**OIREACHTAS INCREASES: OUTRAGEOUS, SCANDALOUS, SCURRILOUS SAYS COUNTY COUNCILLOR**

In a scathing attack on the recent 19 per cent increase granted to members of the Oireachtas and the Judiciary, Cllr. C. O'Riain at the November monthly meeting of Waterford County Council said that he wished to protest against them. As members from all sides of the Council chamber supported the protest, the two Council Senators, Katharine Bulbulic and Michaela Queney, sat silently in their seats.

Cllr. O'Riain said that these increases must be condemned and deplored by every responsible public representative in the county. They were outrageous, scandalous and scurrilous at a time when the economy of the country was at crisis point.

Commenting on the speech with which the legislation approving of the increases had been passed, he pointed out that this had been done when the members were just back in the Dail after a 4 months holiday during which many of them had been joy-riding around the world.

While the Ministers, T.D.'s and Senators had voted themselves these high, staggering increases, the case of the increases for the Judiciary, he said, was worse as these had been made retrospective to 1981. "When I see this kind of thing going on in the Dail and Seanad," said Cllr. O'Riain, "I think the people of Ireland should be coming on to the streets in rebellion against these savage increases. But, as in the past, they will be forgotten in a short time and everything will be all right again."

Cllr. James A. Walsh, supporting the protest, said that ours was an impoverished county and the grandiose idea of members of the Oireachtas that they should be paid the same rates as those of the big rich countries was absolutely ridiculous.

**HEAVY FINES ON HELVICK FISHERMEN**

Fines totalling €3,175 including costs and expenses were imposed on nine Helvick fishermen by District Justice L. O'Dea at a special sitting of Dungarvan Court. The fines resulted from charges which were a sequel to the "salmon war" which was on between the Southern Region Fishery Officers and the fishermen in the Helvick area last July.

The District Justice ordered on July 1, 6 and 19 and convicted of assaults on the fishery officers and the others on charges of obstruction.

Tríall MacMurchadha was fined a total of €340, Liam Ronayne €200 and James Hayes €500, all on assault charges.

On the obstruction charges the following fines were imposed: Nicholas Walsh €50, Maurice Condon €200, Richard Tobin €200, Bartholomew Whelan €200, Liam Kelly €200, Liam Kelly, Sr. €50 and James Hayes €200.

The District Justice said it was clear there was a conspiracy to carry out illegal fishing and to obstruct fishery officers.

# Jail Sentence For Defendant Who Broke Into Supermarket "On Spur Of The Moment"

Derek Moroney (20), single and unemployed of 22, Boreenara, Dungarvan who admitted at Dungarvan Court last week that he had broken into Darrers Stores, Mary Street, Dungarvan on November 1 "on the spur of the moment" was sent to jail for three months when he was convicted on the charge of breaking into a supermarket by District Justice L. O'Dea.

Moroney had been sentenced at the previous sitting of the court a fortnight earlier to ten months detention when he was convicted by District Justice M. O'Reilly on a number of charges including damage to the amount of £208 to a stain glass window at Dungarvan Parish Church on August 26 and stealing £500 in cash the property of Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P. He lodged an appeal against this sentence and was allowed to go free pending the hearing of the appeal.

At last week's Court, Moroney pleaded guilty to a charge that on Nov. 1 at Mary Street, Dungarvan he entered Darrers Stores as a trespasser and stole goods and cash to the value of £298. Supt. M. English who prosecuted stated that Moroney had made a statement after caution to Detective Garda J. Molloy who was investigating the incidents and in referring to the first charge, Moroney stated that on Tuesday night, November 1, at about 5.30 p.m. he was walking down town from Cathal

Brugha and on the spur of the moment he decided to break into Darrers. He approached the premises from the back way and broke a window and got into the store and took a lot of stuff which he later hid at Gallowhill. In relation to the second charge, Moroney in his statement said that on the following night he was going home from Gallowhill at about 2.30 a.m. and decided to break into Nugent's V.G. Store. He got in through a window and took a load of stuff which he and another man, not before the court, put into fertilizer bags and took away.

## PREVIOUS CONVICTIONS

# Drank Stolen Wine In Middle Of The Night

— RECEIVER'S STORY

Thomas Kirby (32), 13, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan and Patrick Duggan (18), 20, Chasville, Dungarvan were charged at Dungarvan Court with receiving at Cathal Brugha Place on November 2 goods valued at £387 the property of James Nugent (V.G.), O'Connell Street, Dungarvan knowing them to have been stolen.

Kirby pleaded guilty but Duggan said he would plead guilty to receiving only 80 cigarettes. Kirby was additionally charged that on October 2 he did break into the premises of Central Dairies at Shandon, Dungarvan with intent to steal and also pleaded guilty.

Supt. M. English prosecuted and Mr. E. P. King, Solr., appeared for the defendants.

Supt. English stated that Garda J. Molloy searched Kirby's house in the course of investigating the robbery and Kirby made a statement after caution.

Giving evidence, Garda D. Lehané read the statement which he took from Kirby on November 3 at Dungarvan Court. Kirby said that on November 2, another person called him and he went out the back and opened the gate. The man told him that he had more down to collect it. They went back down to collect it.

The other man and myself brought the wine and myself and Pa Duggan were still sorting the other stuff."

Kirby's statement continued: "We then shared out all the stuff I got and about 200 bottles of wine and about 200 bottles of beer."

"At about 8.30 p.m. the man went out two or three times and brought back wine about 40 bottles. He said to me and my daughter down for orange and lemonade to mix with the wine. "That night I fell asleep in the shed. At about 5 a.m. or 6 a.m. I was awakened by a noise. A man came in the door. Moroney was with him. They had bags of fags, wine and beer. Tommy Kirby asked me to give him a hand to go down to the V.G. and carry up the rest."

Duggan's statement then continued: "I said I would do it. I went down and I smoked a few fags. About 10 minutes later they landed back with 3 trolleys full of stuff. I gave them a hand to bring them into the shed and they sorted it out. The man said that he would give Tommy some of the stuff if he let him hide some of the stuff in his shed. We drank some of the wine. We helped the man take some of the stuff to his back garden where he hid it. The man and Tommy Kirby went to their homes and I went back to Kirby's shed and remained there until about 10 a.m. Brian Kirby then woke me up and said that the Guards were up in his house."

## LIVING ROUGH

When District Justice O'Dea said that Duggan was 18 years old and had only been once in Court before. He said that he was away from home and was living rough and was the least culpable of all involved in these incidents. "All he got," said Mr. King, was 80 cigarettes and he appealed to the Justice to show him leniency.

In regard to Kirby, Mr. King said that he was 32 years old and although there was a long list of previous convictions against him, he had been nothing except an assault charge against him in the last 10 years.

The District Justice said the charges were very serious but in view of Duggan's age and the fact that Kirby had no charge against him for 18 years he would impose a sentence of 3 months on both the defendants, to stand suspended until they had been 12 months.

## 550 LIVES AND INJURIES SAVED IS TARGET FOR CHRISTMAS DRINK DRIVING CAMPAIGN

550 people will be saved from death and injury on the roads this Christmas if the target of the Garda National Road Safety Association's drink/driving campaign is achieved.

The campaign was launched in Dublin by Mr. Denis Moraney, Minister for Transport and the Environment.

Speaking at the launch, Mr. Moraney referred to the number of deaths and injuries which have occurred on the roads because of drinking and driving. The message of this year's Campaign was "Just two will do."

If everyone limited themselves to a maximum of two drinks when driving, the saving of lives and injuries would be enormous. Mr. Moraney paid tribute to the Wine and Spirits Association, the Irish Brewers' Association and both Vintners' Societies for their support, both financial and otherwise, for the Campaign. The drinks industry had constantly stressed their abhorrence of the abuse of alcohol. Their support for this Campaign was tangible proof of their sincerity.

Chief Supt. Joe McGovern of the Traffic Section, Garda Headquarters said that the Garda were enthusiastic in their support of the Campaign to rid the roads of the menace of drinking drivers. The success of last year's Campaign provided strong evidence of how the death and injury toll on our roads could be significantly reduced and he sought the co-operation of the public once again this year. Garda Superintendents throughout the country will be directed to intensify enforcement of the Road Traffic Act with particular emphasis on drinking and driving offences, dangerous and excessive speeding.

Backing up the publicity drive will be press, radio and TV Campaign which will remind drivers of the high risk of being caught and of the severity of the penalties on conviction, the most severe of which is the automatic loss of licence for 12 months. For many this means the loss of their jobs.

Jim Kelly, Director of the National Road Safety Association pointed out that this is an average Christmas. 1,645 people will be killed and injured on our roads between now and the 31st December. Last Christmas the Campaign spearheaded by the Garda and the Association succeeded in cutting this figure by 413. It was clear that the tide was turning and the drinking driver was beginning to be seen for what he really was—a threat to himself and to everyone else in the community.

The three main messages of the Campaign this year are— (1) That any more than two drinks could put a driver above the limit. (2) That the Garda will be very vigilant against this Christmas. (3) That the best time to de-

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Q.—How long do you have to be working before you become entitled to claim Unemployment Benefit?

A.—Usually 6 months. This is because a person in insurance for the first time, paying the full rate, gets "credit" to bring him into benefit quickly.

Q.—If, for example, you started work in June 1983, by the end of November when you had 26 weeks social insurance paid, you would be credited with Social Welfare contributions back to April 1983, and for the two previous contribution years 1981-82 and 1982-83.

Q.—In December you could claim Unemployment, Disability or Maternity Benefit. You would be paid a slightly reduced rate of benefit as you would need to be working for a year to get the maximum payment. Also, unless a person has a good social insurance record over the previous 7 years the payment is reduced further after 6 months.

Q.—Unemployment Benefit is normally not payable for a year to get the maximum payment. It continues for 56 weeks, or 52 weeks in the case of a married woman living with her husband or being maintained by him.

Q.—A person under 18 years will be paid for a period of 8 months only.

Q.—To claim Unemployment, Benefit you go along to the local employment exchange (or Social Welfare Agent) and sign on as available for work. You should bring your P45 (cessation of employment form) with you. If you don't have a P45 still register as available for work and follow the matter up with your employer.
