PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

"FAREWELL MR. PRESIDENT" "GOOD-BYE, MISSUS" Well the great week-end has come and gone, the great man and his trail, charming wife, have been and gone again. We have been and thank God, it is all over and without any untoward incidents of any great significance. From the moment that President Reagan and his wife Nancy departed from Air Force 1 at Shannon last Friday evening until they took off on departure from Dublin Airport last Monday evening everything went off with a well-planned, dignified and impressive air.

However, on the engagement when the President and his wife had to fulfil over the two day period, a woman appeared, gave my attention to an on-behaviour on the visit to Ballyporeen, meeting between the acknowledgement and late in the afternoon, he escorted it as both his homecoming and the signpost of his visit to Ireland.

Contrary to varying degrees marked most of the other formal occasions and security mounted by the President's own personal body-guard and members of the U.S. Secret Service accompanying him was so evident as to be almost repressive at times. But in Ballyporeen it was different. Without doubt it turned out to be the most informal event of a week-end in which security kept the 40th President of the U.S. and his party out of reach at the welcoming crowds and at times, we must admit, protesting groups as well.

The first stop which the President and his wife made after landing in Ballyporeen was at the house of the Parish Priest, Very Rev. Fr. Johnny Murphy. Escorted by the Corate, Fr. Eanna Condon, they went to the point to look at the parish records and the one shabby smudged line that proved that President Reagan's great-grandfather was baptised in Ballyporeen.

As the VIP party emerged, Fr. Murphy came out leaning heavily on two sticks and sat down in a chair. He held a gold-wrapped parcel and announced with obvious delight that the President had not "come home" empty-handed but had brought the gift of a chalice which would be used for Communion in the Parish Church.

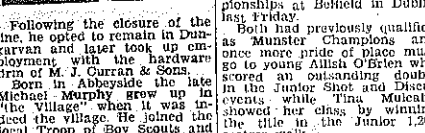
The party began to gather itself together to move on. Fr. Murphy leaned sideways in his chair and saw Mrs. Reagan standing by herself, half-screened by security men. He caught her eye and as she came forward he clasped his outstretched hand, he said "goodbye now, Missus, God bless. It was a farewell remark very typical of Fr. Johnny in its simplicity and so much in contrast to the formal "Farewell, Mr. President" for her husband as the Presidential party eventually prepared to depart from the village.

MR. MICHAEL MURPHY

It is with profound and the most sincere regret that we record the death of Mr. Michael Murphy, Caseviller, Dunganvan, which occurred at his home on Wednesday night, May 30. Although he had not enjoyed good health for some time previous, his death was nonetheless unexpected and came as a great shock to his beloved wife, loving family and a very wide circle of friends.

In his early 60s, Mick Murphy was the popular and highly efficient clerk at the C.E. freight department at Dunganvan Railway Station up to the time that the Waterford-Mallow rail line was closed. In that capacity for many years he became extremely popular with the many people who dealt with him for his courteous and understanding manner and for the helpful way in which he made himself available to everyone.



Following the closure of the line, he opted to remain in Dunganvan and later took up employment with the hardware firm of M. J. Curran & Sons. Born in Abbeystide the late Michael Murphy grew up in the village when it was indeed the local Troop of Boy Scouts and matured under the guidance of such men as James Nugent and Peter L. F. Lanigan who were benefactors of the club and performed in those years.

Always brimful of wit and humour, Mick Murphy or "Goola" as he was affectionately known to his intimate friends, was always the life and soul of the party at scout Troop meetings and at annual camps. A regular feature of the Abbeystide Scout Troop in those years, too, was the annual concert which always drew packed houses and it was Mick Murphy with other scouts such as Jimmy Nagle and the late Mick Clancy and the Troop Chorus, all trained by Liam Lanigan, who provided all the tun, mirth and merriment. He loved all kinds of sports and was a keen follower of hurling and football.

In the latter years of his life, Michael Murphy lived quietly at home and it was there, having watched a European, soccer final on the television on Wednesday night, that the end came and he slipped quietly and peacefully away to the great beyond. His wife who was with him at the end and of his entire family to all of whom we now extend our heartfelt sympathy.

A very large and most representative cortege accompanied the removal of his remains from the Killy Funeral Home to St. Mary's Parish Church on last Thursday evening where they were received and blessed by Rev. Fr. M. Cullinan, C.C., assisted by Rev. W. Carey, C.C. and Rev. C. O'Donnell, O.S.A. An Honour Guard of Abbeystide Scouts stood to attention as the remains were taken into the Church.

Requiem Mass was celebrated on Friday morning by Fr. Cullinan who also recited the final prayers assisted by Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P., V.E. Fr. Carey and Rev. C. O'Donnell, C.C. Ballylanceen as the remains left for St. Laurence's Cemetery, Ballinacorney where the burial took place in the presence of another large gathering of mourning relatives and friends. Chief mourners—Alice (wife), Sean, Paddy, Michael and Tony (sons), Kathleen and Ann (daughters), Tommy, St. Michael (brother), Crissie, London (sister), Anne, Ann and Stella (daughters-in-law), Steve Wallace (son-in-law), Mary Murphy and Mary Dwyer (sisters-in-law), Jackie Power and Paddy Power (brothers-in-law), and many, many, many nieces and grandchildren.

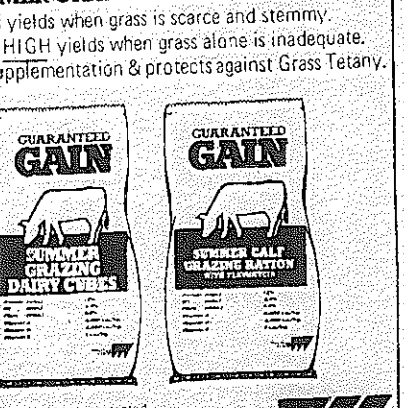

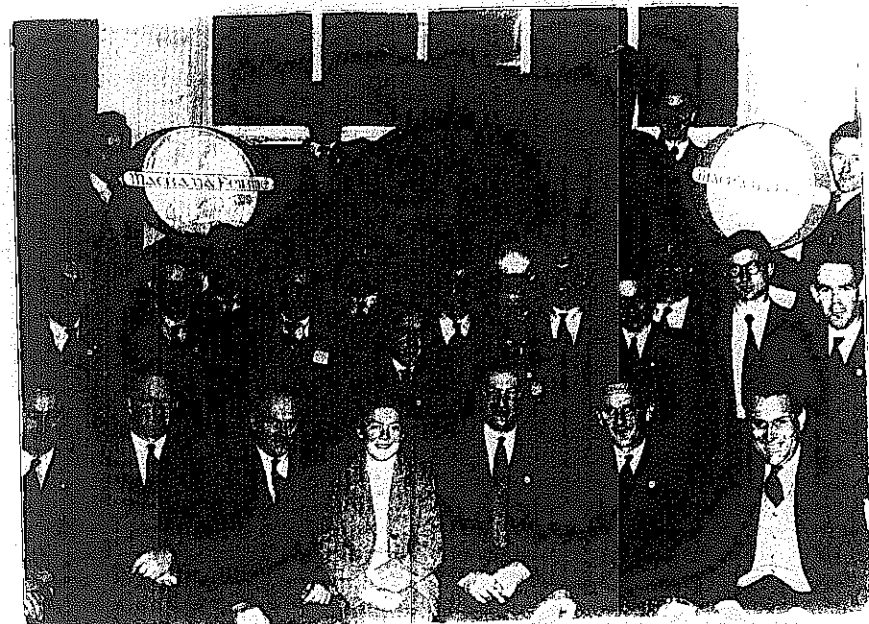
NATIONAL PLAN FOR AGRICULTURE NEEDED SAYS I.C.M.S.A. CHIEF

GRAIN GROWERS RE-ASSURED ON MOISTURE DECLARATIONS

Mr. Martin Breen, Chairman of the National Grain Committee, stated that he wished to allay the fears of grain growers who have been led to believe that the proposed Department of Agriculture Feed Regulations will be an attempt to have the moisture declaration requirement dropped.

The new regulations are a package deal and as well as the requirement for declaration of moisture in compound feeds and grains over certain minimum levels, 10% moisture for compound feeds and 15% moisture for grains, there will also be a requirement for declaration of moisture in feed supplements and sale of substitutes of bad and questionable quality.

Mr. Breen stated he felt that the moisture declaration requirement over 15% moisture will create an even more buoyant market at local level for ventilated grain because of the loss of moisture to very generous.

It is felt that there will be an even greater requirement for good quality native grain and that better quality feeds will be produced at better value for money.

NOTICES OF MOTION AT CO. COUNCIL MEETING

The following notices of motion were moved at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dunganvan:

Proposed by Cllr. G. O'Halloran: That the Council take over the road leading to the Walsh and Gairy houses, held at Ballinacash, Clashmore.

Mr. J. O'Flynn, Co. Engineer pointed out that present Council policy was that no new roads be taken over at present but when Cllr. O'Halloran pressed this point to have this road placed on the list, Mr. O'Flynn agreed and said that it could be considered at a later date.

Cllr. C. O'Hain proposed that a Stop Sign be erected at the new school at Ballynacorney, in the interests of the safety of the school children.

The Co. Engineer said that in this regard he intended to place a Yield Sign in the road at first and would monitor the results this would have on the traffic at the junction before taking any further action.

I.F.A. WARNING ON SILAGE COVERS

The Chairman of the I.F.A. National Industrial Committee, Mr. John McCullin, has renewed his earlier warning to farmers purchasing polythene silage covers to beware of any substitution of inferior material which they may be offered.

Mr. McCullin said that it is particularly important for farmers to be aware that there is a French manufactured product on the market, identified as MC Silage Packs, the weight of which has been deliberately cut below the standard 500 gavage product.

Mr. McCullin said that the reputable suppliers of silage covers on the Irish Market had come to a gentlemen's agreement with the Institute for Industrial Research and Standards and the I.F.A. not to take unfair advantage of this loophole in the standard specification.

Mr. McCullin said that I.F.A. would be advising farmers who might have already unknowingly taken delivery of their underweight silage covers to put their retail supplier on notice of their intention to claim compensation for any financial loss resulting from the supply of an inferior product to them.

CULTURLANN EVICTION FACING C.C.E.

Labhras O'Murchu, Director-General of Comhaltas Ceoltuoirí Breacnua, addressing a meeting of Comhaltas in Cullinstown on Thursday, said that the ICC is now seeking vacant possession of what has become the mecca of native culture.

Due to a decrease of 50% in State funding to Comhaltas in recent years the group has had to be unleased to smash the hopes and achievements of Gaelic Ireland. The phenomenal success of Comhaltas was not achieved by the voluntary work of thousands at home and abroad, they were the patriots who put into practice the spirit of the Irish constitution and who now suffer the same indignities as were being inflicted on native peasants by a foreign ruler.

Mr. O'Murchu went on: "It is ironic that at a time when our people are being sought, State agencies denote one of the most potent commodities which has united people, created world-wide affection, and that is Irish traditional music. It was brought back from the diaspora by the emigrants and is stronger than at any time in Irish history."

"The movement which played the leading role in this modern miracle — the Ceoltuoirí Breacnua — is now being pushed into the gutter by the cultural racism of State agencies — only in this case the racism in question is the relegation of our own race and their people, which has united people, created world-wide affection, and that is Irish traditional music. It was brought back from the diaspora by the emigrants and is stronger than at any time in Irish history."

"When the plain people of Ireland take to the streets in Dublin on June 9 to seek a regard it will be with heavy hearts they do so. Who would have thought that such a regard would be won by those who loved the native traditions, would have forced the cultural movement to be a light on our cultural and intellectual reputation."

ATTENDANCE AT UNDERMINE O.A.P.

Professor Raftery also commented on the attempts by the United Kingdom Government to give £50 million compensation to some of its milk producers and said that this should be fought all the way in the E.E.C. This attempt to manipulate the E.E.C. should not be tolerated. Rules are there for all the member states without exception.

"While Britain continues to claim massive refunds from the E.E.C. he says, it is apparently seen fit to introduce National Measures in a further attempt to undermine the Common Agricultural Policy."

"I am calling on the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Austin Hanlon, to immediately project at the highest level in the E.E.C. and to strenuously resist these measures."

£260,000 LOAN FOR CAPPOQUIN FIRE STATION

Waterford Co. Council at their meeting in Dunganvan unanimously agreed a resolution proposed by Cllr. J. A. Walsh and seconded by Cllr. J. Denny, T.D. to immediately project a loan of £260,000 for Cappoquin Fire Station.
