PAYING UNDER PROTEST

At a public meeting held in
Tallow on Monday night last
about the sewerage and garbage
charges, some strong and force-
ful arguments were made
against them.
The two members of the com-
mittee explained the outcome of
their meeting with the County
Manager, which as stated last
week, was not very satisfactory
from the delegations point of
view.
Many people felt the charges
were grossly unfair but recog-
nised the fact that they have
very little choice but to pay
them after a long discussion
on the matter it was agreed in
principle to pay the charges
"under protest." While this may
be welcome by the powers that
be in the Co. Council the com-
mittee will continue to monitor
the situation especially in rela-
tion to the "Waiver Form"
which is payable for people who
because of various financial con-
straints they should be entitled
to relief from these charges.
People are strongly urged to
make full use of these Waiver
Forms, which can be had from
the Co. Council Office, and if
any extra outgoings they have
that are not asked for on the form.
The committee also hope to
look into the possibility of join-
ing a national tenants associa-
tion which they feel is the only
way to fight these savage
charges.

MR. EDWARD FENTON

Mr. Edward Fenton died sud-

YOUNG IRELAND GROUP'S BUY IRISH CAMPAIGN

The Young Ireland Group established in Dublin earlier this year with the aim of creating a new awareness of the link between buying Irish goods and the creation and maintenance of jobs at home has now spread to several parts of Ireland. Membership of the Group is made up of students of second-level (secondary) schools throughout the country.

The representatives of the Group help in spreading their message made to the General Council of County Councils resulted in a discussion on it at the October monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council, following which an invitation was extended to the Group to attend a meeting of the Council and to meet representatives of second-level schools in the County who were also to be invited to attend.

At the November monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last week a letter was read from Agnes Ward, Central Co-ordinator of "Young Ireland" of Oatlands College, Mount Merrion, Dublin in which she informed the Council, with regard to the present they were unable to accept such an invitation but hoped it would be possible to do so in the not-too-distant future.

The letter then went on to say: "In the meantime, we feel it is pertinent to mention that every second-level school in the country has been furnished with a Young Ireland starter kit. We are delighted with the number of schools who have responded to us already. Our message of hope and common-sense has captured the support of teachers and students alike. We feel that there is a very valuable educational dimension to our message. We know that our first step which is the creation of awareness among the student population of the link between buying Irish and creating and maintaining jobs — is already well established.

"It would be our wish that you might continue to encourage support for Young Ireland in County Waterford until such time as we can accept your invitation to meet with you.

"In conclusion, may I refer especially to the kind remarks and encouragement given to us by Senator Bulbulia when we addressed the General Council. We look forward to being in touch with you again soon."

ACOT GEARS ITSELF FOR GREATER RURAL DEVELOPMENT

The following is a more detailed description of the Client-Enterprise based advisory service about to be launched by ACOT and described briefly by Mr. George Frost, C.A.O., at the November meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture.

With resources more limited, rigorous, sharply focused advisory and educational programmes are essential in providing farmers with the technological and managerial capabilities to enable them to have a prosperous and competitive agricultural industry.

As the national body responsible for transferring this expertise to the agricultural industry ACOT is concerned with the full spectrum of farmers irrespective of resources, enterprises, farming systems, location, social circumstances or motivation. However, ACOT's resources are limited and are becoming increasingly so. Accordingly, its impact will be determined by how it deploys these resources and, in particular, on the response capacity of the farmers on whom these resources are expended.

ABLE AND WILLING

With the objective of securing the most effective and efficient use of its resources, ACOT must focus its programme on those farmers identified as being capable of responding to advice and who are in a position and prepared to do so. Accordingly, the Board of ACOT has recently decided to provide such farmers with a more intensive specialised service while continuing to provide the more general available resources to give to all farmers a service commensurate to their needs.

ADVICE BASED ON ENTERPRISE

ACOT is currently gearing itself to provide what may be described as a CLIENT-ENTERPRISE based advisory service in which the levels and nature of the service available to the individual farm unit will be tailored to its potential to expand and to the nature of the main farm enterprise(s). The effective provision of such a sharply focused service will require fundamental changes in ACOT's operation. Two prerequisites to provision of a Client-Enterprise service are:—

- (a) Identification of farmers with potential of the priority clients of the service;
- (b) development of greater specialisation at adviser level or enterprise advisers.

LIKELY TO RESPOND

Clients — Those farmers who have been classified as Commercial or Development in the Farm Modernisation Scheme are capable of expanding output, and generating increased income and, so would all receive the intensive service. Guidelines or criteria are currently being drawn-up to assist ACO's local management to identify other farmers with definite potential for development, who are likely to respond to a more intensive advisory input. These also would receive the priority service. A development plan will be prepared for all the priority clients, as necessary, and they will receive strategically timed farm visits on specific occasions throughout the year. Farm visits which are becoming increasingly costly, will be directed mainly to the priority clients and confined to occasions where significant impacts can be achieved.

ENTERPRISE ADVISERS

Because of the growing complexity and competitiveness of modern agriculture, attainment of specified improvement in farm output and income requires the support of more specialised advice or enterprises, which takes into account also the total development of the whole farm and family. To meet this requirement ACOT proposes to supply its services through District teams. The intention is to establish in each county a number of District Teams — usually two to four, depending on size.

The members of the District Team will work together, under the leadership of the District Manager, to promote the development of the farming and farm families of the District. Each District will have a number of advisers specialising on the major enterprises of the District. These enterprise advisers will be assisted by a number of clients whose major farm enterprise matches the adviser's special knowledge, interest and experience. To support the enterprise advisers a core of specialists is being established in the five ACOT regions. Also, in-service training and a social provided at the Western Resources Centre which will be in operation shortly.

ADVICE BASED ON ENTERPRISE

The need and demand for a Client-Enterprise service have been felt for a long time by those engaged in farming and other competitive agriculture.

A terrifying ordeal suffered by a young Dublin garda when he was robbed, beaten and battered with death after being picked up in a car. The four men on the night of May 6 was recalled at Waterford Circuit Court last week.

Before the court was Robert Cairns (26) of Elm Park, Clonmel, who pleaded guilty to robbing Garda Gerry Corcoran of £25 and Gabriel Grogan (22) of College Avenue, Clonmel, who also pleaded guilty to robbing Garda Corcoran with intent to cause him grievous bodily harm.

Mr. Tom Teahan, B.L., told Judge D. P. Sheridan that on the night of May 6, Garda Corcoran was on duty in a patrol function in Waterford City with his girlfriend. After he left the girl home he walked along the main road, Waterford Cork road, where he was to get a lift to Portlaw. In the vicinity of Waterford Industrial Estate a car pulled up, the back door was opened and one of the four occupants told him to get in because he had a "shooter".

Inside the vehicle Garda Corcoran's hair was pulled, a knife was put to his throat and a razor blade to his nose. His pockets were also searched and £25 was taken as well as his garda identification card. The vehicle was driven 14 miles along the Waterford-Cork road. It turned off towards Kilmacthomas and down a long lane. When the vehicle finally came to a halt Garda Corcoran was told to get out and lie face down on the ground where he was beaten again. After being dumped it took him some time to get to a house and raise the alarm.

Sgt. M. Seablan, Clonmel, told the court that during this ordeal a vote was taken whether or not to kill the victim. All voted to kill him except Cairns who was subsequently threatened that if he said anything about the incident his children would be "knocked down".

Having heard the evidence, Judge Sheridan said that the young garda must have been terrified for his life and, because of the great seriousness of the matter, he would adjourn the decision on punishment for a week.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN

DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE

Q—I am unemployed and get £24.80 p.w. I've been told I'm not entitled to Pay Related Benefit because of the 85% rule. What does this mean?

A — The 85% rule is a limit on payments to unemployed people to ensure that they don't take home more in social welfare than they did while working.

To get Pay Related Benefit you must first of all be getting Unemployment, Disability or Maternity Benefit.

In the case of Unemployment Benefit, the flat rate, plus Pay Related, plus any tax rebate due, must not be more than 85% of your average net weekly earnings, i.e. earnings less tax and P.R.S.I., divided by the number of weeks from the beginning of the tax year to the date of signing on. In your case your net earnings must have been more than £41 p.w. As you cannot get more than 85% of the £41 p.w. you can get no Pay-Related Benefit at all. The flat rate unemployment payment is not reduced by the 85%.

If you can get no Pay-Related Benefit at all, the flat rate unemployment payment is immediately reduced in doing so to the average net weekly earnings and therefore Pay-Related Benefit.

BALLYDUFF TIDY TOWNS REPORT

The following are the adjudicators' comments on Ballyduff's efforts in this year's Tidy Towns Competition. Maximum points in brackets:

Effort — Community involvement in improving general appearance (35) 27. — Community effort is not as obvious in the presentation of the village this year as it was last year. The improvement under the headings of natural amenities and approach roads have not been very dramatic, nonetheless the accumulation of small improvements together with the maintenance of high standards in other sections will eventually build up to a very high overall standard of presentation. Good luck to the committee in the coming year.

Tidiness — Appropriate placing of litter bins — absence of litter, derelict sites, buildings and indiscriminate dumping (20) 15. — Again this year, litter control was very good. However, many litter bins were broken and dirty and this in itself looked untidy. A field of abandoned cars was visible from the bridge forming the main road and also from the Talloy Bridge approach. These should be either removed with the help of the County Council or screened properly from public view. The polioles at the entrance to the village should be filled in these look ugly, especially when wet. The semi-derelict building still remains in its prominent position without the usual screening to detract from its overall appearance, as do the old sheds and outhouses nearby.

PRESENTATION OF NATURAL AMENITIES

Open spaces, village green, river banks, forestry, trees, flowerbeds, etc. (25) 13. — The points made in last year's report can be repeated. The river could be better presented and used as a recreational area. Its banks are grossly overgrown. There is great potential in the village for the development of green open space which would give a pleasant atmosphere to the village.

For example the open spaces beside the school and behind the Garda Station are overgrown and unsightly, as are the open spaces in front of and behind the small housing estate. The green area on the left hand side of the road down from the Grotto leading into the village also has great potential. If developed and maintained properly as is the attractive open space surrounding the Grotto.

APPROACH ROADS AND VERGES

Approach roads and verges, streets, back lanes and footpaths (20) 11. — Again this year the verges and hedgerows of the approach roads were somewhat overgrown and this untidy. The Fermoys approach road would be much improved if the fencing was painted. The junction road sign on the Fermoys road was hidden by the vegetation; this of course defeats its purpose.

The name on road signs, however, both on the approaches and throughout the village are of a good standard and care should be taken to ensure that these standards are maintained.

PRESENTATION OF BUILDINGS

Shops, business premises, factories, historic and public buildings, etc. (20) 10. — The presentation under this heading was quite good. The Church and graveyard together with the School and Garda Station look very well. The library and several business premises such as Tobin's, the Hardware Shop and the Night Owl Restaurant.

The business premises that need to be heightened up and their surroundings areas up are the Texaco Garage, the builders' providers using the old school and the shop at the corner of the road leading down to the Church and also the Medical centre. The Muintir na Tire building looked very well this year.

PRESENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL AREAS

As mentioned last year, the standard of residential areas is very high. The green open space both in front of and to the side of the small housing estate on the Fermoys road still awaiting development and maintenance and the fencing here also needs to be painted. The older houses in the village are nicely painted in bright colours and are an important part of the overall presentation of the village. Some of this individual effort should now be channelled into community projects.

Presentation of street furniture on roads, car parks, open spaces, etc. — including road signs, telephones, kiosks, post boxes, litter bins, village pump, statues and monuments, seats, advertising hoardings (15) 13. — As mentioned above, the name and road signs are for the most part, very well presented. However, the telephone kiosks need a wash this year and some litter bins were broken.

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THE OIL FOUND

Collins pointed out last Friday. It is a light oil which means that it is probably associated with gas (in fact gas was found). Many experts would argue that the find may turn out to be a gas find rather than an oil find.

The type of oil formed is dependent on a number of factors such as the source materials, the pressure which the source basin is under and temperature. The high pressure can induce natural "cracking" of the oil similar to that which occurs in a refinery.

This sediment is known as the source rock. However, it is not from this that oil is eventually discovered. It must first "migrate" to reservoir rock where it will accumulate. The oil is carried by water from the source rock in minute quantities, but given the scale of time, a sizeable accumulation eventually forms.

Pressure from sediments above the oil help it form a shale-type covering which is non-porous. Further oil migration is then trapped under this cap. But oil is continuously on the move seeking more permeable rocks, and since it is lighter than water, a higher position. Eventually "pools" are formed within the porous rocks, trapped by the shale top. An oil field may consist of one huge pool or numerous associated ones.

Oil can only be produced from porous rocks and the pores must be interconnected. The oil and gas displace the water (with the gas on top) under the reservoir's cap.

And that is how oil is formed!
