PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

A SPORTING HERO

The XXIII Olympiad ended in Los Angeles USA on Sunday last and throughout the entire period of the games or at least until that very last day the spirit of most in the Irish Olympic camp were flagging. Bill John Treacy ventured forth on that now memorable evening to take on the greatest marathon runners in the world over the 26 miles and 385 yards course through the suburbs of Los Angeles. Ireland had not done as well as expected. But like the sun shone as the slim, quietly spoken young man from Villierstown showed the great heart he had and finished in second place to take the Olympic silver and set the Irish flag flying for the first time at the games after an epic run.

It was a great day for the Irish and indeed for John Treacy himself who has had several heart-break years since the terrible trauma he suffered in the cauldron that was the Olympic Stadium in Moscow in 1980 where he collapsed during the 10,000 metres. By his great performance last Sunday he has proved the cynics who thought his sun had set wrong and more importantly he proved that he had the courage to set out a race which broke all the iron men of road running from Australia's Robert de Castella to America's Alberto Salazar.

de Castella, the man the experts rate as the greatest of all specialists in the marathon field, offered the opinion at a press conference after the race that Sunday's marathon topped the list. "It has got to be said," he told the assembled press, "that this was the most competitive marathon of them all. I just look at the depth of talent in the line-up and the men who failed to make it into the top."

And now it is all over for 1984. We are all grateful to John Treacy for his outstanding achievement and are happy to see him back at the top. We salute him again as a sporting hero. Indeed in the early days of the XXIII Olympiad a couple of weeks ago we sent a telegram to John Treacy in Los Angeles on behalf of the Editor and Staff of the "Dungarvan Leader" which said: "Up Villierstown, Up Waterford, Up Ireland, success to your efforts." And in it has turned out.

Well Done John, You Did Us Proud

"Well done John" were the simple words with which President Hillery congratulated John Treacy after the 27 year old Villierstown man's epic run to win the silver medal in the marathon, the final climactic event of the XXIII Olympiad in Los Angeles, U.S.A., which concluded in a blaze of glory last Sunday night (Monday morning Irish time). Thousands of telephone calls and congratulatory messages have been pouring into the Treacy home in Villierstown since Monday morning and the celebrations of the wonderful achievement have been in progress in the picturesque village of the Blackwater all the week. The celebrations have also been in full swing in Scortstown, Co. Monaghan, the Border village where his wife, Flonnualla comes from and where he did much of his pre-Olympic training.

"I offer you my sincerest congratulations and good wishes," the President stated in his congratulatory telegram to John. "You have won deserved acclaim and honour for Ireland with your Olympic performance. We are all proud of you," President Hillery said, "and speaking on behalf of all the people of Ireland."

In a message to John on behalf of the Government, the Hon. Mr. Spring, himself an Irish international rugby player, said: "The nation salutes a sporting hero. You have won great honour for yourself, for your native county, Waterford, and for Ireland."

For John Treacy who won successive World Cross-Country Championships in 1978 and 1979, his great win in the marathon, his first, was a superb day for Irish marathon running. Treacy, in his first-ever marathon, ran 2 hours, 9 mins, 55 secs, to beat the existing Irish record of 2:12:26. The winner Carlos Lopez of Portugal and reigning World champion Kenenisa Bekele of Ethiopia were also in the race.

HOW THE RACE WENT

Treacy succeeded admirably in putting the bitter disappointment of the previous Monday night's 10,000 metres final behind him and as the runners passed through the four mile mark he was going smoothly and according to plan. He slipped slightly in a 14-man heat at this stage and first settled in beside the Japanese runner Seko, having passed through eleven miles Treacy moved up behind Niibori of Holland. Pre-favourite Bob de Castella from Australia and five others including the British runner Spedding were taking turns at the pace-making up front.

On the freeway where the temperature was 85 degrees, Treacy was grateful for the special shoes he had made to cope with the hot asphalt.

At this stage another green vested Irishman, the Dublin based Lattoway man, Jerry Kieran, was also well up.

When they hit 20 miles, Seko and de Castella were burned off and fell back and then Lopez, Treacy and two others occupied the leading group. With a few miles remaining Lopez went clear and was well ahead when he reached the Coliseum to take the gold. A great battle then ensued between Treacy and Spedding but showing his usual magnificent courage the trail, lightly built Villierstown man

FULSOME PRAISE

After his sensational win and the medal presentation ceremony which set all hearts in the Irish Olympic camp in Los Angeles thumping with excitement, it was interesting to hear some of John's comments which typified so well his great humility.

"It was fulsome in his praise and thanks to a wide variety of people. Top of the list was his wife Flonnualla and baby daughter Caoimhe. "A third of the medal belongs to each of them. My wife supported me all the way," he said.

Dr. Herrera and Bob Amato, the Providence College mentors, with the expert approach, who did metabolic tests monthly to measure Treacy's growing fitness to run his first-ever marathon were warmly thanked. "BLE and as John himself described them to the international press conference, "The Irish Export Board," were thanked for their support through his preparation for the greatest day, so far, in his sporting life. Even his two World Cross-Country medals would have been traded for an Olympic bronze. He made that abundantly clear.

A CHEERING FINISH

Thus ended the XXIII Olympiad, thankfully on a high note for the Irish. We had to wait for something to really cheer for. It was a relief, especially when the other Irish vest worn by Jerry Kieran appeared to be in the lead for more than three minutes after John Treacy to finish ninth overall.

CELEBRATION OF A LIFETIME PLANNED FOR VILLIERSTOWN

Since John Treacy took the Olympic silver in Los Angeles last Sunday the spotlight of world publicity has once more returned to the small town of his native village of Villierstown.

By noon on Monday, Villierstown was at a high pitch for everyone as hundreds made their way there to meet and congratulate John's parents.

John will overnight in Waterford on Saturday at his brother's home and will travel to Villierstown on Sunday where the official welcoming ceremonies are planned to commence at 6 p.m.

Mr. Paul Clerkin, Deputy County Manager, confirmed to the "Leader" that the County Council were conferring with the local committee in Villierstown about plans for the reception. He said that the County Council would be making a presentation to John and that Dungarvan Urban Council would also be involved. The plans, he said, would ensure that John's return home would be marked by a celebration of a lifetime.

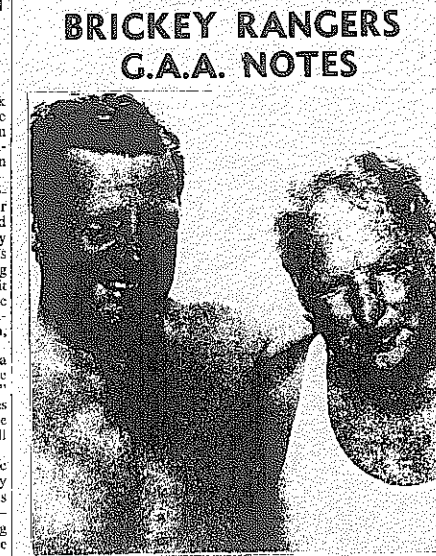

which Local Authorities have had to face in recent years has been caused, in large part, by the rise in the number of burglaries, thefts of cars and vandalism in general.

The concept of seeking compensation from a local authority for malicious damage goes back at least to 1836 when the Malicious Damage Code was introduced. The code was intended to be a deterrent against "social unrest" and a safeguard for the property of the landed and affluent classes against attacks by the peasantry. It provided an incentive for people to keep affairs in some of their own localities as charges were usually limited to the areas where the damage was done.

The Malicious Injuries Act is one for which many calls have, in the past, been made by all parties to the government of the day for abolition and it is likely, therefore, that the decision now announced by the Government will receive a large measure of cross-party support both in the Dail and in local Councils.
