PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

CRIPPLED BY TAXATION
Last week a delegation from the national and provincial newspapers went to plead with Minister for Finance, Alan Dukes, to reduce or abolish the crippling 23 per cent VAT on newspapers — a tax which increased the selling price of most of these papers by up to 8p.
The group included many leading figures in the newspaper world at national and local level and had arranged to meet the Minister at 5 p.m. on Wednesday in the Department of Finance. This was changed to 8 p.m. at short notice. Mr. Dukes bustled in five to ten minutes late and announced that he had to leave again at 8.30 p.m.
The delegation, many of whom had travelled from the far corners of the country had only got halfway through the presentation of their case when the busy Mr. Dukes bustled out again, leaving an embarrassed official to deal with the frustrated newspapermen.

This is typical of the treatment of Irish newspapers by successive governments since the tax was originally introduced. Of all the countries in the EEC, Ireland is the only one which places such a penalty on newspapers — in England and Northern Ireland no VAT is charged on papers while in no case does the tax exceed eight per cent in any of the other member States.

The Irish newspaper industry provides a great deal of employment and down through the years it has proved a most responsible and stabilising influence in the lives of the community. Now it appears that the present government is intent on pushing many of those who have so far still succeeded in remaining in business to the wall by insisting on this crippling rate of taxation.

This week the "Dungarvan Leader" passing its 45th milestone, having been first published on Christmas Eve, 1938, and in common with its sister weekly papers up and down the country it is finding survival becoming ever more difficult.

The tax people with their incessant demands under the various heads of VAT, PAYE, PRSI and direct income tax are pushing local newspapers and indeed most other small industries, especially those privately owned, to the very brink. They appear to have adopted a policy of trying to make up on the swings what they lose on the roundabouts as they seem to have let many of the larger concerns, which nonetheless have gone to the wall, off the hook for several years as evidenced by the huge amounts owed by them in taxes as declared when they go into liquidation.

Unless the government changes its present attitude and relaxes its taxation policies there can be little doubt but that the entire country will itself become bankrupt before long and the goose that has provided the golden eggs (including the extra £1 million to pay the recent £1 million increases for the judiciary and members of the Oireachtas) will at last have been killed.

HAPPIER CHRISTMAS
Here we are again right on top of Christmas and office parties and a week of work to get ready for the New Year and more than 1,500 people injured or killed on our roads. Most readers will already be aware of this year's campaign by the Garda Síochána and the National Road Safety Association to try to reduce the amount of drunken driving between now and the middle of January which was announced early last month, but we make no apology

CRAFT WORKERS SUSPENDED AT WATERFORD CO-OP CREAMERY

The refusal to reply to a query by Management concerning the work schedule of a craftsman engaged in work at an outside branch and a breakdown of discussions subsequently held between the Management of Waterford Co-op Society in Dungarvan and the representatives of the Unions of the craftsmen resulted in work stoppage by the men followed by a number of suspensions during the past week.

About 30 fitters and electricians, members of the AUEW and ETU were involved.

On Friday last, December 16, each of the workers concerned received notification from the Personnel Manager at the Co-op, Mr. Carl Payne, that further to the meeting on the previous evening with the men's union committee, the Co-op Management confirmed that each stood suspended without pay from 8 a.m. on December 15. "This," the Personnel Manager's letter stated, "is as a result of your decision to cease working despite Management's requests for you to return to work and your continued refusal to do so."

On Friday last also, Mr. P. J. Dineen, General Manager, Dairy Division, Waterford Co-op in Dungarvan sent a letter to all AUEW and ETU members employed at the Co-op which stated: "The withdrawal of labour by craftsmen following a simple routine enquiry by Management regarding details of work carried out demonstrates again your repeated disregard for the Society for your fellow-workers and the future of Dungarvan processing. It also makes it impossible for Waterford Co-op to guarantee continuity of service and supply to our customers. This is another example of the abuse of agreed procedures and absolute disregard for the dire economic circumstances facing us."

The letter added: "The prospects of the Society in 1984 are depressingly demanding with the possibility of penalties on milk output and reduced prices for products. Against this background the Society requires and needs 100 per cent commitment from all employees. If we are to protect our future the Society cannot continue to operate with the present attitude and practices adopted by the craftsmen."

DISPUTE SETTLED

Negotiations between the parties continued during the week and on Tuesday settlement terms were agreed following which the suspensions were lifted by the Management and the craft workers agreed to resume work. The electricians went back on Tuesday evening and the fitters resumed this (Wednesday) morning.

CIRCUIT COURT APPEAL FOLLOWS BALLYDUFF FESTIVAL FRACAS

A punch up which took place in Ballyduff on Sunday night, June 26 during the annual festival in the village was mentioned at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week when James O'Brien, Kiltoran, Co. Na., an apprentice butcher, appealed against his conviction at Lismore Court on October 5, 1983, of a charge of assaulting and occasioning actual bodily harm to Noel Kearney, Ahanboy, Glencain on June 26 at Ballyduff. He also appealed against the fine of £50 with £20 expenses imposed on him and against the order that he enter a bond in the sum of £100 to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for a period of 12 months.

Noel Kearney stated in evidence that he was a salesman/truck-driver and on Sunday night June 26 at about 11.30 he was going into Lindsay's pub in Ballyduff. It was during the festival. At the time, James O'Brien was coming out and they accidentally bumped into each other. O'Brien said to him "watch it but witness did not recall what he said in reply.

Witness then went on to say that all he remembered after that was being on the ground and O'Brien was on top of him hitting him very hard in the face with his fist. O'Brien then got up and ran off down the road. As a result of being hit witness said that he had to go to the Regional Hospital in Cork the following morning where it was found he had two broken bones in his face. He added that he had given no provocation for the assault.

ever he was inclined to believe that it might have happened on an isolated occasion in the present case and he would give the appellant the benefit of that doubt. On the evidence he felt that O'Brien had overreacted on the occasion and there was a serious assault and he found that proved. However, he ordered that both parties involved enter bonds to keep the peace and to undertake not to taunt, molest or interfere with each other for a period of 2 years as he was not going to allow this kind of taunting to go on. He then reduced the fine imposed on O'Brien in the District Court to £25 and knocked off the £20 for expenses and added that in the circumstances he thought the proper course to take was to allow the parties concerned to follow whatever

DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL VOTES SYMPATHY TO BRITISH P.M.

On the proposal of Cllr. T. Wade, Dungarvan Urban Council on their December monthly meeting unanimously passed a vote of sympathy to Mrs. Margaret Thatcher, British Prime Minister and to the British Government on the deaths of the people caused by the car-bomb explosion in London.

At the outset of the meeting standing orders were suspended on the proposal of Cllr. B. Kynce to allow him "to refer to the terrible things which had happened in this country and in Britain at the week-end."

Cllr. Kynce said that he had a young policeman and a young soldier shot and they had now come to the time to speak out. There had been talk since that Sinn Féin should be banned. "But," he said, "I don't think that Sinn Féin should be banned. They should be allowed continue so as to let us see who and what they are — they're the backers of murderers."

He proposed that the Council's sympathy be extended to the Ministers for Justice and Defence and that a letter be written to the Taoiseach requesting that Sinn Féin be not banned.

Cllr. Angela Creedon second-

ed and in addition moved that the meeting be adjourned for five minutes as a mark of respect.

Cllr. J. Byrne described the members of Sinn Féin as "defendants from hell" adding that to call them animals would be an insult to animals. They had seen two fine young men murdered and for this he felt they should be banned from every walk of life and even from the Church. "They should be banned off the face of the earth," he added.

Cllr. D. Goode said that by their actions these people were desecrating the ideals of Irish nationalism.

Cllr. M. O'Flaherty said that capital punishment should be brought back for such crimes and it was time to arm all the Gardaí.

Cllr. R. A. Walsh, Chairman, said that they were only criminals and they were the only real enemies of the country.

Cllr. Wade then proposed that they should also extend sympathy to the British Government and to Mrs. Thatcher on the London bombing.

Both resolutions were passed unanimously and the meeting stood adjourned for 5 minutes.

At the December monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last week, Cllr. B. Kyne referred to a position at the Co. Council machinery yard in Dungarvan where two apprentices, now out of their time, had been given notice of termination of employment.
