**CAN WE FACE REALITY?**  
The Government's three-year plan, "Building On Reality", which already has sunk into millions of newspaper and radio and television news items, is not a staid old plan for an otherwise simple way of looking at it, do a great deal to make the outlook for the future any rosier. Basically, unless we are all prepared to face the facts and indeed the reality of the situation, there is very little reason to believe that "Building On Reality" will achieve the results which the experts expect from it.

Our problem at its simplest is that we are a nation of overspenders and that, for years now, we have been living beyond our means. This is evident in governmental expenditures and in national expenditures as a whole. In the final analysis, this overspending is reflected in the borrowing of resources from abroad to finance excessive current balance-of-payments deficits but the root of the problem lies in excessive governmental expenditure with the draconian taxation system which has resulted from this.

If as a nation we are unwilling to pay for the current level of public services, the only solution is to scale back those services to levels for which we are prepared to pay. As a community we are currently overspending on a massive scale. Unless we stop doing so it is only a matter of time until we compromise our right to take our own decisions and manage our own affairs. As individuals, it has already publicly been said that history might judge us as "the rip-off generation" for our "what's in it for me" attitude. This is an attitude that Irish people need to change and change quickly. But there appears to be resistance at all levels to change. There is resistance everywhere from politicians to the local effects of changes designed to improve services in a more cost-effective manner. There is also resistance from trade unions because they see less promotional prospects for their members and less members where "rationalisation" is carried out. We still want the luxury of silk and satin but we just cannot afford it any longer.

The solution to the problem is a task which we must all, as individuals, face up to. There can be nothing gained by saying that it is not our responsibility. While it is a task for the government to correct our financial and economic problems, it is a matter for each of us to make that action possible by altering our expectations in regard to the services we demand and the incomes we seek.

Under date September 26, the letter stated that a new digital exchange has now been provided in Youghal and this has been connected to the new modern trunk exchange at Charlestown in Cork. Dungarvan exchange has recently been connected to the new digital exchange in Waterford City. "These developments," the letter then stated, "will provide a greatly improved service to telephone subscribers within both the Youghal and Dungarvan areas and on calls between the 024 and 028 group of exchanges."

**CO. COUNCIL TO TACKLE LISMORE TRAFFIC PROBLEMS**

Traffic congestion created by cars being parked on both sides of some streets in Lismore was discussed at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday. The subject was raised as a result of the motions put down in the names of the Cllrs. Councillors Willie McDonnell and James A. Walsh and Fianna Fail Councillors Mrs. Nancy Armstrong and Jimmy Quirk.

Cllrs. McDonnell and Walsh in their motion asked the Council to investigate the provision of parking restrictions at Lower Chapel Street and East Main Street in the town while the other motion asked that "because of acute traffic problems at Lower Chapel Street and East Main Street double parking be prohibited in both areas, double yellow lines laid and appropriate by-laws enacted to enforce one-side parking only".  
Cllr. McDonnell said that the problem was that East Main Street was very narrow and also the lower end of Chapel Street and if parking in these areas was allowed on one side only he felt it would improve the position.

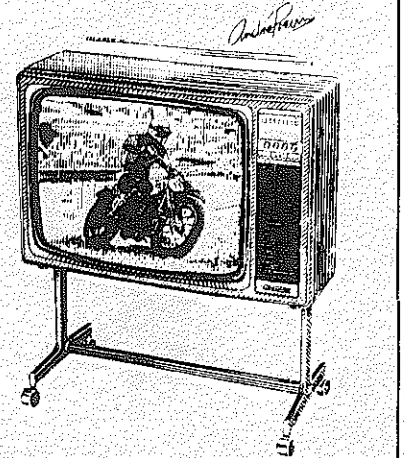
**REPAIRS**

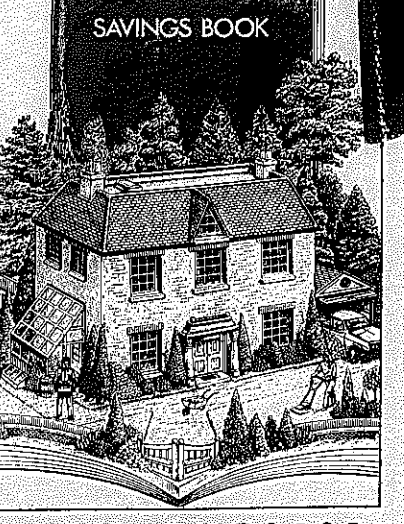

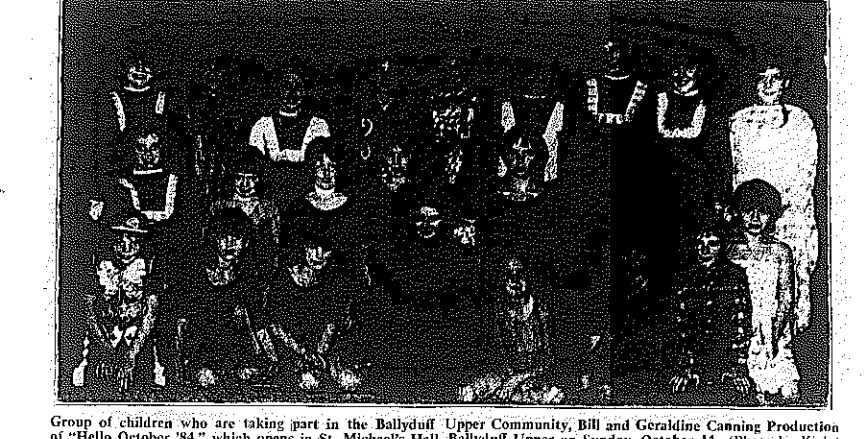

## COURT SEQUEL TO SUMMER INCIDENT IN ARDMORE

A 16-year-old Cork city youth who was said to have received 1200 words of dental treatment after being struck in the face outside a dancehall in Ardmore last July, was to a degree the author of his own misfortune, District Justice W. E. O'Connell held at Youghal Court.

Before the court was 19-year-old Thomas Cronin, Lisarrow, Ardmore, who pleaded not guilty to assaulting the youth in Ardmore on the night of July 11 last.

In evidence, said he went to a disco in the village hall that night and after purchasing a ticket was refused admission by the doorman. He asked for a reason and was pushed out and given a "dig" in the face by Cronin.

Cronin, who pleaded not guilty to assaulting the youth in Ardmore on the night of July 11 last, said he had been barred from the hall a few weeks previously but for no reason. He had been barred a week before this incident in the hall without any trouble.

Garda John Galvin said the youth complained of being assaulted, and witness said that the inside of his lip was out and bleeding. He spoke with Cronin, who admitted the assault, but said he had tried to force his way into the hall after being told he was barred.

Cronin said the youth was assaulted and cursing, and he also kicked the door of the hall. He also said to witness: "You are dead."

Corroborative evidence was given by another doorman that night, Michael Morrissey.

District Justice O'Connell said there was no doubt there was an assault but the defendant was entitled to restrain the youth when he tried to force his way into the hall.

"I don't believe the defendant used excessive force, and to a degree the injured party was the author of his own misfortune," the District Justice said, dismissing the charge against Cronin.

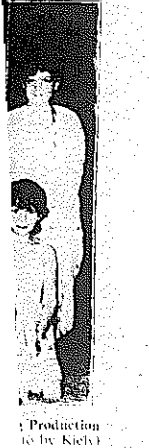

# Community Enterprise Has Important Role In Job-Creation

"Community Enterprise" is the direct involvement of the community in the job-creation process. It involves community groups to make a real contribution to job-creation and to the promotion of self-confidence in the community about its ability to decisively influence the course of local economic development.

Community groups are well placed to identify the employment needs of young people in their area and are also often equipped with the resources and potential to identify and cater for local needs. Meeting these local market opportunities can mean the creation of local employment.

**INITIATIVE**  
A community has to take the initiative in exploring local resources and needs to become involved in community enterprise. The community group interested in community enterprise should ask: "Are there goods or services which are required that are not being supplied already?"

There is no point in community enterprise efforts if the people who work at the expense of others job. New markets and opportunities must be found.

Not is there any set formula for the generation of ideas for community enterprise. It exists, the Youth Employment Agency's Community Enterprise Programme is available to help as the projects generated by the needs of the community, providing work for unemployed people within the community.

**COMMUNITY ENTERPRISE PROGRAMME**  
The Youth Employment Agency is committed to the concept of community enterprise, and last year launched the Community Enterprise Programme to act as both a stimulus and a response to community groups' efforts in the job-creation process.

The Community Enterprise Programme, currently being expanded, brings groups to a stage where they can avail of the supports offered by other agencies in the statutory, commercial and voluntary sectors.

The Community Enterprise Programme is complementary to the job-creation activities. Its central role is the financial assistance it provides in-kind.

Advice to interested community groups and links to other groups who have launched successful enterprises.

Planning grants for groups wishing to identify and investigate goods and services which could be produced locally.

Funding the recruitment by local community groups of a full-time Enterprise Worker for up to 12 months to develop specific job-creation proposals.

Links to other sources of assistance from state/commercial agencies.

Direct financial aid, including start-up finance, and project management costs for up to 12 months.

**EDEN GARDENING SERVICE**  
Eden Gardening Service, also hoping to expand, is currently employing three young people in providing gardening services on a contract basis (commercial and domestic).

**OPEN ARTS WORKSHOP**  
The "Open Arts Workshop" is employing four young people in the areas of graphic design and commercial art. Waterford Recycling Co-op, which employs six young people in the collection of waste paper and glass on a weekly basis. It is currently looking for a storage premises.

**VEGETABLE GROWING**  
Kilmurry Enterprises, Ferrybank, Waterford, received funding from the Youth Employment Agency as a pilot project involving 10 young people in growing vegetables on 30 acres of land rented from the IDA. Young people are provided with an on-going month training course in horticultural skills which involves them attending day-release classes at Kildallon Agricultural College. It has qualified for "Start-up" assistance under the Community Enterprise Programme.

**IMOKILLY**  
Imokilly Community Development Company Ltd. was established by East Cork Mullarney. The branches in Autumn 1982, with assistance from the Community Enterprise Programme, to provide employment opportunities for young people in East Cork. Thirteen people are now employed by the Co-op manufacturing a number of wood-based products. These include cauliflower crates; fish cartons; sprouts and celery boxes; puppets; cabbage baskets; wooden trellis fencing and oyster boxes. Many of these items were previously imported either for use locally or by various distributors around the country.

**EMPLOYMENT PROSPECTS IN THE AGRI-FOOD SECTOR**  
It would be unrealistic to expect increases in employment in the food sector with the present mix of the industry. Dr. Pierce Ryan, Director of the Agricultural Institute, says at the Conference on Strategies for Employment held by An Foras Forbartha in Dublin last Tuesday.

In the milk sector, where output increased by 56 per cent in the period 1973-82, employment only increased by 3 per cent. Two other sectors had increased output in the same period—meat processing and iron and steel—but employment declined in both these industries.

**IFA PRESIDENT CRITICAL OF IRISH DAIRY TECHNICAL COUNCIL**

In a statement he said: "The question that must be posed is: 'What has the Dairy Technical Council at Moorepark and its predecessor, the Steering Committee delivered to farmers since the publication of the Agricultural Institute Report 'Chemical Composition of Milk in Ireland for 1977?'"

"Can we point to one tangible product which has benefited the ordinary dairy farmer? Despite the best efforts of the Agricultural Institute, ICMSA and IFA, nothing positive has been done."

"The Farm Organisations and the Institute, in my view, have been frustrated in their endeavour on the Council by other vested interests. However, it is encouraging to find that the Agricultural Institute Personnel involved in the Council have displayed the highest level of professional and scientific integrity."

"In this situation, IFA would expand and intensify its own butterfat checking programme for 1985. Our check-weighing programme this year has proved of real benefit to dairy farmers."

# COUNTY ENGINEER REPORTS PROGRESS ON ROADS AND SANITARY SERVICES

Progress reports for the month of September in respect of work on roads and sanitary services (water and sewerage schemes) throughout the county were submitted as follows by Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer to the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday:

# IMPORTANCE OF SMALL INDUSTRIES STRESSED AT IGC SEMINAR

Pat Loftus, IDA Assistant Regional Manager, South-East Region, speaking at the Irish Goods Council Seminar in Waterford on Wednesday, October 3, stressed the importance of the Small Industry programme in the context of the overall national economy where small firms (up to 50 employees) comprise 2 out of 3 of all manufacturing firms. In the South-East Region alone there are over 700 manufacturing units employing less than 50 people.

"The IDA's role is to act as a catalyst in identifying and developing worthwhile ideas throughout all walks in life in Ireland into viable projects. More and more of our people will have to be job creators in the future rather than in the past." This seminar is an ideal forum for us to meet with a wide cross-section of people from school leavers to people who are actually putting project ideas together and give us an opportunity to explain the various incentives that are available.

# REGIONALISATION OF SMALL INDUSTRY

The Government has decided to fully regionalise the services of the Small Industry Programme over the IDA regional structure including the decision making process. According to Pat Loftus, it is the most important development in the programme since its inception in 1967. It is a total devolution of responsibility to the regions.

Pat Loftus, with the basic philosophy behind it being the local initiatives and enterprises can more easily be identified and developed at local level. It is our hope that the whole process of having a project approved for grant assistance and actually receiving the grant will be greatly streamlined and reduced considerably the time lag from the original concept to the actual start of production.

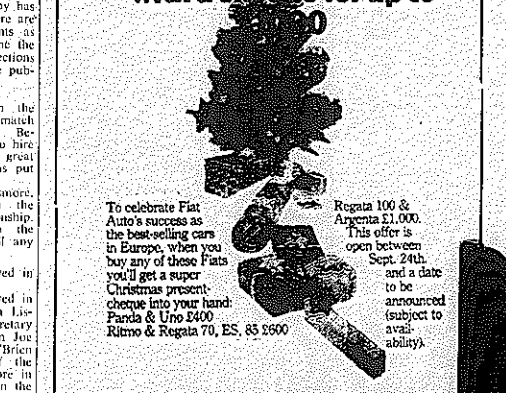

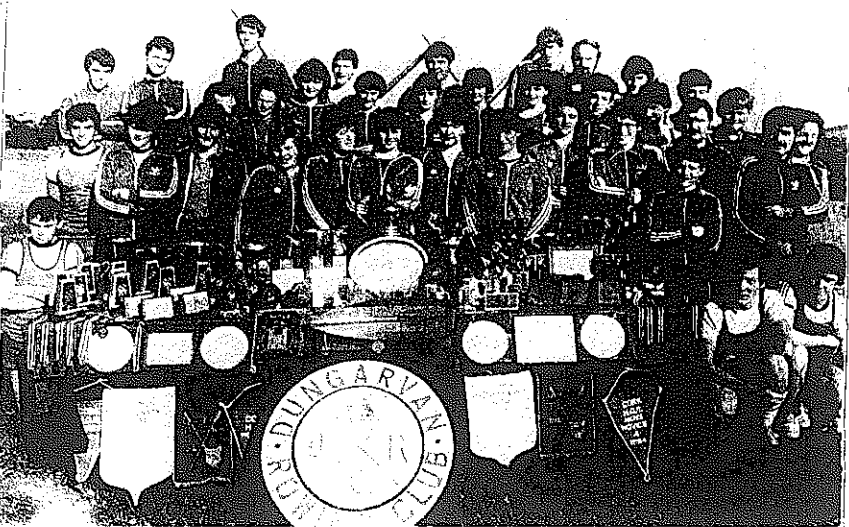
