VIOLENCE TO THE ELDERLY

We have all become sickened at the constant attacks on our senior citizens and our feelings of outrage are only matched by our feelings of helplessness in doing anything to even check the mounting number of these attacks.

We may ask, is anyone in authority even listening to the constant calls and appeals being made for some positive evidence that action is being taken to restore law and order. Are the Department of Justice and the Garda hierarchy insensitive to the judiciary's scathing and willing to match the crime with the punishment?

The recent dreadful happenings here in Dungarvan and throughout other parts of the county as well as similar happenings in East Cork which have seen several elderly people who live alone attacked and threatened in their homes and even forcibly removed from their dwellings in the course of middle of the night raids, have horrified everyone.

These attacks have been publicly condemned by both Waterford and Cork County Councils at meetings held last Monday. In Cork a resolution calling for the reintroduction of the death penalty for all serious crimes was passed by a 28 to 9 vote but the Council balked at a suggestion that the death penalty be extended to include murder with violence especially of elderly people, rejecting this on a 24-14 vote.

Proposer of the motion, Cllr. Denis O'Leary, said that the way of crimes, including murder which was so rampant in the country had prompted him to table them.

Waterford County Council, on the other hand, were unanimous in their call to the Minister for Justice to introduce legislation making it mandatory on the courts to remand in custody those appearing on charges relating to robbery with violence.

The proposer of the motion, Cllr. Patsy Kenneally said that granting bail to such people was making a total laugh of the law as it had often happened that such people had gone on further criminal rampages while on bail in the past.

Cllr. Kenneally was indeed expressing the now generally held view that it was a sad reflection on society as a whole when elderly people living even within the environs of Dungarvan were to-day living behind locked doors all day, every day.

They are simply afraid to come out for fear of being attacked by these gangs of lawless thugs.

Most of us have affection for our parents so we should make no bones about our feelings regarding this sickening blight which has come over the countryside in recent years. Everytime we read or hear of an old person attacked we are relieved when it is not one of our own but it has happened to someone's and it might just have well been ours.

One day we shall all be old and if we have to live in fearful isolation, cowering every time someone knocks at our doors we might only if any day steps are taken now, have each other to blame.

THE EURO ELECTIONS

According to figures quoted last week Irish interest in the European elections was second lowest in the Common Market's ten countries. Apart from Britain, Ireland was the only country where less than half the registered voters failed to take part.

O'Leary said that the biggest drop in voter interest of any EEC country, the 48 per cent turn-out in Ireland was 17.6 per cent down on the 63.6 per cent figure of the first European elections in 1979.

The results of the elections in the Munster Constituency saw the following elected: T. J. Maher, Indep. (outgoing); O'Donnell, F.G. (outgoing); Tom Rafferty, F.G.; Sylvester Barrett, F.P.; and Gene Fitzgerald, F.F., the latter two without reaching the quota.

Biggest surprise here, of course, was the very unexpected defeat of the Fianna Fail sitting M.E.P. Noel Davern while also a surprise was the facile manner in which Fine Gael newcomer, Prof. Tom Rafferty captured a seat.

Without doubt Prof. Rafferty's win was due to excellent work by the Fine Gael party machine in the matter of planning, distribution and indeed hard work throughout the entire Munster constituency.

On the other hand, the unexpected defeat of Noel Davern, has been seen as an under-estimation on his part and on the part of his personal supporters who presented to his chances by his Cork party colleague, former Minister Gene Fitzgerald who, in the final analysis "nicked" the Clonmel man's seat from him.

Conceding defeat and the loss of his seat in the closing stages of the count in the parochial hall at Gurranebragher, Cork, Mr. Davern commented: "I am out of a job, it's as simple as that." He added that he had obeyed the party rules to the letter and had not campaigned outside the area allocated to him: Tipperary, Waterford and East Cork.

Perhaps had Mr. Davern cast his net a little wider he would have picked up more than the few thousand extra votes that would have made all the difference for him in the end.

Mr. Davern's defeat means that for the first time in decades the Davern family are now without a parliamentary seat. His late father, Michael Davern was a long-sitting T.D., who was succeeded by son Don and after the latter's tragic death in 1969, Noel won the seat and has been a prominent and indeed popular politician since.

Incidentally there was almost total indifference to the referendum on the Amendment of the Constitution to allow non-nationals to vote in Dail elections but from the small number of voters who did vote in the issue, there was a big majority in favour.

Here in County Waterford, of a total valid poll of 16,257, there was a majority of 8,747 in favour; 12,507 voting "Yes" and 3,760 voting "No".

BALLYPOREEN WAS TOPS SAYS NANCY

President Reagan's visit to his ancestral home town of Ballyporeen was the highlight of his European tour, which all began exactly a month ago this week-end, his wife Nancy told newsmen on their return journey to the U.S.

Commenting on the tour in general, Mrs. Reagan spoke of her feelings when she saw her husband standing on the spot where his great-grandfather had been baptised in the village of Ballyporeen. Asked if it had been an emotional moment for the President, she replied, "Oh, yes. If your father was orphaned at the age of 6, and you didn't know anything about your family background at all, then to actually stand at the baptismal font... where the great-grandfather stood..."

But now that this historic visit has all passed off, a tourist treasure hunt for hidden mid-Munster beauty spots is expected to be one of the principal spin-offs.

American visitors are expected to adopt President Reagan's example and stop off in the South Tipperary village during their countrywide tours. Tourism chiefs are confident they can effectively promote attractions in the region which have not been part of the main holiday trail up to now.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Council's Capital Debt Reaches New High Of £30.7 Million

Waterford County Council's capital debt stood at a new high of £30.7m on December 31 last. It was disclosed by County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley in a report to last Monday's Council meeting in Dungarvan.

"The capital account however is not in disarray," the Manager said. "It is in fact well under control."

Mr. Hurley disclosed that the debt had risen substantially since 1977 when it stood at £9.7m. By 1979 it had reached £12m, and on December 31, 1983 was £25.3m. Due to subsidies however the impact of servicing the debt was much lower than at national level, and in the County Council's case the gross figure amounted to just over £23m in 1983, but after State allocations, S.D.A. repayments and other contributions the net cost plummeted to £301,200.

In a detailed summarisation of the capital debt, Mr. Hurley revealed that almost £21m. of the £30.7m. related to local authority housing and loan advances for private housing, and the Council was not faced with any loan charges in respect of these.

"Overall, our capital debt is not an unconfortable figure," the County Manager said, adding that the abstract of accounts will shortly be placed before the Council when an opportunity will be afforded the members to consider the overall financial position in

depth.

Cllr. Tom Healy said it was evident, despite the size of the capital debt, that the affairs of the Council were being managed "wisely and well" and that was shown in the relatively low cost of servicing the debt.

£550,000 MORE FOR HOUSING

There was better financial news for the meeting by way of a circular from the Department of the Environment disclosing that the Minister was allocating an additional £1,250,000 to the Council for its housing programme in the current year.

Mr. Hurley said that while

their total allocation was still somewhat short of last year's, this extra allocation would enable them to complete their 1984 housing programme.

Cllr. Michael Hennebery urged that the Manager consider a resolution to the effect that the housing scheme for the village of Newtown where he claimed no local authority house had been built since the foundation of the State.

"Newtown has become the neglected and forgotten village of the county," said Cllr. Patrick Cahill, while Cllr. Pat Coffey also supported a call to build Council houses there.

Mr. Hurley said he would keep that in mind when their future housing plans were being drawn up.

The Chairman, Cllr. James Walsh said they could be proud of their housing progress in the county, to which Mr. Hurley responded "we certainly are not in a crisis situation where housing in the county is concerned."

WASTE OF MONEY

Meetings of the joint Cork, Kerry, Waterford, Sligo and Donegal District Councils were a scandalous waste of public money, one of the Council's representatives on the committee told the meeting.

Cllr. Jim Barry said the holding of monthly meetings by the committee was a "non-sense" and they were really only an excuse for collecting travelling expenses.

The colleague on the committee, however, Cllr. Kieran O'Riordan sharply disagreed, and warned that such a course could turn out to be a national scourge if not kept under control. He insisted the Committee of which Waterford, Cork and Kerry public representatives were members, was an excellent one and doing a very fine job on behalf of an industry worth many millions of pounds a year to the nation.

The new chairman of Waterford County Council for the coming year is Cllr. James Aiden Walsh (FG), who defeated Fianna Fail's Cllr. Paddy Kennedy in a 12-11 vote at Monday's annual meeting in Dungarvan.

Cllr. Walsh, whose first time as chairman this is, is a brother of the late Cllr. Norman Walsh, who also formerly held the chair.

The lone Labour member, Cllr. Billy Byrne, who had the all-important deciding vote, supported Cllr. Walsh, but stressed that he was not tied to either Fianna Fail or Fine Gael now or ever.

In proposing Cllr. Walsh, Cllr. William McDonnell (FG) said he believed the chairmanship of the Council should in the future rotate, as the time was

long gone when any one person should hold the chair for a long number of years. Cllr. Oliver Coffey (FG) seconded.

Cllr. Kenneally was proposed by Cllr. Tom Cunningham (FG) who said he welcomed the Fine Gael view that the chair should rotate in future. Cllr. John O'Brien seconded.

Cllr. Kenneally was unanimously elected vice-chairman on the proposal of Cllr. Michael Hennebery.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN

I hope to sell my car privately in the near future. A friend was telling me that when you sell your car now you no longer hand over the registration book to the buyer. I wonder could you please explain the new situation to me.

A. Since February of 1983 the onus is on the seller of a car to ensure that the new ownership is registered with the local motor taxation office. It is in the interest of the seller that the motor tax office be notified promptly of the change of ownership. Otherwise the seller would continue to be regarded as the registered owner and liable for parking offences and offences relating to uninsured driving of the car.

In the case of a private sale, both seller and buyer should fill up a joint declaration of sale on a special form (Form R2) obtainable from the motor tax office. 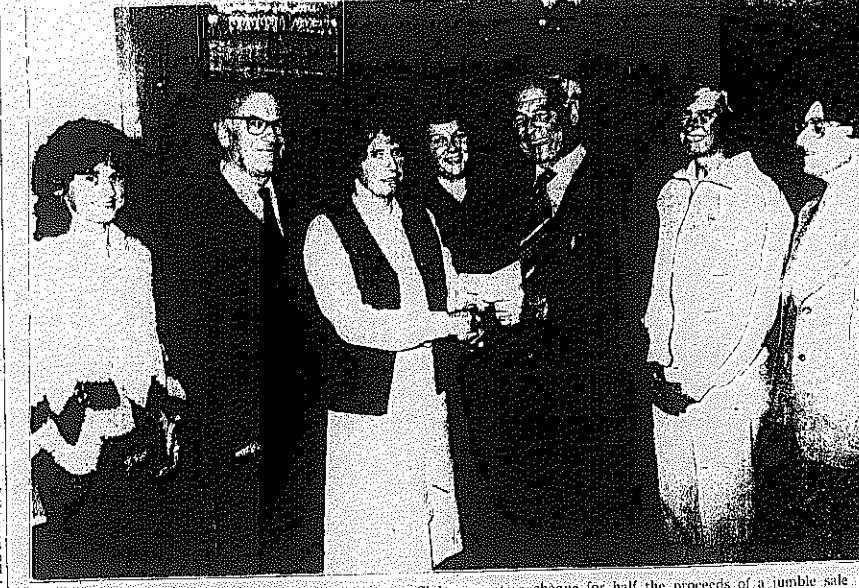

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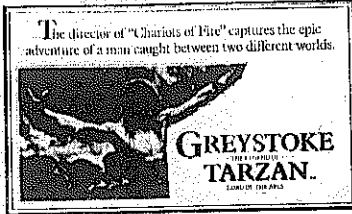

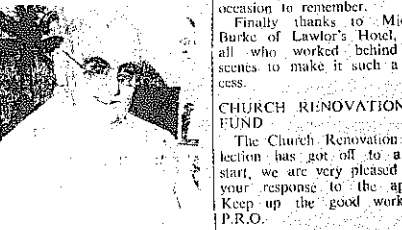
