## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### THE COST OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The members of Waterford County Council succeeded in their second attempt last Monday in striking a rate and agreeing to charges which will enable the Council to meet its financial commitments for the coming year. For all those present at the meeting, the 15 members who voted in favour of the resolution which was approved as well as the 4 who opposed it, the decision was not a pleasant one. Neither was the task of the Co. Manager, which he described himself as an impossible one, in presenting the estimate, a pleasant one. All were on the horns of a dilemma and in the circumstances did the best that they possibly could.

The money to finance the £14.342 million budget of the Council had to be found in order to maintain the public services which people have now come to accept as normal and with a shortfall of £463,000 because the Department of the Environment had limited the domestic subsidy and rates in lieu of land to 8 of one per cent for 1984, the immense difficulties facing the officials and members of the Council in providing the money required cannot be too difficult to understand.

Further difficulties will now have to be faced in view of the fact that the Department's Road Grant Allocation for 1984 as notified to the Council only last week totals £1.982 million. This prompted Dan Hurley to remark at last Monday's meeting that he was appalled and gravely disappointed at how little had been allocated to Waterford. He warned that it was imperative for the Council to seek an increase in the allocation if further jobs are not to be lost and a very critical situation as far as roads were concerned was to be avoided before the year's end.

In this regard we note that the Environment Minister, Labour Deputy Liam Kavanagh, was more than generous to his own home constituency of Co. Wicklow, almost doubling their road grant allocation for 1984 and doing the same for the Urban authorities within that constituency. We have a boast in the Waterford Constituency of having a senior Minister in the Cabinet and also a Junior Minister in the Government and while neither are involved in the Department of the Environment, it should not be beyond the bounds of possibility that their combined efforts should result in a bigger slice of the cake for Waterford. After all, what's sauce for the goose should be sauce for the gander!

A deputation has been appointed to see the Minister for the Environment in Dublin (if it can be arranged) to seek an increase in the "appalling" allocation made to Waterford and we will await with interest the outcome of this meeting.

**VANDALS LOOSE IN DUNGARVAN**

We must condemn in the strongest possible terms the vandals who felt a trail of destruction and damage be-

hind them as they roamed loose around Dungarvan last week-end.

The main targets were the shrubs, plants, flowers and trees which have done so much to beautify the town and which have been the source of widespread admiration since they were introduced a couple of years ago. Thanks to the initiative of County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, this planting scheme was commenced following the establishment of a nursery in Dungarvan and a new gardening section under the umbrella of the local Urban Council. Ornamental containers were purchased and placed at vantage points in the town; around the Square in the beginning but with the passage of time to practically all parts of the urban area.

Amazingly, and contrary to expectations, the containers and their shrubs and flowers were not interfered with then and were allowed to blossom and grow and bring new life and colour wherever they were placed. The civilised reaction of the community and especially of that section who might be expected to act otherwise gave those responsible for the introduction of the new planting scheme a warm feeling. It showed that their efforts were generally appreciated and they were given in their praise (as indeed we were also in this column) for the manner in which it was received.

The expansion of the scheme has continued in the couple of years since it was commenced and with the exception of a few minor incidents the containers were left unharmed and untouched.

That was until last week-end when an apparently uncivilised group of young vandals (we must assume that they were young) went on a rampage around the town and in parts of Abbey-side.

The shrubs and plants placed near the old Market House at Lower Main Street which now houses the town's newly established Museum were torn up and removed as were the trees and shrubs in the containers in the vicinity of the Christian Brothers' schools. Further out in Abbey-side, vandalism of an even worse form was perpetrated when a number of young ornamental trees growing in the green space by the old railway line near the new housing estate at Sea Park were attacked and cut with saws.

There can be no excuse for this type of wanton damage and destruction and it must be condemned out of hand and if those responsible are caught they should be dealt with without leniency.

**FROM DUNGARVAN**

A native of Dungarvan, Mr. Condon was educated at St.

Augustine's College, Dungarvan, Copewood College, Ballinacorney, Co. Limerick and U.C.C. where he studied Dairy Science.

He joined Waterford Co-op's Production and Product Development Department and was appointed Production Manager in 1955. He joined CTT in November 1969 and served in the Marketing Advisory Division in London and Dublin. In June 1970 he was appointed Assistant Chief Executive for Development with responsibility for corporate planning and the development of new services and projects.

Mr. Condon who is married with 4 children is a member of the Taoiseach's Central Development Committee, a Council Member of the Irish Management Institute, a member of the Marketing Advisory Group of U.C.D. and a member of the Council of Gorta. He was President of the Marketing Institute of Ireland from 1987 to 1983.

## Co. Council Approves Increased Rate, Water And Scavenging Charges

Waterford County Council at their adjourned Estimates meeting in Dungarvan last Monday approved by 15 votes to 4 a rate of 221.23 in the £ which is an increase of 21.23 on last year's figure. The rate provides for a total expenditure for the year of £14,342,190, an increase of £1,538,945 of which the main items are Loan Charges £2,768,000, Remuneration £350,000, Goods and Services £370,045.

Clr. P. Coffey, Chairman re-

called that when the Council adjourned consideration of the estimates at the previous meeting he had proposed that the Manager's suggestion to increase the domestic water charges from 245 to 255 be reduced by 23 but this had not been put to the members. He now proposed the same resolution again.

Clr. J. A. Walsh said that if they were going to do it for domestic users he felt they should also provide some reduction for those on metered supplies.

**TOP HEAVY**

Clr. O'Riain said that no one would like to see any staff, indoor or outdoor, being left so. "But," he said "I'd like to ask a simple question: are the top-heavy engineers: how many have we now employed?"

In reply to Senator Bulbulis the Manager said that to reduce the metered water charges pro rata to the proposed reduction in the domestic water charges would cost about £5,000.

Senator Bulbulis then proposed and the Chairman Clr. P. Coffey seconded that the rate as presented by the Co. Manager be approved and that the charges for domestic water be cut to 252 with a pro rata reduction for metered supplies to 202 per 100 gallons.

The Manager said that if this meant a settlement of the issue he would accept the proposal and find the £25,000 involved in the reduction of water charges by having a better and earlier collection of the amounts due.

CAPPOQUIN GIRL'S BODY RECOVERED FROM BLACKWATER

Almost a month after she had been officially reported missing, the body of a 15-year-old Cappoquin schoolgirl was recovered from the River Blackwater near the town last Sunday afternoon.

While strolling in the spring sunshine shortly after 2 o'clock, local people saw the body of the girl in the river.

The grim discovery has brought to tragic realisation the worst fears of Cappoquin's entire population, many of whom had assisted in the numerous organised searches of the river which included the utilisation of Garda and civilian sub-aqua divers on several occasions.

Often the searches were hampered by the badly swollen waters of the Blackwater, and in fact, three successive weekend searches of large stretches of the river proved abortive.

Loreto, described by her teachers and fellow students at the local St. Anne's Secondary School, as an extremely quiet and lovely girl, had not been seen by anyone since the evening of January 31, when she left the school around 4 p.m. after completing her studies.

She did not return home, however, but left her schoolbag at the front door with reports of a note inside it for her parents. About half an hour after leaving the school, she was sighted on the parapet of Cappoquin Bridge overlooking the River Blackwater.

Since then some of the most concerted searches ever of the Blackwater were undertaken including parts of the river which, tragically, have claimed a number of lives over the past decade.

Throughout last Thursday, Saturday and Sunday, in fact, members of the Emergency River Search and Rescue Unit, who were part of the many river searches, were particularly busy in the area.

Loreto's body was removed to Dungarvan Hospital, where a post mortem examination was carried out. An inquest will also be held at a later date.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN

DUNGARVAN COMMUNITY INFORMATION CENTRE
Q - I am a married woman with two children. My husband is a full-time student without any income of his own. As a family we depend on my husband's income from my job. Recently, I was made redundant. I've been told that I can only claim 230 (Unemployment Benefit and Family-Related Benefit) - 581 in all. I can't claim anything for my husband or my children. I want to know if anything can be done.

A - As present a married woman is regarded as a dependent for social welfare purposes. This applies even if she is the breadwinner as in your case. It means that you cannot claim your husband as a dependent. In fact, the only situation where you could claim your husband as a dependent is if he was an invalid being wholly or mainly maintained by you. The children are also regarded as dependants of your husband and therefore you cannot claim dependants allowance for them.

The flat rate Unemployment Benefit that you get is 24.20 per week less than a man on a similar basis. As a married woman you are also entitled to a number of other benefits. Everybody else over eighteen years can get the payment for loss of wages. All these restrictions occur in the case of married women despite the fact that they contribute to social insurance at the same rate (14.5%) as everyone else.

The only positive thing that can be said is that these types of discrimination will be ended by 1994 because of the implementation of an EEC Directive.

# Unemployment in County On Increase Says Co. Manager

In his report to the Estimates meeting of Waterford County Council, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, has indicated that the unemployment situation in the county is a serious one and that the County Development Office is working hard to combat it.

Land Use Planning - A review of the County Development Plan was adopted by the Council in 1983. The Plan for 1984 is being prepared and will be presented for adoption by the Council in the near future.

Small Industry - Small industry is defined as those firms employing up to 50 persons. The promotion of Small Industry in the County is the main priority of the County Development Office.

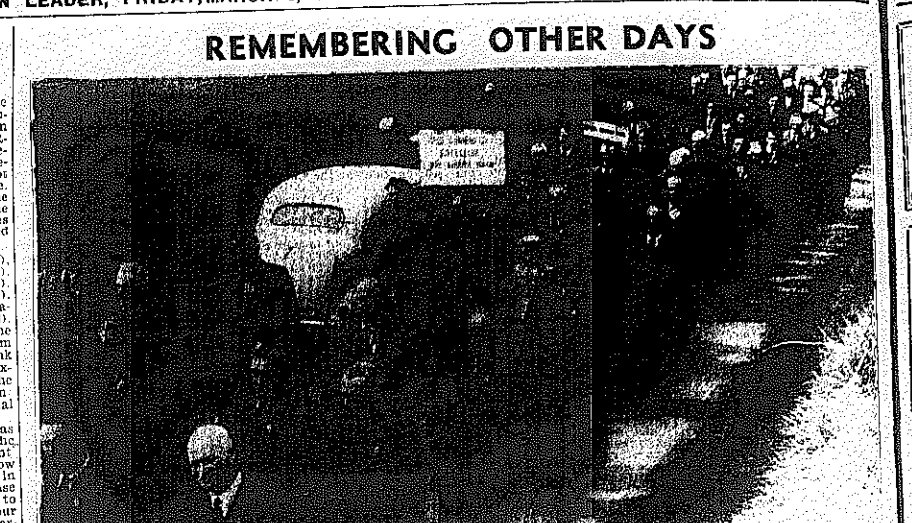
