GULF OIL FIND PUTS DUNGARVAN IN THE NEWS

For more than a week up to last week, speculation, laced with all types of rumours about an oil strike off the Waterford coast in the Celtic Sea were being mentioned by people "in the know." Rumours of a similar nature had surfaced about other oil drillings in the past and, as a result, much of what was being more recently said was being taken by many with the proverbial grain of salt.

But the rumours persisted and became more factual and on Tuesday of last week reliable sources were repeating with growing optimism that news from the Gulf Oil drilling site off Dungarvan was more than promising. All that remained to be ascertained was whether the oil find was one of commercial value and tests continued all over last week-end with the reports becoming more and more optimistic.

The latest report to hand, at the time of writing this on Tuesday, indicates that the oil flow from Gulf's second and very crucial test had greatly exceeded the most hopeful expectations and was leading to the virtual certainty that the company had indeed made the country's first commercial oil find.

The site is located approximately 20 miles south-east of Dungarvan in 2-14 feet of water. As such it is closer to shore than the Kinsale Head gas field in relatively shallow water compared with the 1,000 feet plus depths in the more inhospitable Porcupine Basin area off the country's west coast. The development costs are expected to be relatively cheap.

Reports from the drilling rig on Monday stated that very high pressures were encountered in the second test which showed an oil flow of 6,500 barrels per day nearly leading to an accident that would have seen thousands of gallons of burning oil escape from the testing apparatus and setting fire to the sea around the rig.

To control the pressures, the company capped the hole with a narrow choke pipe to stem the flow. It was also confirmed on Monday that the oil recovered in the latest test is of high quality.

Since news of the discovery leaked out there has been an enormous amount of Stock Exchange activity in the oil market which sent the shares of Atlantic Resources which holds a one-third stake in the Gulf consortium, rocketing.

Now that the discovery has become a reality it conjures up all sorts of prospects. However these may not all be for the best as has been shown by previous developments elsewhere. The Minister for Industry and Energy, Mr. John Bruton was cautious about the find when he spoke about it on Monday night. He warned of the danger that news of the find "could take too firm a grip on people's imaginations" and he pointed out that "even an optimistic scenario would equal only a relatively modest portion of one year's annual Government expenditures."

It gives you a certain assurance about the future—like a nest egg," he said. "But it does not remove the need for prudent house-keeping on a day-to-day basis."

For Minister of State at the Department of Industry and Energy, Mr. Eddie Collins, the discovery just 20 miles off the coast of his constituency will have a special significance as it will indubitably mark his period of office for all time. What the discovery will mean to the economy of the country remains to be seen but as we see it it can only be good.

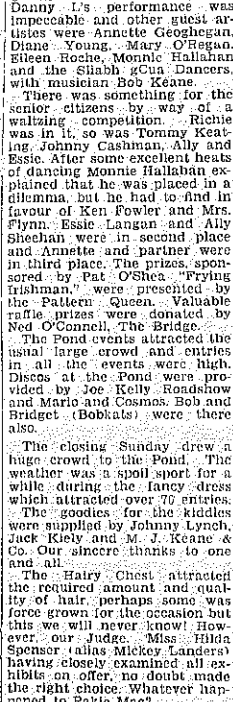
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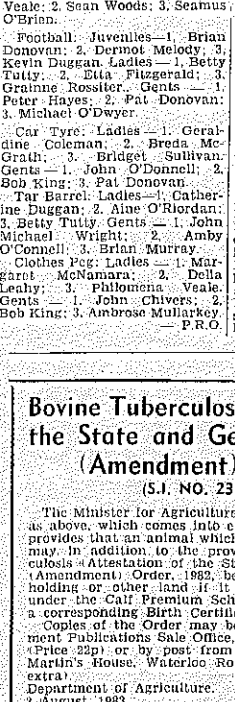
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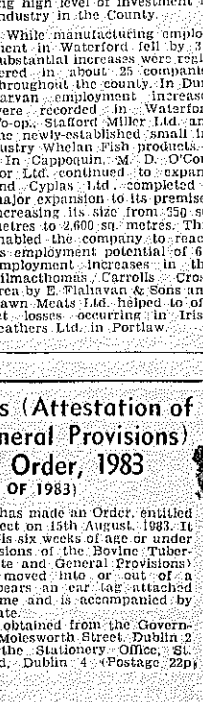
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Bovine Tuberculosis (Attestation of the State and General Provisions) (Amendment) Order, 1983 (S.I. NO. 230 OF 1983)

The Minister for Agriculture has made an Order, entitled as above, which comes into effect on 15th August, 1983. It provides that an animal which is six weeks of age or under may in addition to the provisions of the Bovine Tuberculosis (Attestation of the State and General Provisions) (Amendment) Order, 1982, be moved into or out of a holding or other place if it bears an ear tag attached under the Calf Premium Scheme and is accompanied by a corresponding Birth Certificate.

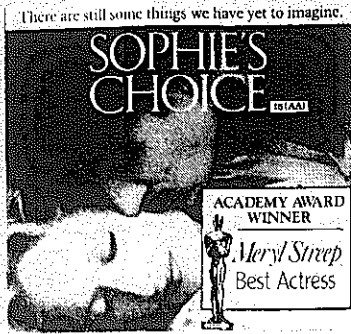

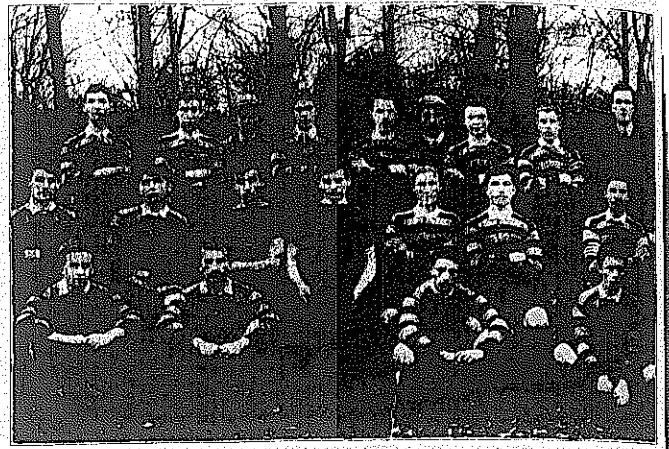

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN

DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE Q - My sister and I, who are both single, are planning to buy a house between us. What tax relief can we claim on the mortgage interest? A - Providing the mortgage and house are in your joint names and that the house is your only residence, you can both claim tax relief on the interest paid. You will each be allowed to claim half of the interest up to the personal maximum of £2,000 for a single person. In other words, if you pay loan interest of £3,000 you could claim £1,500 each against tax. If your interest was £5,000 you could each claim £2,000 against tax - £2,000 being the maximum interest allowable for tax purposes. (Unlike a married couple, you cannot avoid interest relief not used by your sister. The maximum tax relief on loans allowed is £4,000 for a married couple, £2,000 for a widowed person and £2,000 for a single person.)
