SOCIAL STUDY CONFERENCE AGAIN FOR DUNGARVAN
At a time when the population of west European countries is either stable or falling, the population in both parts of Ireland is increasing, and more than half this population is now under 25 years of age. At the same time unemployment in Ireland is among the highest in Europe. These circumstances, with their potential for revolution, pose a major challenge to Irish Society. This challenge is the theme of the Social Study Conference Summer School which, this year, will again be held in St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan from July 30 to August 6 under the title "Young Ireland - Potential Revolution". Young people, particularly those without work or the prospect of work, are becoming increasingly disenchanted with traditional values and many now doubt if the aspirations of youth can be met without radical change amounting to revolution. The steps to be taken to effect this change will be discussed at the Summer School under various headings and speakers will include Mr. J. R. Regan, M.P., East Antrim; Deputies Seamus Brennan and Richard Bruton, Senator Michael D. O'Riain, Ald. Paddy Gallagher, Bishop Anthony Ferganella, Belfast; Bishop Donal Murray, Dublin; Peter Caswell, C.I.C.U., Tim Chapman, Northern Ireland Probation Service and Padiac White, I.D.A. Anyone interested in attending the Summer School should contact Pat Burke, 20 Merville Ave., Stillorgan, Co. Dublin.

WHY? — THEY DON'T KNOW
High pressure bringing with it clear skies and warm south or south-westerly breezes is the cause of the hot dry spell which has brought us the heat-wave conditions which we have been enjoying for the past few weeks. However, despite all the recent technological advances, scientists do not know why such conditions arise at certain times. Meteorologists say that Ireland's weather is usually variable so we should not be surprised by the heat-wave which so swiftly followed the cold wet spring of one of the worst in living memory. As I see these lines on Tuesday we still have a high pressure area to the south with a variety of south-westerly flow which brings conditions of instability and heat which result in isolated cloud bursts and violent thunderstorms in various areas. These thunderstorms over the past week have resulted in electricity power cuts in many places, the most widespread being on Thursday morning last when many main generators were put out of action simultaneously by lightning, blacking out the entire south-east from Waterford to Cork for more than two hours. (From shortly after 9 a.m. bringing all activity depending on electricity to a standstill and creating additional headaches for many including ourselves here at the "Leader" Office.) It just goes to show that even when the sun shines there can be emergency situations.

SEEKING RELATIVES

SIGN POST NEEDED?
A local resident in the Ballyduff, Dungarvan townland has told me that a signpost is needed at the junction of the Ballyduff and Dungarvan roads at Ballinacree, showing the direction to Clonmel. He states that many people going to Clonmel go wrong at this point, taking the lower road. He also states that in fact there was such a sign-post at the point up to some years ago when it was knocked by a collision but it was never subsequently replaced.

ON MICK MACKAY MEMORIAL COMMITTEE
Ann Mulqueen, the well-known traditional singer, who lives in the Ring Gaeltacht, has been elected on the Mick Mackay Memorial Committee which has been formed to erect a fitting memorial to the famous Limerick hurler in his native Castleconnell in County Limerick. Ann, who is married to Kerry born school-teacher, Tomas O'Ceilleachair, and has five children, was born next door to the Mackay family in Castleconnell. She grew up in the village, made famous by outstanding hurlers whose club was Abane. Now it is planned, with the aid of former team-mates Dick Stokes and Jackie Power and others, to erect a memorial to Mick Mackay in the village of Castleconnell, six miles from Limerick City. Various fund-raising activities, including a greyhound meeting, are planned to raise money for the venture which will surely have the wholehearted support of all GAA followers.

PROMOTING GOOD WILL
The Mayor of Camden Town, London, Cllr. Ronald Hefferman will travel over to this country especially to officially start a 1,000 mile sponsored cycle tour of Ireland by Fr. Butler to raise funds for the Irish Centre in London. The start will take place at Rosslare to-morrow, Thursday, July 14. In conjunction with his visit, the Chairman of Waterford County Council, Mr. Pat Coffey, Portlaoise has extended an invitation to Mayor Hefferman to visit County Waterford and has arranged a small informal reception to honour the occasion to be held in the 14th in the interest of promoting good will and contact between the authorities. Invitations to the function have also been extended to the Chairman of Tramore Town Commissioners and the Mayor of Waterford. Such cordial cross-channel contacts can do nothing but good and Cllr. Coffey is to be congratulated on his initiative.

QUB HONOURS O'HEICHA
The President of University College, Galway, Dr. Colm O'HeicHA was honoured last week at Queen's University, Belfast, at what was described as "an historic academic family reunion." The QUB chancellor, Lord Ashby said that there were no borders between the Universities in Ireland or elsewhere except those between knowledge and ignorance when he conferred the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Law on Dr. O'HeicHA. "Son of the late Fear Mor and Bean Uí hEochá, Dr. O'HeicHA was born in Ring and grew up in the County Waterford Gaeltacht and is a native Irish speaker. As far back as his immediate post-graduate years he had written his Masters thesis in Irish and then gone on to study in California and the Netherlands before returning to Galway as Professor of Biochemistry, his work on plant pigmentation and in a range of biochemistry

NAVAL ENCOUNTER AS NETS ARE SEIZED OFF HELVICK

For the second time within a week there was confrontation and actual physical violence, on the fishing grounds off Helvick Head, where fishermen later angrily accused naval personnel of "hounding and harrasing them into the seabed." The latest incident took place on last Friday morning around 4 a.m. It involved the Helvick-based fishing trawler "The Ealga" skippered by the only naval fishing skipper in the South East, Cathal Mí Aodha (nee O'Ceallaigh), and naval personnel about a corvette patrolling the area. Bean Uí Aodha, and her four crew, were fishing when they sighted the corvette a relatively short distance away. The corvette then lowered a dinghy into the sea and made in the direction of the "The Ealga" with naval personnel on board. The violence erupted when they drew alongside the trawler and intimidated that they intended setting the fishing nets. At least two nets were actually made to puncture the dinghy by crew members on board the trawler and for a short time the situation looked extremely menacing and dangerous. But despite the stubborn naval personnel successfully seized the nets, and the confrontation petered out for a fair deal."

FATAL TRAFFIC ACCIDENT NEAR KILMACKTHOMAS

Garda Denis Connolly (25), married, 5 Chestnut Park, Newmount, Waterford, a native of Moyry Co. Tipperary was killed instantly in a traffic accident on the main Dungarvan-Waterford road at the T-junction at Grilly's Garage near Kilmackthomas on Monday morning last. Garda Connolly who was stationed at Ballybricken, Waterford, had received the Traffic Corps only a week previously. The dead garda was driving a patrol car accompanied by Sergeant Joe Hurley on their way to investigate a stolen car when the collision involving a milk tanker and a tractor unit occurred. The patrol car was extensively damaged on the driver's side but Sgt Hurley miraculously escaped serious injury and was discharged from hospital on Monday evening. Garda Connolly is survived by his wife Bernadette, his parents and by three brothers and one sister to all of whom deepest sympathy is extended.

FISHERY BAILIFFS AND "BULLY BOY" TACTICS QUERY BY CO. COUNCIL

Referring to what he described as recent assaults on Ring fishermen by fishery bailiffs, Cllr. Jim Harty, Ring, at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday said that the attitude of the bailiffs backed up by members of the Naval Service amounted to nothing less than "bully boy" tactics. He said that he was not going to enter into the question as to whether illegal fishing was taking place or not but in recent incidents off Helvick two young fishermen had been assaulted and one had his hand broken. Cllr. Harty said that the Council should write to both the Minister for Justice and the Minister for Fisheries to enquire if the fishery bailiffs were entitled to approach boats and board them armed with pick handles. Cllr. Harty then told the Council that on the previous Wednesday a Dutch trawler had put into Helvick for ice and the skipper showed so much monofilament net as would not be seen in the whole of the south of Ireland. "It seems," said Cllr. Harty, "as if the fishery laws are being applied only to Irish fishermen as foreign trawlers seem to be able to do as they please without any interference."

Cllr. O Riain Again Walks Out Of Co. Council Meeting

The row which has been going on between Cllr. O Riain and the County Planning Officer of the County Council, Mr. J. Shine for several weeks past erupted once again at the monthly meeting of the Council which was held in Dungarvan last Monday. At the previous meeting of July 11, Cllr. O Riain stood up to him over the future that had followed his allegations about the granting of planning permission for the building of a bungalow in his area he would never again attend a Council meeting at which the Planning Officer was in attendance. The principal business before last Monday's meeting was to consider proposals for the reviews of the Development Plans for the County and also for the Development Plan for the town of Tramore. These were numbered 6 and 7 on the agenda which contained a total of 12 items and the meeting was due to begin at 11 a.m. to enable a full day to be taken to discuss the proposals. At the outset Cllr. O Riain was asked to read a letter which he had written to Mr. Shine and the Council agreed to deal with all other items on the agenda before going on to discuss the Development Plans. When the agenda had been cleared, baring items 6 and 7, Cllr. O Riain then stood up and referring to the "house document" which was involved in the Review Plans he said that having read through the proposals it was clear to him that the entire northern area of the county from Carrick-on-Suir to Tramore and from Clonca to Portlaoise was being completely discriminated against. "This development plan," said Cllr. O Riain, "has been drawn up by people who I can only refer to as 'blow-ins' and who now dictate to people whose families have been in the County for generations and generations as to what can and cannot be done in regard to planning and development."

IN COVENTRY
As he disappeared through the door, Cllr. P. Coffey, Chairman said that meetings had already been arranged by the sub-committee of the Council set up to deal with the matter and there was nothing he could do at the moment to stop Cllr. O Riain from leaving the meeting. Senator Katharine Bulbulin said that it was to be regretted that Cllr. O Riain had put himself "in Coventry" in this manner. Cllr. B. Kyne said that the members of the Council and the officials had to work as a team where this important issue was concerned and he regretted that Cllr. O Riain had stated that the plan had been drawn up by "blow-ins." It didn't make reconciliation in the matter any easier either by leaving the meeting. Cllr. Cunningham said that something should be done as soon as possible to resolve this problem as it was going on too long now. At this stage Senator M. Quenly found fault with the manner in which the Chairman was dealing with the situation. It was making a farce of the whole affair. "Cllr. O Riain shouldn't be allowed to come in here and make attacks like this and then walk out. If Cllr. O Riain is not prepared to stay at meetings when he comes to them then he should stay out altogether!" he said. Cllr. D. Good said that while Cllr. O Riain spoke for himself

he did not think he should have left the meeting because he had a grievance with the County Planning Officer. He should have stayed on as he had a duty to discuss the proposals fully. Cllr. Good added that he always found Mr. Shine to be a very official and a very good man in his own right and for that reason he could not understand why Cllr. O Riain had left. The Chairman, Cllr. Coffey then stated that he would allow no further discussion on the matter at this stage.

EEC SETS DATE FOR PARLIAMENT ELECTIONS

Anyone who may be interested in standing for the next elections to the European Parliament has just under a year to get ready. After consulting the present Parliament, the EEC's Council of Ministers has fixed 14 to 17 June, 1984 as the period during which all ten member States will elect their members to the new Parliament.

The Irish elections are likely to be held on the first day, 14 June, which falls on a Thursday. Some other member States where voting is traditionally at the weekend, may wait until 16 or 17 June.

The detailed regulations for the Irish election are laid down in the European Assembly (Elections) Act of 1978. Under this Act, the nominations day will be fixed in due course by the Environment Minister, Mr. Dick Spring. Candidates are required to lodge a deposit of £1,000.

It is expected that the constituencies and number of seats will be the same as in 1979, with four large constituencies — Connacht, Ulster (3 seats), Dublin (4), Leinster (3) and Munster (5). Voting here will be under the usual Irish system of the single transferable vote.

There must, however, be at least one amendment to the Act before the new elections are held. This relates to the procedure for replacing a Member of Parliament who resigns his seat. Under the 1978 Act, the retiring Member nominates his own successor and may choose any eligible person who belongs to the same party as himself. In most member States, however, the successor must be a person who can stand in an election usually the first unsuccessful candidates from the same party.

The Parliament's Procedural Committee raised this point when Irish labour members were replaced in 1981 and again in 1983. On the second occasion the Irish Government undertook to amend the replacement procedure before next year's elections, to provide that those nominated as replacements should be persons who have gone before the electorate. This is felt to be important in view of the Parliament's role as the EEC's major democratic institution.

In the 1979 vote, Fianna Fail won 5 of the 15 seats, and Fine Gael and Labour 4 seats each. Two seats were won by Independents: Mr. T. Maher in Connacht-Ulster, both of whom topped the poll and were elected on the first count.

All four of the Labour members elected in 1979 have since been replaced. Mrs. Eileen Desmond, Mr. Liam Kavanagh and Mr. Michael O'Leary resigned, joining the Coalition Government in 1981, and Mr. John O'Connell, on becoming Cwain O'Connell. Two of their successors — Mr. Frank Cluskey and Mr. John Horan — were themselves replaced earlier this year. The other 11 people elected in 1979 were all members of the Assembly.

VOTING SYSTEM

It had been hoped that the 1984 elections would be held under a uniform voting system, identical in all ten member countries. However, it was not possible to secure agreement on a uniform system in time. Most member States will be voting on a list system, with large constituencies where members are elected from party lists according to the votes cast for each party.

It is understood that the United Kingdom was unwilling to abandon the first-past-the-post system used in Westminster elections and this was the main obstacle in reaching agreement on a uniform system. The task of finding a uniform procedure will now be pursued for 1989 elections. In view of the re-election of Mrs. Thatcher's government, with an enhanced majority, however, it is clear that difficulties may still lie ahead.

The failure to agree a uniform system means that some member countries may not be able to vote at all. Citizens of other member countries residing in Ireland can vote in the Irish elections, but in most member countries the arrangement is that foreign residents generally have no vote.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN

DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Q - On what basis are Home Help provided and how does a person arrange for one?

A - There are now a large number of Home Help throughout the country. Some are part-time, some full-time, some are employed directly by Health Boards, some by voluntary organisations with health board support.

Home Help are provided on the basis of need and medical, family and income factors are taken into account when the assessment is being made. A Home Help whether full-time or part-time depending on circumstances may be provided in the following cases: (1) to an elderly person who is incapacitated, house-bound or for any other reason might have to enter an institution if help was not available. (2) to a family because of illness or death or an inability to cope with day to day difficulties: (3) to a sick person or to an ex-patient during convalescence, where the person might otherwise have to enter an institution.

Application can be made through the family doctor, public health nurse social workers or directly to the Health Board. In cases where home help are employed by voluntary organisations application can also be made through the organisation. The fact that a person has a medical card does not entitle them to a Home Help. Equally, the fact that a person does not have a medical card does not mean that they cannot get a Home Help. The assessment is made on the basis of need and the person may be asked to make a contribution towards the cost of the Home Help if they have sufficient means to do so.

CHARGE AGAINST ARDMORE FISHERMAN DISMISSED

While the action of an Ardmore fisherman in firing two rifle shots on the cliffside overlooking Ardmore Bay on August 16 last might have been suspicious, it was not sufficient to warrant a conviction, District Justice W. F. O'Connell said at Youthful Court.

Before the court was John Cronin, 43, Ardmore, who was prosecuted by the Southern Regional Fisheries Board for unlawfully giving warning to persons fishing illegally in Ardmore Bay on August 16. The defendant, represented by Mr. J. P. Gordon, solicitor, pleaded not guilty.

Inspector Michael Fawcett of the fishery board, told the court that around 9.45 a.m. on the date he was on patrol duty on the cliffs overlooking Ardmore Bay. Using binoculars, he saw a boat way out in the bay in which he was on patrol duty. He saw a net being hauled on board and in a period of 20 minutes he counted eight fish taken on. He could not identify the two men.

Inspector Fawcett said that Cronin, equipped with a rifle, then fired two shots which he believed to be warning shots for the benefit of the two men fishing from the boat. This date was during the closed salmon season.

When Mr. David Keane, solicitor, prosecuting, intimated that he had all the evidence he was furnishing to the court, Mr. Gordon asked for a direction on the grounds of "totally insufficient evidence".

District Justice O'Connell said that what Inspector Fawcett told him was, in fact, little better than suspicion. The fisherman in the boat might not have been salmon fishing at all, and while the discharge of the shots by Cronin might well have been done to tip off the fishermen it would be dangerous to convict in the circumstances.

Dismissing the charge against the defendant, District Justice O'Connell refused to allow him costs, stating that the case in the first instance had been brought justifiably.
