THE NATIONAL FESTIVAL
The National Festival year-
ling St. Patrick's Day which
falls on Saturday next will be
observed over the week-end by
special functions and celebra-
tions throughout the
country. Special emphasis
will be placed, as usual, on

Main attraction for Dun-
garvan and West Waterford
will be the usual St. Pat-

**SEVENTEEN IN THE
QUEUE**

At their recent Estimates
meeting, Waterford County
Council unanimously decided
to request the Minister for
the Environment, Mr. Liam
Kavanagh, to receive a deputation
to discuss the need to
increase the amount of the
Road Grant which he had al-
located to County Waterford
for 1984.

They had been told by the
County Manager, Mr. Dan
Hurley, that he was appalled
at how little they had got in
this year's allocation and that
if the amount as presented
would be further job losses
(in addition to those expect-
ed as a result of the cut-back
in the general rate) right ac-
ross the board.

This information prompted
Kilmeaden Councillor Paddy
Cahill to declare that as the
Minister had not given Wa-
terford the money they were
entitled to they should call
on him to resign altogether.
This call, however, found no
response among the other
members of the Council.

In the interim, the request
to the Minister to receive a
deputation from the Council
was forwarded to the Depart-
ment and at their monthly
meeting in Dungarvan last
Monday the Secretary told
the members that he had
been informed by the Depart-
ment that there were seven-
teen Councils ahead of Wa-
terford in the queue seeking
to meet the Minister! They
were assured however that
he would meet the Waterford

Mocollop House Burnt Out After Bombing Raid

The people of the quiet vil-
lage of Ballyduff in the peace-
ful valley of the Blackwater in
West Waterford were shocked
by an outrageous incident on
last Sunday morning when two
armed and masked men broke
into Mocollop House, the resi-
dence of Mr and Mrs. Denis
Canning, tied up and placed a
bomb over Mrs. Canning's head
and removed her to an out-
house before placing two in-
cendiary devices which subse-
quently exploded, setting fire to
the house which was completely
burnt out. At the time Mr.
Canning was absent, having
gone to Mass at St. Michael's
Church about two miles away.

The terrifying experience of
72-year-old Mrs. Ann Canning
began shortly after 11 a.m.
when she was alone in the house
and the two masked men burst
into the residence. They tied
her up, gagged her mouth and
put a hood over her head drag-
ging her to an outhouse.

Shortly after, she heard a great
explosion in the driveway which
joins the main Ballyduff-Fermoy
road and then heard two loud
explosions.

Gardaí believe the two men
placed incendiary devices in the
2-storey, 18th century period
residence and these exploded
setting off the fire. Within
minutes the house with its
priceless contents of
antiques, Georgian furniture
and a large amount of money
were destroyed in the fire.

While the house was blazing,
Mrs. Canning, who had been
at an earlier Mass, managed to
free herself and make her way
to the main road where she was
seen by a passing motorist, local
postman, Mr. Tommy Enright.
Another local man, Mr. Pat
Flynn, then arrived on the
scene and it was he who drove
Mrs. Canning to Tallow where
she was treated for shock by
Dr. Cantillon. Mr. Flynn later
told the Press: "I succeeded in
getting the hood off Mrs. Can-
ning's head. She was shaking
and very frightened."

THE ONE DAY A WEEK BUS SERVICE TO ARDMORE

Arising from criticisms raised
by Chris P. Kennedy and
John O'Brien at a previous
meeting concerning the cur-
tailment of the bus service to
Ardmore and Old Parish, the
following letter from Mr. J. A.
O'Connor, Area Manager, C.I.E.,
Waterford, was read at the
monthly meeting of Waterford
Co. Council in Dungarvan last
Monday.

"I refer to your letter of the
26th January, 1984 to the Min-
ister for Transport which has
now been passed to me for at-
tention and direct reply.

"Arising from lack of support
it was found necessary to re-
duce the frequency of bus ser-
vices as between Dungarvan
and Ardmore on this route be-
cause of the low revenue in-
come which had made the ser-
vices concerned grossly un-
profitable. It was obvious from
surveys carried out that a one
day per week service was suf-
ficient to cater for the passen-
ger potential offering more par-
ticularly in Winter time and
the service curtailments came
into operation on the 9th Janu-
ary, 1984.

"Some 7,121 primary school
children availed of the bus ser-
vice concerned but this occur-
red in the afternoon only
when the children were return-
ing home from school. While it
is appreciated that the children
concerned may have suffered
inconvenience in the after-
noons their non-attendance at
school cannot be attributed to
the bus service curtailment
concerned.

"In relation to the general
curtailment I would mention
that it is intended to restore
the twice daily weekday ser-
vice between Dungarvan and
Ardmore during the months of
July and August when there is
a demand for a service of this
frequency."

"Mr. O'Brien said that it was
unfortunate that the day on
which the one day a week ser-
vice now went to Ardmore was
on Saturdays as this was
found to be most unsuitable,
especially by pensioners who
would want to go to Ardmore
on Fridays to draw their pen-
sion." He recommended that
they refer this back to CIE on
that basis and the Council
agreed.

MINISTERS REPLY ON NEWSPAPERS TAX DEPLORED

Referring to a resolution
from the Council passed at
their January meeting calling
for a reduction of the 23 per
cent VAT charged on all Irish
newspapers, a letter was read
from the Secretary of the Min-
ister for Finance, Mr. Denis
Leahy, at the monthly meeting of Wa-
terford Co. Council in Dungarvan
last Monday which stated that
the Minister had carefully
noted the points raised in the
resolution.

It added: "The Minister
would point out that VAT at 23
per cent applies to all news-
papers whether domestically
produced or imported into this
country. The rate of VAT on
newspapers was not increased
in this year's Budget."

Mr. P. Cahill who proposed
the original resolution said
that he was entirely disap-
pointed with the Minister's reply
and he proposed that the mat-
ter be referred back to him
with a request that he consider
the position.

Mr. C. O. Rain referred to
the "triple" which was in the
papers coming in from Britain
and said that as far as he was
concerned he did not want to
see these foreign papers coming
into the country. "There was
far more information in the
