PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

DUNGARVAN SPORTS CENTRE VANDALISED

A couple of weeks ago there was a rather spectacular occasion at the Dungarvan Sports Centre when the GAA Centenary Cup hurling final captains, John Lennon of Cork and Pat Crotty of Limerick, visited the new 4,000,000 complex at Quin's. Following a "Cook's Tour" of the building, guided by Mr. Tom Keith, Manager of the Centre, both were lauded in their praise of the very fine facilities which were provided there. There, too, to welcome the visitors was Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager, whose drive and initiative was primarily responsible for the building and equipping of the Centre.

Although the Centre was officially opened only a little more than two months ago, the visitors were appalled to learn that even in the first week and a number of occasions since, the building has been attacked by vandals.

The Manager, Mr. Keith said that windows had been smashed, gutter pipes broken and cut, toilets were blocked and stones thrown on to the roof. He added that there was what he described as "only a mindless minority" responsible for the damage as all who had used the Centre had treated it with maximum care.

However, this mindless minority can create quite a deal of damage which costs money to repair. When they carry out these attacks on the Centre they cannot be invisible and must be seen by someone or other and it should not be necessary for us to stress that it is a civic duty for anyone to see that public property is protected and to report to the proper authorities when they see and possibly recognise the vandals who are responsible for creating this damage.

SELECTION BY FAIR AND IMPARTIAL COMPETITION

Dungarvan Urban Councillor Michael O'Riordan has received a letter from Mr. John Boland, T.D., Minister for the Public Service, in reply to a query which he made concerning canvassing for public service positions.

The Minister states in the letter that he has now sanctioned a regulation which he requested the Civil Service Commissioners to make and which is aimed at strengthening the Commissioners' long-standing prohibition against canvassing by, or the use of influence on behalf of candidates at Civil Service Commission competitions.

Mr. Boland claims that the effect of this regulation is to ensure that any attempt, direct or indirect, by a candidate to influence the Commissioners will automatically disqualify the candidate.

"As you will appreciate," the Minister's letter then states, "the purpose of the regulation and of my decision to transmit all representations made to me to the Commissioners from May 1, is to ensure that selection is made, and seen to be made, through fair and impartial competition."

Minister Boland closes his letter by stating that in connection with this matter he was once again appealing to the general public not to embarrass their public representatives by making requests which it would be improper for them to pass on and the effect of which would be to disqualify the applicant.

OUR HARD-WORKING T.D.'s

Councillor Says It Galls Him To Hear "PAYE People" Moaning And Complaining

During a lengthy discussion at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan on a report of a recent national seminar on Local Government reform a Flanna Fail member, Cllr. Kieran O'Riordan, said he repeatedly called him to hear "PAYE people" moaning and complaining about the amounts of taxation and PRSI payments they were making.

The meeting heard Senator Katharine Bulbulia and other members complain about the steady erosion of the powers of County Councils, with Senator Bulbulia insisting that "we are becoming nothing more than cosy talking shops."

The meeting dealt in detail with the worsening financial crisis confronting local authorities and Cllr. O'Riordan warned that unless local authorities came up with some source of money to raise their own funds they would soon be left without powers of any kind.

When Labour's Cllr. Billy Ryan said he would be slow to support any local fundraising venture that would involve already overburdened PAYE members in making further contributions, Cllr. Ryan said that every time he heard people

cribbing, moaning, and groaning about the PAYE people it galled him.

"Unlike the small farmers," continued Cllr. O'Riordan, "those on PAYE at least know what they are earning each week. Many of them are earning extravagant wages and through PAYE all they are doing is paying tax on what they earn."

Cllr. O'Riordan said many of the small farmers he represented would gladly pay income tax if they were earning the kind of money some of those on PAYE were earning.

Cllr. Ryan retorted that everybody knew well the inequity of the present taxation system with those on PAYE carrying the burden for everyone.

Fine Gael's Cllr. John Carey asked "who is Cllr. O'Riordan talking to? He is saying I don't know where this nation would be today," Cllr. Carey added.

FINANCES

The Council's current serious financial situation was referred to after the meeting by the proposal of Senator Bulbulia, seconded by Cllr. William Kennell, to have three additional posts at the new Tramore library, and the raising of a loan of £20,000 to buy new books for the service in the county.

The raising of the loan was proposed by Cllr. Con Casey and seconded by Senator Bulbulia. The three new posts are that of assistant librarian, an assistant, and the county librarian told the meeting that the books for Tramore would be open in the autumn and would be the finest in the county.

Cllr. Paddy Kennedy said he was not objecting to the Tramore library but he had been reliably informed that in another five years Waterford County Council could be facing the most dire financial straits.

"Are we going over our heads completely," he asked, "and are we not getting the authoritative information that we were?"

Cllr. Ryan said his colleague had asked a very valid question, and he suggested that when next the accounts are "done the books" members should be able to tell us what the figures are to them regarding borrowings and the danger of going "over the top."

Mr. Paul Clerkin, Acting Co. Secretary, said that at any time members can be made aware of the up to the minute financial situation of the Council, Provisional had been made in the estimates for the three new appointments and the 250,000 loan approved today while the abstract of accounts would be before a meeting of the Council in about two months time.

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COMPLAINT ANSWERED

Before the meeting was a letter from Mrs. Mary O'Driscoll, Vocational Employment Exchange Branch Manager, answering allegations made at a previous Council meeting by Cllr. NO CLOSURES

The Minister for Justice Mr. Noonan has scotched all rumors that some rural garda stations may be closed down in the coming months.

The Minister in a letter to the Council said his Department had no plans whatever to close any rural station anywhere in the country.

Cllr. Michael Hennebery, who had proposed a resolution calling on the Minister to give such an assurance, said he was delighted the Minister had now done so. He called however for an assurance that at least one additional garda to the town of Portlaoise where, he said, there has been many instances of criminal activity in the recent past.

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Hunt On For 'Travelling Criminals'

The hunt for the five man gang described as "travelling criminals" who carried out six raids on Tuesday morning in the counties of Waterford and Kilkenny, continued throughout the South East last night.

First target for the hooded gang was an English registered Grenada car parked in the car park of the Lower Hotel, Waterford City, in which they travelled the 30 miles to Dungarvan. There they raided the single storey home of Mrs. Eileen Moloney, a 71-year-old retired nurse of Gallow's Hill, before kidnapping her and dumping her in a hut at Kilmeadon, Co. Waterford at 1.30 a.m.

On their way from Dungarvan they stopped at Haughton's licensed premises at Carrois Cross, and smashed in the front door and tied up the two young boys in a shed at the rear of the premises.

Before leaving, they took £20 in cash, two bottles of gin, a bottle of vodka, a bottle of rum, and 600 cigarettes. The raid was discovered by Detective Garda Pat Sullivan of Tramore who was on patrol duty in the area.

The gang then drove to Adamstown, Kilmeadon, where they carried out a raid on the bungalow of the two Lynch sisters and the home of Mrs. Margaret Kelly with the three elderly women in the boat of the car they failed to start it, and stole a red BMW Reg. 3192ZF.

A nearby caravan owned by Mr. Michael Hickey of Silvercut, Co. Kilkenny, was also ransacked.

The gang travelled to Mooncoin, Co. Kilkenny, where they smashed a window in the shop of Mrs. Kathleen Holden, at 2 a.m., and then forced the door of her nearby dwelling and tied her up and gagged her.

They brought her to a shed

at the rear of her house and locked her in it, while the gang set off to free herself after two hours.

The gang then drove to Ballygarry, Granagh, three miles outside Waterford City, where they threw a concrete block through the glass panel of the front door of the home of Sean Croke. The five fled the area when Mr. Croke produced a shotgun.

Supt. Don Donoghue, of Waterford Garda Station, said yesterday that a car fitting the description of the red BMW stolen at the Sweep, Kilmeadon, was seen heading early yesterday morning through Co. Carlow.

DUNGARVAN WOMAN'S ORDEAL

"The extent of the violence and sheer brutality the gang displayed towards 71-year-old Dungarvan widow, Mrs. Eileen Moloney, unfolded on Tuesday evening.

Still very badly dressed and upset after a terrifying ordeal, which began with the gang forcing their way into her home at Gallow's Hill, abducting her in the boot of a stolen BMW car and finally locking her into the outskirts of Kilmeadon village 20 miles away, Mrs. Moloney said she thought her end had come.

At the home of her daughter, Mrs. Jennie Phelan, St. Patrick's Terrace, Abbeyside, where she was staying on Tuesday night, Mrs. Moloney told how she had been threatened repeatedly by the men that she was punched and kicked, bitten on the hand, and finally dumped in a rattle-trapped but.

A Dungarvan family was left homeless at the weekend after fire almost completely gutted their two storey home at Clonety Villas.

Mr. and Mrs. Michael Donnelly, their sons Kevin and Brian and daughter Ann, stayed with relatives and friends over the week-end after losing most of their possessions in the fierce blaze, which left their terraced house a virtual ruin on Saturday afternoon.

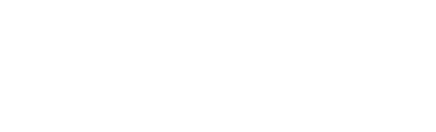
Only Mr. Donnelly was at home around 4 o'clock when the fire started in the kitchen. He escaped unharmed and neighbours raised the alarm at 4.10 p.m.

Within minutes two units of the Dungarvan fire brigade under Asst. Fire Officer, Mr. John Shanahan were at the scene. By then, however, the fire had spread rapidly throughout the house with the flames coming through the front door and windows.

The women who remained at the scene for three hours were powerless to save either the house or the contents and their efforts were concentrated to a very large extent on preventing the fire from spreading to the adjoining houses at either side.

The fire is believed to have started in the kitchen but the cause is yet unknown.
