PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

POLLUTION DANGER

Because of the long, long period of rain which has soaked the land for months past, there is now a far greater danger than in previous years of serious pollution of rivers and lakes with the arrival of the silage making season.

As a result, a special appeal has been made to all farmers to be extra careful when silage making this year. Last year, a record number of pollution incidents and fish kills were caused by agricultural activities, most of which could have been prevented by better farm management.

Mr. Dick Spring, Minister for the Environment and Minister for the Environment has asked County Councils to convene meetings of all relevant local interests (Fisheries Boards, ACOT, IFA, etc.) so as to secure increased co-operation between the bodies concerned and to impress on farmers the urgent need for proper farm practices which will avoid pollution.

Separate silage effluents is by far the most serious pollutant of water arising from farm activities. As little as one litre of silage effluent can reduce the oxygen content of 10,000 litres of river water to an extent which can have a lethal effect on fish life. The effluent should therefore be properly collected and stored to avoid pollution.

Where pollution occurs, farmers are required by law to notify their local authority and failure to control it, if and when it occurs, can result in heavy fines.

AN EYE-OPENER AT DUNGARVAN TOWN HALL

Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P., V.F., was certainly on the mark when he spoke at the opening of the "Treasure The Pleasure of Leisure" Workshop and Exhibition at the Town Hall in Dungarvan on Thursday last week, and described the venture as a real eye-opener.

When I arrived at the hall the place was buzzing with excitement and energy and a full crowd of young people had it bubbling at the seams as they moved from one to the other of the stands mounted by 39 local clubs who had their attractions and activities on show for the occasion.

From what we can see around us here in the Town Hall to-day, he said, there must be something, by way of sport and recreation, to suit everyone.

Dean Cassidy endorsed this view when he said that the displays showed that there were plenty of opportunities for the young people to spend their leisure time. Not for decades have our young people felt so frustrated—even alienated—as they are at present by the combination of a rigid school system and uncertain employment prospects.

With nearly half the population under 25, our youth should be regarded as our greatest resource.

Instead, they are being told by prominent politicians that there will never again be enough jobs to keep all our population gainfully employed, and that a return to the pattern of emigration (which led to the 1930's) must be considered.

But the economic reality is that employment prospects in most of our western democracies are little better than those at home. Faced with this situation, the National Youth Development Organisation is reviewing its efforts to encourage young people to identify and develop their own talents and creativity.

As part of its new development drive, Foroige launches this week an impressive array of new programme resources. The materials, booklets, leaflets and a video film, are now available to Foroige members and volunteer leaders who are pursuing activities under Foroige's eight education programmes.

The official launching of the programme materials, Director Michael Cleary said that Foroige views the young people of the country not as a problem but as a major opportunity.

WOULD BE CHEAPER TO DRIVE WITHOUT INSURANCE

When 21-year-old butcher, Terence O'Sullivan, 23, Boreenrath, Dungarvan, appeared at Dungarvan Circuit court yesterday, Garda P. Galvin with driving car without insurance at Youghal Road, Dungarvan, on April 23, was the subject of O'Connell that he could not afford to pay the premium of £588 which the insurance company wanted.

In reply to Mr. E. J. King, J.P., who appeared for him the defendant said that at first he had been told that the premium would be £430 and he collected that amount but when he went to pay it he was told that the premium would then be £588.

Pointing out that in such cases, the maximum fine which he could impose on conviction was £100, the District Justice said that it was cheaper for young people like the defendant to take a chance and drive without insurance rather than pay a premium of almost £700.

When Mr. King pointed out that there was another insurance summons against the defendant pending, the District Justice decided to adjourn the matter until the Court on June 1 when he would deal with both together.

He imposed a fine of £220 on O'Sullivan for having no tax in the car, £5 for having no horn, £2 for having no front identification mark and a further £5 for having no driver's licence remarking that with no insurance and no horn the defendant was likely to get up to an accident!

GRASSLAND
1. Leaching or loss of nitrogen is liable to be greater in newly re-seeded grass fields, than in older established pastures. The advice in such cases is to err on the side of excess nitrogen.

2. Try and avoid cutting the brown butts in silage crops. It has a digestibility of 60% (M.D.).

3. Do not raise the cutting blades of the harvester.

CATTLE
On blackleg prone farms now is the time to inoculate against this disease.

CATCH CROPS
Kale can make a big contribution to autumn and winter feeding of dairy cows. For optimum results Kale should be sown by mid June on well drained land. If direct drilling, grass should be sown in the same field using Roundup. Best yielding varieties this year are Maris Kestrel, Protecor and Bittern.

GENEALS
Watch out for Rynchosporium in Spring barley. It can be confused with Nitrogen deficiency.

All spring cereals should be sprayed for Eyspot control this year. Optimum time for spraying is growth stage 4-6.

SPRAYS
This is peak spraying time on farms. Follow directions carefully and store all chemicals out of reach of children.

Recent adverse weather conditions may make it advisable to re-assess your financial situation.

ACOT ADVICE IS FREE

There is no charge whatever for advice given by ACOT advisers. This is the clear message in a statement from ACOT, aimed at clearing up the confusion which has arisen following the introduction of a charge for work done by advisers in connection with the administration of the Farm Modernisation Scheme.

The ACOT statement emphasises that only farm visits in connection with Farm Modernisation Scheme administration are liable to a charge. Administration of the scheme is defined as follows: categorisation of new applicants; re-assessment; supplementary investment approval; modification to plans; verification of farm accounts and verification of Guidance Premiums. The charge in these cases is £20 for each farm visit, which is deducted by the Department of Agriculture from the grant payable to the farmer.

All other visits by ACOT advisers about the carrying out of Farm Modernisation Scheme plans are entirely free, as are visits about any other aspects of the farm.

An important aspect of the new arrangement is that no charge is made for Farm Modernisation Scheme administration if the farmer visits his adviser at the ACOT office. Some of the administrative matters referred to above, can be handled without involving a visit by the adviser to the farm.

An order has been made by the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley that the tender of M/s. Gerald M. Ruane & Co., Building Contractors, John's Park, Waterford, in the sum of £28,376.81, being the lowest of 5 tenders received for the reconstruction of houses at Cathal Brugh, Pince, Dungarvan, be accepted.

The order notes that the amount of work to be carried out up to December 31 next would not exceed £40,000 and it adds that the extension of the tender for work to be carried out in 1984 would be dealt with by the Department for this scheme.

CO-OP WORKERS WAGES SHOULD STICK TO GOVERNMENT PAY NORM

Mr. Pat Finnian, Chairman of IFA National Dairy Committee, has called on dairy farmers to stick to the Government's pay norm in settling wage increases with Co-op workers. He pointed out that wages had risen by 134 per cent since 1978, while milk prices have only increased by 28 per cent over the same period. He said that dairy farmers' incomes have fallen by 40 per cent in real terms since 1978.

Mr. Finnian pointed out that the delay in price fixing this year has seriously eroded the value of the milk. The recent bad weather is likely to lead to reduced productivity in Co-operatives due to falling milk supplies.

Mr. Finnian called on workers to recognise that wage increases are not inevitable because of this difficult economic climate.

BALLINROD MAN FINED £200 AND DISQUALIFIED FOR THREE YEARS

It was a question of total surrender as far as the defendant was concerned on the occasion stated Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solicitor when he appeared for Garda Brady in the Dungarvan Circuit Court yesterday. The defendant, Garda Brady, was charged with driving with excess alcohol in the County of Waterford, on December 27 last and also with refusing to take a breath test and with dangerous driving on the same occasion. He pleaded guilty to the charges.

The defendant, who presented himself to the Court that Garda Brady was operating a check-point on the Causeway on the night in question and at 1.15 p.m. he observed the defendant's car coming towards him. He was swearing and when Garda Brady stopped him to stop his car for some distance before coming to a halt. Garda Brady requested the defendant to take a breath test but he declined and the Garda then arrested the defendant. The defendant was taken to the Garda Station where he was held.

The Superintendent then stated that the defendant had previously been fined in 1978 for driving with excess alcohol and was convicted of driving with excess alcohol in February and had been convicted of dangerous driving and driving without insurance in 1978.

Mr. Gordon, J.P., said that the reason the defendant had refused to take a breath test on the occasion was that he saw no point in taking it as he knew he would be taken to the Garda Station and fined. He said that the conviction in February related to an offence committed prior to the present one. "It was," said Mr. Gordon, "a case of total surrender as far as Fitzgerald was concerned on this occasion."

Commenting that Fitzgerald's record was not impressive and that the concentration of alcohol was very high, District Justice W. F. O'Connell convicted the defendant on all three charges. He imposed a fine of £150 with three years disqualification to be endorsed on the defendant's licence. He also imposed a concurrent disqualification of six months and endorsement on the dangerous driving charge.

FARMERS BEING MISLED ON TAXATION ISSUE - FRANK MASTERSON

The ICMSA are now misleading farmers on the Taxation issue. This was stated by Mr. Frank Masterson, Chairman of IFA Taxation and Credit Committee on Monday, May 23.

Mr. Masterson said: "To advise farmers to burn Tax Forms is totally irresponsible. To encourage farmers to burn Tax Forms is tantamount to anarchy and can only lead the farming community into organised chaos in a few days."

"Farmers are not foolish but some of their organisations can be. Any organisation who would suggest the above remedy to their tax liability is itself unhealthy. It is not sick. Such an organisation is unfit to lead or to advise. Such an organisation needs a large dose of democratic medicine."
