TO PUT THE RECORD STRAIGHT

When we wrote in our issue of June 8 about the several people from County Waterford who played prominent roles during the recent visit to Ireland of President and Mrs. Reagan, the name of Rev. Fr. M. NO LONGER OFF THE BEATEN TRACK

Last Monday we were in Ballyduff and local Postmaster Eamonn Bolger showed us a cutting from the "Irish Echo" dated June 16, 1984, published in New York, which he had received that morning from a friend of long-standing and of many visits to Ballyduff and other parts of West Waterford, Mrs. Eileen Clouse, 225 Lake St. Lake Orion, MI, U.S.A.

It probably was a coincidence that the extract was a "Spotlight" column by Joe Murphy in which he wrote about "The Lovely Blackwater".

The portion with which we are concerned here referred to Ballyduff and this is what Joe Murphy had to say about it: "The evening was beautiful as I drove along the winding road to Ballyduff in Co. Waterford - a road that offers some of the most memorable views of the River Blackwater. I have often wondered why it is that this charming village just ten miles from Fermoy is so little known to people in both Cork and Waterford. There was a time when I knew many people in that area but when I called into the village on my last visit, I found that the majority of those I had known had gone, some in exile but far too many in their graves.

"As I said earlier, it was a lovely evening and I was in no great hurry. I strolled down the bridge and looked at some cattle standing in the River Blackwater close to the shore. I was leaning on the old bridge when a friend of many years' standing came along. In the course of our chat he casually mentioned the tragedy of the decline of so many Irish villages, and all for the want of more encouragement to develop an industry of their own. The trouble with us down here in Ballyduff and other such places is that we are off the beaten track and virtually forgotten. I said my friend from the Banks of the Blackwater."

Old Age Pension Committees

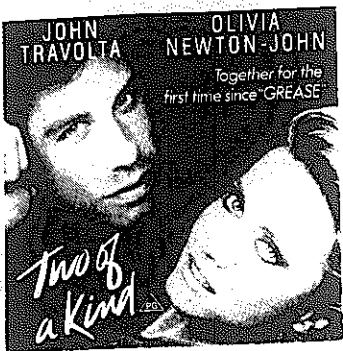
From the 2nd July Old Age Pension Committees no longer operate. In future, claims for non-contributory old age and blind pensions will be decided by Deciding Officers in the same way as other Social Welfare claims. There is a right of appeal to an Appeals Officer. The new arrangements will streamline procedures and improve the service.

THERE IS NO CHANGE IN THE WAY PENSIONS ARE CLAIMED. Claim forms are available at any Post Office. REMEMBER: Old Age Pensions should be claimed in good time - up to 4 months before age 66 (or age 18 for Blind Pension).

COMPULSORY ACQUISITION OF LAND

DUNGARVAN URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL C.P.O. NO. 3 OF 1983

The Minister for the Environment has, on the 22nd day of June, 1984, made a confirmation order, confirming the above-mentioned compulsory purchase order as respects the land described in the Schedule hereto. The said order, as so confirmed, authorises the Dungarvan Urban District Council to acquire the said land compulsorily. A copy of the order as so confirmed and of the map referred to in it may be seen at all reasonable hours at the Town Hall, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford.

The order, as so confirmed, will become operative at the expiration of twenty-one days after the date of publication of this notice but if an application is duly made to the High Court within that period by any person aggrieved by the compulsory purchase order, as so confirmed, and desirous of questioning the validity of the order, the court—

- may by interim order suspend the operation of the compulsory purchase order as so confirmed either generally or in so far only as it affects any property of the applicant until the final determination of the proceedings;
- if satisfied upon the hearing of the application that the compulsory purchase order as so confirmed is not within the powers of the Housing Act, 1966, as extended by Section 10 of the Local Government (No. 2) Act, 1966 (as substituted by Section 86 of the Housing Act, 1966) or that the interests of the applicant have been substantially prejudiced by any requirement of the Housing Act, 1966, as so extended, not having been complied with, may quash the order as so confirmed either generally or in so far only as it affects any property of the applicant.
