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ACT INAUGURAL MEETING

ACT stands for Aid for Cancer Treatment and is a foundation set up primarily to raise funds for the purchase of essential radiotherapy equipment for the treatment of cancer patients at the Regional Hospital in Cork. On Tuesday night of last week, December 6, the Officers of the Management Committee of ACT based at the Cork Regional Hospital attended a meeting at the Devonshire Arms Hotel in Dungarvan aimed at the eventual establishment of a regional branch of the foundation for Co. Waterford.

In addition to the provision of equipment at the Hospital, short-stay bed accommodation must be increased. The unit there provides the only radiotherapy treatment centre for cancer patients outside of Dublin and treats patients from all other hospitals in the Munster region generally, including Waterford and Tipperary. At present over 6,000 patients are receiving treatment in the Cork Regional each year, with up to 1,200 new patients being treated every year.

Working in close co-operation with senior medical staff at the hospital, priorities for immediate action, as part of a long-term plan, have been identified by ACT. The most dramatic improvement in treatment can be achieved by the purchase of two very expensive pieces of equipment and this is the Foundation's immediate objective.

Dr. M. Hurley who is Consultant Radiotherapist at the Hospital and Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee of ACT explained to the meeting the great need for this new equipment with the first priority the purchase of a planning simulator at a cost of £280,000.

Mr. T. Jackson, Hon. Secretary and Mr. S. Bourke, Joint Hon. Treasurer gave details of fund raising functions held which have realised a total of £50,000 since the Foundation was first set up earlier this year.

Mr. J. D. Hally, Waterford County Engineer, organising the attendance at the inaugural meeting and it is hoped to establish the regional branch of the Foundation for Co. Waterford later as a result.

CALL TO DISBAND BOARD OF WORKS

Arising from the minutes of a previous meeting Cllr. J. Quirk at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday once again referred to the fact that no move had as yet been made to do the repairs required to the Garda Barracks in Eally.

He said that recently the Dept. of Posts and Telegraphs had sent a radio-telephone mast to be erected at the Barracks but because the place was in such a state of disrepair it could not be erected and was left lying at the Barracks.

"The Board of Works said they were going to seek tenders to have the work done," said Cllr. Quirk, "but they have done nothing about it since. They're just coddling us." He added that a person who visited the Barracks lately said that there was no other Garda Barracks in all Ireland as bad as this. Proposing that they give the Board of Works a further month in which to get the repairs done, he said that they should call on the support of the Dept. of P. & T. to have put down the book about this and now," he added. Cllr. P. Cahill seconding the proposal said that the Board of Works should be disbanded altogether.

LOW PROFILE OPENING FOR NEW FIDDOUN BRIDGE

The Minister of State at the Department of the Environment will officially open the new £11 million Fiddoun Bridge on Monday next, December 19 at 3 p.m. Funded by Waterford and Kilkenny County Council the official opening was originally to be followed by a reception at the Toll Bridge Tavern in Fiddoun. Invitations to the opening and reception were issued last week by the Kilkenny County Secretary but on Friday last the invitees were notified of "revised arrangements" which stated "after further consultation between the Cathaoirleach of Kilkenny County Council and the Cathaoirleach of Waterford County Council, it has been decided to cancel the reception and instead make an appropriate contribution to a charity. The arrangement for the Official Opening at 3 p.m. on Monday, December 19 stands."

The matter was referred to at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday when the Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, stated that it was proposed to hold a special meeting of the Council in Portlaoise that day and the members could then go on to the bridge opening which would be nearby.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that in view of the times that are in it the decision was taken to have only a simple opening ceremony with no reception and that the money which would have been expended on such a reception would be presented to the Chairman of each of the Councils to be donated to local charities.

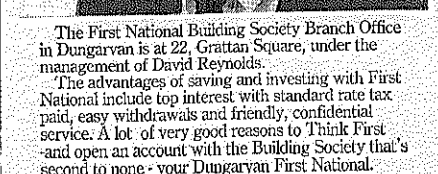

They were again victorious against Tallow before beating Strabally 2-4 to 1-0 in our final. With Pledge and Pat Walsh as their main players, Kilrossanty are a team to watch.

Tramore have the extraordinary distinction of having been involved in seven county under 21 football finals in the past four years. In 1959 they were beaten in the first round by a single point. They won the county in 1960, 1961 and 1962, but were beaten in the final by a single point also.

WATERFORD MAN JAILED AT CAPPOQUIN COURT

A 21-year-old Waterford city man who has been serving a six months prison sentence since last October, was given a further six months when he appeared in custody before District Justice Mary Martin at Cappoquin Court.

John Fermoche, 28 Connolly Place, Waterford, was charged with assaulting Thomas O'Sullivan at Main Street, Cappoquin on July 29 last; using an unlicensed and uninsured car on the same occasion and causing an obstruction on the public roadway.

The defendant was also charged with assaulting Thomas O'Sullivan at Barrack Street, Cappoquin on August 29 last. Giving evidence in relation to the July 29 charges, Thomas O'Sullivan told the court that Fermoche had been barred from a local chip shop and witness went to him to try and get him to apologise to the owners. Fermoche was still not allowed into the premises "and he then clocked me".

Asked by Supt. M. English to prosecute to be "more specific" O'Sullivan said Fermoche hit him with his head and when he was on the ground the defendant was striking his fingers into his eyes.

Replying to Mr. J. P. Gordon, Supt. defending witness denied that it was he who had attacked Fermoche, and he also denied hitting the defendant in the face. On the following day Fermoche apologised to him for the assault.

Sgt. Bergin told the court that he saw the defendant causing an obstruction on the roadway that night and later he found Fermoche and three others in a car which was neither taxed nor insured. "Fermoche would not open the car for me and I had to break the window," Sgt. Bergin said.

The defendant, who pleaded guilty to all the charges with the exception of assaulting Thomas O'Sullivan on July 29, said it was O'Sullivan who ran into his head on that occasion. Witness who is presently serving six months for the unlawful taking of a car, said that while he hit O'Sullivan, he was only in self-defence.

When District Justice Martin intimated that she intended to convict Fermoche on all the charges, Supt. English said the defendant had a long list of previous convictions, including three for assault in the last two years.

On the two assault charges the District Justice sentenced Fermoche to six months imprisonment, the sentence to run concurrently. He was also fined £5 with an endorsement on the insurance charge and was disqualified from driving for two years. The remaining charges were marked "taken into consideration".

When the Progress Report on Roads for the month of November was being discussed at the December monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan, Cllr. W. Kennedy said that he wished to congratulate and compliment the Council's Engineering Staff and the Council workers involved in putting down the "cat's eyes" in the roads. They were a great aid to motorists driving at night, especially when driving conditions were hazardous. "What it comes to this," said Cllr. Kennedy, "Waterford is way ahead of the other counties."

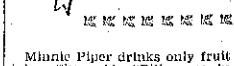

Minnie Piper drinks only fruit juice. She said: 'Bill came last night, so drunk he could sing a duet. Miss Roche, the Labour Exchange, had said to him, 'Bill, will you take a job thinking? 'Will I need a step-ladder for it? She showed him the door.' He had forgotten where he left the messages. It was only an ounce of tea, and a twopenny loaf of bread. He was bad mood all the week. Jenny Piper, his mother, had promised to give us her house in Waterford. As he was drinking heavily, she sold it for €250 which she bequeathed to the children. She died during the week. Bill's remark was, 'Jenny took the money with her.'

When I entered the house Minnie had been to town to buy Christmas presents. I helped to put her fur-coat of rabbit skins. Bill looked at her with an irresistible charm he could exert when he chose to atone for a night's drinking. 'What do you think of the times, Minnie?' I said. 'Ask Bill, he's as full of wisdom as a turkey's egg is full of muck.'

Bill reflected my family were stone-masons in Waterford City. It is a city in which Tudor and Georgian houses are imbedded in the upper part of the factory. I was fast becoming a machine. Then I went back to dressing stones with my father. John, my father, was a cultured man. He liked Byron, because of Byron's republican principles. When in Stuart's of Drogheda, Thomas Carlyle made friends with John Mitchell. My father had a copy of Carlyle's 'French Revolution.'

He taught me to see the beauty of religion in my work. He used say, the character of a nation is engraved in its homes and its cathedrals. A job well done is a revelation of one's character. There is no wealth but life itself with its devotion, joy, love. The country is the greatest of all the greatest numbers of happy human beings.'

Here Bill passed to squat a slow bow drooping against the window-pane. We then spoke about the Civil War. He remarked: 'Though having opposite opinions, each of these men contributed in some way to Irish life. Not in each of these, but in all, is human nature whole.' With an air of superiority he looked at Minnie. 'And you think, Minnie, I'm a fool.' 'No, but I'm sure of it,' she answered. All the while she had been hovering tentatively about her background. She said: 'Christmas is here! Sit down boys and share the straboung with me. The grey in her long glib of hair was mingling with the brown. She spoke about her youth.'

'We used the Daddy's stockings, because they were bigger, the top of the stocking was hung over the brass knob for Santa Claus. A voice whispered, 'she is asleep, Mammy.' I became nervous. I saw my mother in her white bedgown, hang up the stockings.'

The bells peal into Christmas for Mid-night Mass. Years have melted, as snowflakes fall by night on a wide river; twenty centuries have gone by since the Christmas truth began. 'Lo, unto us a Child is given; Lo, unto us a Son is born.' Polished boots his along to the church. My mother took me into Mary Finucane's wake. At the bed little Tommy stood, praying his mothers soiled lips to speak. Her heart had no more feeling. My mother pressed her hand and whispered a Hall Mary, kissed her headless cheek. This night, the star that hung over Bethlehem would guide her soul into the inky skies.

Inside the church, Miss Blind Jim, with his guide-dog. His large eyes are blind. Once they had seen the sun coming up over Carrig na nBan, and the thin moon, and watch with delight the wonderful Seagach Geal, and the hedgegroves in Spring. Now to Jim, night and day are one. But he needn't worry for the Christ Child will take his hand and lead him gently on his way to school. He said, 'I have passed the allotted span. The night is closing on me. Matly has prepared a grave for me beside the old gable ruin, where I can hear the rooks in the elm trees. No need to be sad, Bertie, for an old man's rest is sweet. CONTINUED LOSSES FOR IRISH LEATHERS GROUP

Irish Leathers, the ailing leather processor of which the leather factory in Dungarvan is a part, continues in the red. The group's losses in the first half of 1982, compared with a loss of €1,787,000 in the first half of 1982.

The company's market share continued to decline, chairman Mr. C. Hurley says in an interim statement. 'While hide prices increased significantly over the corresponding period in 1981, the loss of business is unable to recover the sales increases fully in the sales prices achieved for our leathers and consequently operating margins suffered once again.'

Because of these difficulties, further reorganisation of the group's production facilities was inevitable. Production and marketing levels at its Fortlaw tannery were reduced in the middle of September and 149 workers were temporarily laid off and the production of side leather at Fortlaw, apart from patent leather, virtually ceased.

The chairman says that the level of losses incurred in the side leather operation at that plant was unsustainable. This accounted for 60% of total group losses in the first half of 1982. The loss account for a 'significant portion' of the group's losses in the third quarter.

Mr. Hurley says that much emphasis has been placed on product development as well as on the leather operation at that plant. He says that the work will bear fruit in the years ahead. While the group does not anticipate a return to profitability this year, it is optimistic that 'operating results for the fourth quarter of this year will be close to break even.'

The interim results show a rise in turnover from €9,873,000 to €10,905,000, which represents a decline in real terms. Interest charges went up from €151,000 to €158,000. There was an extraordinary charge of €55,000 and a decline in real terms amounted to €13.5p compared with a loss of 13.5p previously.

At the end of 1982, the group had shareholders' funds of €2,888,000. The latest results would have reduced these by about a half. The shares at 6p (1983 high 8p 6p) have no investment interest.

HOW TO STOP FLIGHT FROM THE LAND

In the course of a brief discussion at a meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last week on the flight from the land and the best steps to be taken to stem it and to achieve the aim of keeping as many people as possible on the land, Mr. I. Murphy (L.O.C.) said that predictions about the problem indicated that the flow from the land would continue up to the year 2000.

In facing up to the problem he said that they would have to deal with realities and that this regard the priority of the Minister for Agriculture must be the only way that this could be done was by improving conditions on the land. 'If conditions were good,' said Mr. Murphy, 'enough people would stay but the fact is that these conditions are deteriorating and people are consequently, and alternatively means of living.'

Mr. Murphy added that for farmers, the priority was education and in turn the Government would have to come up with a long-term plan for agriculture. 'Without training,' he said, 'there's no hope for farming.'
