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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

WEEK-END OF HIGH TRAGEDY
 Last week-end proved to be one of stark and heart-breaking tragedy for a number of families up and down the country as road accidents accounted for one of the heaviest death tolls for any week-end period for a very long time.

The worst of a series of crashes and collisions which claimed the lives of twelve people shortly after mid-nights on Saturday night when three young people from Cappoquin, two teenagers, and a young man from Cork met death in a sudden and violent manner in a two car collision which occurred on the Youghal Road a short distance outside Dungarvan. For the youngsters, a joyous celebration for one turned out to be a prelude to a requiem for three—for the young man it was a sudden end which cut him down in the prime of his manhood.

Of course the terrible news shocked and stunned the entire community and cast a great gloom over the whole district. But it is on the parents, families, relatives and friends of those who died that the cross has fallen heaviest. The heart-ache and grief that has come to them through this great tragedy is indescribable.

In offering, on behalf of all the people, our deepest sympathy to the bereaved in their great sorrow, we realise it is but a poor gesture but we do pray that God will give them all the strength and courage to bear the heavy burden that has now come upon them.

And as if the heavy toll on the roads did not bring enough grief at the week-end we had a black patch made even blacker and gloomier by a horrific rail crash between two passenger trains near Kildare on Sunday night when seven passengers were killed and scores seriously injured.

CLOSURE AT PORTLAW
 The Irish Leathers' tannery in Portlaw which is to close next month with the loss of 200 jobs was responsible, it has been stated, for most of the £2.9 million loss incurred last year. It is understood to have lost around £1.75 million and with losses continuing on financial grounds, but to close the Portlaw factory.

In order to keep the group operational, the Tannery, the State rescue Agency pumped £2 million in the form of preference shares into Irish Leathers at the end of last year but despite this injection, it still ended up with a deficit of £2.05 million in the revenue reserves. Capital and reserves amounted to £2.89 million at the end of 1982, so losses this year at the rate of last year could not be sustained as the company would be totally insolvent.

Last week a company spokesman confirmed that the closure of the Portlaw plant in this issue was only temporary and that some workers would be re-employed within three months. The number of people overall employed was reduced from 800 to 600 within the past six months. Some 100 were made redundant in Dungarvan, 70 were let go in Carrick-On-Suir while 30 were released in Portlaw. The latest redundancies will now reduce the workforce to 400. The tanneries in Dungarvan and Carrick will remain open. Irish Leathers in a statement issued last Friday said the losses for the group will not be significantly less than those in the first half of 1982. The statement then says: "The problems of Portlaw

areas arose through custom and practice, a spokesman for the Local Government Staff Negotiations Board in Dublin has explained. Staff in Dublin Corporation and Dublin County Council never got the days off. "It was essentially a traditional rural arrangement," the spokesman is quoted as saying.

Days off on Church Holidays have usually formed part of a manual workers annual leave entitlement but traditionally this did not apply in the case of clerical and administrative staffs. They simply got Church Holidays off when they fell on normal working days—no compensation or time off in lieu applied whenever the Church Holiday fell on a week-end.

The 1981 public service pay agreement provided for the negotiation of a minimum of 20 days paid annual leave. The clerical workers got no increase since they were reckoned to already have more than 20 days.

There are six Church Holidays each year, but only an average 4.2 of them fall on normal working days in any year, according to the Staff Negotiations Board.

The Civil Service is not affected by Church Holidays. It would appear then in continuing the "tradition" of no work on Church Holidays the staffs of the rural local authorities are having the best of two worlds. It is a "perk" that no other group enjoys. However in these times when everyone is expected to help to the economy by increasing productivity perhaps it is time for these workers to forego either one or the other—Church Holidays or Bank Holidays instead of taking all of both.

One is reminded that even in Spain, the workers are beginning to wake up to their responsibilities and commitments and that fewer are continuing to observe their "tradition" of the siesta in the noon-day hours. Perhaps local authority workers might follow suit (in the matter of Church Holidays I mean).

Birthday Celebration Ends In Horror Death Crash

Twelve people died and six more were seriously injured in road traffic accidents last week-end. Seven of the dead, all under 21 years of age, were killed in two crashes.

The worst of these happened just outside Dungarvan shortly after midnight on Saturday night when three teenagers, two girls and a boy and a young man died in a horror collision between two cars, a Toyota Corolla travelling towards Dungarvan and a Datsun 2000 going in the opposite direction. The crash happened on a straight stretch of wide road at Kilsara, about 11 miles out from Dungarvan on the main road to Youghal, near the bungalow residence of Mrs. Dumphy.

Killed instantly were 19-year-old Noel Walsh with an address at Richmond Guesthouse, Cappoquin, 17-year-old Sandra O'Shea, Sunlawn, Cappoquin and 17-year-old Ann Reddy also of Sunlawn, Cappoquin who were travelling in the Datsun car and 30-year-old Eamon McIntyre, single, Belmont, Montserrat, Cork who was the lone occupant of the other car.

Seriously injured were the driver of the Datsun, John O'Connor, 18, of Carrigeen, Cappoquin and two other passengers in the car, his cousin, Mark O'Connor, 17, of White House, Blennethine, Cappoquin and 16-year-old Shirley Egan of Caseville, Dungarvan. All three were taken by ambulances to Ardkeen Hospital.

The teenage group were travelling out from Dungarvan to a dance to celebrate the birthday of Shirley Egan which fell on Saturday. She was a cousin of Sandra O'Shea, and the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie O'Shea (nee Terry, Dungarvan) of Sunlawn who have one other child, a son Eamon, 17, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kieran Reddy also of Sunlawn and was the eldest of a family of six.

Noel Walsh was brought up at St. Anne's Orphanage in Cappoquin and lived with the Deery family at their Richmond Guesthouse at Cappoquin.

The dead girls were next door neighbours at Sunlawn and had been school pals and students at the Convent of Mercy, Cappoquin. The O'Connor cousins are members of two of the best-known business and farming families in Co. Waterford, Montserrat, Cork. A nephew of the late John Boyle, Fine Gael Chairman of South Tipperary, County Council, he had been managing a farm owned by Mrs. Betty Boyle at Castlekeale, Ardman, Co. Tipperary.

At the Masses in several churches on Sunday morning special prayers were recited for those killed in the dreadful accident and for their bereaved parents, families and relatives.

STRUCK STONE WALL
 The other major road accident was early on Saturday when three youths, aged 17, 18 and 19 died instantly after their car struck a stone wall outside Newcastle in Co. Down.

BIG RAIL CRASH
 The death toll from tragedies at the week-end accelerated on Sunday night when two GIE mainline trains collided just south of Kildare Station and 7 people were killed and 40 injured. The collision occurred at Cherryville Junction at about 9.45 p.m. when the Galway-Dublin train ran into the rear of the Tralee-Dublin train which had stopped because of locomotive failure.

According to a GIE spokesman, there were an estimated 1,000 passengers on both trains.

CROWDS ATTEND OBSEQUIES
 Huge crowds gathered at the District Hospital, Dungarvan on Monday evening for the removal of the remains of the three Cappoquin victims of the tragic collision to All Saints Church which was timed for 7 p.m.

Harrowing scenes were witnessed as the heart-broken parents, families and friends of the deceased made their last farewells. Relatives and neighbours consoled the three families in their grief and there was hardly a dry eye amongst those in the huge crowd which had gathered.

Then the three hearses bearing the coffins drove from the hospital grounds, those of the girls, Ann Reddy and Sandra O'Shea, surrounded by many floral tributes, first and then that of Noel Walsh which was draped in the local GAA Club colours.

One of the largest and most representative corteges ever seen in the district followed in the last and journey to All Saints Church where the coffins were received and blessed and following Mass remained in the new Cemetery, Ardman, in the presence of another huge gathering of mourning relatives, friends and neighbours.

Shortly after the departure of the Cappoquin funerals, the remains of the fourth victim of the crash, John McIntyre, were removed from the District Hospital on Monday evening to the Church of the Holy Family, Ardman, followed also in this instance by a huge cortege which included his bereaved parents and family relatives and many friends.

Mass was then celebrated on Tuesday morning following Requiem Mass at 11 a.m. The interment took place in the new Cemetery, Ardman, in the presence of another huge gathering of mourning relatives, friends and neighbours.

Both cars were veritable write-offs after the crash; the Toyota had the engine and bonnet concertinaed into the body of the car by the severe head-on impact while the main damage to the Datsun was along the passenger side.

An eye-witness who came on the scene within minutes of the crash described it as the most horrific he had ever seen with bodies all over the road. These had obviously been catapulted from the Datsun by the force of the collision.

The alarm was raised immediately and promptly the gardai, 2 ambulances with medical attendants and two units of Dungarvan Fire Brigade under Station Officer John Hamilton and Fire Officer John Shanahan were on the scene. Cutting equipment had to be used to calculate some of those trapped in the wrecked cars.

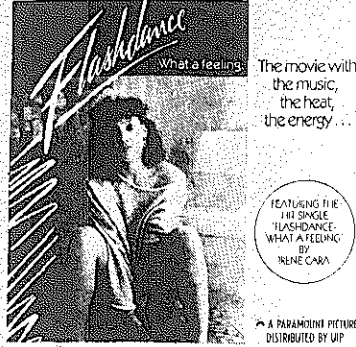

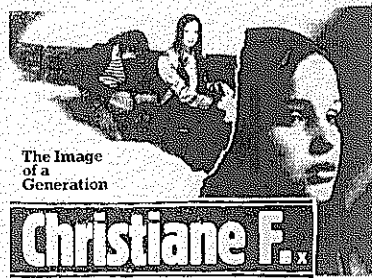

NEW PROVISIONS IN LOCAL RADIO AUTHORITY BILL

The Local Authority Bill now being drafted contains a number of provisions which represent radical departures from previous public law legislation on this subject. Among the more important of the changes are the following: - The Authority will no longer own and operate all transmitters. - The economic viability of stations will not have to be proved before they are established - provision is being made for minority RTE involvement in Local Radio services. - In considering proposals for local radio contracts the Authority will have regard to the extent to which profits would be used for community development. - The Authority will have power to ensure the provision of satisfactory services in different areas by requiring different stations to be operated by the same contractor, by requiring cooperation between different contractors and by making grants available to contractors for specific purposes.

The structure now proposed for local radio will be more flexible and less costly than that previously proposed. The provision of broadcasting transmitters by community groups and private interests will allow the development of local radio to proceed as quickly as those interested are prepared to invest in the services provided they are licensed and meet other requirements. The Authority will not, as previously envisaged, bear the cost of providing and operating transmitters.

RTE INVOLVEMENT - The provision for minority RTE involvement in the programme for Government. It is hoped that the involvement of RTE in Local Radio will give these services access to the expertise and facilities which RTE have developed over the years, e.g. in their Community Radio experiments and in their Local Radio service in Cork. The involvement of RTE will also help to offset the loss by the of revenue generating revenue which might be expected to follow the establishment of local radio services. RTE need not have a share in services serving small populations (up to 25,000) because such services are more likely to be community based. RTE involvement might bring unnecessary rigidities and costs.

The extent to which profits of local radio stations would be used for community development will be among the factors which the Authority will take into account in considering proposals for contracts. This provision is likely to help considerably towards strengthening community involvement on the part of local radio stations, particularly stations in large urban areas which might tend to have a more commercial aspect. The various provisions enabling the Authority to take steps to facilitate the development of local radio services in different areas are regarded as important to ensure the earliest possible provision for such services throughout the country. The Authority will be able, for example, to require contractors in more profitable areas to operate similar services. Authority may require separate stations to cooperate in the use of facilities or programming so that, for example, the existence of say two large stations serving the Dublin area would not necessarily preclude the establishment of community stations within the service areas of those large stations. The Authority will also be empowered to make grants available out of its revenue in cases where it thinks that appropriate.

There will be a number of other new provisions in the legislation. Local radio services will be expected to provide a service of education as well as information and entertainment.

EXCLUDED GROUPS - It is the intention to exclude political and religious groups from involvement in broadcasting contracts so that contrac-

tors can be seen to be free from undue influence in these areas. Another new aspect of the legislation will be a provision that, in the event of a contract being terminated or not being renewed, the Authority may require the broadcasting assets of the contractor to be disposed of by new contractor on agreed terms or by arbitration. Additionally, the Authority may require contractors to enter into bonding arrangements and the Authority will have powers to take other steps necessary to provide for continuity of service in the event of a contract being surrendered.

In general the Bill will create a framework for local radio services which will operate within specified standards and criteria and which will also have sufficient flexibility to allow stations of different types to be established to meet local needs in different areas throughout the country. The Bill should have the effect of allowing local radio services to be established quickly and at reasonable costs. There will be adequate scope for commercial involvement but with no bias against community oriented services. Submissions from all interested parties on the framework outlined will be welcomed.

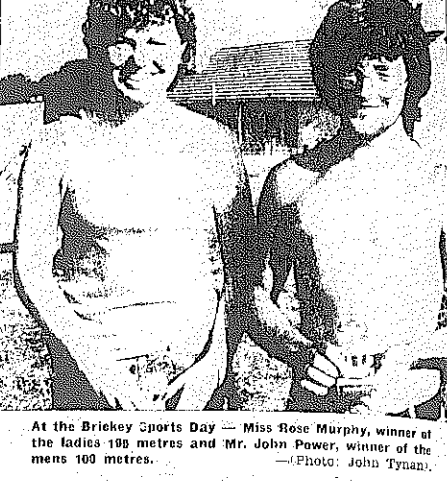
