PRESSURES ON THE PRESS

In the first of three articles on "Pressures On The Press" which appeared in the "Irish Times" last Monday, James Downey very correctly points out that at present few Irish newspapers are making any money at all, much less a reasonable return on the very large amounts spent in setting up and maintaining a printing plant.

He goes on to deal with the competition which papers have to face from radio and television in the field of advertising as well as the present prolonged recession which has seen many firms go out of business and the advertising budgets of most cut to a minimum with a resultant loss to the revenue of papers.

He then states, and we fully support this as it is our own costly experience: "But in Ireland the greatest threat to the financial viability of newspapers—on which after all, in a capitalist society, the freedom of the press very largely depends—comes from the Government. A 23 per cent VAT rate and crippling postal and telecommunications charges combine to make an almost impossible burden. It would make a huge difference to the viability of Irish newspapers if an informed and sympathetic public opinion could persuade the Government to reduce the VAT rate to some reasonable figure like five per cent. In the absence of such public opinion, the press has no hope whatever of gaining concessions from Governments."

AN OLD PENNY

Work in reconstructing the old Market House at Lower Main Street, Dungarvan, formerly in the ownership of R. A. Merry & Co. is proceeding apace and when completed it should prove to be an imposing building and most appropriate to house the town's new museum, branch library and tourist information centre.

The reconstruction work is being carried out by M/s. E. O'Brien & Sons (Dungarvan) Ltd. and in the course of hacking down one of the walls in the old building lately, Mr. Michael O'Riordan, a general foreman with the construction company and also now a member of Dungarvan Urban Council, discovered an old coin.

Having been cleaned, the coin has been identified as a George III penny and as such dates from the late 17th or early 18th century—a real museum piece, appropriately discovered within the old building which is being converted into the town's museum.

Incidentally I was pleased to note that the weather-cock which has been a landmark on the high roof of the building for generations and which was removed when the reconstruction work commenced has once again been replaced in its old position.

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE COIN

At the week-end the role of the local paper and its influence for good in the local community was praised by a prominent farming leader who warned of the consequences of its demise.

Mr. Dan McCarthy, National Council member of ICMSA and Chairman of the organisation's Farm Development Committee, described the provincial press as the "right arm" of the local community.

Speaking to farmers at Templeglantine, Co. Limerick he said "We would not be the problem that we are if the Government could close some of our provincial papers, don't forget that."

Mr. McCarthy added: "In all my years of being involved—over 15 years—I have found the local press to be tremendous."

"The provincial press is 100 per cent on our side and many of the problems we have faced and many of the solutions that I have seen in various areas, been provided to find for those problems, are as a result of the support we have got from the provincial press."

"It is a fact that, like many of us, the provincial press is in serious trouble because of VAT and other problems that they are facing."

"We should recognise that if anything was to happen to them, and some of them were closed, the Government would deal with us much simpler and much easier."

In conclusion Mr. McCarthy stated: "The papers have always supported us and they would be a serious loss if any of them were to go and at present they are in real danger."

GAIRDA INVESTIGATIONS FOLLOW PROMINENT FARMER'S DEATH

DEATH OF MR. GEORGE GOLLEY, T.D.

Following incidents outside a licensed premises in Ballymahon on last Thursday night and the death of Mr. John Harrington, 72-year-old farmer of Ballymahon, Ballinacorney, Garda were active carrying out investigations in the area throughout Thursday night and Friday.

As a result, the State Pathologist, Dr. J. Harbison, Dublin was called in to examine the body which had marks on the side of the face and to carry out a post mortem examination. The body was not released until these examinations were completed.

The Garda investigations were commenced by and conducted under the supervision of Inspector J. Harrington, Dungarvan.

The post-mortem, carried out on Friday, disclosed that the natural cause had died from natural causes.

It is understood that a report will be submitted to the Director of Public Prosecutions on the circumstances surrounding the death.

I.F.A. DELEGATION MEETS E.E.C. COMMISSIONERS

An I.F.A. delegation has met in Brussels, the E.E.C. Commissioner for Agriculture, Mr. Dalgaard, the Commissioner responsible for the E.E.C. Budget, Mr. Tugendhat, Ireland's Commissioner, Mr. Richard Burke and Mr. Graham Meadows, a senior member of the Cabinet of the President of the E.E.C. Commission, Mr. Thorn, to put the case for the E.E.C. on the part of the Common Agricultural Policy.

Following these meetings, Mr. Michael Berkeley, I.F.A.'s General Secretary, said: "The general reaction to the meetings is that there is an understanding in Brussels that the Commission proposals would have a particularly severe impact on Ireland. The challenge now facing the Irish Government and I.F.A. is to convert this understanding into concrete action."

"The case put by I.F.A. was that the greatest part of the problems facing the Common Agricultural Policy were caused by the uncontrolled importation of subsidised products in the absence of controls on the vegetable fats market and the presence of substantial positive M.C.A. in three Member countries. I.F.A. stressed that if solutions were found to these problems at European Community level, the penal measures proposed by the Commission would not be necessary."

"With regard to the sugar levy, Mr. Berkeley said that milk production was 60 times more important to the Irish economy, than to the overall E.E.C. economy, and that for the vast majority of Irish farmers there just was no realistic alternative to milk production for economic survival."

"We took this opportunity to invite the three Commissioners, Mr. Dalgaard, Mr. Tugendhat and Mr. Thorn, to visit Ireland in the very near future."

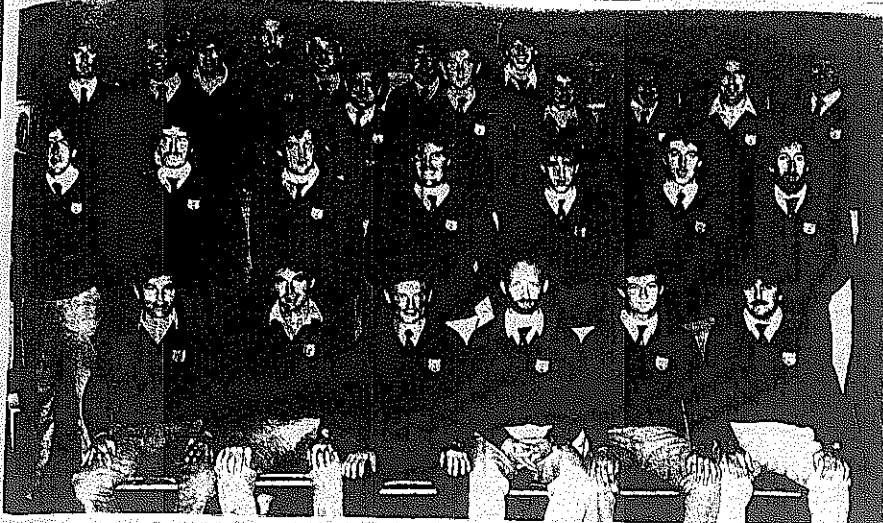
