DICING WITH DEATH

In connection with a Child's Safety Awards Project competition announced last week which will involve every primary school in Ireland and which is sponsored by the Church and General Insurance Company, a fact sheet relating to accidents to children has been issued which makes rather disturbing reading.

This shows that an average of 170 children are killed by accidents every year; that 16,000 children are admitted to hospital annually because of an accident and that, on average, a child is killed by an accident every 2 days.

Presented like this it must come as something of a shock to most people that the death and accident rate among children in this country is so high.

Dealing with the age groups during which children are most prone to accidental death and injury, the facts show that accidents are the most common cause of death amongst children aged 1 to 14 years; nearly 50 per cent of deaths to children aged 10 to 15 years are caused by an accident; one-third of all patients attending a hospital accident and emergency department are children. Therefore accidents are a growing threat to the health of Irish children; today and if further proof of this, beyond the figures already quoted, was needed there is the fact that they accounted for 47 per cent of deaths to children in 1980 compared with 12 per cent in 1950.

Between 1950 and 1979 there was almost a five-fold reduction in the mortality rate of children from all causes except accidents. The three main causes of accidental death are transport accidents, drowning and fires which account for 54 per cent, 13 per cent and 10 per cent respectively of all childhood accidental deaths in this country.

Pedal cycle accidents are the principal accident type in the 10 to 14 age group and while the majority of these occur in daylight in conditions of good visibility, the hazard grows with the early onset of darkness for the winter months.

The facts quoted above are well-founded as the sources are An Foras Forbartha and the Medicso-Social Research Board and can be accepted at face value.

Last week-end marked the official start of winter time which results in early evening darkness. During the past year we have no doubt but that the number of young cyclists on the road has risen very steeply. These children have been used to cycling around the streets and roads throughout the summer in bright daylight conditions. Even at that they were always at risk. Now that daylight fades before 5 p.m. how much more at risk are they?

It is vitally necessary for all cyclists, and this includes adults as well as children, to cycle at night to be equipped with properly functioning front and rear lights. It is absolute folly to venture out otherwise as motorists will not be able to spot you in time and you will be whipped before you know where you are and you will just have become another statistic in the number of accidental deaths.

And indeed this warning would also apply to joggers who frequent the roads in ever-increasing numbers. If you don't wish to commit suicide when out at night then make sure that you can be seen either by having proper lights on front and rear or if you are a cyclist, and if a pedestrian or jogger by wearing reflective arm bands or something white. Otherwise you are only dicing with death.

MOTORISTS FINED, DISQUALIFIED AT DUNGARVAN COURT

A number of motorists were fined and disqualified from driving at Dungarvan Court when they all pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol.

A 27-year-old welder, Thomas Curran, 7 Parklane Drive, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, was convicted of the offence at the Causeway, Dungarvan, on July 15 last. He was found to have a concentration of .219 milligrams in his blood.

"The conviction will be disastrous for him, he will lose his job because of it," Mr. Niall King, Solicitor, said.

District Justice W. F. O'Connell however responded by saying that while it was an unfortunate thing, the defendant must have known the consequences of drunk driving.

A fine of 475 was imposed, the conviction was endorsed, and Curran was disqualified from driving for 12 months, the disqualification to commence on November 12.

A fine of 6100 was imposed, on Larry Kieley, Glendog, Cappaugh, Dungarvan, who pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol (226 milligrams) in his blood at Bahaadon, Dungarvan, on July 15. He was also disqualified for the statutory 12 months, the conviction was endorsed. The defendant had been stopped at a "routine" Garda check point.

A man who was returning from a close friend's funeral collided with a parked car, and the mishap cost him a total of £180 in fines as well as a loss of his driving licence for 12 months.

Patrick Mooney, an 80-acre farmer of Blandford, Ballynamunn, pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol in his blood (283 milligrams) at Main Street, Dungarvan, on August 19 last.

The defendant also pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of careless driving and failing to report an accident to the Garda.

Supt. M. English said Mooney's car collided with a parked car. He then stopped and having looked at the damage, drove on. The Garda however were later alerted when questioned by a man who was reporting the driver.

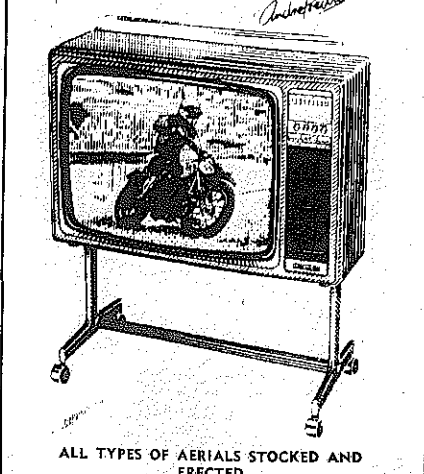

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS COLUMN

I'm an old age pensioner and would like to know if I can get (to dental treatment)?
You have two possibilities - with regard to dental treatment.

The Dept. of Social Welfare provides dental benefit for insured workers. If you were entitled to this benefit at old age pension age you would still be entitled to that benefit now and will be for life.

If you are not covered by Social Insurance, you have a Medical Card only, you are entitled to free dental treatment from the Health Board's own dentist. There can be delays in getting treatment but priority is given to very young, the elderly and expectant mothers.

The portion of the cost paid by Social Welfare if you are covered by insurance depends on the full amount of examination and supply of basic pair of glasses up to half the cost of contact lenses.

Priest Who Knew Padre Pio Visits Dungarvan

As the campaign for the beatification of the renowned Franciscan Friar, Padre Pio of San Giovanni, steadily gathers momentum worldwide, the priest who shared with him every day for the last three years of his life has spoken of his extraordinary disciple of Christ.

New York-born Fr. Joseph Martin, O.P.M., Capuchin, whose grand-parents had emigrated from Dungarvan, was visiting the birthplace of his ancestor, staying first at the home of Thomas and Mary Kely of Knockateenore, Dungarvan, and then at the home of relatives, the McGrath family of Colligan, where his grand-parents William and Mary Dalton once lived.

It was Fr. Joseph's third visit to his ancestral home, having come first as a boy in 1959 and again in 1980 - six years after his ordination. Padre Pio died in 1968 at the age of 81, and Fr. Martin, then 19, was on the altar in the Church at San Giovanni the day Padre Pio collapsed as he concluded a Mass of Thanksgiving for the Holy See's approval of worldwide Prayer groups. Fr. Joseph recalled the fatal moment, "I grabbed him as he fell, but he died later that night, September 23, 1968. Nine years earlier, said Fr. Joseph, Padre Pio had prophesied the day and date of his death to a Dr. Bove of Naples.

Fr. Joseph, so very proud of his Irish and Waterford ancestry, recalls that his first meeting with the holy Capuchin in 1958, and shortly afterwards travelled to San Giovanni to tell Padre Pio of his wish to enter the priesthood.

It was the beginning of a remarkable friendship which was to strengthen and consolidate itself in the ensuing years, and more particularly in the final three years of Padre Pio's life which they shared almost on a daily basis.

"Padre Pio was a very simple, humble man," Father Joseph stated. He suffered enormously in fact, and you could touch the holes in his hands, feet, and heart. They were clearly visible for fifty-six years during all of which time they continued to bleed."

Fr. Joseph said Padre Pio never discussed his own personal self with anyone. At times he may have given the impression that he was rather gruff but that was never the case, he said.

Fourteen months after Padre Pio's death permission was given by the Church authorities to prepare documents for beatification. The actual process for beatification has been under way since March 1983 and Fr. Joseph is hopeful all that work will be completed within the next two or three years. After that, everything will rest with Rome.

He is "quietly confident" however that Padre Pio will be declared a saint by Rome. "If isn't one who is?" he quipped. "Every minute of every day was given by Padre Pio to God. He slept only two hours a night, retiring shortly after midnight and rising again around 2.30 a.m."

Fr. Joseph clearly recalled that he spent five hours every day before the Blessed Sacrament praying - and that was after spending practically the entire day in the confessional. There are now over 70 Padre Pio Prayer groups in Ireland, including Cork and Waterford. Fr. Joseph himself was instrumental in setting up the Colligan Prayer Group which meets once a month in the local church where his grand-parents went to Mass.

He doesn't conceal his delight at this, and on his visit to Dungarvan and Colligan he literally jumped at the opportunity of conducting a Prayer Group meeting on two successive nights which taxed the capacity of the church at Colligan to the limit.

Fr. Joseph presented one of the letters which was placed over Padre Pio's heart, where the stigmata was, to the Colligan Prayer Group. That is now at the Kely home at Knockateenore and will be placed in Colligan during all the Prayer Group meetings.

He had no doubt, whatever about Padre Pio's entitlement to beatification. "He's doing everything you ask him to do, and I've come to call him St. Jack of all trades," he said.

He will tell you of some of the specific cures brought about by Padre Pio's intervention. Among them the story of a county Cork girl, Anne Busted from Bandon, who spent many months in a coma with a brain tumour which threatened her life.

Ann is a member of the Church of Ireland, and many of her Catholic friends began to pray to Padre Pio. "These prayers were answered and today Anne enjoys marvellous health," said Fr. Joseph.

As we took our leave of this remarkable Irish-American priest he promised to return to the home of his ancestors again at the first given opportunity.

PAY PARKING SUGGESTED FOR DUNGARVAN

Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager, told members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting that it was he who had asked to have an item suggesting the introduction of pay parking in Dungarvan placed on the agenda for the meeting. He wanted the Council to give serious consideration to the suggestion.

He pointed out that the Council had expended a great amount of money in buying and levelling Landon's on the quay while additional land had been acquired for a car park for County Council officials at Arns Brugha which would relieve the parking pressure on the street there. "We are providing an area of free off-street parking which is all costing money and I would ask the Council to consider the matter in that light," he said.

Mr. Hurley went on to point out that at this time money which the Council could not fund on its own. "My aim," he added, "is to generate a fund on the basis of user pays."

He then told the members that he was not looking for an immediate decision but just wanted to let the members know what way he was thinking at the moment. The pay proposal would apply only to prime parking areas in the town.

It was agreed to discuss the matter at a special meeting to be held later on.
