DUNGARVAN WOMEN CHARGED WITH ASSAULTING GARDAI AFTER FRACAS

Two young women, one a separated mother of two, appeared at Dungarvan Court charged with assaulting gardai after a fracas outside a local hotel in the early hours of August 19 last.

Mrs. Breda Nolan, 34 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, was fined a total of £50 in charges of assaulting Sergeant Joseph Hurley and Garda Donal Foley in the due execution of their duty, and was bound to the peace for six months.

The second defendant, Miss Catherine Duggan, Dr. Caseyville, Dungarvan, was acquitted on a charge of assaulting Sgt. Joseph Hurley in the due execution of his duty on the same occasion.

Sergeant Joseph Hurley in evidence said that around 1.35 a.m. he went to the assistance of a gardai who was attempting to arrest a man outside the Ormonde Hotel. When he did so, Mrs. Nolan, who was using very bad language, rushed at him and kicked him in the shin.

Replying to Mr. Gordon, Soir., Sgt. Hurley agreed that he twisted Mrs. Nolan's hand up behind her back. Eventually assistance came from the Dungarvan gardai and she and another woman not yet before the court were put into the back of the Dungarvan patrol car.

Garda Martin Shanahan, Dungarvan, told the court of receiving a patrol car call to go to a fracas outside the Ormonde Hotel at 1.35 a.m. When they arrived there he saw Traffic Corps gardai trying to put a man into a patrol car but they were being obstructed by a number of women.

Garda Donal Foley told the court that when seated in the front of the patrol car with Garda Shanahan he was grabbed by the hair from behind by Mrs. Nolan. The women were kicking and lashing out and Mrs. Nolan was kicking so severely that she strained the door of the patrol car.

Mrs. Nolan was wild and mad and resisted as strongly as she could, Garda Foley said. Mrs. Breda Nolan in evidence however denied all the gardai allegations. She said she was standing on the footpath not interfering with anyone when two gardai grabbed her and she was kicked by Sgt. Hurley and Garda Foley.
