BAD LAW

Last week's column concerning the proposed constitutional amendment on abortion and the holding of a referendum created a lot of interest. I want to make it clear that I have never been a pro-abortionist. I merely believe that this exercise which has taken up so much time during the passage of the Bill through the Dail has been completely unnecessary as basically it will change nothing.

The leader of the Labour Party, Mr. Dick Spring put it in a nutshell when he said that the version of the amendment put forward by Fianna Fail would hamper any hopes of Irish unity, it would do nothing to reduce the number of abortions; it would make bad law and create serious problems. The version put forward by Fine Gael would have created other similar problems and taken together this entire exercise has proved to be the most divisive for the people of Ireland and our politicians cannot be thanked for landing us in this mess. The only people who won and who can crow as a result are the minority pressure group who were responsible in the first instance for raising this unnecessary proposal.

While the political parties have been swarming in the Dail in recent weeks on the issue and while the pro- and anti-lobbies have been pursuing the debate in the letters columns of the daily papers and at seminars and conferences, the country has been staggering through the crisis which has brought us all practically to our knees; law and order has been challenged as never before and without exaggeration there has been a small revolution in the air.

These are the real issues of the moment to which our legislature should be devoting itself instead of getting itself tied in knots with a time-consuming issue which, as I have said, is of no basic change in the situation to which it is directed. Abortion is illegal now in the country under existing law but it has not stopped those seeking it from crossing the channel to England nor indeed will the proposed constitutional amendment, should it be approved in the referendum.

And this is another aspect of this entire matter on which I must make a critical comment. At this time when financial constraints are causing cut-backs in many of our essential public services and the imposition of new charges for the maintenance of some of our existing services, how can the spending of £750,000—or maybe £1 million—to hold this referendum be justified?

FOCUS ON LISMORE AND CAPPOQUIN

When I chanced to arrive in Lismore last Monday morning, I found "road blocked" signs at Ferry Lane and a detour sign shutting off Main Street from the Monument and wondering what was amiss I soon found out as I made my way on foot, through Main Street and saw a squad of camera men and technicians, mid-way along the street, surrounded by all the paraphernalia of a television set, outside Greehy's pub. A van parked close by had a display sign "BBC TV" while across the street groups of interested townspeople watched.

It is all part of the new excitement which has come to Cappoquin and Lismore in recent weeks as a BBC television team shoot scenes for "One Of Ourselves," written by Mitchellstown man, William Trevor, as a follow-up to the very successful, award-winning "Ballroom Of Romance." According to Producer Ken Trodd from South-

hampton, the finished production will run on the screens for about one hour; it will be a once-off production and will be shown sometime in the Autumn.

Set in the 1950's, the star of "One Of Ourselves" is a young local boy, 15 years old Stephen Mason of Cappoquin who won the part after a big number of boys were interviewed and who has, I have been informed, turned out to be a "natural." Major roles in the film are also being played by such famous actors as Cyril Cusack and Niall Tobin and by Pat Leavy, Tom Hickey, Anita Reeves and the Scottish actor Bill Patterson.

Locals have also been "signed up" for some minor roles and a well-known Lismore auctioneer (sans moustache) will, we understand, play the role of the sawmill owner—shots of which will be taken at the sawmills in the Castle Yard. Many of the local young men and women and many children from Cappoquin and Lismore have been taken on as "extras" at daily rates of between £20 and £25.

As the styles in the film must be those of the '50's, the local barbers and hairdressers have also had a busy time turning back the calendar to those years when short back and sides was the fashion of the day for the men while suits and dresses of those days have also been tailored for the participants.

On Saturday morning last a sequence in which Cyril Cusack and young Stephen Mason featured, catching "breacraos" (minnows) was shot under Lismore Bridge in the shadows of the towering Lismore Castle, and I understand that the assistance of well-known Ballyduff fisherman, Con Corcoran, was availed of in this instance as his minnow net was pressed into use.

Filming has continued throughout the past week at locations in Lismore—Greehy's pub at Main Street, Lil Flynn's farm at Monalour, the Sawmills—and will continue to-day (Thursday) with a visit being made to the Church location in Tallow between 2 p.m. and 6 p.m.

The film unit will return to Cappoquin to-morrow (Friday) for shots at the Grain Mill and a house at Cook Street.

One of the major scenes will be shot in Lismore on Sunday night—Monday morning (dawn) with tracking shots at Main Street. This will entail actively throughout the night and require the removal of two street lights while two 60 ft. cranes with flood-lights will be brought on to the street which will have to be made wet for the occasion.

There will be no shooting on Monday and the unit will return to Cappoquin where they will continue with filming from Tuesday until Friday next at the Parochial Hall.

As I said it all lends a new air of excitement to Cappoquin and Lismore and it will be with more than passing interest that we will watch out for the finished product on our tv screens next autumn.

URBAN COUNCIL OPPOSES ORDER TO ACQUIRE LAND FOR CEMETERY

An order made by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, to acquire by Compulsory Purchase, land just over three acres of land on the outskirts of Dungarvan for a new burial ground, is being resisted all the way by the nine members of Dungarvan Urban Council.

The land is part of a 20-acre holding owned by Mr. Dan Foley, Kilrush who, some time before the April monthly meeting of the Council and pleaded for the support of the councillors in his declared opposition to the Manager's move.

"I beseech you not to proceed with the CPO Mr. Foley stated in his address to the meeting. "Any reduction of my 20 acres would make the holding non-viable and would cause very serious hardship to me."

Mr. Foley said the land was in the family for many generations and was regarded as a treasure by them. He warned that a CPO would be contested by him though he did not want things to come to that. He was amazed that such a small holding as his would be diminished still further by an act of the Council and he would ask the members and the Manager to consider the feelings of his aged parents towards this holding.

Also before the meeting was a letter from Dr. T. Higgins, Dungarvan, the Foley family doctor. He said both parents were very upset and he feared the thought of losing the land, and the whole thing could have an adverse effect on them.

Mr. Higgins recommended that for medical reasons the acquisition proceedings be not undertaken by the Council. Dr. Higgins's letter coincided with the proposed CPO was total. Cllr. Tommy Wade said the loss of 3.10 acres would make the 20-acre holding wholly unviable.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said it was a disgrace that the Manager should proceed along such

lines. There were other big farmers in the area who could be asked to give three acres of land for a burial ground.

Cllr. Billy Coster said it was "nonsensical" to take three acres of this holding.

Cllr. K. A. Walsh said a three-acre graveyard would be full in a few years time. He had had an offer of land less than 100 miles from town for a graveyard and had passed that offer on to the Manager.

Mr. B. White, Town Clerk, said in October, 1981, the Council tried to get land for a burial ground, and if necessary that it be acquired by CPO.

Cllr. Angela Creedon, however, said no one could justify a move that would in essence deplete Mr. Foley's holding. "I will oppose it all the way," she said.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said Dan Foley's case was a case from the heart. He proposed that they ask the Manager not to proceed with the CPO. Cllr. Declan Goode seconded.

There was unanimity for the proposal, but Deputy County Manager, Mr. Brian McNally, warned that that decision might mean they would be unable to get suitable land for a burial ground in the urban area.

Cllr. Creedon: There are 100 acres across the road.

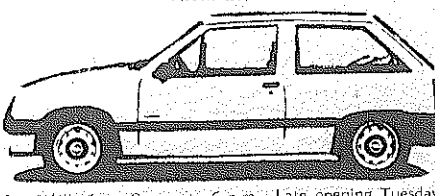

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ASSAULT CHARGE FOLLOWS DUNGARVAN FACTORY INCIDENT

An incident involving two long-serving employees of Irish Leathers Ltd., last November, "at a time when tensions were high because of the risk to jobs and people's futures," was recalled before District Justice O'Connell at Dungarvan Court when Michael O'Riordan, 97 Murphy Place, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, pleaded not guilty to the charge of assault on the Director of Public Prosecutions in assaulting Miss Josephine Liddane, Park Terrace, Dungarvan, on November 4. The defendant, who is now held with Irish Leathers, told the District Justice that he had no reason to fear her, he held no grudge towards her. District Justice O'Connell said he was satisfied that all the witnesses had told him the truth as they saw it. This whole incident, happened in an atmosphere of great tension and saw a time when jobs and people's futures were at risk," he said.

The District Justice went on to say that harsh words had undoubtedly been spoken but he believed both parties were sincere and attentive union officials and workers. It was a sad situation that things should come to this between two employees of such long standing. He said that he was glad that there was no assault on the occasion though he accepted that Miss Liddane was indeed assaulted. He said that he was also glad that the defendant had accepted the application to bring the defendant to the peace generally with liberty to sue. Miss Liddane in evidence told the court that on November 4 last she attended a union meeting at the local tannery as the union representative for the clerical section. However, on the evening before there had also been a meeting between management and the supervisors section and at that meeting there were discussions to include the supervisory and clerical sections. Miss Liddane said that at the meeting of November 4 she stated that the previous meeting had been a clandestine and secret one. O'Riordan, who jumped to his feet and said he would not listen to that. He left the meeting and later in the evening he was in his office she said the defendant said to her "you're a scab, a dirty scab" and came towards her with his fist closed and said "hit me". Witness said there was a partition behind her and O'Riordan struck the upper glass portion of the partition with his right hand. Another employee intervened but she was unable to speak. She went home, went to bed and had to receive medical attention. O'Riordan, who is now held with Irish Leathers, defended Miss Liddane agreed that under the decision of management she had to work in the factory. However, she had always accepted that jobs in the leather industry were made on both sides. She came to the factory with a long time ago. She accepted the decision coolly. She said that the defendant had never personally come to her to apologise to her and there would have been nothing to give her an apology in writing, with an assurance that the incident would not be repeated. She consulted her solicitor on the matter and the defendant later made a statement to the Garda.

Mr. John Farley, an employee in the factory, told the court that on November 4 last he was in the factory when he saw O'Riordan and Liddane. He said that the defendant was in the lower down wooden portion of the partition wall and was talking to Miss Liddane. Witness said he did not see the defendant make for Miss Liddane with his clenched fist and thought he had struck the partition with his fist to emphasise his point in the argument.

DEFENDANT'S EVIDENCE Michael O'Riordan in evidence said he would be thirty years employed at the leather factory near Scoones. He was a supervisor and a trade union representative. He said he had attended a meeting on November 4 last on behalf of the supervisory staff. The company was introducing a programme of rationalisation because of financial difficulties and jobs were being lost. His own among them. Subsequently he became re-employed when other employees opted for voluntary retirement. He said that from the November 3 meeting Miss Liddane was to lose her job though she, too, subsequently became re-employed. O'Riordan said there was a meeting of the representatives of the general body of employees the next day, November 4, and when Miss Liddane came in just as it was about to start she attacked them for having accepted a clandestine meeting. "I said I would not listen to that and asked another employee to leave the room," witness went on. "I was standing in the hallway when she came through the door and again accused us of having attended a clandestine meeting." The defendant said words followed between them and he did accuse her of scabbing on jobs back in 1982. He denied going towards Miss Liddane with his fist raised and said it was the lower down timber part of the partition he struck to emphasise his point. Had he struck the glass portion it would have shattered. He also denied using foul language to her. The defendant added that Miss Liddane accused him of having forgotten about his union principles and having climbed on the back of his fellow workers to get the position

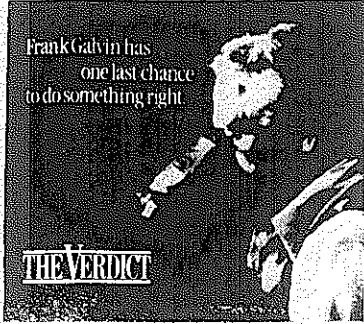

INCH TAKE TITLE 'My decision must rest on awards had been presented and the other formalities completed. An audible gasp was heard from the audience as the adjudicator at the final of the fifth Waterford Trustee Savings Bank — Tops of the Deise, to a capacity audience in the Priory Hall Theatre on Friday night, last was the signal for a thunderous approval which threatened at times to bring the roof crumbling to the ground. Not that the Inch supporters or many of the uncommitted audience would have noticed or even minded, such was their exultant delight. The Castleack cast and indeed their supporters while obviously disappointed that the decision was not in their favour, accepted their fate graciously and in true tradition of the Theatre, were loud in their praise of the Inch performance. In the three hours previous to the announcement of the drama had unfolded in front of one of the most appreciative audiences ever to grace the Priory Hall Theatre and they were not disappointed at the quality of the entertainment served up on the occasion. Inch opened the night with a rousing all company chorus and from then their colourful, inventive and highly exciting finale never left their audience relaxed into their seats. I saw hands poised over open sweet bags for minutes at a time as people were unwilling to take their eyes away from the stage. They miss any of the excitement that was liberally strewn through the Inch spectacular. Exaggeration? No, if you doubt, have then you obviously were not one of the 400 lucky people in the theatre last Friday night who saw leading lady and award-winning Bow Performer Mary Flavin take her cue from her other 'family' — through their obviously well rehearsed routines, with no evidence of the nervousness and misfiring which dogged their second round appearance. Mary, who together with her brother Anthony, who credited with the production and indeed took the award for Best Producer this season, had obviously put into this final performance which paid dividends for them in this major competition. MUST HAVE BEEN WORRIED Castleack had it all to do as they opened the second half and immediately it must be admitted that Inch must have been worried by the efforts of their western opponents. The style of their show was different but no less entertaining and perhaps the youthfulness of their cast whose age averaged just sixteen years guaranteed us a vitality and freshness not easily achieved.
