## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**WHAT IT MAY BE LIKE BY THE YEAR 2000**

The Annual Review of An Foras Forbartha, the National Institute for Physical Planning and Construction Research was released last week and the projections which it lists indicate a number of problems which need to be tackled now if the desired standards are to be achieved by the year 2000.

What will Ireland be like in the year 2000 if developments follow patterns of recent decades? What challenges need to be confronted in the immediate term if the momentum of the past two decades is to be sustained? The series of annual conferences initiated by An Foras Forbartha in 1980 on the theme "Ireland in the Year 2000" has, according to the Review, given some consideration to these two questions and as a result, between now and the year 2000 it is forecast that: 1) population will increase by one million, 2) 0.5 to 0.7 million new jobs will be required; 3) up to 75 per cent of the population will live in urban areas with 40 per cent in the eastern (Leinster) region of the country, 4) 0.6 to 0.75 million new houses will be required together with the necessary shops, schools, hospitals and recreational facilities; 5) new and improved roads will be required to accommodate a two-fold increase in the number of cars; 6) there will be a two-fold increase in the number of telephones; 7) a somewhat less than two-fold increase in energy requirements; 8) increased industrialisation, more intensive agriculture and substantial infrastructural development will place significant pressures on environmental quality; 9) there will be further development of new and far-reaching technologies (telecommunications, microchip, bio-technology, etc.) and 10) there will be an increase in the average time available for leisure purposes.

The Review goes on to elaborate on these projections by stating that basic to national progress is a major expansion in manufacturing, industry, agriculture and tourism in relation to infrastructure, the magnitude of investment required to the end of the century has been estimated as being of the order of IR£45,000 million (1980 prices) and could amount to IR£60,000 million if other related investments, especially machinery and transport equipment, were included. At the same time, increased expenditure to protect and improve environmental quality is also required.

The conference series concludes that infrastructural deficiencies, institutional weaknesses and public cynicism rank among the major challenges for the 1990s and that removal of these obstacles was a prerequisite to continued development.

The Review then stresses that the full and proper use of the nation's research and development facilities is essential to achieving national social and economic objectives. The research and development facilities should provide, inter alia, basic data required for planning, identification and evaluation of the options available, assistance in the effective implementation of plans, monitoring of progress of plans and an indication of where adjustments might be necessary.

Now all this might sound somewhat far-fetched especially to the ordinary person and indeed it does sound like something that can possibly occur only in the distant future when we have all based on the projections which have been mentioned above are forecast to become realities by the year 2000 and that is only 17 years away!

"But I'm the Minister for Agriculture," he explained plaintively, before being allowed in by the still dubious whitecoats.

## Cllr. C. O Riain Rebuffs Planning Officer And Storms Out Of Council Meeting

A row over the granting of planning permission for the building of a bungalow by Waterford County Council escalated on Monday night when the Council's longest serving member, Cllr. C. O Riain (FF) thundered out of the Council meeting in Dungarvan because of the presence of the Chief Planning Officer, Mr. James Shine.

Cllr. O Riain has claimed that whereas he failed in his representations to have planning permission granted for the building of the bungalow, the subsequent intervention of the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Austin Deasy, "did the trick."

That charge resulted in the setting up of a special Council sub-committee to investigate the whole affair, but now Cllr. O Riain, 29 years a Councillor, has declared that he will not attend any future Council meetings at which Mr. Shine is present.

"In the absence of an apology to me over the furore that has followed my allegations about the granting of this particular planning permission I will never again attend a Council meeting at which the Planning Officer is in attendance," an irate Cllr. O Riain told last Monday's meeting.

"That officer is here today and while this is a very important Council meeting I cannot remain on," said Cllr. O Riain, who added that under the proposed new five-year Development Plan for the county his area of north Waterford was being discriminated against, "I must now leave this meeting," he said, and he then stormed out.

Cllr. Billy Kynne said the latest increase in tension did not help their endeavours to get to the bottom of the allegations raised by Cllr. O Riain who, having been told in the first instance that planning permission could not be granted for the erection of a bungalow, subsequently learned that permission had been granted.

The chairman Cllr. Pat Coffey said it was the hope of every member that the issue could be amicably resolved as quickly as possible.

**DEVELOPMENT PLAN**

The meeting decided unanimously on the recommendation of the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, to devote an entire day on July 11 to consideration of the proposed County Development Plan governing the next five years.

The plan was before the meeting but Mr. Hurley suggested that they go through it "page by page" and this, he submitted, would require a day-long sitting of the Council.

Mr. Brian J. McNally, County Secretary said that unless they got an extension from the Minister for the Environment they might be in difficulty about finalising the plan by the deadline date of November 27.

Mr. McNally said that when the plan was adopted by the Council it then had to be put on display for three months so that objections and representations could be lodged.

The meeting decided that the meeting on July 11 to consider the plan will commence at 11 a.m.

## COUNTY COUNCIL TRIBUTES TO LATE CO. MANAGER

There was a ten-minute adjournment of the meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday as a mark of respect to the former County Manager, Mr. Charles A. O'Connor whose death occurred recently.

Proposing the adjournment, the chairman, Cllr. Pat Coffey described the late Mr. O'Connor as an outstanding administrator, while Cllr. Kiernan O'Ryan, seconding, said Mr. O'Connor's managerial door had always been open to every Councillor.

All the other members joined in the tributes, as did Mr. O'Connor's successor, Mr. Dan Hurley who said the late Mr. O'Connor had been a friend of his down the years.

"He was a man of tremendous ability and integrity," said Mr. Hurley "and the healthy state of Waterford County Council today is a glowing tribute to him."

# An Rinn By A Whisker

### AN RINN 1-8; BALLINACOURTY 1-7

An Rinn held on by a whisker to qualify for the quarter-finals of the senior football championship when they scored the narrowest of victories over three-time champions, Ballinacourty in an extraordinary clash at Frater Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last.

Ballinacourty were totally outclassed in a completely one-sided first half and they were fortunate not to be further than 6 points behind at the halfway stage. With Tom Gough and Michael Hayes completely on top in the centre of the field the Gaelsch side were in complete control and rattled Ballinacourty to such an extent that they failed to score in the thirty minutes period.

A lack of maturity, however, in the Ring attack saw them miss a few chances and as subsequent events proved, these misses could have proved costly.

The second half saw a complete transformation in the trend of play as Ballinacourty pride stung, battled their way back into the game.

Using Michael Hanrahan as an extra midfielder they took control in this area as Ring's Tom Gough visibly faded, and with Dan Looby showing improved form at centre back the tide slowly turned in Ballinacourty's favour.

Points from John Curran in the 35 and 37 minutes gave them the spur they needed and despite the fact that Nicolas Mac Craith had a Ring point in the 39th minute further Ballinacourty points from John Moloney and Jimmy Healy left just three points between the sides (0-7 to 0-4) by the 41st minute.

There was intense excitement as Courty attacked looking for the equaliser. Time was gone the hour when Mulvihill was again put clear but he blazed his shot straight at Ring keeper Tom Maher, and the ball rebounded clear.

Referee Jim Joe Landers blew the final whistle as Eddie Cahill net the rebound and sent the ball over the bar, but the score was not allowed as Ring had survived to qualify for the quarter-finals.

The reason for Ballinacourty's total eclipse in the first half is as hard to fathom as Ring's collapse during long periods in the second half.

Ballinacourty looked like a team without purpose in the first half. They lacked commitment and heart in comparison to Ring who showed a rare appetite for the ball and maybe on this score alone the Ring side just about deserved to go through on the day.

Ring had one of the outstanding players on the field in back Daniel Murphy who got most assistance from Michael Drummy, Tom Kelly, Noel Murphy, Carthac Mac Craith, Sean Lenane and Kevin Curran, with Tom Gough one of their more prominent players in the first half.

Few of the Ballinacourty players enhanced their reputations in the first half but in the second Michael Hanrahan, Ray and John Moloney, Dan Looby, Johnny Burns, John Curran and Jimmy Healy all showed considerable improvement and they could be deemed a little unlucky with their last chance effort.

## PUBLICANS FINED FOR BREACHES OF LICENSING LAWS

When a Garda Sergeant inspected a premises on the outskirts of Dungarvan in the early hours of March 17 last he came upon a "cruben and cocktail party" on the premises. District Justice W. P. O'Connell was told at Dungarvan Court.

Mrs. Gerie Hayes, licensee of the "Duck" public house, on Kilmenee, Dungarvan, was charged with a breach of the licensing laws on that occasion. Sergeant in evidence said when he entered the premises he got the names of thirteen people but a number of others "got away" on being asked to leave.

Mr. Gordon—Would you agree that this premises and the other 200 premises owned by Mrs. Hayes' husband are on the road are well kept?

Sergeant—Surely—No, I got a lot of advice from Mrs. Hayes that night.

The defendant told the court that she organised a sing-song and a public house party for the regular customers of her husband's pub. It was a private function for which there was no charge and all the money went to charity.

District Justice O'Connell said that the defendant was aware that the whole thing was illegal after normal closing time had passed. He imposed a fine of £25 on the licensee and ordered the conviction. The "found-ons" were each fined £5.

A charge against Mrs. Ann Gough, publican of being in breach of the licensing laws at 11.55 p.m. on March 16 was dismissed.

Thomas Gough, husband of the licensee, told the court that there had been between 150 and 200 people on the premises that night and he made every reasonable effort to clear them out on time. No drink was served after 11 p.m. and he had ordered some customers to leave and get them to leave.

District Justice O'Connell said he would give the defendant the benefit of the doubt and dismiss the charge. The found-ons however were fined £5 each.

I think that army personnel should be deployed to assist the Garda in the maintenance of law and order."
