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THE NEGOTIATIONS IN ATHENS
Confidence appeared to be growing among Irish Ministers in Athens after the opening sessions in the negotiations concerning the future of the EEC Common Agricultural Policy on Monday that some kind of exemption from the super-duty would be granted to the Irish dairy industry.
The Agriculture Commissioner, Mr. Poul Dalsager, said that the super-duty proposal would stay but there would be modifications. Asked would these be for Ireland, he replied: "I said there would be modifications."
In a move clearly intended to underline the financial crisis facing the EEC, Mr. Dalsager announced that headage payments for sheep and other advance payments worth about £280 million could be suspended for the rest of the year but no final decision had so far been made on this.
Ireland is represented at the Athens negotiations which will continue until this (Wednesday) evening, by Mr. Barry, Minister for Foreign Affairs, Mr. Duks, Minister for Finance and by Mr. Deasy, Minister for Agriculture.
After the opening session the Ministers would not give any specific assurances but from various indications it appeared that there could be proposals to change the super-duty reference date from 1981 allowing Irish milk output to increase further before being subject to quota restrictions.
Mr. Deasy was cautious but said that from things which had been said throughout Monday (this column is being compiled on Tuesday morning) he was confident that Ireland would not have to suffer the worst effects of the super-duty proposal as originally made by the European Commission which would cut milk output back to 1981 levels.
However while it was generally accepted that there was a growing appreciation among the Council of Ministers of Ireland's problem, the super-duty proposal had the support of most of the member States. Progress, if any, is bound to be slow and whether Mr. Deasy will be able to return from Athens to-morrow with any acceptable reliefs for dairy farmers remains to be seen.
Our Minister for Agriculture is indeed a busy man and incidentally he has now moved with his wife and family from his former home in Durrow, Stradbally to Killrush on the outskirts of Dungarvan. One of his last local commitments before he flew out to Athens on Sunday was at the National Ploughing Championships in Waterford on Thursday evening.
He arrived just as the evening had turned bitterly cold and to avoid getting bogged down in the mud he was taken on a lap of honour in a vehicle described as a farmobile around the ploughing plots and commercial stands.
Commenting on his visit he said: "The trip around the site was as good as a week's canvassing. I saw more of my constituents to-day than I have seen in the last nine months."
Mr. Deasy remarked that it was a little incongruous and a sign of the times that land zoned for industrial development was being used for a ploughing contest (the Ploughing Championships were held on a site owned by the Industrial Development Authority just outside Waterford).
He praised the trade exhibits of his own Department, the Industrial Development Authority and ACOT. He told journalists about the wonder cow on the ACOT stand. She produces 2,000 gallons of milk each year and is owned by one of the Minister's new neighbours, Mr. James Foley of Ballyneety, Dungarvan.

TO REPLACE MINISTER ON CO. COUNCIL

APPLICATIONS FOR PLANNING PERMISSION
Among the applications for planning permission received by Waterford County Council during the month of September but not so far processed was one from Caitlin Ni Toibin, Barra-na-Stuach, An Sean Phobail seeking permission to convert a garage at her residence for use as a Post Office for the Old Parish area and also as a grocery shop and one from Comhlucht Plaisteach na Rinne Teo, per Richard Daly, Ballinroad, Dungarvan for permission for a plant for the purpose of "proseal eis agus big 1 Ballingol, Ring, Dungarvan."
An application for planning permission was also received by Dungarvan Urban Council last month following the publication of the usual statutory notice in a newspaper. The notice appeared in the back-page of the "Irish Times" on a recent Saturday and vaguely stated: "Full planning permission is being sought (from Dungarvan UDC) for change of use of No. 4 New Line, Abbeyside to accommodate a shopping unit." It was signed, "M. Casey."
Curious to find where No. 4 New Line, Abbeyside was, we made several inquiries before finally ascertaining that this was a house standing on a site one time occupied by what were known as the old Railway Cottages. It is almost directly opposite the entrance to The Grove, at New Line, Abbeyside. The applicant we understand has an address at Knocknaghy, Killostraw.

DUNGARVAN MART AND PROPOSED ITINERANT HALT

At the September special meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Jim Harty raised objections to the proposed CPO by Dungarvan Urban Council to acquire lands at Shandon, Dungarvan, adjacent to the Mart for the purpose of establishing an itinerant halt in the urban area. He said that farmers in general will oppose the acquisition of the site for this purpose and he requested a report as to the amount of malicious injury claims paid as a result of damage and vandalism to Mart property in recent years.
When the matter came before the October monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. Harty agreed to a request to defer further discussion on the matter to next meeting to allow the Co. Manager, who was dealing with the subject and who was absent from the meeting, to attend.

CAPPAGH I.C.M.S.A. CHAIRMAN CRITICISES CO-OP AREA REPRESENTATIVES

At the first annual general meeting of the Cappagh I.C.M.S.A. at Whitechurch House Hotel, there was a representative attendance. The meeting was addressed by Donald Murphy, General Secretary, who in a wide ranging speech stressed the need for total harmony among all agricultural organisations in the county in view of the imminent financial crisis in the Common Agricultural Policy and the disastrous consequences that the present conditions of the E.C. in curbing over production of food will have on the Irish economy.
Mr. John Cashman, the newly elected chairman, in his address said that he felt that milk suppliers to Waterford Co-Op were being very badly treated in view of the fact that Waterford Co-Op were collecting in excess of 100,000,000 gallons of milk per year, more efficiently than any other co-op in the country, but yet the suppliers are not receiving the possible benefits of 3p to 4p a gallon or on average £25 per acre. This was largely due to the inability of the 1982 dominated Board who have been elected by the Shareholders to maintain their decision-making authority on the Board and instead have become robots in the hands of the Management. This, he felt, was demonstrated by the fact that Cappagh area representatives who ignored the special invitation to this meeting to-night, were showing they are not interested in maintaining the proper liaison between the supplier and his Co-Op.
The other main problem he felt was the heavy penalties over the past ten years, irrespective of political party which had been levied on the farmers by the intensive farming area survey which allows the farmer's tax liability to be assessed on the average result of the farmers in their own area rather than on the accounts system on a per farm basis. This would have a better than average result the incentive and initiative to aspire to better living conditions.
He went on to say that as a member of the Ballinacorney IPA it was sad that he had to bring in the ICMSA to represent the farmers of the area who felt betrayed and disillusioned by the IPA disunity both within the county and at headquarters in these representative areas. He stated that the ICMSA was a budget of £220,000 p.a. were available for the benefit of the dairy farmer than the IFM who are financed to the tune of £3,000,000 per year through the loans on milk, grain, beef, cows and sheep.
Mr. Roger McCarthy, Churchwarden, Modugno was appointed Secretary.

Cllr. McDonnell felt that the Council should afford every possible assistance in the Residents Association at Parks Road as it was an exceptionally well-kept estate which reflected the credit on all the people living there. "It was," he added, "reflected favourably in the Tidy Towns Report for Lismore published last week in the local paper."
Cllr. J. Quirk seconded the motion remarking that the Parks Road houses were certainly very well kept.
Mr. J. D. Hally, Co. Engineer, told the Council that he had arranged for a survey among the residents to see what was required and when this was completed he would be in touch with the Council members for the Lismore area.
