**PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT**

**WHAT A DIFFERENCE THE SUN MAKES**

Although as we write this, the "Mel" Office people are predicting an imminent break in the weather, we have had up to ten consecutive days of beautiful sunshine. And what a difference it has made for everyone. As we basked in the beautiful, bright warm rays of the sun it was easy to forget the gloom of the recession and somehow the bad news of closures, unemployment and a d killings which are so much part of our daily news bulletin nowadays, did not seem to have the same depressing effects.

Suddenly Winter had gone and Spring had rushed into Summer. Cloudless skies, day after day, saw the sun-worshippers quickly take on the golden skin tan normally reserved for those whose privilege it is to be able to travel to the various costas of the sol. We had Spain at home and had even "out-sunned" those Mediterranean resorts. Everything was beautiful and it was almost too good to be true.

But it made the Easter holiday break additionally memorable and as we pen these lines on Tuesday afternoon the sun is still shining outside, even if it has lost some of the warmth which it so generously bestowed on us last week.

So unexpected has been this phenomenal spell of weather that it seemed as if overnight, the renewal of Spring had been wished upon all like as the roadside trees and shrubs broke into blossom, flowers bloomed, the birds sang and indeed everything was beautiful. Praise the Lord that the fine spell still struggles on although we understand farmers are praying for a break.

**WATER POLLUTION FROM AGRICULTURE**

A report entitled "A Review of Water Pollution in Ireland" has been prepared by an Foras Forbartha at the request of the Water Pollution Actory Council. This report should be of particular interest to farmers and farming organisations in so far as it places great emphasis on the environmental damage which could be caused by water pollution from agriculture.

Briefly, the report points out that water pollution is caused by two main sources from agriculture: from land on which animal manures or effluents have been spread and from farmyard wastes such as silage effluent, soiled water and wash-water from milking parlours, dairies, un-roofed cattle yards and feeding areas, as well as seepage from dungheaps. Other potential sources of agricultural waste would include chemical fertilisers and agri-chemicals such as herbicides, fungicides, insecticides and growth regulators.

Of all these sources, silage effluent is the most potent and dangerous pollutant. In-gress of this effluent to rivers or lakes may have a devastating effect on fish populations and may cause serious pollution of water supplies for human consumption. Silage is being used increasingly as a fodder for cattle with the result that year by year there are increasing risks from silage effluent. Farmers must always make adequate provision for the storage and disposal of all silage effluent and should contact the local ACOT adviser whenever information about disposal of silage effluent is required.

The law in relation to water pollution from agriculture is embodied in the Local Government (Water Pollution) Act 1977, the Fisheries Act 1980 and the Local Government (Planning and Development) Acts of 1963 and 1967.

The object of the '77 Local

Government Act is to make more effective arrangements for control of water pollution and to ensure that the quality of water resources is maintained at a satisfactory standard consistent with their beneficial uses. The Act also makes arrangements to meet our obligations arising under the EEC Environment Programme. The penalties under this Act include heavy fines and even imprisonment in certain cases.

Under the Fisheries Act a person can be charged in respect of the passage of any "deleterious liquid" into any waters and the penalties under this are greater than those under the '77 Act referred to above.

With regard to the Local Government Planning and Development Acts, planning permission is required for all development "except for" "exempted developments". Unfortunately there is much confusion as to what constitutes "exempted developments" in agriculture and the regulations are being interpreted in different ways by different local authorities.

However, in general terms, if farmers adopt the following rule of thumb, they should not find themselves in conflict with any of these Acts: Collect all silage effluent all soiled water from milking parlours, dairies, un-roofed cattle units, open loose yards (including exercise yards, self-feed silos and silage areas), seepage from dungheaps—and spread on land so as not to give rise to surface run-off or seepage into land drains.

It is important that such steps are taken if we are to ensure that pollution will not be destroyed that our rivers and lakes remain free from the poison which could kill off our fish population.

**50 QUID A GO!**

At a recent press conference in Dublin, the General Secretary of the Association of Higher Civil Servants, Mr. John Dowling, said that the increase in the number of parliamentary questions asked of the Dail and the representations by politicians on behalf of a minority of their constituents were reducing the service which the Civil Service could provide for the majority of citizens.

The press conference marked the release by the Association of their submission on matters relating to the role of the Civil Service to the Minister for the Public Service, Mr. John Boland, T.D.

The submission recommended, among other things, that parliamentary questions be restricted to matters not appropriate for consideration by the Ombudsman, such as policy issues.

It had been estimated a few years ago, Mr. Dowling said, that each parliamentary question cost £50 to answer and this figure had probably gone up since. He referred to the inordinate cost in time and resources of certain kinds of parliamentary questions and representations which are totally hidden to the general public and possibly to Ministers too and said that the appointment of the Ombudsman now provided an alternative avenue of approach for anyone who felt the civil service was not providing the service expected.

The overall cost of processing these Dail questions in the course of a full year, if the figure quoted by Mr. Dowling is correct, must run into a colossal amount. In the latest copy of the Official Dail Report (which records the discussions and happenings of Dail-Eireann for each sitting day) that we have to hand we find that about 40 questions were down for answer on April 12. This, we believe, was a light question-

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**Local Group To Combat The Drug Problem**

In the last few years, one of the most sinister developments that we have witnessed in Ireland is the ever growing problem of drug abuse. By all standards the problem has reached crisis proportions in Dublin and has penetrated right through our cities, towns and countryside. The implications of this are all too obvious and the fact that the majority of our population are young people, makes our country uniquely vulnerable. As more and more people become aware of the drug environment which has seeped into all levels of our society, there have been a number of laudable responses to combat the problem. Yet one thing remains quite certain; unless comprehensive measures are taken to curb and reduce the problem, it will get steadily worse in time.

In Waterford, steps were taken recently to set up a comprehensive drug abuse prevention programme. Earlier this year a number of preliminary meetings were held of people who have been working in the field of drugs abuse and the social problems associated with it. As a result, on 5th April, 1984, the WATERFORD DRUG ABUSE RESOURCE GROUP, which consists of representatives of various voluntary and statutory groups, was established.

The members of the group are: Chairman, Fr. John Lawless (Waterford Regional Youth Council); Secretary, Dr. Martin O'Boyle (Senior Area Medical Officer with S.E.H.B.); Treasurer, John Walsh, S.E.H.B. (Mental Health Committee); Dr. C. A. Kelly, D.C.C. and M.O.H.; Mr. R. P. Doyle (Supt. Community Welfare Officer), Joe Gough (Youth Officer, Waterford Youth Committee); Richard Meagher (Youth Worker) Bro. Columbanus, O.F.M. (Drug Abuse Counsellor).

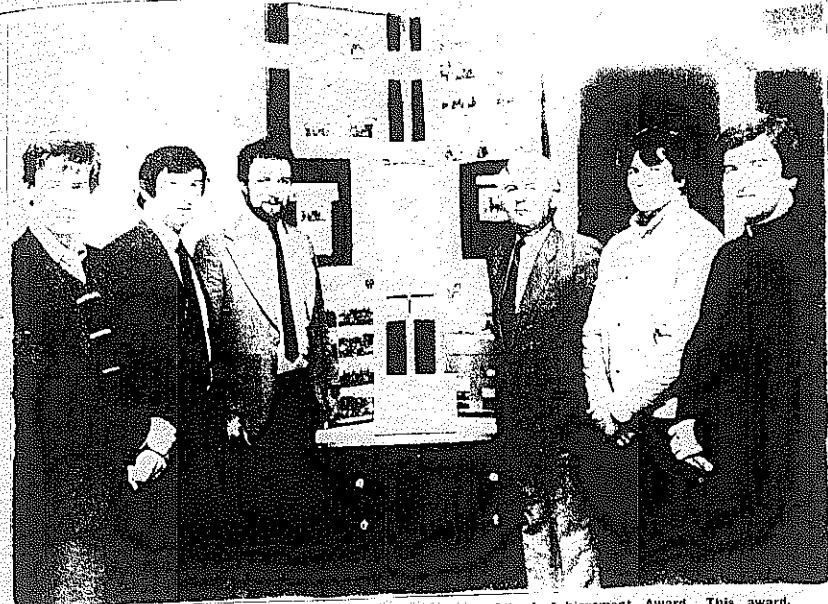
