COMMUNITY COUNCIL **CHAIRMAN'S ADVICE TO ELDERLY**

has warned that violent attacks on elderly people, and the robbing of them of their life savings, will become even more wide-spread while people continue to keep large sums of money in their homes.

The warning was issued by the chairman of the Conna Community Council, Mr. John Finn, when he performed the official opening of a branch of Tallow Credit Union in Conna on Saturday.

Mr. Finn openly acknowledged that the decision to set up a branch of Tallow Credit Union in Conna had been greatly influenced by the spate of violent attacks on the elder-ly throughout the country. The idea had been mooted over two years ago but never quite got off the ground. However, the dastardly attacks which had appalled every decent citizen had now brought about a "change of heart," while the organising of "Community Alert" by their Community Council was also an important influence in the decision.

"We all have a duty, if the oppor tunity arises, to advise people, young and old, against the habit of hoarding money in their homes," the Community Council chairman went on "However I would sound a note of caution too-unwanted advice could easily prove counter productive."

Judge Sheridan said the entire impression created in his mind by the article was that it was an attempt at character assassination. Those who engaged in that sort of muck-raking did so at their peril. It was one of the most outrageous articles about a public representative that he had read for some time.

Mr. Stephen Lanigan O'Keeffe, B.L., instructed by Crawley, Sheerin and Wynne, solicitors, for Mr. MacSharry whose address was given as "Alcandara," Pearse Road, Sligo, said he had been very seriously dehe had been very seriously de-famed in the article which ap-peared in the "Waterford Post" on April 17, 1984. Mr. Lanigan O'Keeffe said the words complained of appear-ed under the heading: "Pub-lic Representatives How Are

After T.D. Charlie McCreevy and Senator Brendan Mc-Gahon appeared on RTE's Public Account programme admitting they did not pay betting tax, the article appeared in the Waterford paper sug-gesting that "Mr. MacSharry is almost a professional punter so his annual betting tax would be quite sizeable."

The article suggested that Mr. MacSharry was a person guilty of a criminal offence and was a person without morals or scruples in whom the public could not be expected to have any faith, according to Mr. MacSharry's counsel. Mr. Lanigan O'Keeffe said

the article went on to effec-tively lump Mr. MacSharry in the same category as another person who was charged with offences involving homosexuality. Judge Sheridan interven-ed to point out that the per-son charged with homosexuality had been acquitted.

Mr. Lanigan O'Keeffe said that from the tone of the argument it was clearly a scurrilous attempt to undermine the standing of Mr. MacSharry in his personal capacity and very much in his capacity as a nublic representative and public representative and former Minister.

An apology and compensation were sought and in corres-pondence Ocline Associates said that in their next edition an apology had been publish-ed exonerating Mr. MacSharry. The defendants did not feel MacSharry constituted a very serious libel and they offered to issue a further apology and make a contribution to a charity of his choice.

The majority of "Waterford Post" readers would have ackknowledged the human error of confusing Mr. MacSharry's name with that of another public representative, the defendants claimed.

But Mr. MacSharry never received a copy of the newspaper containing the apology. 

"HONEST" MOTORIST WARNED AND FINED £130 AT LISMORE COURT

A District Justice has warned a "refreshingly honest" motorist that he will go to jail if in the future he is convicted of road traffic offences.

The warning came from District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Lismore Court where Patrick Heffernan, 10 Chapel Street, Lismore, pleaded guilty to stealing a road tax disc the property of Joseph Motherway, Killeagh, Co. Cork; using the fraudulent disc on November 6 at Lismore; driving an untaxed car on the same occasion, and having two bald tyres on the vehicle.

Garda P. Norris gave evidence

Garda P. Norris gave evidence of seeing Heffernan driving the untaxed vehicle, and when he interviewed him about the fraudulent tax disc the defendant admitted taking it from a car in Killeagh some time previously. Heffernan had previous convictions for tax and insurance but his circumstances were

not good.

The defendant told the court that he couldn't make any excuses but added that the car was off the road since last Dec-

(Rev. Bro. M. D. Murray)

As briefly announced in our last issue the death took place in Clork on Monday, April 29 of one of the best-known Christian Brothers in Ireland, Rev. Bro. Mijchael de Sales Murray who gave over 70 years of dedicated service to the order.

Dr. Murray, who was honourto the Orden. He is best remembered for his long connection with the GAA Colleges Council and for his six-year term as Superior of North Monastery, during which time ence of President de Valera and

It was also during the latter period-20 years ago that Bro. Murray celebrated the 50th anniversary of his entering the Order. He had the very rare honour of celebrating 70 years'

Young Michael Murray enter ed at Baldoyle in 1914. Only three years earlier, he had taken part in the famous 1911 Pageant in the North Monas tery grounds, honouring the centenary of the establish-ment of the Brothers' first school in Cork.
