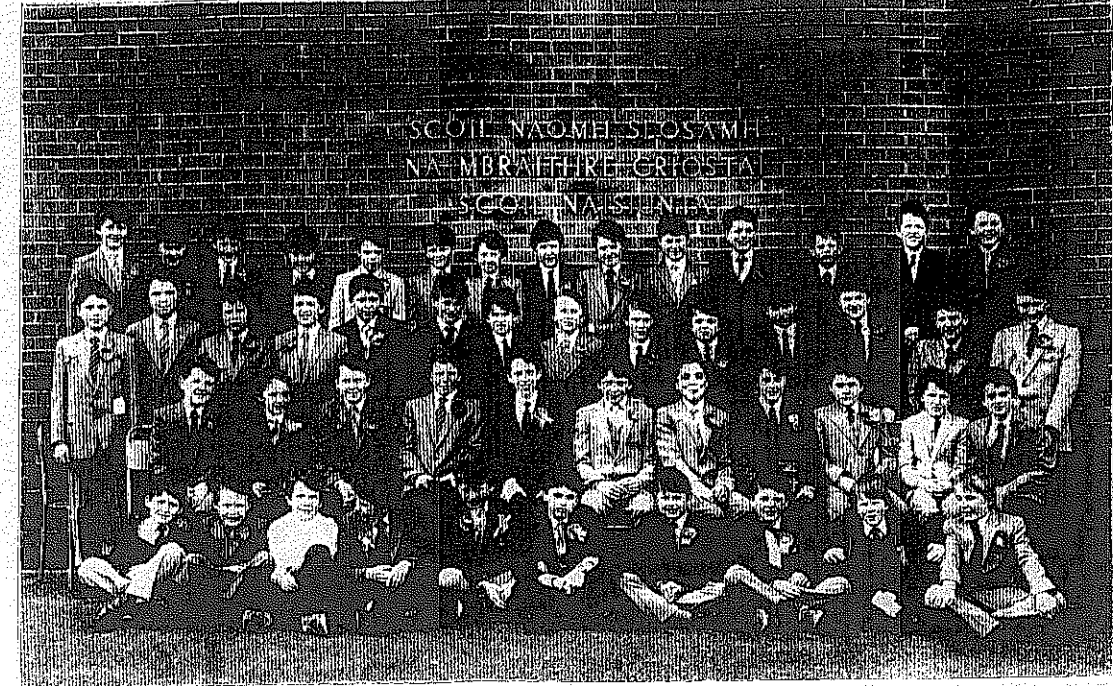

O'DONNELL SPEAKS ON EUROPEAN TRANSPORT POLICY

Mr. Tom O'Donnell, MEP (Chr. Dem. Member) spoke during the course of two debates on transport policy at the European Parliament in March. Speaking about the role of ports, Mr. O'Donnell underlined the vital importance of ports to Ireland. A coherent transport policy was impossible without a specific policy for ports, and Parliament had unanimously stressed the need for a global community transport policy. Speaking about transport organisation, Mr. O'Donnell said that Parliament had done much solid work on various aspects of transport policy, but few tangible results had been produced. It was no wonder that Parliament's transport committee was taking the Council to the European Court of Justice. Transport affected a country's exports and the level of development of primary resources. The report under discussion dealt particularly with the need for action in energy saving and in harmonising taxes and duties on motor fuels. Parliament's public hearing on transport has emphasised the need for energy saving and these commitments had been adopted by Parliament itself. It was looking forward to the Commission's proposals. There were also enormous differences in duties and taxes on fuel, and Ireland, unfortunately, was top of the league. This placed Irish transport and Irish exporters at an enormous disadvantage. Irish vehicles and spare parts also bore a high rate of duty, making transport costs 20 per cent higher than in Northern Ireland. Ireland also suffered from remoteness.
