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LET'S HAVE GOOD MANNERS

In little more than a week Mr. Ronald Reagan, President of the United States of America, will spend a week-end in Ireland as a guest of the Government and it is proper that he should be accorded every courtesy and honour. In saying this let us add that to welcome and honour the President of the United States is not necessarily to express agreement with the policies pursued by his administration.

In recent weeks what appears to be a very vociferous minority opposed to this visit have been making full use of every means at their disposal to make themselves heard. If we were to believe all that these dissenters have said and are saying about President Reagan, we would have to accept that he is almost the incarnation of the evil devil himself. We have seen the names of many of these dissenters listed in a recent Press Release from the 'Irish Campaign Against Reagan's Foreign Policy' and we are satisfied that they include known Communists, smoked salmon socialists, liberals of the far left and such like.

But in our ordinary way we believe that the majority of the people of Ireland do not belong to the new trendy left, whether clerical or lay, even though the latter are orchestrating their opposition in order to raise the loudest possible clamour. In all the voices of opposition against President Reagan where are the protests against Russian foreign policy—a policy in which genocide is as much a part as is a domestic policy of suppression of civil liberties in the cruelest possible way? It is no excuse to say that the Russian Head of State is not visiting us.

It could be made beautiful. Prompted by a letter from Mrs. M. J. Power, a resident of Abbeyside, which came to us last week-end, we paid a visit to the old Dungarvan-Waterford railway line at Abbeyside last Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Power's letter protested at the manner in which the place has been vandalised with graffiti and strewn with litter which includes old fridges, bicycles, as well as rubbish of all sorts.

She then asks: "Could it not be cleaned up by some of the unemployed youth and made into a nice walk with flowers, trees and seats rather than the way it is which is a disgraceful wilderness. It could be nicely landscaped and this would make the area more beautiful."

This is indeed a fair question and having walked along the railway line from the Clonra Road to Sarsfield Street last Sunday afternoon we must fully agree with all that Mrs. Power stated in her letter.

We did find old rusted fridges and cooker frames there, a lot of huge stones and clay while under the New Line road bridge there was a proliferation of empty soft drink cans and evidence that the place is used as a public toilet. Toward the Sarsfield Street end, the long grass on each of the sloping sides had been cut—but whom we cannot say—but this had not been collected and removed and lay scattered on the ground, greatly adding to the generally uncared for look of the place. In fact it would have been much better had the grass not been cut rather than leaving it to be scattered all over the place as it was.

The original plan when this railway line was abandoned by CIE and it became the property of the County Council after long negotiations, was to develop a pedestrian way stretching from Strandside South in Abbeyside to Barnawee. Some work was done and the foundation for a good surface now exists there. If there was any possible chance of further development it would, without doubt, prove an added amenity for the area.

How much such a development would be appreciated was spelled out for us by that grand old man of Abbeyside, Pax O'Faolain, when we met walking there on Sunday afternoon. He pointed out how level the stretch was, drawing our attention to the gradient on the road outside with a rise of 12 feet from the entrance at Seepark to the New Line Bridge.

He also referred to the great shelter available there stating that he had walked there on the stormiest of days last winter without feeling a breeze—the wind just blew above the

level of the trees. He said that he had seen a lot of people walking there and that it was a very pleasant surprise to find it so well kept.

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Dungarvan River Anglers Express Concern About Town Dump Proposals

The Dungarvan Freshwater Anglers Club in furtherance of their campaign to prevent pollution in the river Colligan submitted a list of points in relation to the town dump at Ballinacross to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night. The points were raised following a visit by members and officials of the Council with members of the Angling Club to the dump site on the previous Friday night.

Point one asked whether planning permission was adhered to in relation to the fence that was promised to be erected at the dump and also where rubbish and most importantly what materials were to be dumped. "Does this mean that industrial waste could be dumped there?" it asked.

The memo then stated: "The new fence erected at the dump in early February this year, thus incorporating it into the dump. This, it was said, could mean access being denied if the other entrance to the dump is ever closed. It is requested that the original planning permission" be granted.

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MEMBERS' VIEWS

Cllr. R. Walsh, Chairman of the Council had met with Officers of the Anglers Club and had visited the dump site.

However the Town Engineer was not present at the Council meeting and he thought that the best thing to do was to obtain a report from Mr. Walsh on the points now raised by the Anglers Club.

Mr. D. Goode thought that the Council had done what it had to do about the dump and the water tests which had been carried out near the site in the Colligan had shown that there was no pollution.

Referring to the memo from the Anglers Club, Cllr. Goode said that this was unsigned and had no heading and he did not know where it came from.

The Chairman, Cllr. R. Walsh, said that Cllr. Goode had been at the dump site himself and he was not happy about the position there. "I saw a lot of water that shouldn't be there," he said.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the Anglers had expressed very reasonable observations and the points raised by them should be easily answered.

Cllr. J. Byrne said that he had also been on the visit made by members of the Council and he saw noxious waste flowing from the dump into the river. He had no doubt about that. He was shown a photograph of the area for the proposed extension of the dump at the week-end and this showed that the place was fully flooded at high tide.

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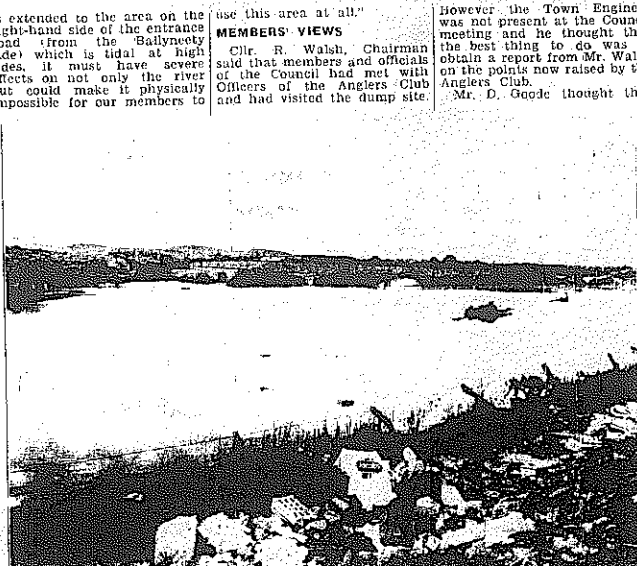
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Photographed above is the area for the proposed dump extension under heavy flooding. (Photo: John Tynan)

L.V.A. PRESIDENT'S REMARKS A SLUR ON THE G.A.A. SAYS CO. BOARD CHAIRMAN

The Chairman of the Waterford County Board of the G.A.A., Mr. James Tobin has issued a strongly worded statement denouncing certain comments made by the newly-elected President of the Irish Licensed Vintners Association, Mr. Tom McLaughlin of Waterford, following his election.

Mr. McLaughlin had stated in his post-provintial address that social clubs were operating as pubs to the detriment of bona fide licensed vintners, and he singled out G.A.A. clubs as the "worst offenders."

But now the G.A.A. County Board chairman has accused Mr. McLaughlin of casting a slur on the Association in Waterford. "When I asked him whether he had taken 'grave exception' to Mr. McLaughlin's remarks,

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PRAISE FOR MANAGER OF NEW SPORTS COMPLEX

At the May monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. B. Kyne voiced high praise for the Manager of the County Council's new Sports Centre at Guann's. Mr. Tom Keith. He said that he had been down at the centre a number of times recently and the time and effort which Mr. Keith was devoting to the centre was as far as he could see, beyond the call of duty.

Members referred to the centenary of the centre and it was pointed out that the stone-chips which were a feature of the centenary at the centre were being thrown around into the pipes, thus blocking the toilets. It was also stated that youngsters were just running through the shrubs and

flowers planted there and creating a great deal of damage. Cllr. Wade said that he had met a man who told him that he had seen some of the vandals in action at the centre. "When I asked him whether he would be afraid of being attacked if he did so," said Cllr. Wade.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that a great deal of the work at the centre was experimental. In regard to the stone-chips, he said that they had decided on these for an experimental period of six months but if they proved unsuitable he would have them taken up and replaced by tar-macadam.

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OIL FLOW IN DUNGARVAN

At the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night Cllr. D. Goode said that he was on Abbeyside bridge recently and noticed a lot of oil flowing out on the ebb tide. He said that he would be curious to find out if someone in the locality had been 'getting careless' in letting this oil off.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that full precautions were in operation at the Co-op Creamery but he believed that someone was dumping waste oil through the town drains.

Cllr. Goode said that he had not mentioned anyone in particular. Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that it would be unfair to mention any names in the absence of an investigation into the matter and he said that he would have this done by the County Council Pollution Dept.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager observed that recently was the first time he had seen the dump. He said that he would obtain reports from his officers on the points raised and he would prepare a composite report for the Council from these for the next meeting.

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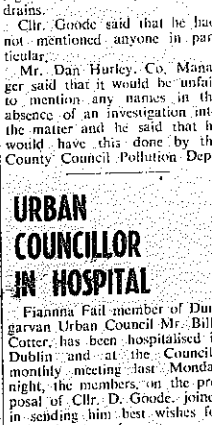

COUNTY WATERFORD TOPS IN TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION - SAYS BORD FAILTE

County Waterford is the best overall County in Ireland in the Tidy Towns Competition.

This is the conclusion of statistics issued recently by the Environmental Department of Bord Failte which indicate that the average marks per centre received in County Waterford during 1983 was 121.438, an average increase per centre of 5.250 marks on 1982.

The next nearest County was North Riding of Tipperary with 116.038 marks while the South Riding of Tipperary came third with 114.613 marks.

These results reflect great credit on the 16 towns and villages in the County who annually enter the competition and which have now brought County Waterford to the pinnacle of success. Great credit is due also to the interest taken by the local authorities in the appearance of the County which overall has contributed significantly to the tourism scene.

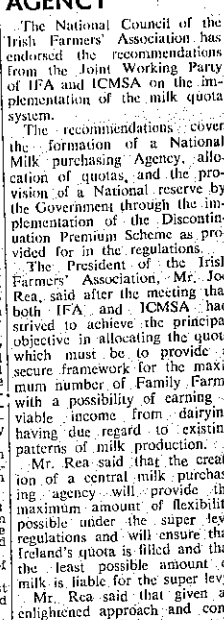
