THEY DIDN'T FORGET THEMSELVES

Last week the Dail went into summer recess" and will not reconvene until October 23 next. That is almost 14 weeks summer "holidays" for our T.D.'s and that is not the only "recess" period into which they pass as apart from the 3-day week they operate when in session there are also long holiday periods at Christmas and Easter.

## Dungarvan Man Heads Company Which Purchases Irish Leathers Factories

receivership last month, have been purchased by the Kilkenny based International Hide and Skin Co., founded fourteen years ago by Mr. Raymond Lannen, a native of Dungarvan and member of a family which has associations with the Hide and Skin business for gener-Dungarvan and member of a family which has associations with the Hide and Skin business for generations in the town.

The deal was successfully concluded with the receiver, Mr. Bernard Somers on Saturday, after protracted negotiations, and for an undisclosed sum. It is expected the new owners of the group will be meeting with trade union representatives in an effort to see how many of the 380 jobs. lost through the collapse of Irish Leathers, can be saved. There is cautious optimism, that the majority of them will be re-employed.

Last year, the Kilkenny concern stepped in and acquired two of the Irish Leathers major subsidiaries—Central Hide and Skin and Irish Hide and Skin, both of which have since played a major role in boostsince played a major role in boosting the company's sales to well in excess of 1.2 million hides and sheep skins.

There are a lot of myths about exercise. Some people say there is no point at all in exercising. Others say that you exercising. Others say that you should do a bout of strenuous exercise each day. The truth is somewhere in between. Exercise is very good for you. It helps both your physical and mental state. A brisk walk is a very good form of exercise. Try pulling your tummy in for ten steps as you walk along. ten steps as you walk along, then breath out for the next ten steps. If you did this all through a brisk one mile walk every day, you would be amazed at how quickly your tummy will flatten. Cycling is also a very good form of exercise, as also is swimming. A very good exercise for the legs and thighs, when swimming, is to go into the water until it's above the top of your thighs, and then jog in place for the count of fifty. The water will act as a massage and break down the fatty tissues. If you work in an office or are sitting down a lot of the time practice this one:—tighten all the muscles in the tummy and bottom, hold for the count of three and then relax. an excellent exercise for toning the tummy and bottom.

Details of the organisation's plans for horticultural development were outlined at a function in Warrenstown College, Co. Melath at which a new specialised technical-marketing service for horticulture was formally launched by the Minister, of State for Agriculture, Mr. Paddy Hegarity.

The overall objective of the

ACOT plan for Irish horticulture is to reduce imports of fresh fruit and vegetables by more than £15 million (at 1984 values) between now and 1990 This represents more than 50 per cent of the current level of substitutable imports of fresh fruit and vegetables.

ACOT's Director, Dr. Liam Downey, said a number of crops which have real potential for import substitution have been identified and a vigorous campaign is now underway to bring about an explansion in

the acreage of these crops Major priority is being given to the following crops — early rrots. onionis flower, apples, tomatoes and dried peas. District, county, regional and national targets have been set for increased acreage of each of these crops and, in all cases, the extra acreage is being zoned in the most suitable climate locations. In addition, IACOT aims to secure the domestic market for pollatoes and eliminate imports (valued at £7 million in 1984). In this, the organisation will be working closely with the recently established Irish Potato Farmers' Co-op. In order to provide the most

effective service to Irish horticulture and to ensure that the development targets will reached a major re-organisa-tion of ACOT's Horticultural Advisory Service has been undertaken.
