Litter Act Charge Against Fossett's Circus Fails

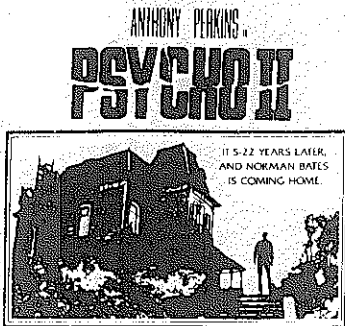

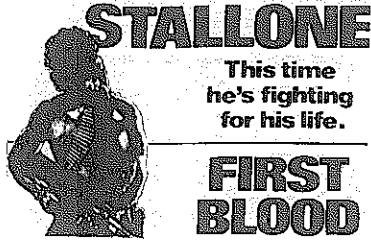
