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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**KEEPING IT UNDER WRAPS**  
Members of Waterford County Council by an almost unanimous decision decided at their monthly meeting last Monday to keep information about any foreign junkets and trips abroad which they may be involved in during the coming year to the general and away from the public. This is in keeping with a previous arrangement which they have reached with the County Manager.

A couple of weeks back we referred in this column to the fact that these junkets and trips are kept on the secret list when we were politely told to mind our own business when we asked whether any money had been provided in this year's County Council estimates to pay for these trips. It is this despite the fact that it is the hard-pressed ratepayers who have to cough up this money.

At the time we referred to the fact that the large "delegations" from Councils all over the country which attend these conferences, have, by comparison with the groups from the much bigger and more wealthy countries, made us a laughing stock of Europe. At times there have been two and three times as many more "delegates" from Ireland as from some of these countries.

Of course the majority of Councilors look upon these junkets as perks to which they are entitled "for services rendered," apart from the travelling expenses, and subsistence allowances which they receive for meetings, and are obviously not prepared to make any economies or cuts where they are concerned.

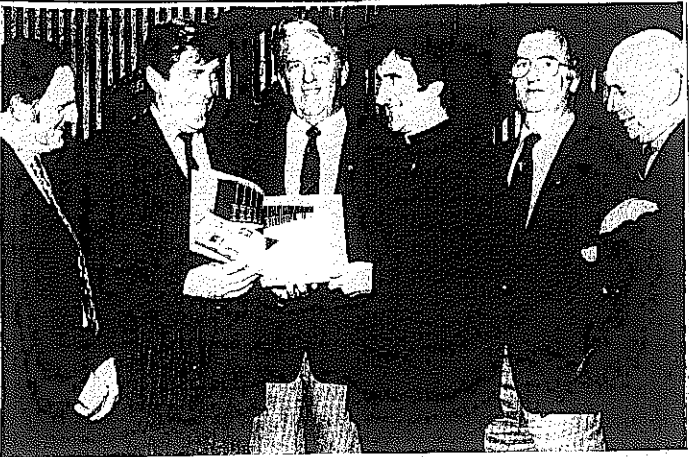
That this is so came through at last Monday's County Council meeting when Labour Councillor Billy Kyne proposed a motion standing in his name that because of the present financial restrictions, the Council decide not to send any members on overseas trips during the year. The motion was seconded by Cllr. Dec. Goode who has always opposed these junkets in the past.

However when the issue was put to the Council it was defeated by 13 votes to 2, the two favouring the motion being the proposer and second. The general attitude of the Council members was typified by remarks which a couple of Councilors were overheard making prior to the start of the meeting that they had no intention of supporting such a motion as "all they had out of this now was the odd trip abroad."

The position in choosing which conferences are to be attended, we heard places such as Lillson and even the United States mentioned as likely centres for travel, and who is to go rests, under the existing arrangement, with the County Manager and the Party Whips. This arrangement was endorsed, also by a 13 to 2 vote, at last Monday's meeting, and means that travel arrangements will be made privately and this will effectively continue to keep the whole affair "under wraps" in the future.

## Farmers Furious At Labour Councillor's Statement

Statements made by Labour Councillor Billy Kyne at the estimates meeting of Waterford County Council a fortnight previously were challenged at last Monday's monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan. Cllr. Kyne at the estimates meeting called on the government and on the Council to make farmers pay up the money they owed; he claimed the amount due was £14 million (over 3 years) and he also suggested the introduction of a tax charge of £5 per acre on all land under the control of the Council. The estimated area was approximately 455,000 acres and said that in doing this the Council would realise a sum of £2,275,000.

Referring to the matter at last Monday's meeting, Cllr. W. McDonnell said that since reports of that meeting were published he had been approached by members of the IPA, who were furious over these statements. He said that they all, without exception, deplored and strongly condemned the statements made by Cllr. Kyne. "Farmers of County Waterford," he said, "have, in the past, and always, paid their fair share of taxation and I cannot understand why trade unions tend to come down so hard on farmers especially at the present time."

Cllr. C. O'Riain supported what Cllr. McDonnell had stated and said that farmers' responsibilities and duties in this regard. Farmers, he said, were the backbone of the country and provided many jobs for others. He said it was grossly unfair to put any further tax on them. Cllr. James A. Walsh said that Cllr. Kyne's suggestion would mean bringing the whole principle of agricultural rates back again which would be wrong. He said that the reason why so many farmers did not pay income tax was that as many as 95 per cent of farmers were on the PAYE system and that they would never pay tax because of the low level of their incomes. He said the basic principle of taxation should be the ability to

pay. "The only function of most farmers now," said Cllr. Walsh, "is to provide jobs for others."

Cllr. P. Coffey, Chairman said that to clarify the position Cllr. Kyne in his statement at the estimates meeting did not specify farmers for the 25 per cent charge but suggested that it be spread right across the board. Cllr. Tom Cunningham said that Cllr. Kyne's statements were aimed at driving a bigger wedge between farmers and trade unionists and he deplored this. Cllr. Kyne added that in no way did he set out to be deliberately hurtful to any section of the community.

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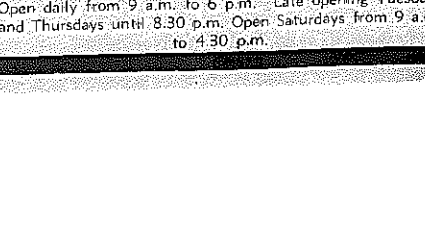

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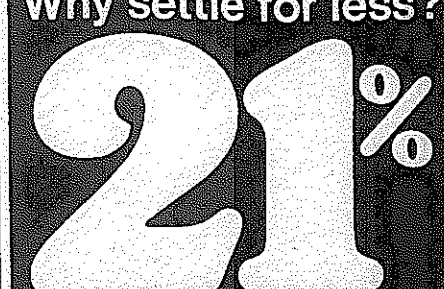

The closure is a great blow not only to the town and surrounding areas of Tallow but to West Waterford in general as the factory was seen, when it was initially opened, as an industry which would provide much needed employment. For a period the factory was open and the workforce grew to around the 100 mark with plans for further expansion.

However things then began

to go wrong and last November the factory went into receivership. Since then efforts have been made by the Receiver and by the I.D.A. to mount a rescue package and while hopes rose at one stage that a takeover by another firm would be successfully negotiated, these hopes were finally dashed when the final negotiations ended in failure last week and the factory finally closed its gates on Friday last.

"The promoters were approved a loan by the Industrial Credit Company and their decision on a request for a loan when the promoters changed their minds and made a lower offer for the assets to the Receiver than they had made in the first instance. I understand that the Receiver rejected this offer. I regret that this second package which had been accepted for a take-over has fallen through despite the best efforts of the I.D.A. and other State bodies.

"On learning of the decision by the potential promoters to change their minds the I.D.A. has revived contact with other firms known to be interested in the factory and the community in the Tallow area that the I.D.A. are doing everything possible to promote the plant and find a buyer for the industry. I will be keeping the matter under constant review."

**STATEMENT BY MR. COLLINS**

The Minister of State at the Department of Industry and Energy, Mr. Eddie Collins, T.D. issued the following statement last Friday in regard to Jyden, Tallow.

**DUTCH ACCUSED OF ABUSING MACKEREL QUOTAS**

The Irish Fishermen's Organisation in a statement last Thursday called on the Minister for Fisheries and the Government to insist upon adequate and realistic quotas for the fish fishing fleet for 1983. The Organisation has expressed its concern that the recent quota proposals, if adopted, will bankrupt the Irish fleet.

The I.F.O. went on to say that the Irish fleet is continuing to pay for the depredations of the EEC fleets, which have shown a gross disregard for conservation of stocks. In this regard the Organisation accused Holland, in particular, of abusing mackerel catch guidelines. The I.F.O. said that the Dutch mackerel quota for 1982 was 35,000 tonnes but the actual catch went on to around 200,000 tonnes.

The I.F.O. Chairman, Mr. Joe Maddock, said that mackerel herring and white fish quotas have been hit and that a great many vessels currently struggling to meet their financial commitments will be ruined. He accused the EEC Commission of disinterest in the Irish fishing industry and of cowardly support of those countries which have overfished suffered any quota reductions which have to be made.
