PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

STAND UP AND BE COUNTED

It is to be hoped that the appeal made to the general public by County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, at the opening of the new Sports Centre in Dungarvan last Friday evening, to stand up and be counted in seeing to it that the magnificent recreation complex is properly maintained and preserved from the activities of vandals will be noted and put into effect.

In recent weeks a fresh rash of vandalism has broken out in the town and environs with attacks on the shrubs, flowers and trees which the Garden Section of the local Urban Council have so carefully placed throughout the town in recent years.

Following a complaint from local residents last week-end, we visited what older people in Abbeyside will know as the "new road" - the entrance to the beach from the junction of Friar's Walk and Seachtrine - and saw where a number of trees had been cut down and removed. We were unable to find any evidence of an added complaint that a barrier of trees had been placed across the road, impeding the passage, but at the time we went there, it was Sunday afternoon, this had probably been removed.

These facts lend added significance to the call made by the County Manager that the people of Dungarvan should not tolerate vandalism of any kind where the new sports centre is concerned. The town has now been presented with a magnificent 400,000 leisure facility and the best way of showing how we appreciate this is to ensure that it is maintained and cared for properly.

The complex which provides for a variety of activities should attract not only the youth but the senior citizens as well and the County Manager who was primarily responsible for motivating the people into reality stressed this point at the opening of the Centre. As he said, the planning, development and building of the complex was the result of a tremendous team effort in which the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White and Mr. Pat Walsh, Town Engineer played leading roles. The outlay for the project was funded jointly by the Urban and County Councils and by the Department.

We trust that the Centre will live up to the hopes expressed for it in the future and that it will become a focus of activity for leisure and pleasure in the town and district.

Any further weakening of Garda strength in country districts must be deplored and every effort possible should be made to ensure that such a plan is not activated. From the discussion, it appears that the re-organisation proposals are part of an internal plan worked-out by the top-ranking officers of the Garda Force and have nothing to do

Official Opening Of Dungarvan's New £400,000 Sports Centre

Dungarvan's new Sports Centre was blessed and officially opened in a simple ceremony on last Friday evening. Located on a 12 acre site at Gaumn's it looks out on to Dungarvan Bay and will provide facilities for a multitude of sports activities including volleyball, badminton, basketball, indoor soccer, hockey and gymnastics, with a spectators overhead gallery to accommodate 200. The Centre also contains toilet and shower facilities and meeting rooms.

Nearby on the same site is the new almost completed new premises of Dungarvan Youth Club and the South Eastern Health Board have reserved a site there for a new Day Care Centre while the Department of Education has given approval for the building of a new Vocational School on another part of the site.

The official opening was performed jointly by the Chairman of Waterford Urban Council, Cllr. R. A. Walsh and the Chairman of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. P. Coffey following the eucumenical blessing of the new Centre by Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P. Abbeyside, and by Rt. Rev. Liam Gilbert Maves, C. of L., Dean.

Main Contractors for the new 400,000 Centre were Felbarr Construction Ltd. and the Architects were Niall Hyde and Partners, Dublin. The project was funded jointly by Dungarvan Urban Council who provided the site and Waterford Co. Council who provided the labour, provided a grant of £100,000.

Cllr. Walsh in the course of his address said that he was very pleased that the South Eastern Health Board had now accepted the invitation to locate a Day Centre on the site and that the Vocational Education Committee had agreed to build a new school there.

Pointing out the many facilities that the Sports Centre would provide, Mr. Hurley said that it was not allowed to be vandalised in any way.

Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager, said that the occasion was indeed a great one for Dungarvan as it represented the completion of the first step for the further development of the area. He was very pleased that the South Eastern Health Board had now accepted the

invitation to locate a Day Centre on the site and that the Vocational Education Committee had agreed to build a new school there.

Mr. Hurley went on to say that the project had been the result of a tremendous team effort and he paid a special tribute to the outstanding parts which they had played in its planning and development.

The attendance also included Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D., Minister for Agriculture, Mr. J. Falvey, T.D., Very Rev. M. Canon Farrell, P.P., Abbeyside, Mr. T. McManus, Dept. of Labour, members and senior officials of the Urban and County Councils, and of the Vocational Education Committee and the general public. The occasion was favoured with beautiful weather which made it most pleasant for all.

Mr. Tom Keith, the newly appointed Manager of the Centre acted as M.C. throughout the ceremony.

Following the official opening a reception was held to mark the occasion at Whitechurch House Hotel.

CO. MANAGER'S HOPES FOR NO STAFF LAY-OFFS

At the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Friday references were made to the possibility of job losses as mentioned during discussions at the Council's Estimates meetings in the previous month and the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, said that he had studied the financial situation further since then and he assured the members that as a result there would be no staff lay-offs in the near future and he added: "I hope that we will be able to get through the rest of the year on that basis."

Mr. Hurley said that the position was that some jobs might not be filled but they would be monitoring the situation on a month to month basis. Members generally expressed satisfaction at this statement by the Manager.

Council Protest At Plan To Downgrade Rural Garda Station

Waterford Co. Council are to protest in the strongest terms possible to the Garda Commissioner, Mr. Laurence Wren, against proposals to re-organise the Garda Síochána by cutting out rural Ireland which would result in the downgrading of Garda Stations in all rural areas.

This decision was reached at the monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last Friday when the proposal of Cllr. M. Heiney, Portlaw, it was agreed that Standing Orders should be suspended to allow the Council to discuss the situation.

Cllr. Heiney said that it had come to his notice that a re-organisation of the Garda Síochána throughout rural Ireland was planned under which Garda stations in rural areas would be closed and Garda would be sent out in squad cars from central areas to patrol the various districts. This, he said, was totally unacceptable as far as he was concerned. At present things were bad enough with vandals roaming the countryside and old people being robbed and beaten up by the Gardaí were to be taken out of rural Ireland things would be worse, said Cllr. Heiney, "is to prevent crime and not to catch criminals after they have committed crimes and I propose that we protest and make the strongest possible representations to stop this re-organisation."

Cllr. P. Coffey, Chairman supporting the proposal said that he had lately come to his notice that it was the policy from the top to close the smaller Garda stations throughout the country in favour of larger stations.

The Chairman, Cllr. P. Coffey, remarked that Cllr. Goode was very naive to think that any compliance would be taken by the government of resolutions such as about VAT and things like that passed by the Council.

It was agreed to refer the matter back to the Minister for a reply.

When Cllr. W. Kenneally asked whether the Council had been requested to do anything in particular to assist the Rothman's Circuit of Ireland Rally which would be making Waterford its headquarters for the Easter week-end at a meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Friday, he was informed by the Acting Co. Secretary, Mr. Paul Clerkin, that arrangements had been made to close certain roads as requested.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager, said that the Rally organisers were looking after all these things themselves and the Council would be only too glad to assist and facilitate in any way they could.

Cllr. Kenneally said that the occasion would be a great one for the county and it would mean that an amount of money would be spent by visitors. He felt that anything that the Council could do to lend a festive air to the occasion should be done and that the roads in the area would be cleaned up.

The Co. Manager said that this would indeed be done and he also agreed that Tramore Falthe be asked to erect buildings in the area for the occasion.

C.I.E. REGRETS ON DUNGARVAN/ARDMORE BUS SERVICE

A letter from C.I.E. was read at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Friday in reply to the Council's request made at a previous meeting that the present weekly bus service between Dungarvan and Ardmore operate on Fridays rather than Saturdays. The letter expressed regret that C.I.E. found it was not possible to make the alteration requested but pointed out that the service would operate twice weekly in July and August.

Cllr. John O'Brien said that he was very disappointed with this reply from C.I.E. As he had previously pointed out the present service was useless and C.I.E. had been told this as Friday was the day on which pensioners especially would use it.

Cllr. P. Kenneally said that if the service was run on Fridays instead of Saturdays it would prove a great advantage to people in the Ring and Old Parish areas who wanted to go to Ardmore on that day. This service was no good to them on Saturdays.

Criticising C.I.E. for their attitude in the matter, Cllr. Kenneally commented that when matters like this are concerned there should be some co-operation shown by semi-state bodies such as C.I.E. where they concern the public.

On the proposal of Cllr. W. Kenneally who said that the Council should not let the matter rest, it was agreed to write back to C.I.E. and ask them if they could re-organise their school schedules so as to provide for the alteration asked for by the Council.



IFA LEADER CLARIFIES HEALTH CONTRIBUTIONS AND LEVIES POLICY

Mr. Michael Kelly, Chairman of the IFA, in a recent statement said that IFA wishes to advise its members on policy in relation to payment of Health Contributions and Levies as follows:

POLICY POSITION

1. IFA advise farmers to pay Health Contributions and Levies fully, arrears included.
2. IFA advise farmers that the demands issued to them from their local Health Board for health contributions and levies plus arrears up to the end of April 5, 1984 are based on estimates of gross income in the majority of cases. Therefore the current demand could be excessive.
3. IFA advise farmers that where they know their income for each year up to April 5, 1984, they should pay all health contributions and levies on a taxable income basis after deduction of personal allowances and relief allowances and before deduction of personal allowances and reliefs, (i.e., a net income basis).

IFA advise farmers that where they do not know their income, they should estimate their income on a net income basis after deduction of personal allowances for the farm and to pay the due amount each year to their health board promptly.

IFA advise farmers that they have a statutory obligation to pay Health Contributions and Levies but that they have a moral and financial responsibility to their families to pay only the just amount in line with the relative burden on all other taxpayers.

Accordingly, IFA advise farmers to determine their net income and pay on a net income basis or "taxable income before personal allowances and reliefs" where farmers cannot agree the level of income for a particular year with their health board they should be prepared to make an account payment and settle with their health board the following year.

5. Part-time farmers who are in receipt of income from PAYE sources and who contribute towards PRSI with their health board should note that health contributions and levies on all other income sources including income from the farm, they should note that health contributions on a continuous basis should guarantee their medical cover in the interim.

6. Every person in receipt of income from either PAYE or a self-employed source is liable for health contributions and levies plus arrears. If a person is married and wife each separately earn an income they are both separately liable to health contributions and levies. They cannot aggregate their incomes in order to minimise payment.

Therefore if a farmer's wife owns land she will be separately liable for health contributions and levies purposes but if a wife is not a major help in rebuilding the farm or trade separately from her husband (i.e., she has no income) she will not be separately liable to return their demand notes for health contributions and levies plus arrears to their local Health Board stating "Nil income". In such cases all income from the farm accrues to the husband who is separately liable. Only in situations where wives have an income source are they liable.

7. Medical card holders are exempt from health contributions and levies. Accordingly IFA advise farmers who hold medical cards or certain pensions/allowances or benefits (see your local Health Board demand note) that they do not have to pay health contributions and levies. However, from 1984/85 onwards exemption from income tax will correlate with exemption from the Special Income Levy (1%). (i.e., only 1% health contribution and 1% Youth Employment Levy will be payable in such cases).

8. All farmers/taxpayers are liable to health contributions and levies irrespective of the level of income. Exemption or exclusion from income tax does not result in exemption from health contributions and levies. However, from 1984/85 onwards exemption from income tax will correlate with exemption from the Special Income Levy (1%). (i.e., only 1% health contribution and 1% Youth Employment Levy will be payable in such cases).

9. All health contributions and levies up to 5th April, 1984 are payable directly to your local Health Board.

10. All future payments of health contributions and levies (as and from 6th April 1984) will be assessable by the Revenue Commissioners and payable to the Collector-General.

BOY CYCLIST KILLED NEAR KILMATHOMAS

Eight years old Jason Brazil, Hillcrest, Kilmathomas, was killed instantly in a road accident which occurred on the main Dungarvan/Waterford road not far from his home last Sunday.

Jason, the second eldest of three sons, was cycling to visit his grandparents, who reside 5 miles away at Leamybrien, when he was struck from behind by a car travelling in the Dungarvan direction and died instantly.

His body was removed to Ardara Hospital, Waterford, where a post mortem examination was carried out. An inquest will be held later.

The boy's father, Mr. Liam Brazil, had left home earlier on Sunday morning to travel to Dublin for the P.A.I. Cup semi-final which was held at the Dungarvan U.C.D. but was stopped by Gardaí in Naas who informed him of the sad news that his son had been tragically killed in an accident.

GOVERNMENT TO BLAME FOR C.C.E. FINANCIAL CRISIS

In a statement issued by Labhras Ó Murchú, Director-General, last week, Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann say that the present financial problems of Comhaltas are not attributable to the movement itself but are due to the non-payment of Government capital grant which was promised in 1982; and (b) the reduction of our annual grant from Roinn na Gaeltachta which was reduced in 1982 from £125,000 to £110,000 and has been kept at that level since. This is unprecedented treatment for a cultural movement and particularly in view of the fact that the holding of grants and not the building of our new theatre complex which is causing the financial problems of Comhaltas.

If the capital grant had been paid on time and the level of annual funding maintained, Comhaltas would have an overdraft in the region of £100,000. Another factor which has contributed to the financial problems of Comhaltas has been that the Entertainment Grant of Comhaltas from the Arts Council has remained static at £50,000 out of a budget of £51 million for three years. Last year a survey requested by the Arts Council and carried out by the Lansdown Market Research Ltd. showed Irish traditional music in a premier position among the arts in Ireland, yet only 2% of the Council's budget is allocated to the music arts. Figures paid to other art forms i.e. ballet £400,000, opera £250,000, etc. We do not believe that the native art form is at least entitled to parity with these.

It is not correct, as stated by the Minister for the Gaeltacht, that only £22,000 was collected by Comhaltas in membership fees. This is the portion received by head-office after the branches, county boards and provincial councils have received their share. In addition, the Minister will note that Comhaltas also received several hundred thousand pounds from their own resources.

While we welcome the announcement from the Government that the long-awaited capital grant (first promised in 1982) will shortly be paid, the amount of £250,000 is £100,000 short of the equivalent sum promised. The second area to which we request the Government to address itself is the annual organisation grant to Comhaltas which was reduced in 1982 from £125,000 to £110,000 and has been kept at that level since.

The work programme of Comhaltas covers three continents; 45 headquarters clubs; 600 branches; 45 headquarters clubs; 750,000 people annually. This programme is coupled with the Irish Cultural Institute in London, the Irish Cultural Institute in Monksdown is now endangered. MAHER EXPRESSES SHOCK

Minister M.E.P. Mr. T. Maher said in a statement last weekend that it came as a great shock to him to learn that Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann were in such a serious financial trouble. They are playing a major role as a cultural organisation and have been excellent ambassadors of our country in America, Britain and Europe. At home their contribution in promoting our culture has been one of the success stories of the century.

Mr. Maher went on to say that he was pleased to hear that Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann has secured throughout Ireland for tourists and in this area it can be stated that they are making a positive contribution to the economy. In Irish culture and in Irish life it is one that we cannot afford to do without.

Investment Funds: Investor Funds increased by 25.81% to £199,281,227 the highest Rate of any of the Big Five Building Societies.

TOMMY WADE SUSPENDED FOLLOWING LISMORE POINT-TO-POINT INCIDENT

An inquiry at the Registry Office of the Turf Club in Dublin on Friday has the stewards of the IHSC withdrawn Tommy Wade's licence to ride with effect from May 1st, 1984 and declared him to be a disqualified person up to May 31, 1985.

The stewards found that Wade was in violation of Rule 273 - dealing with conduct of persons at race meetings including point-to-point. At the West Waterford/Lismore point-to-point on March 4, Shamrock Master, ridden by Michael Phillips, despite joining in the Open Maiden race after a circuit of the course had been completed, the stewards fined Phillips £100.

GRASSLAND RE-SEEDING
Reseed immediately. Cover seed very lightly and roll well. If undersowing, sow cover crop and grass seeds the same day. Spread one bag of 0.10.20 per acre on the surface for the grass seeds, as the fertiliser drilled with the cover crop will not be available to the grass seeds.
Select a grass seed mixture to suit your specific purpose.

GRASS TETANY
As grass growth improves there is an increased risk of grass tetany. Ensure that all cows are getting Colicined Magnestie as some cows may not be eating any ration. Each cow needs 2 ozs. per day.

CALVES
January/February born calves can now be turned out to fresh pasture that has not been grazed by cattle in the previous year. Continue meal feeding.

LIVESTOCK CHAIRMAN WELCOMES BEEF PACKAGE

The price package for beef, agreed by the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Deasy will be a major help in rebuilding our markets for cattle and beef in the EEO Community.

This was stated by Mr. Tim Boland, Chairman of IFA National Livestock Committee.

Mr. Boland said: "The retention of the variable premium, the call premium and the reduction of MCA's are to be welcomed. It is disappointing that the intervention price supports for cattle of equal quality throughout the Community will not be applicable for at least three years and in the meantime, there will be no support for young bull beef production in Ireland."

"The implications of the super levy on the additional supplies of cow beef in the Community must be counteracted by a vigorous marketing policy of increasing fresh at auction beef exports outside the Community. It is vital that the EEC export refunds remain at realistic levels to achieve beef exports of at least 750,000 tonnes this year."

"In January 1984, the Minister for Agriculture agreed to enquire into the value for money farmers are receiving for the excessive levy high meat inspection levies they are being forced to pay on their cattle. To date, we continue to be excessive over-manning of meat factory inspection personnel in our factories at a high cost to farmers. He called on the Minister to immediately reduce the meat inspection levy and also to reduce the number of personnel under employed for meat inspection."
