RADIO 2 — LIONS CLUBS CHRISTMAS FOOD APPEAL

Another major national food appeal to help the needy poor of this country over the Christmas period is at present in full swing. Organised by RTE Radio 2 in association with Lions International, the public are being asked to spare some non-perishable foodstuffs for distribution to the needy at Christmas.

Last year goods to the value of £140,000 were collected by the exercise while in 1982 £110,000 worth of food was collected and £108,000 in 1981. Now in its sixth year of operation the Radio 2—Lions Clubs Christmas Food Appeal can claim to have generated almost half a million pounds worth of foodstuffs for less fortunate families in Ireland at Christmas time.

The Appeal is expected to generate an even higher level of food donations this year. With the help of 55 Lions Clubs taking part, over 1,200 collection points have been arranged around the country. These are supervised locally by members of Lions International and the food collected is distributed locally by the Lions in co-operation with other local social workers.

Here in Dungarvan the local Lions Club are participating in this very worthwhile charity and collection boxes have been placed at vantage points. So when you see one and if you can afford it, drop a little package into it. It will all help out!

THE DRINKING HOURS DEBATE

Since the government came up with the possibility of an alteration of the licensing laws to permit late night drinking there has been a great deal of debate and discussion ranging from statements by Government Ministers, Bishops and members of the licensed trade down to the man at whom it is all directed—the one who goes to the pub for a pint, bottle or half one.

It has generally been accepted in the meantime that there is no need for any great extension of drinking hours and recently in his home-town of Tralee, the Taoiseach and Minister for Energy, Mr. Dick Spring, helped to clarify in an extension what the government's intention in regard to the matter appears to be.

Mr. Spring, speaking at a meeting of Tralee Friends of the Council, assured his listeners that there would be no late night winter drinking under changes in the laws proposed by the government. Any relaxation of the laws which exist at present would

STUDENTS UNDER PRESSURE

The Bishop of Kerry and Archbishop-elect of Dublin, Most Rev. Dr. Kevin McNamara recently warned that with academic pressures in modern schools, the real purpose of education may be lost.

He said that schools were under tremendous pressure to achieve high academic performance for their pupils. The obvious danger was that other aspects of personality development would suffer and that schools would not have freedom or leisure to provide an all-round education.

Bishop McNamara said that in the long run other things such as a sense of fair play, ability to get on with others, perseverance and self-discipline proved more important for success in life.

We hope that those in charge of our educational system will pay heed to these words of Dr. McNamara. From a recent experience we were appalled at the work-load which young second-level students are now expected to dispose of each day. Following something like seven hours of conventional school class-work they are given a schedule of "homework" which can run into a further three or four hours. It is excessive and too much for both the mental and physical welfare of our young boys and girls.

LABOUR COUNCILLOR REFUTES SENATOR'S REMARKS ON CLOVER CLOSURE

The remarks made by Fine Gael Senator M. Queally, Chairman of the previous year's meeting of the County Committee of Agriculture during a discussion on the closure of the Clover Meats factory that blame for the closure would have to be placed squarely on the shoulders of the workers and the unions, was refuted by Labour Councillor B. Kynne (Lab.) at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr. Kynne said that he was both surprised and amazed to see this statement by Senator Queally (who is also a Council member) and he thought it would be a pity if the matter was taken to the next meeting.

Mr. John O'Brien said that the closure was a national disaster and he thought the whole thing had been carried through too fast. He felt that pressure should be brought on the Minister for Agriculture and their Junior Minister to give the Government to have the outstanding estoppel owed to farmers honored.

It was agreed to write a letter to the Minister expressing the Council's concern in the matter.

Dangerous Bend—The Co. Engineer also told Cllr. McDonnell that he would look into what could be done to improve the dangerous bend adjacent to Moore's and Dowd's at Deer Park North, Lismore.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran was the only Fine Gael member to question the resolution referring to the possible setting up of a Libyan embassy in the country as a result.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran said that the group that went to Libya went on a non-political basis and there was no intent in making a political issue of it here at home.

When there was no further opposition, the resolution was passed and Cllr. Cahill hailed the decision with a hand-clap.

It was noted that the County Hurling Officer was very critical of the many adult clubs who were doing nothing for the juveniles and this led to a discussion on their failure to send delegates to Bord na nÓg meetings.

John Fraher, in a verbal report about the County Board, Committee (County and Board) being inactive for some time and asked to have this rectified as soon as possible.

The chairman promised that this would be done when he had been given sight of the minutes of the meeting and the terms of reference set up by the committee. He said he welcomed the suggestion.

A report from the senior hurling management told about the discomfiture of the Antrim defeat, but stated that with patience and perseverance the team would develop in time. All the players were young and all the panel were eager to do their best but had been their lot recently. It asked the members of the Press not to be too critical of the young players.

A report from the Under 21 football management told of their immediate plans to get training underway and it was noted that a match had been arranged for January.

The minor hurling committee had a report which told of the satisfactory progress which had been made. A final trial will be held before the management decides on the final panel to go into training for the Munster championship game.

There were comments about the failure of the football management to submit a report to the meeting and the county secretary was told to get in touch and have a report for the next meeting.

Tom Cunningham reminded the meeting that all the services to be provided by the county committee were required shortly after their appointment for the term of their office and these would be expected to give an approximate cost of the training schedule envisaged.

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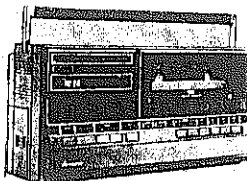

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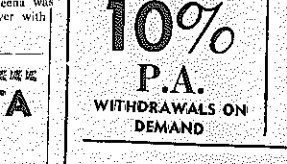
