VOCATIONAL MUSIC CLASSES IN JEOPARDY

For 10 years a thriving school of music has functioned at many centres throughout Co. Waterford under the organisational expertise of Vocational man Jim Morgan and under the control of the Co. Vocational Education Committee. But now the refusal of the Department of Education to sanction the appointment of a full-time teacher to conduct the school is threatening its existence: last week's monthly meeting of the VEC in Dungarvan was told.

The chairman, Very Rev. Dean P. Cassidy P.P. V.F., said the School of Music currently had 830 students and was operating at 15 centres throughout the county. "The Department of Education, however, will not sanction the appointment of a whole-time teacher for," said Dean Cassidy, "and while this committee has an organiser, the students, the track record and the money, it is the school that the Department sanction the teacher before the work of 12 years is eroded."

Mr. D. Goode said it would be an indictment of the Department of Education, and more particularly of the Minister, Gemma Hussey, if the school was allowed to die. He proposed, and Mr. Pat Coffey seconded, that they ask the Department to sanction a whole-time teacher. There was unanimous support for the proposal.

There was criticism by several members of a Department regulation whereby gross earnings were the criterion for educational scholarships. The meeting was told by the acting CEO, Mrs. Margaret McGrath, that the number of scholarship applications this year was down on former years. Mr. Billy Ryan said it was "inherently wrong" that a person's gross pay was the means by which the scholarship application was assessed. He would be far more equitable, he would have a wage earner's net pay as the criteria and this was a Government regulation in need of immediate change.

Mr. James A. Walsh supported and he proposed, that they call on the Department to review the situation.

INCREASED FEES In approving increased fees for adult education classes in the coming year, the meeting was told that among the classes available would be one for the adult game, bridge. "That drew a retort from Mr. Goode: "I think I'll start up classes and make a few pounds on the side."

NEW OFFICES The meeting was informed by the Acting CEO that Department approval had been received for the Committee's new administrative offices which would be located on the site of Dungarvan Vocational School, which is to be replaced. Mrs. McGrath disclosed, however, that the Department's approval governed a maximum expenditure of £25,000 on the new offices.
