BEING AN MEP AND ALL THAT

Various reasons for the very small poll in last month's Euro elections have been voiced but it appears to us that one of the main causes was the great apathy among the electorate and the disenchantment that has set in among the people in regard to politicians in general. A big section of the public believe that the new generation of politicians are basically "me-finders" with a "what's in it for me" attitude.

Where the European Parliament elections are concerned it is a fact that those who have been elected will all find themselves substantially richer after their five-year term of office. And the £16,413 salary is only the tip of the financial benefits that the MEPs who will commute to Strasbourg will accrue during their term in Europe.

An MEP who attends all the EEC's parliamentary sessions, and city committee meetings each year could easily be £70,000 richer by the end of the year. A daily allowance of £93 is designed to cover bed and breakfast and day-time meals. All air fares are paid by the EEC and a country member will, in addition, be paid at a rate of £125 per mile for the journey from his base to the airport.

Office expenses of £15,000 per year should ensure that the daily delivery of post is properly filed. One-third of this can be claimed without receipts. Meanwhile, £23,000 is earmarked for the secretarial expenses, although receipts must be produced for this cash hand-out.

Air travel allowance within the EEC is confined to a mere £1,860 against no receipts. Many of the re-elected and defeated MEPs already are also entitled to substantial pensions and top of this list is Fianna Fail's Sean Flanagan who could comfortably retire on £18,214 per year pension. Among the other "pensioners" are Paddy Hart, £14,606; Mark Clinton, £14,368; Richie Ryan, £14,367; Neil Blaney, £8,276; Gene Fitzgerald, £5,333; Tom O'Donnell, £5,333; Eileen Lomax, £4,982; Noel Davern, £4,927; Ray McSharry, £3,295.

All these "rewards" make the local TD's look as if they are living on the breadline. An ordinary Deputy gets the same basic salary as his European counterpart, of £16,413. But there the comparison ends. Twenty Deputies, those more than 20 miles from Dublin, get an overnight allowance of a "mere" £27.50 plus travelling expenses of 40p to 50p per mile. So it can easily be seen that for those who succeeded in jumping on to the gravy train it is truly a case of "I'm all right Jack." On the other side of the coin it must also be realised that when the Joe Soaps who put them on the train see all this money in flight, with very little to see in return they cannot be blamed for becoming apathetic and fed-up. And indeed that's the way most now see it!

£1 Million Plus Budget For County Vocational Education

A record £1,198,647 estimate for 1985 was unanimously adopted by the members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

This is the first time ever that the budget to run the affairs of the Vocational Education Committee in the county has topped the £1 million mark. Of that total, £616,000 will be expended on instruction. Receipts are expected to almost keep pace due to grants from the Department, estimated to be more than £6 million.

The adoption of the estimates was proposed by Mr. T. Maher and approved unanimously by the Committee.

NEW VICE-PRINCIPAL The meeting unanimously approved the recommendation of the independent interview board that Mr. Pat Buckley be appointed to the vacant post of Vice-Principal at Dungarvan Vocational School.

Mrs. Margaret McGrath, Acting CEO, stated that Cork-born Mr. Buckley was presently a member of the teaching staff of the Dungarvan school.

His appointment was proposed by Cllr. Pat Coffey who presided, seconded by Cllr. Oliver Coffey and unanimously approved.

SCHOOL OF MUSIC When the Acting CEO stated that the financial allocation for the servicing of the Vocational schools in the county and this would not enable them to allow Mr. Jim Horgan to continue in the exclusive capacity of tutor for the School of Music. Under the present teacher allocation" said Mrs. McGrath, "the School of Music as we now know it in Co. Waterford will be gone next term."

Mr. Kieran Heffernan warned that once the School of Music went that would be the end of it. "We should call on the Department to allocate an individual teacher for it," he said.

DEASY PRESIDES AT FIRST MEETING OF COUNCIL OF MINISTERS Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D. Minister for Agriculture, chaired his first meeting this week as the incoming President of the EEC Agricultural Council of Ministers.

Mr. Deasy said that there were some encouraging signs in the second half of 1984 as regards the Common Agricultural Policy. He said courageous decisions had been taken which he recognised had caused considerable anxiety among farmers, in the interest of restoring balance to the Common Agricultural Policy. Mr. Deasy added that it was necessary that the budget problems for the remainder of 1984 should be rectified, otherwise there could be a trend back to national measures. He was determined to ensure fully the aims of the Common Agricultural Policy.

As regards specific objectives Mr. Deasy referred to the implementation of the Structures Policy, the harmonisation of legislation on Veterinary Plans Health and Animal Feed matters and also the problems of the beef sector which may arise during the autumn.

After further discussion it was decided to defer a final decision to the next meeting of the Committee. Sympathy was expressed and tribute paid to the late Dr. Jack McEann, Chairman of the Irish Vocational Education Association whose unexpected death occurred recently.

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DAIL QUESTION ON TENDERS FOR WATERFORD REGIONAL HOSPITAL

'Dr. D. Ormonde (FF) asked the Minister for Health to allow the new Waterford Regional Hospital to go to tender immediately in view of the fact that all stages of planning are now completed. NEW YORK CO. WATERFORD ASSOCIATION TO HONOUR GAA CENTENARY

More than one hundred County Waterford people who live in the New York area and who are members of the County Waterford Association in New York are to fly home to Ireland next month. The flight is being sponsored by the County Waterford Association in honour of the GAA Centenary and is scheduled to arrive in Shannon on Friday, August 3. Pat Whelan also states that besides these games, many more activities have been planned for the duration of the group's visit. Without doubt there will be a hundred thousand welcomes awaiting the County Waterford exiles when they arrive in Shannon on August 3 and indeed throughout their entire visit to their home county here in the Delse.

UNBLEMISHED RECORD REMAINS UNSULLIED

A woman with a hitherto unblemished record was given the Probation Act when she appeared before District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court on a larceny charge. Mary Ann Connors, Durrrow, Stradbally, pleaded guilty to stealing a pair of runners valued at \$2.00 from Durrrow Store, Mary Street, Dungarvan, on June 15. Garda Inspector J. Harrington said that after leaving the store with the runners the defendant was stopped and when the garment came she admitted the theft. District Justice O'Connell said he would not sully the defendant's good record. Applying the Probation Act, he told the defendant that he did not expect to see her in court again.

LADY DRIVER FINED £100 AND ENDORSED

Breda Barron, Kinsalebeg, Youghal was summoned at Dungarvan Court for driving without insurance at Tarr's Bridge, Dungarvan, on March 3 last. Garda Donal Foley in evidence stated that when he stopped the defendant at Tarr's Bridge on the date in question she told him that she was insured and that she would produce the necessary papers at Youghal Garda Station. When he made inquiries there and later also at Ardmore Garda Station he found there had been no response from the defendant. When Mr. M. Hanrahan, who appeared for the defendant, asked to have the matter adjourned to the next court to enable him to receive further instructions from his client who was not in Court, District Justice O'Connell refused the application stating that he felt the defendant was trying to be a little too smart on the occasion. He imposed a fine of £100 on the insurance charge with an endorsement and an additional mitigated fine of £20 for having no tax on the occasion and fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.

SEATBELTS REDUCE ROAD DEATHS

Road deaths in the United Kingdom fell by 12% last year, when the wearing of seatbelts was made compulsory, according to EC Transport Commissioner Giorgos Contogeorgis. Injuries also fell by 14% compared to 1982, clearly illustrating the positive impact of fitting people not wearing seatbelts, he said. In other EC member states where seatbelts are already compulsory, the number of people killed or injured on the roads showed a further small decline of 1 to 4%, he claimed.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL COMPULSORY PURCHASE ORDER GRAIGUESHONEYEN, KILMACTHOMAS 1983

The Minister for the Environment has, on the 8th day of July, 1984, made a confirmation order containing without modification the above named compulsory purchase order as respects the land described in the Schedule hereto. The said order, as so confirmed, authorises the Waterford County Council to acquire the said land compulsorily for the purposes of the Housing Act, 1966. A copy of the order as so confirmed and of the map referred to in it may be seen at all reasonable hours at Arus Brugha, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford. The order, as so confirmed, will become operative at the expiration of twenty-one days after the date of publication of this notice but if an application is duly made to the High Court within that period by any person aggrieved by the compulsory purchase order, as so confirmed, and desirous of questioning the validity of the order, the court—

- (a) may by interim order suspend the operation of the compulsory purchase order as so confirmed either generally or in so far only as it affects any property of the applicant until the final determination of the proceedings; (b) if satisfied upon the hearing of the application that the compulsory purchase order as so confirmed is not within the powers of the Housing Act, 1966, or that the interests of the applicant have been substantially prejudiced by any requirement of the Act not having been complied with, may quash the order as so confirmed either generally or in so far only as it affects any property of the applicant.

Top Class Games In Prospect

Practically all the championship games listed for Sunday next are crucial to the clubs as far as progress in the championship is concerned. With so many top-class games in prospect we are sure to have at least some splendid contests.

The Collihan v. Ardmore junior hurling final listed as a crucial contest gives a fair indication of the quality of the programme to be played at Fraher Field. This could be the match of the day and whatever the outcome, the hurling will be good and there will be plenty of excitement. Collihan are strong, well, but not as well as last year. An improvement in their level will be needed if they are to get a share.

Ardmore are improving and being out of the football will be concentrating on hurling. There is a similarity in styles up to a point, but Collihan are the more potent side, with Ardmore, possibly the stronger.

Collihan are favourites and may win but their favourites nowadays seems to be becoming more and more meaningless. An Rinn versus Athane in intermediate football is the kind of game that gets supporters' heads in anticipation of an exciting game. Both are going well for the title and both will have to be at their best to win it. Athane, who suffered an unexpected defeat by Ballyvaughan last week, will have to realise that in championship you must be able to keep going for the full hour. Their best for a full hour may not be good enough to beat Athane who are now beginning to get their game back. Athane in form should win here.

Dungarvan and Caislean (Caislean will be in action in intermediate hurling at Fraher Field at 2 p.m. and with the result, now in jeopardy, will be a surprise first round defeat by Tallow they will be difficult to beat. Dungarvan have dropped only a single point to St. Mary's, and a win here will leave them strongly in contention for a Western title. Dungarvan could come through, Abbeyside, and Tallow meet in intermediate hurling at Cappoquin and how this will go is anyone's guess. Tallow were beaten by Dungarvan in the same way and a similar margin so on that basis the sides would seem equal. Things rarely work out that way and the match will be decided on the best performance. Abbeyside might just see out there.

The first game at the Cappoquin venue will see Kilgobbin and Ballyvaughan in opposition in a crucial game in the junior hurling championship. Victory should belong to the winners through their selection and with so much at stake this game will be an excellent contest. Ballyvaughan are strong at both hurling and football and it might just be their year for a breakthrough in the hurling. A fair idea if his is going to happen.

Lismore and Shamrocks are both going well in junior hurling and we'll know which club is doing the better after their interesting encounter at the grounds on Sunday afternoon.

enthusiasm. Maybe it was brought on at the wrong time. Jim Greene spoke again in support of the many suggestions made in the selectors report. He spoke about the manner of appointment of selectors and said the terms of office was far too short.

Sean Cooke, who made the best contribution to the debate, spoke about the lack of skill at club level, the lack of proper coaching, the attitude of players to county teams in general, some feeling that it is not worthwhile, the management of teams and the lack of planning. Jim Greene, who had been playing for 12 years in the county and during that time he had won only 3 first round matches.

Eddie Cunningham said there was something seriously wrong with our club structures. Many county clubs had no interest in having their players playing with the county, he said.

Mr. Fitzgerald, county hurling officer, was very critical of the County Board. He was appalled by the lack of skills among many of our players and he praised the county selectors for their splendid report. He spoke of the "leakage" after the level and after that, he said, things went to the dogs. Frank and Cullinane, comment on the system of selecting selectors and he thought the availability of money was important.

The chairman stated that he had been requested to give costs of county teams to date this year and the figures given revealed that more than 222,000 had been spent on preparing inter-county teams. This had been spent on senior hurling. (This included National League and the National Hurling League has always been the Board's biggest revenue source.)

Tom Cunningham, speaking on the under-age aspect of the matter, said that the present system in the minor championship was a great disadvantage. He said that he had given no chance of correcting faults in players or teams because the championship games came too close together. Clubs would need a reasonable amount of time between matches to develop skills.

Nicolas MacCrath agreed with these points. The discussion broke off at this point and when it resumed Tom Cunningham made the proposal concerning the setting up of a group to make recommendations to the September meeting.

They did Waterford proud and made a wonderful team. In fact someone said to me on Monday that they were the best Waterford team in a Munster final since 1963 and the fellow who said this has seen them all.
