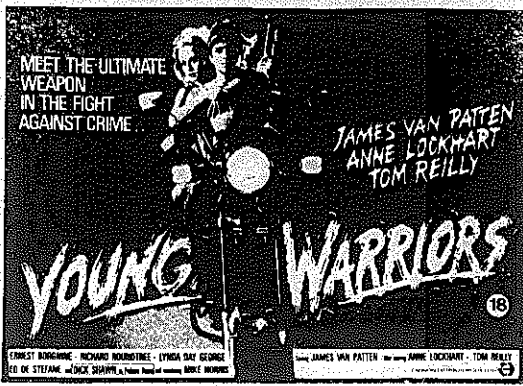

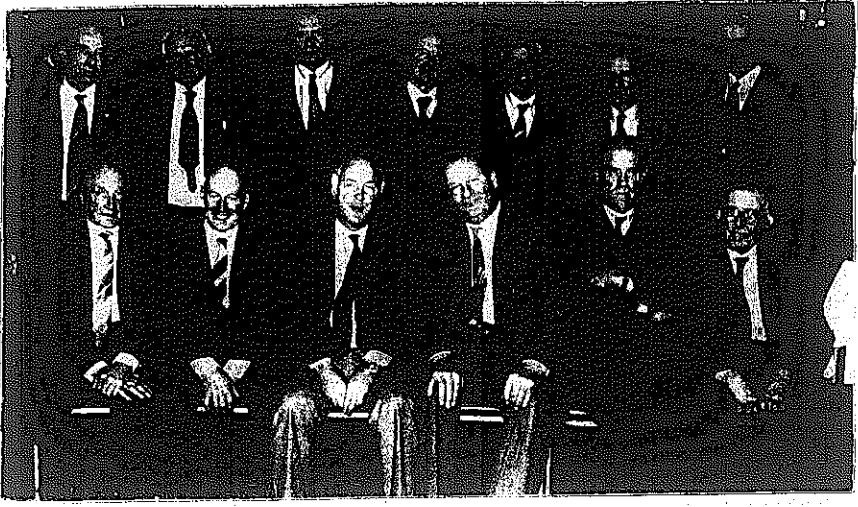

of the same time also adjusts the resistance of the accelerator pedal to the foot. When the driver should accelerate it is easier to depress the pedal and if he should hold back it is more difficult.
The other item told of an "Operation in a container" and read: "Prompter medical aid is now possible in districts without a hospital: the hospital comes to the patient in a container. A new container system, developed by a firm in Mainz, offers sixty differently equipped containers - from an operation theatre to an intensive care ward - from a medical examination room for newborn babies to the chemist's shop. The container can be easily mounted on to a lorry's chassis and can thus be driven into emergency areas."
So indeed one may well ask what's new - perhaps the South Eastern Health Board might find the latter suggestion a help - if they could afford one!
