BIG INCREASE IN DUNGARVAN TOWN RATE

Dungarvan Urban Council at their annual estimates meeting held last Monday night struck a rate of £18.19 in the E, an increase of £2.37 over last year's figure. This is a very hefty hike which the ratepayers residents of the town — those with business premises — will have to face and not only will they have to shoulder this huge increase but they will, together with the other householders in the urban who are at present exempted from rates, most probably have to face further "new charges" later in the year.

The Council members did not express any great concern about the big increase in the general rate at their meeting on Monday night and most of their worries centred on the "new charges" and the services for which they might possibly be made. It was because of the latter that the meeting dragged on for more than two-and-a-half hours before the Book of Estimates was finally approved and a rate was struck. Even at that, reservations were expressed up to the very end and even at the conclusion there were still some slight confusion as to the long-term effect of the approval and one member, not prepared to take any chances, dissented on the grounds that he would not now or at any future date agree to the introduction of "new charges" for such services as domestic water, use of sewers and scavenging and street cleaning.

There can be no doubt but that these "new charges" are in reality the reintroduction of rates on private dwellings and as in so many other issues since they took office, the Coalition government has chosen to lead from behind where it is concerned. The Minister for the Environment and Towns, Labour Party Leader, Dick Spring whose function it is to deal with Local Authority affairs has indicated to local authorities that such new charges may be introduced but he has so far failed to bring in the necessary legislation to define what charges are to be made and for what services. In this he has left the Local Authorities in the lurch and it is therefore only natural that public local representatives should have reservations as to what the future impact of such charges might be.

However the realism of the situation as far as the Dungarvan Urban budget for 1983 is concerned is that there is a gap of £50,000 between expenditure and income and this sum will have to be funded by these "new charges" — the only uncertain aspect of the matter being for what services or facilities will the charges be made. At best we can only wait and see!

At the same time it is easy to understand the reservations which most Councilors feel about the position and the stand most are taking in opposing their introduction. I think the most valid point in this regard was made by Cllr. Angela Creedon who said that while the charges might be comparatively low this year, a figure of £25 per house for the year was mentioned, there was nothing to stop them from rising steadily increased year after year, once they have been introduced at all. This puts me in mind of the T.O.T. (Turnover tax) which, when first introduced, stood at 2 1/2 per cent. Now under its modern guise of VAT (Value Added Tax) it has soared to 23 per cent and to 35 per cent!

Who Will Take Up Tab For £50,000 Shortfall In Income?

URBAN ESTIMATES

A shortfall of approximately £50,000 in the overall estimates for urban services in 1983 and the manner in which it was to be provided was the main, if not the only, problem which occupied the minds of the members of Dungarvan Urban Council when they considered the Council's annual budget last Monday night.

The estimates, presented in book form, were accompanied by a Report by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley which explained the expenditure and income requirements and programmes group listings for the coming year. Gross expenditure on all services reached a total of £54,474 and with income estimated at £29,479 and taking into account a County Demand of £155,000, the rate requirement of £212,024 called for a rate of £18.51 in the E as against a figure of £15.82 last year.

In his report the County Manager stated that on the basis of maintaining the Council's services at 1982 levels taking into account inflation only and the carry over of commitments already made would require additional finance in 1983 of £101,029. The shortfall would be considered by additional service was £19,004 while a sum of £30,000 also had to be provided to meet wage and salary increases in 1983 and the carry over of the wage agreements negotiated during 1982 — total £49,004.

The report went on to point out that the rate of £18.51 represented an increase of 47 per cent on the leviable ratepayers' rate for 1982 and the County Manager stated: "This figure is based on the inflation rate of 17.1 per cent for 1982 and I was determined to do the best for the ratepayers concerned to the inflation increase."

Provision of new works within the limited budget available has been made as follows: In Progress — Sports Hall at Quinns; Marine Outfall at Abbeyside; Renewal of roof at Town Hall; new tractor; Office extension; Land purchase; Tennis Courts and pavilion at Causeway; Completion of water augmentation scheme at Abbeyside; Housing (phase 2) at Abbeyside; At Planning — Preparation of Development and Land Development of serviced sites; Provision of 11 Old People's Dwellings at Abbeyside and 24 houses at Abbeyside; Acquisition of Land — Cloughmore; Youghall Road; Land adjacent to Abbeyside Church; Sites for OPD's at Abbeyside; Also, Harbour Development; Survey of Swimming Pool; Co-operative Housing at Gallowhill and Sale of sites at Industrial Estate.

Under this heading the County Manager stated that the Council had been the most productive in many years. It added that the outdoor staff in the town which were paying rates were already under financial strain. At the same time they had to be buying and selling of properties by such concerns should be subject to a levy payable to the Council. I was looking to those areas to pick up the shortfall of £50,000 and not to the private dwellings in the town.

Cllr. J. Byrne, Chairman then proposed and Cllr. Goode seconded that the rate increase be cut to 15 per cent as had been done by the County Council and the Co. Manager said that he would be prepared to accept this and to make the necessary economies within the existing estimates.

Cllr. Kyne again said that he would be opposed to any extra charges and Cllr. Angela Creedon said that it was people who were buying houses in the town as speculators for letting purposes that should be charged. "Why should the ordinary householders have to pay for everything," she said, adding "it's because they are too easily got at." Stating that the work force was getting smaller but had to pay more she said that if these charges were once introduced they would be increased year after year.



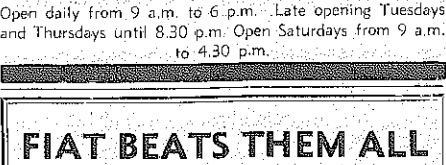

CAPPOQUIN BOY TO STAR IN BBC TV FILM

The BBC team that worked with RTE to make a huge success of William Trevor's Ballroom of Romance is set to make a star out of a 15-year-old Cappoquin schoolboy.

But this time the BBC are working alone, without the assistance of RTE, although the Irish station's Pat O'Connor who directed 'Ballroom of Romance' and who has local connections with Tallow and Lismore has taken two years leave of absence to assist the BBC production, among other ventures.

The new production, written by Irish-born author, Trevor now living in Devon, is called 'One of Ourselves', and will be filmed entirely in Co. Waterford at Lismore and Cappoquin and in Co. Cork and Fermoy.

It's the tale of a young school leaver in the 1950s faced with the decision of taking a 'safe' job in the local sawmills or heading for the big city.

Among the stars will be Niall Tobin, Cyril Cusack and Pat Leavy, all veterans of the Ballroom of Romance.

But the real discovery will be a Cappoquin schoolboy, Stephen Mason, a fifth-year student in the local St. Anne's Secondary School in Cappoquin, who was chosen from 300 local children for the part of the perplexed youth.

Stephen, from Mollery Road, Cappoquin, is son of Seamus Mason, a salesman and his wife, Anna. He is the second youngest of five children. He has no previous acting experience, but was encouraged to try for the part by his elocution teacher, Mrs. Geraldine Canning, when the BBC TV crew descended on the town several weeks ago.

The producer of the 75-minute drama special, which will be shown on BBC 1 later this year at prime viewing time, with the probability of international sales is Kenneth Trodd, the man who produced 'Ballroom of Romance'.

The story is set in the 1950s and the BBC plan to do a Killadea-type exercise on the town of Cappoquin, transforming it to look as it did in 1950.

For location they will use the local sawmills, the old national school, which is now the CYMS Hall and the old Garda barracks.

The BBC film crew are in Dublin and rehearsals and voice and screen tests began during the week.

The crew will move to Cappoquin and the full first dress rehearsal will take place in the town on Sunday next, April 24.

MR. MAURICE O'CONNOR

The tragically sudden passing of Mr. Maurice (Mossy) O'Connor, Mill St. on Wednesday evening came as a profound shock to his huge circle of friends inside and outside the Gaelic Athletic Association, all of whom held him in deep affection and regard for his kind disposition and fine personal qualities. His achievements on the hurling fields with his own club Cappoquin and later the glory years with Saraballs and Cork are now part of hurling history and will not be forgotten.

When his playing days were over and retirement at the end of a distinguished career, his valued advice as team trainer and mentor was freely available to the local Cappoquin/Affane and Modeligo clubs. His interest in and support of the games was never waning and he was a familiar figure on the sidelines at all Waterford venues. His greatest pleasure perhaps was in assisting and guiding the juvenile players and it was significant that so many of them paid their respects at his obsequies.

In later years when the Pitch and Putt Club was formed he was involved in its development and was indeed himself an accomplished performer over the difficult nine-hole course.

The immense outpouring of the removal from Dungarvan on Thursday evening and the interment in St. Declan's Cemetery on Friday bore eloquent testimony. It indeed shows that in acting as pall bearer, sorrow caused by his death and the deep measure of public sympathy felt for his bereaved family.

Present were Mr. John A. Murphy, Chairman and Officer of Waterford County Board and Central Council Representatives, Mr. James Tobin, Chairman, and other members of Waterford Board and countless club representatives throughout the Division. Colleagues of the Cappoquin/Affane and Modeligo Clubs in acting as pall bearers and Guard of Honour, comrades from army days paid their own particular moving tributes. The coffin was draped in the Tricolour and staff of the 13th Battalion acted as pall bearers and the marching band was drawn from C Company under Captain Joe Morris. Among the attendance were Commandant A. O'Sullivan, O.C. 13th Battalion, Ferny, Captain N. Minogue, A.M., Officer, 13th Battalion and Commandant M. Walsh, O.C. 1st Motor Battalion, P.P. was the celebrant at Gravelly Mass at St. Mary's Church before the funeral took place in St. Declan's Cemetery. Fr. Walsh also officiated at the graveside and was assisted by Rev. R. Arthur, C.C. Rev. W. Kennedy, C.C. Modeligo and Rev. Fr. Francis, O.C.S.O., M. Mellary.

A piper and bugler from the militia party rendered honours at the graveside. He is survived by his wife Patricia; Declan and Rory, two boys; Valerie (daughters); Nancy Quinn and Bridget O'Connor (sisters); Rory, Pádraic and Eddie (brothers); and Nicolas Mac Craith was surely expressing the innermost feelings of the great gathering when he paid moving tributes at the graveside.
