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MORE CIRCUIT JUDGES NEEDED

A judge of the Circuit Court last week issued a call to the Government to make more Circuit judges available. Judge D. P. Sheridan who is the judge assigned to the South Eastern Region made the call at the start of court business on Friday last in Waterford City when he referred to the "intolerable burden" on the court for the region.

He said that since 1975 court hours throughout the country had risen to such an extent that the court was now running a double shift each week. "I have often spoken about this dilemma which has now reached crisis proportions," the Judge stated, pointing out that although the court had been in session since Tuesday morning the business was never listed for the week because of the incidence of indictable crime. Judge Sheridan said that he was aware of the lack of funds but he entreated the State to provide additional judges and personnel for the various offices.

"Since the November 1983 sittings 22 people have been returned for trial in Waterford and it is quite evident that, notwithstanding the considerable effort of myself as judge of the circuit and the devoted services of the County Registrar (Mr. John Connel) and the staff, the whole-hearted co-operation of the bar, solicitors, and indeed litigants, it is now quite impossible to serve this circuit in the manner in which I would desire," he added.

Judge Sheridan sits in Dungarvan this week and when the Court opened on Tuesday morning the list for hearing totalled a number of over 60 cases. Of these, there were 11 District Court appeals, criminal and civil; 13 motions; 2 Family Law cases; 6 civil actions; 4 ejection cases; 5 equity cases (seeking injunctions, etc.); and 5 Landlord and Tenant applications.

There can be little doubt but that the workload involved is now beyond the capacity of one person to deal with, as Judge Sheridan stated last week, "the manner in which I would desire". It is to be hoped, therefore, that the State will give the necessary consideration to his call for the appointment of additional Circuit judges which undoubtedly merits.

Last week "An Post," the body which now looks after the postal services, issued a booklet titled "How We Can Work For Your Business." It deals with such new aspects of the service as Publicity Post, Express Mail, Faxpost, etc., and in a foreword, the Chairman of An Post, Mr. Feargal Quinn states, among other things: "Think of us as people who want to hear from you — about your wants, about our shortcomings, about how we can serve you better. This booklet spells out our current 'product range.' It's a graduated range of services, allowing you to pick the right mix of speed and price for any particular occasion."

It was the reference to "speed" that appealed to us in the light of a letter which we received a few weeks ago from the Headquarters, Dublin Postal District, Fenian House, Dublin 2.

Dated 30 January 1984 it stated: "Thank you for your application of the 21st February 1983 concerning copies of newspapers both here and in the U.S.A. addressed to Kingston, U.S.A. Tacoma, Washington. I regret to say that although careful enquiry has been made, posted from December 82 to February 83 no trace of the newspapers can be found and I have been unable to ascertain how or in what circumstances the losses occurred." The letter bore an illegible signature, "A. S. Chearnasani."

The letter was a reply to a complaint made by us in February of last year concerning copies of the "Leader" posted weekly in Dungarvan to a subscriber in the U.S. which were not delivered. We merely refer to it now as it took almost the full round of a year to deal with the complaint.

Surely on this basis, any service now offered by An Post can only be an improvement as far as speed is concerned at any rate!

C.O. COUNCIL ESTIMATES

Failure To Strike Rate At First Attempt

Calling on the Council to give him five minutes more the Chairman of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Pat Coffey failed to get the agreement of members to continue the session on the Council's Estimates after 5 o'clock, the statutory time for Council meetings, when the Council met to strike a rate in Dungarvan last Monday.

There was a proposal to suspend Standing Orders to allow the discussion to continue after 5 p.m. and there was another proposal to go through the Book of Estimates item by item. In the end many members walked away from the meeting which then stood adjourned in an air of confusion.

No positive date for reconvening the meeting was agreed but it seems likely that the Council will have their second go at striking the rate on next Monday week.

At the outset the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, stated that the Council had met in private three weeks previously to hold preliminary discussions on the estimates and after 2 1/2 hours he was asked to go back to the drawing board to see if he could bridge the gap in the shortfall of £436,600 which existed between expenditure and income.

He now proposed to find this deficit by an increase of 12 per cent in the rate (£1.95 to bring it to £2.13 which would realise an extra £65,000 charge for Fire Services, licences and certificates £5,000; increase in water and sewerage connection fees £6,000; water pollution licences £1,000 and increases in charges for water, sewerage and scavenging £110,000. On the expenditure side he proposed to cut services to the extent of £116,000 and to reduce staff cost by £102,500 of which £16,000 would be for administrative staff, £30,000 for technical staff and £56,500 for outdoor staff.

STAFF CUTS

Mr. Hurley pointed out that the total reduction in the expenditure level from that needed to maintain 1983 level of activity was £470,000 and this meant that the Council would be unable to maintain its existing level of staff and to reduce staff loss to a minimum overtime working would only obtain where it was vitally necessary. The employment of temporary staff and the filling of vacancies that might be critically looked at and deferred where possible.

On the question of service charges the Manager proposed the following increases: domestic water from 65s to 65s; sewerage £20 (no change); scavenging from £10 to £15 and non-domestic water (meter) per 1,000 gallons from 0.55p to £1.

Under the heading of Fire Services, Mr. Hurley proposed a charge of £25 for the attendance of Fire Brigades at a chimney fire.

Failure To Strike Rate At First Attempt

Referring to the Government grants he said that the increase allowed for this year, 0.8 per cent over last year made it impossible for the Council to meet its financial commitments and he said that this whole question of finance for local authorities will only pay under our own terms.

Senator Bubbala expressed concern of the little say which the Council now had in deciding such an important issue as striking the rate.

Cllr. O'Riain rejected the charges made by Cllr. Kynne against the farmers stating that farmers were the backbone of the country. Farmers' incomes, he said, had dropped 40 per cent and they now had their backs to the wall and would have to suffer a further reduction of 50 per cent this year.

Cllr. O'Riain said that as matters now stood it was impossible for a local authority to work within the Block Grant allocation by the Government. He said that the Council would take the Manager's suggestion in the labour force he felt it should take place right across the board and not confined solely to the outdoor staff.

Cllr. O'Riain said that it had been anticipated all over the county that the Council would cut 40 per cent in their expenses. However as far as he was concerned this had not happened and in fact the expenses he had been receiving had been cut by 25 per cent.

WOUND DOWN

In reply to Cllr. D. Goode who asked whether redundancies would occur in spite of any decision the Council would take, the Manager said that certain jobs would be wound down but they would try to ensure that these would be as few as possible.

Referring to the proposed charge in the case of chimney fires Cllr. J. Hurley thought that this could back-lash as people in poor circumstances might not call the brigade and this could mean that houses would burn down.

Cllr. B. Kynne said that the Manager was in an impossible position about the Estimates as the Council was short of £1.3 million in unpaid agricultural rates and he asked how Waterford Co. Council could survive with a shortfall of that amount.

Cllr. W. McDonnell described the statement of Cllr. Kynne as a scandalous attack on Irish farmers. They had heard similar attacks from Cllr. Kynne over the past twelve months. "But," said Cllr. McDonnell, "I will stand for no more of it and if such an attack is made again by Cllr. Kynne I will leave the meeting in protest."

Cllr. Hurley said that Cllr. Kynne had spoken a lot of stupidity as everyone knew that farmers were paying their way.

Cllr. J. A. Walsh said that 72 per cent of farmers were in the £6,500-£7,000 income bracket and that was the reason the tax returns in their cases were not great.

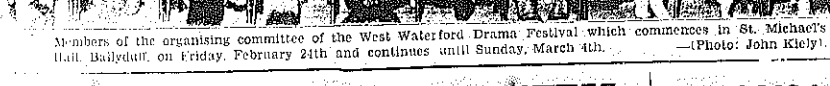
Death Of Miss Alice Creagh
